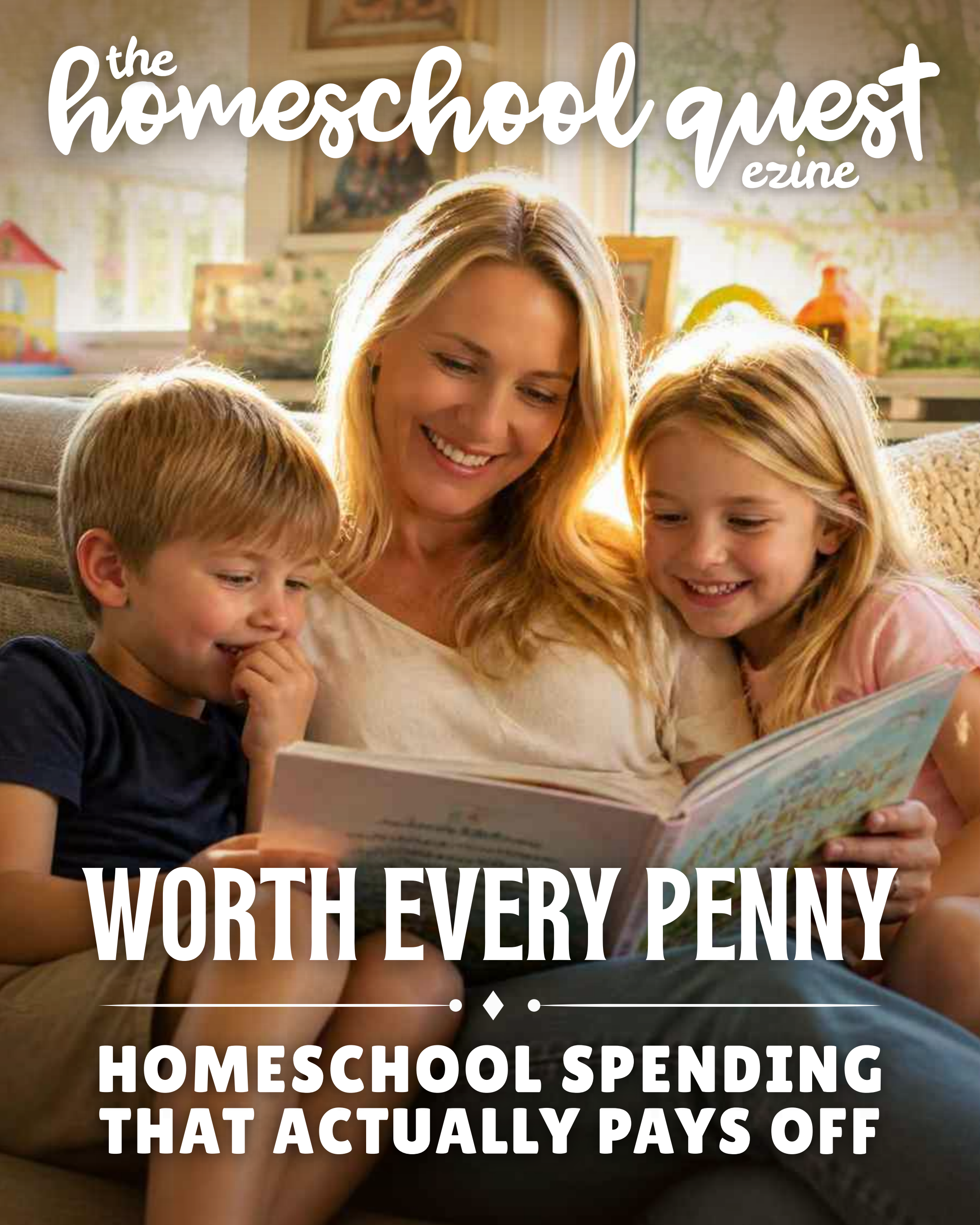

How to choose what's right for your family without overspending

The bright lights of the store illuminate rows and rows of books. Books of all sizes with shiny, decorative colors, each one more beautiful than the next. They all make promises to teach your child to read in 30 days or less, offer math strategies that will rock your socks, and some even offer a curriculum so easy to use that your child will be able to follow it without even needing you in the room. Then you pick them up to find that these all-inclusive curriculums have a price tag that rivals next month's car payment. So you begin to wonder, "Can I even afford to homeschool?" When it comes to the education of your child and what they need to succeed, you are the most qualified person on the planet!



YOU DON'T NEED THE PERFECT CURRICULUM

Start With How Your Child Learns

Homeschooling your child doesn't require fancy, all-inclusive curriculums. It just takes a parent who is invested in their education, showing up each day, ready to teach them in the way that they learn best. Now before we start, I want to say that I have nothing against curriculum packages. For the most part, I think they are great and an awesome guide to those who want to use them. It is also okay if you want to mix and match these curriculum packages to meet your child's needs. What I am saying is that these curriculums aren't necessary. They can absolutely make our lives easier, but the price tag can often be steep. Being able to homeschool our children often means that we are a family living off one income, and that price can be daunting.



YOU DON'T NEED THE PERFECT CURRICULUM



So how do you choose what is best for your child without breaking the bank? Take a look at how your child learns best. Is your child a visual learner? Do they work better when using technology, or is that a distraction to them? Are they better at retaining information when movement is involved, or when they write down what they have heard? What subjects are they strongest in? All these questions will help you determine how to choose or create a curriculum that is best for your child.

YOU DON'T NEED THE PERFECT CURRICULUM

Think About What Your Homeschool Day Looks Like

The next question to ask yourself is what your homeschool day will look like. There is no right or wrong answer here, but it is something to consider when picking out the curriculum that is going to be the best fit for your child and your family. Some parents plan to homeschool for the entire day, breaking it up into subject areas like a traditional classroom setting, while others prefer to homeschool for a couple of hours per day and get everything done during that block of time. This decision is all about what fits the needs of your family best.

If homeschool in your house is more of a hybrid model, you can choose an online platform with self-paced guides to help you navigate the homeschool process. This is what my family does, and it has been great so far. It allows my children to take turns completing the "technology" portion of the day while I work with their sibling on other activities. These activities include experiments, learning games, activity pages, and reading aloud. Once we finish that activity, they switch. This allows me to focus on who needs more help at that time while allowing my other child to continue working and feel confident in what they are doing. Many of the online homeschooling platforms are monthly subscriptions, which is a more cost-efficient option for a lot of families. Large text-based curriculums can require hundreds of dollars, while enrolling online can mean smaller payments ranging from \$20 to \$50 per month depending on the website.

Or Build Your Own Curriculum From Free Resources

Another option is to choose no curriculum and create your own pacing guide at the beginning of the year. This option requires more work on the front end but saves a great deal of money. The first part of this is to plan out your year, what topics you plan to cover, and then pair those with activities. To do this, you can log into online freebie sites and check out homeschool blogs to get activities that follow your plan while also being engaging. There are multiple online platforms that are free to use, such as Splash Learn, PBS Kids, and even Teach Your Monster to Read. Incorporating these gives you a curriculum that is budget-friendly and well-rounded. This type of curriculum can be paired with trips to the library to find books that pair well with the subject or unit you are covering that week.

No matter what route you go, planning your curriculum does not have to be expensive, and it certainly does not have to be complicated. No one in the world is more equipped to teach your children than you are. Ask them what they enjoy learning about, figure out how they learn best, and go for it!

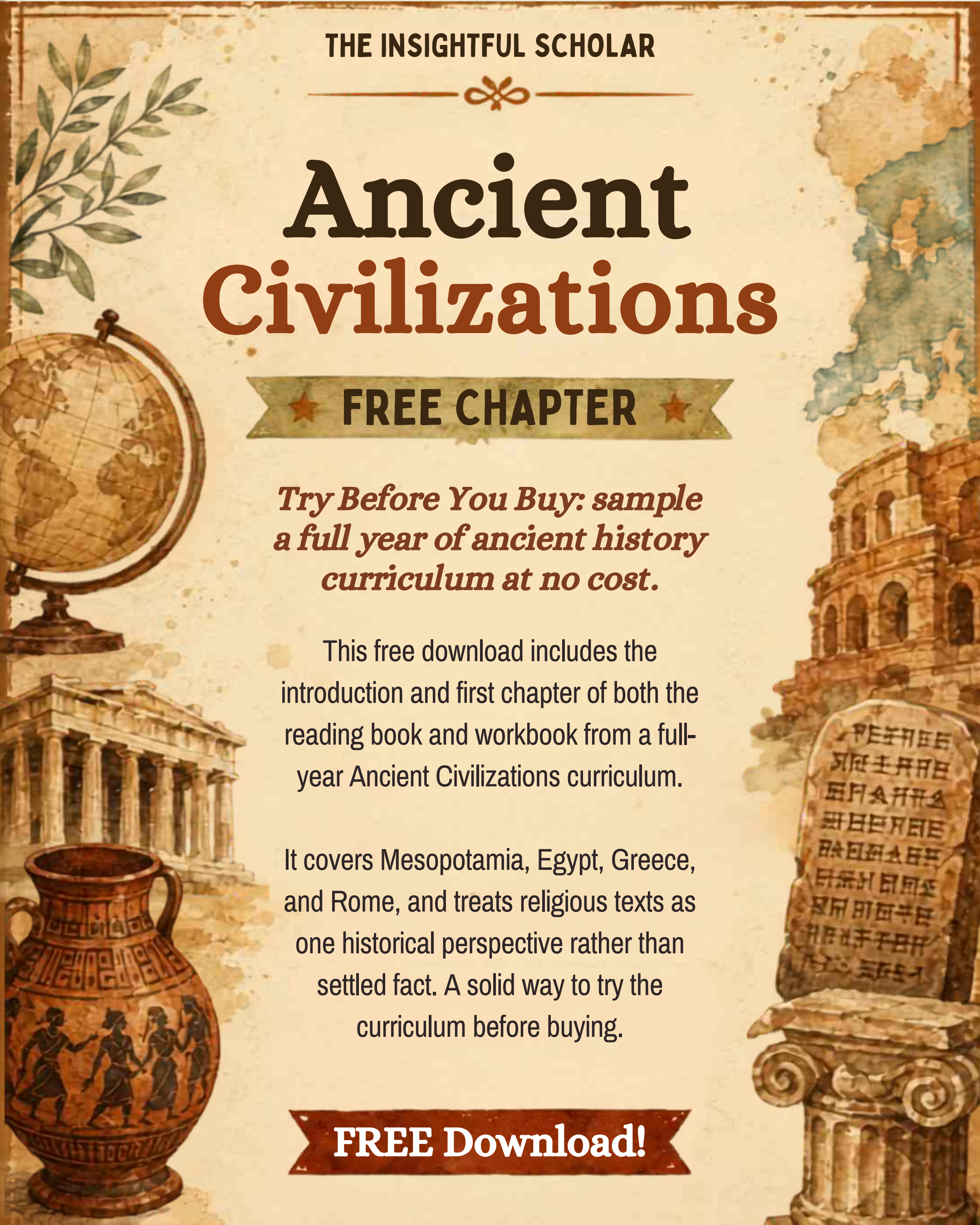

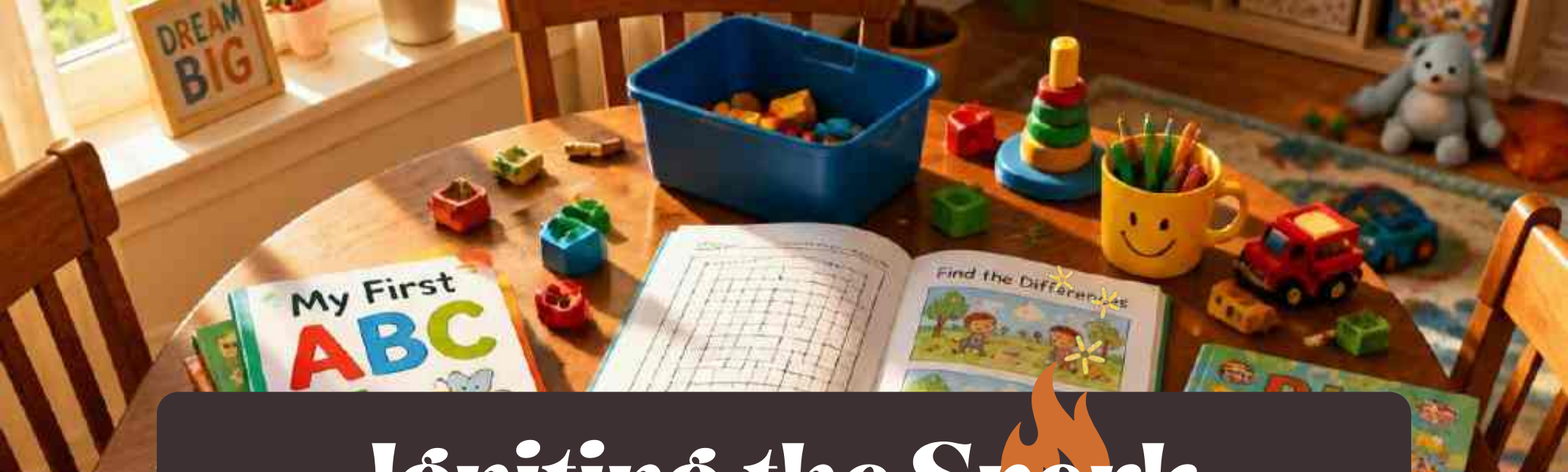


Igniting the Spark

Early on in homeschooling, I can still recall all the mornings I spent staring at a laptop screen and a mountain of digital curriculum that feels more like an obstacle than a resource. Between the breakfast cleanup, the hum of the dryer, the barking of our dogs, and the dozens of resources I have started to create for other families but have not quite polished for my own, it is easy to feel like I am drowning in the roles of Principal, Teacher, Lunch Lady, and Counselor all at once. There are moments when the weight of these responsibilities makes the "daily grind" feel less like a calling and more like a heavy burden.

But then I catch a glimpse of my daughter, and I am grounded in our true purpose. I think back to the girl she used to be, the one who was being bullied and whose confidence was eroding in a traditional setting where her unique spirit was overlooked. Bringing her home was a commitment to protecting her heart and ensuring our faith was the very air we breathed rather than just a weekend activity. In our home, we live by a simple conviction: when a homeschooler is truly captivated by a subject, their productivity follows naturally. By letting my daughter help navigate her own educational path and letting her choose courses that mirror her interests, we have traded a rigid, impersonal system for a journey rooted in purpose and peace.





Igniting the Spark

There is an immense pressure to mirror the timelines of a traditional institution, but those schedules were built for a crowd, not for your unique homeschooler. We often get wrapped up in imaginary rules, forgetting that these structures were never designed with our homeschooler's specific needs in mind. When you prioritize your homeschooler's emotional well-being over a specific digital lesson plan, you are not lagging behind, you are finally operating at the exact rhythm they need to flourish. True mastery happens when a homeschooler feels safe enough to explore a topic at their own speed, the "pace of grace," without the fear of falling behind a state average.

We have discovered that the six or seven hours spent in a typical classroom often translate to just a few hours of deep, intentional work at home, whether that is at the table or on the couch. This efficiency does not just check a box, it restores their time, allowing them to pursue hobbies, rest, and lean into their natural talents. For example, a homeschooler interested in digital art might spend their "extra" hours mastering complex software, or a homeschooler fascinated by history might spend an entire afternoon diving into online primary sources. This extra time is where the "restoration phase" happens, allowing them to play, create, and heal from the pressures of a standardized environment. It is about shifting from a "school at home" mindset to a lifestyle where learning is constant and self-directed.

How to DIY a Substantial Unit Study

Sometimes the most effective curriculum is not something you buy, it is something you craft to fit your homeschooler's specific "spark." Here is how you can curate your own interest-led unit study:

- **Select a Substantial Anchor:** Every unit needs a backbone, a high-quality, solid resource that provides the core information. Instead of a surface-level article, find a professional-level digital course, a classic "living book," or a series of deep-dive documentaries.
 - **Bridge the Subjects:** Take your homeschooler's core interest and look for the hidden academics within it. If they love interior design, that is your math, your history, and your ELA.
 - **Curate a Resource Web:** Do not rely on just one source, crowdsource from digital archives, podcasts, and expert interviews to create a multi-dimensional view of the topic.
 - **Define the "Grand Finale":** Instead of a standard multiple-choice test, have your homeschooler create a final project that demonstrates true mastery, a digital portfolio, an original research presentation, or a community advocacy project.
 - **Infuse the Heart:** Add daily reflection prompts and a prayer that connects their learning to their character.

If the weight of the "to-do" list feels heavy today, remember that your primary mission is the cultivation of a soul. You are the Culture Creator of your home, and you have full authority to set aside the "standard" way of doing things to better serve your family's specific needs. You decide the tone of your schoolroom, and you have permission to move at the speed of your homeschooler's mastery rather than the pace of a clock. Sometimes the most productive thing you can do is close the laptop early and focus on a conversation that matters more than any academic requirement.

Ultimately, our definition of success is not tied to a state average or a rigid schedule. It is found in a homeschooler who feels secure, is growing in their faith, and knows they are deeply loved. Do not feel the need to recreate an institution at your kitchen table, instead, embrace the freedom of a customized life. When you choose to prioritize connection over curriculum, you aren't just completing a lesson. You are building a sanctuary where your homeschooler's light can finally shine.

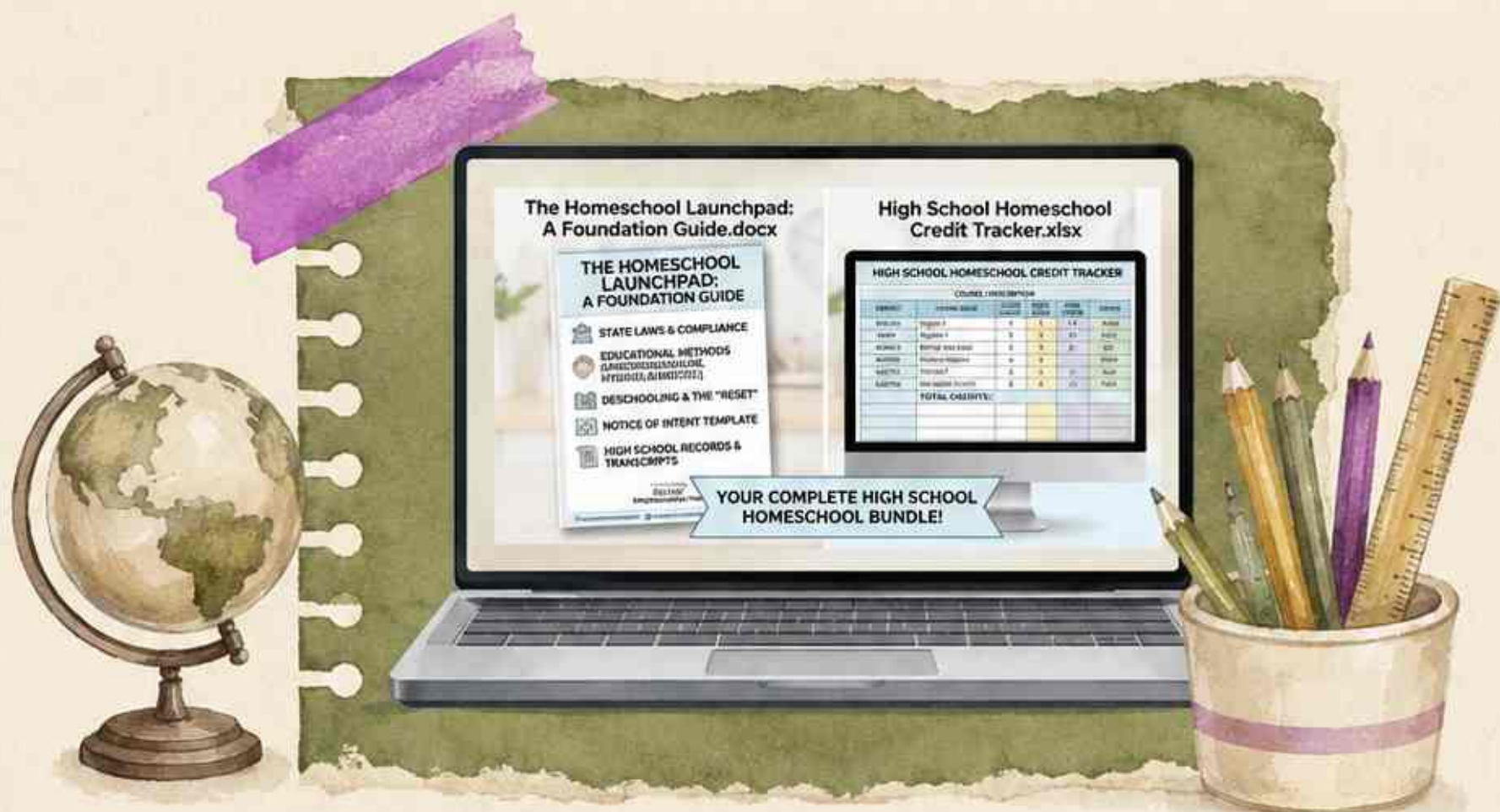

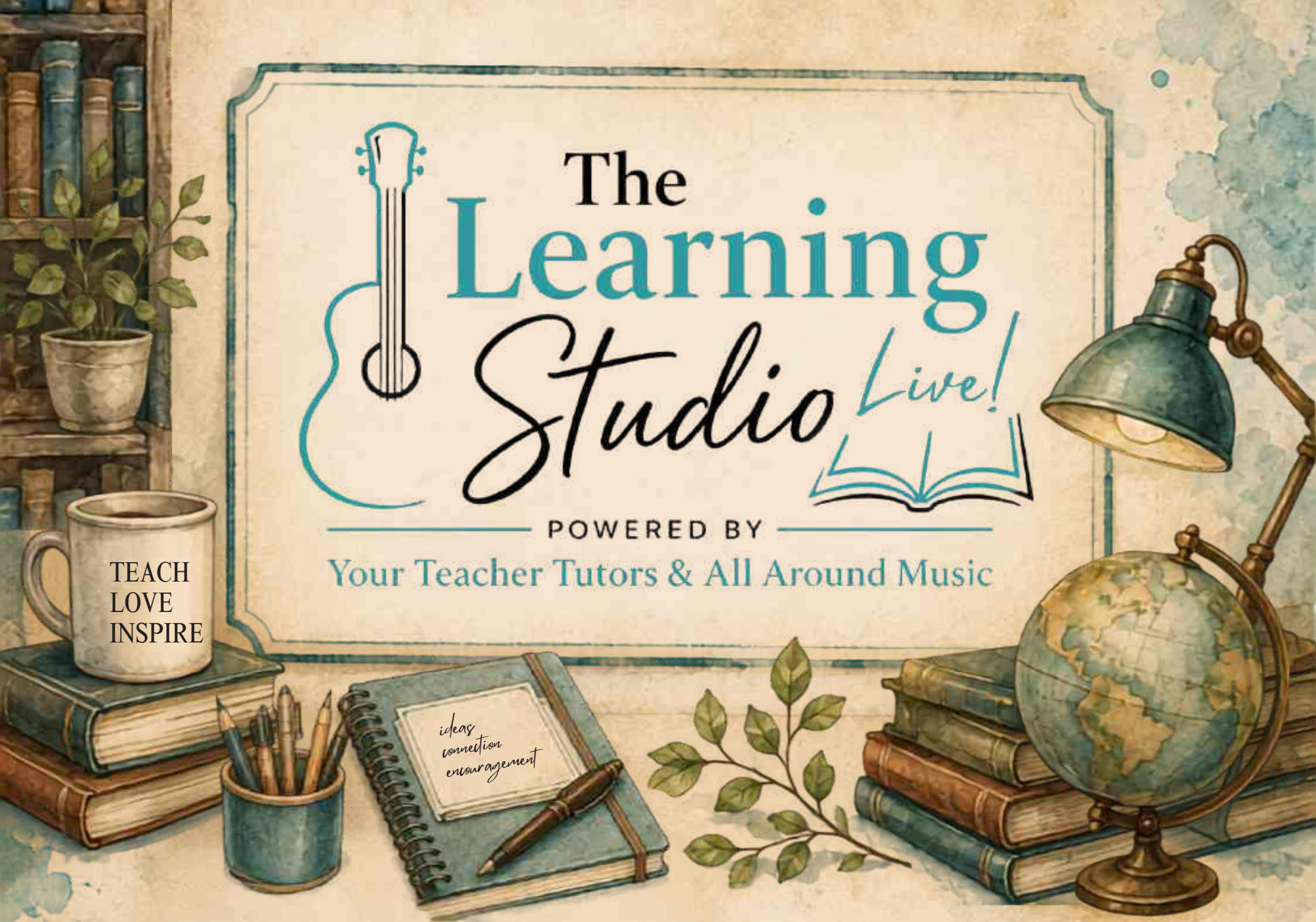

The Hidden Costs of Homeschooling

We all start homeschooling with the same kind of excitement. We picture slow mornings, meaningful learning, and finding the perfect curriculum that aligns with our values and what we believe education should look like. For a while, it feels like we're on the right track.

Then something shifts. You start noticing the little things, the extra purchases, and the costs you didn't think about when you were choosing a curriculum. The truth is, the curriculum is only part of the cost. After investing in different homeschool programs, I quickly realized that the real expenses were the ones I hadn't planned for, the ones that kept showing up over and over again.

The Hidden Costs of Homeschooling

We chose digital curricula because they gave us flexibility. I liked being able to piece together lessons from different programs and tailor them to my kids' needs. It felt like the smarter, more affordable option at the time.

What I didn't expect was how quickly printing would become expensive. Worksheets, activity pages, and full units meant we were constantly replacing cartridges, and when you factor in paper and general wear on the printer, the cost adds up faster than you expect. Looking back, I would have printed less and been more intentional about what actually needed to go on paper. Not everything needs to be printed, and sometimes a notebook or whiteboard works just as well.



The Hidden Costs of Homeschooling

Printing isn't the only sneaky expense. Subscriptions build quietly too. You sign up for a reading app because it looks helpful, then add a math platform, and another membership that promises to make things easier. Each one feels manageable on its own, usually around \$10 to \$20 per month. The problem is how quickly they stack. Before you realize it, you could be spending \$50 to \$100 a month on subscriptions, many of them barely used.



Not every hidden cost shows up in your bank account either. Time is one of the biggest costs, even though it doesn't show up financially. Homeschooling requires planning, organizing, and preparing, and when a curriculum is complicated or requires a lot of prep, it adds stress and takes energy away from actually teaching. Over time, this can lead to burnout.

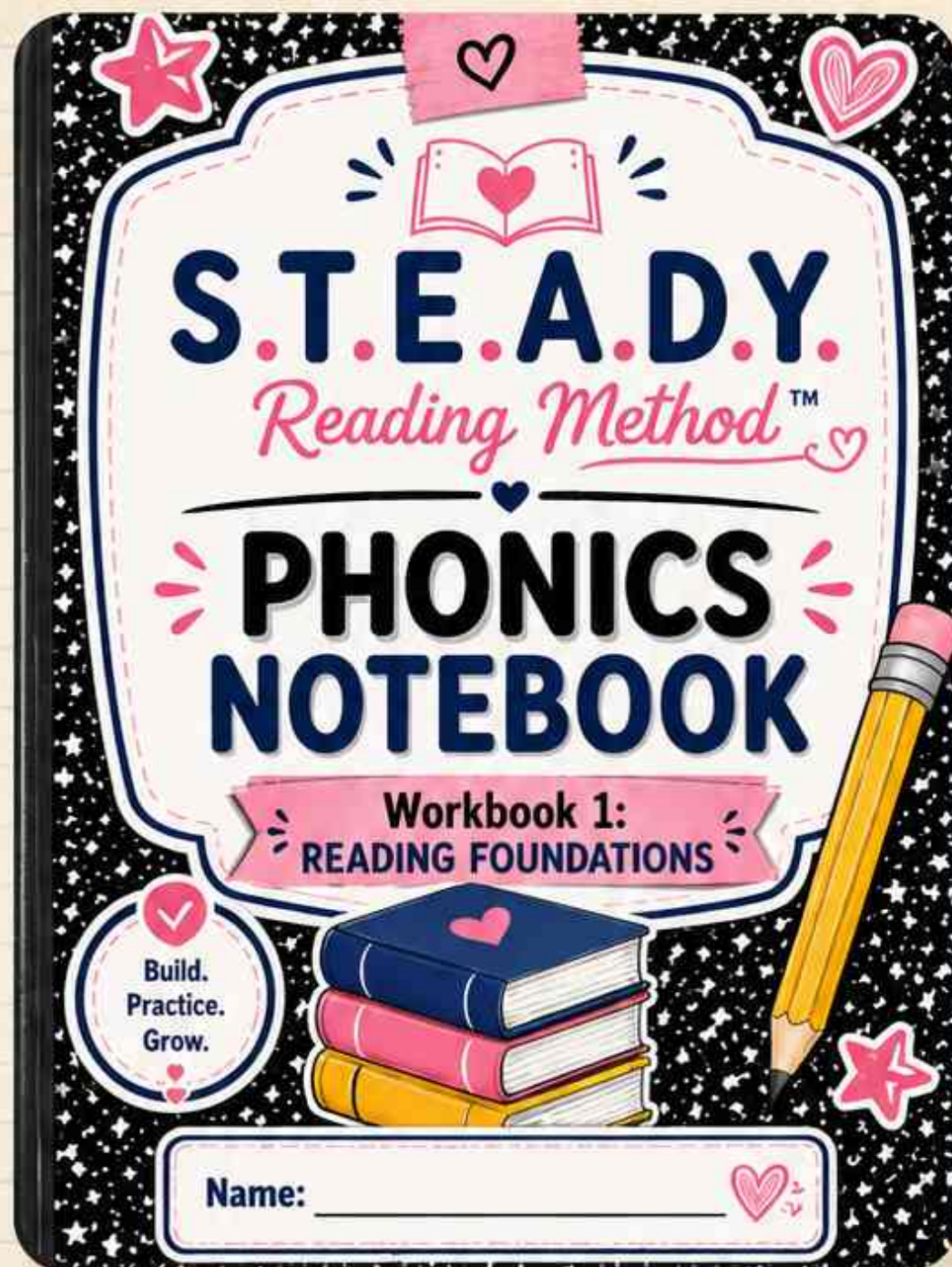

Once you add all of this up, one thing becomes clear. Over time, it becomes clear that more isn't better. What works is having a simple, manageable plan that fits your child and your day. When things feel overwhelming, it's often not because you need more. It's because there is too much. The goal isn't to fill your space with resources. The goal is to create a learning environment that works for your child and still feels manageable for you.

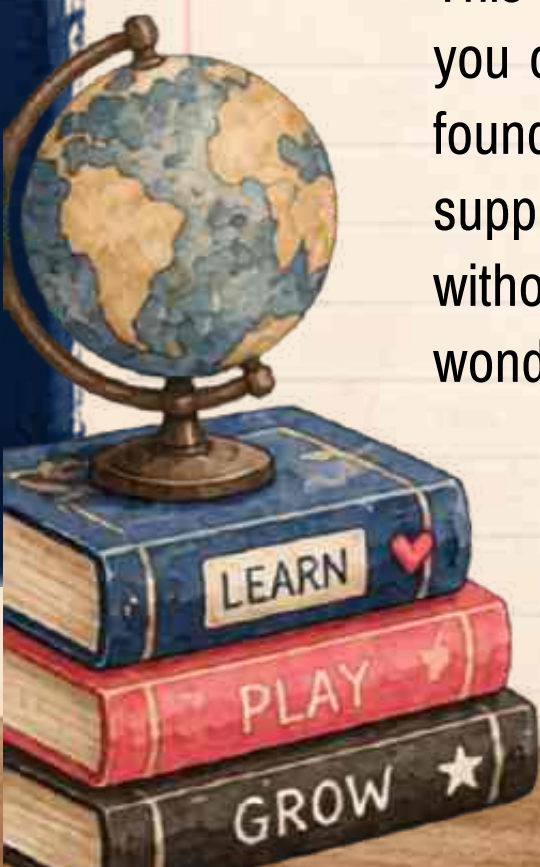

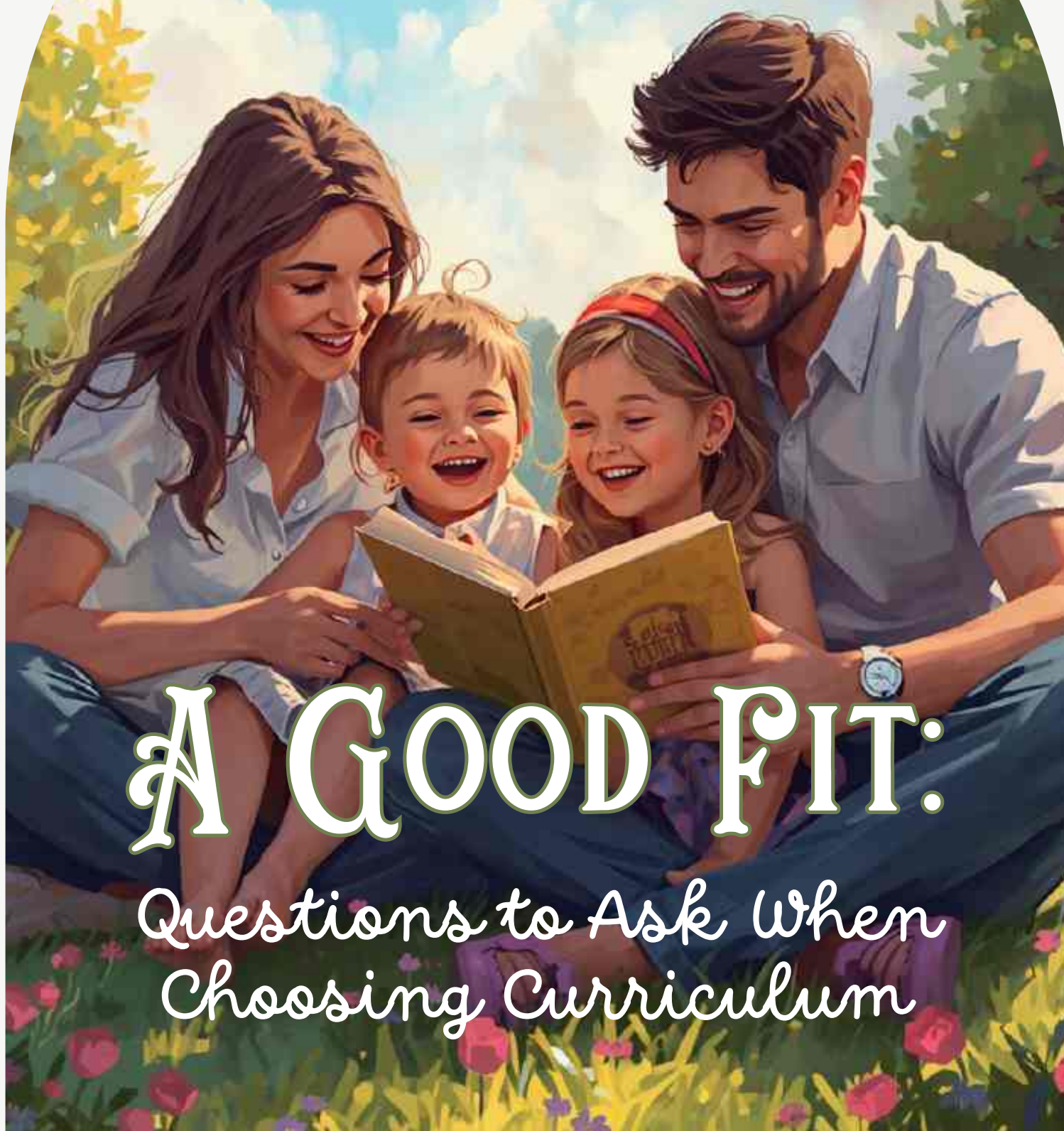


Study Through Art and Music

Questions to Ask When Choosing Curriculum

Most homeschool parents I know (myself included!) have at least one curriculum on the shelf they spent good money on and barely used.

- The program with five-star reviews that you could never quite wrap your mind around.
- The beautiful, exploration-based curriculum that sounded great until your kids complained, "Can't we just watch a video?"
- The one that seemed perfect but turned out to be so complicated and time-consuming that it never got used.

We are fortunate to be homeschooling at a time when there is an abundance of great materials for every budget and learning style, which means there are so many options that it can be hard to choose. I've learned to ask these four questions to help me tell the difference between a resource that worked well for somebody else and one that is a good fit for our unique family.

Questions to Ask When Choosing Curriculum

IS IT HIGH QUALITY?

There is a difference between a good educational resource that will give your child the foundation they need in a subject, and an "educational activity" that keeps them busy today but will be forgotten by tomorrow.

How do you know if a curriculum is high quality? The top factors I look at are who made it and who uses it.

Was the curriculum created by someone who actually knows the subject inside and out? Look for the author's credentials, such as degrees or a career history in the subject and teaching experience at multiple levels. It should be easy to find a summary of what the program covers and in what order (sometimes called the "scope and sequence"), along with a clear explanation of why the author made those choices.

It's also helpful to consider whether the resource has been used successfully by many families like yours. It doesn't have to be the most popular program or the one with the highest ratings. Sometimes a program works really well for a particular type of learner, and if that's your student, it doesn't matter whether it works for everyone else. If you're reading reviews from parents with children who sound just like yours, and they rave about how well it helped their children learn and enjoy the subject, then it could be a good fit for you.

Questions to Ask When Choosing Curriculum



DOES IT FIT YOUR RESOURCES?

Don't get sucked into the idea that more expensive means better. There are great resources available at every price point. Decide on a budget before you start researching, and stick to it. If you find yourself falling in love with something outside your budget, make a list of the features you love about it and a list of the bells and whistles you could live without. There is almost always a more affordable way to get the features that matter most to you.

Money isn't the only resource to consider. Do you have space to store and organize everything that comes with the curriculum? Homeschooling resources come in all shapes and sizes, from fully digital to sets with books, manipulatives, and equipment. How much printing will you need to do? How much time will it take to prepare for each lesson, and what supplies will you need? A program you can't afford, don't have space for, or can't make time to prepare is not going to be a good fit, no matter how good it is.

Questions to Ask When Choosing Curriculum



DOES IT MAKE SENSE TO YOU?

The best way to answer this question is to get your hands on some samples and try teaching a lesson or two. Most publishers offer free samples that you can download, and you may be able to borrow the teacher's guide from a friend or the library.

Working through a sample lesson will give you a sense of how it would feel to use that curriculum day to day. Do you understand the instructions the first time you read them? Can you see how the lessons build on each other? Does the teaching approach match the way you naturally explain things? Can you see how you might adapt the curriculum to fit your schedule, space, multiple children, or other factors?

A curriculum is a tool to help you teach your kids. You're the boss. If you find it confusing or too complicated, keep looking. The best program is the one you can see yourself using, consistently and happily, for a year or more.

Questions to Ask When Choosing Curriculum



DOES IT MAKE SENSE TO YOUR CHILD?

While you're looking at those sample lessons, try doing some of the work together with your child. Watch how they respond to the materials and activities.

Children learn in different ways, and their preferences change as they grow. Some focus best when they read or are read to, while others learn more from watching a video. Some like a lot of discussion to help them process, others like to work through written problems on their own. Some need a lot of hands-on activity in every lesson, others find manipulatives distracting and just want to get the work done on paper. Some need more practice problems than the book provides, and others are bored silly by repetition and need less.

None of these preferences are right or wrong. What matters is that the program meets your child where they are right now and helps them move forward in their understanding of the subject.

Questions to Ask When Choosing Curriculum



THE GOAL IS CONSISTENCY

When you've worked through these four questions, you'll often find that the best fit for your family is not the most expensive or the most popular option. What you're looking for is a resource that is solid, affordable, clear to you, and workable for your child. A less popular curriculum that you can use consistently and that gets the job done is worth far more than the "best" curriculum collecting dust on the shelf.

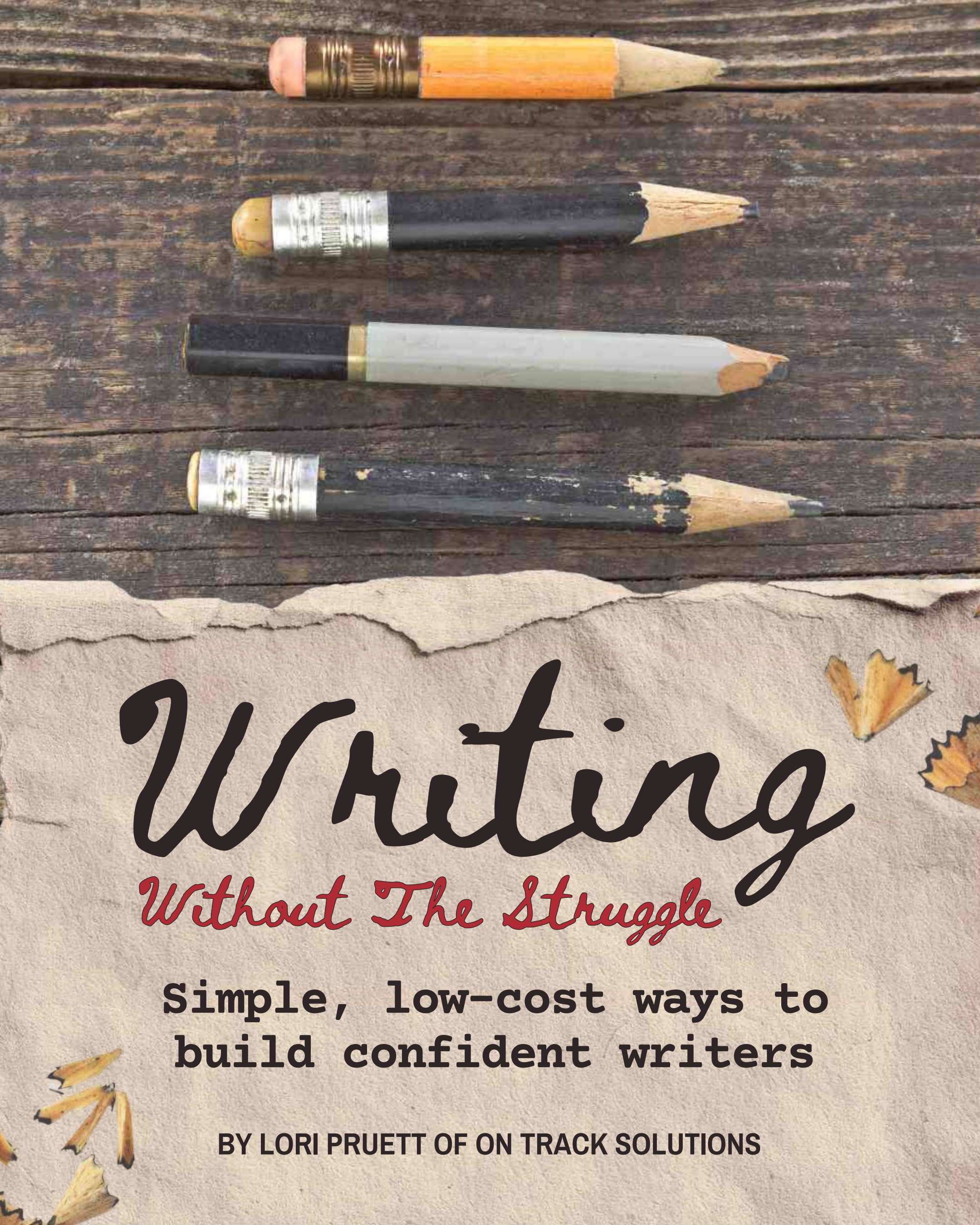

Writing

Without The Struggle

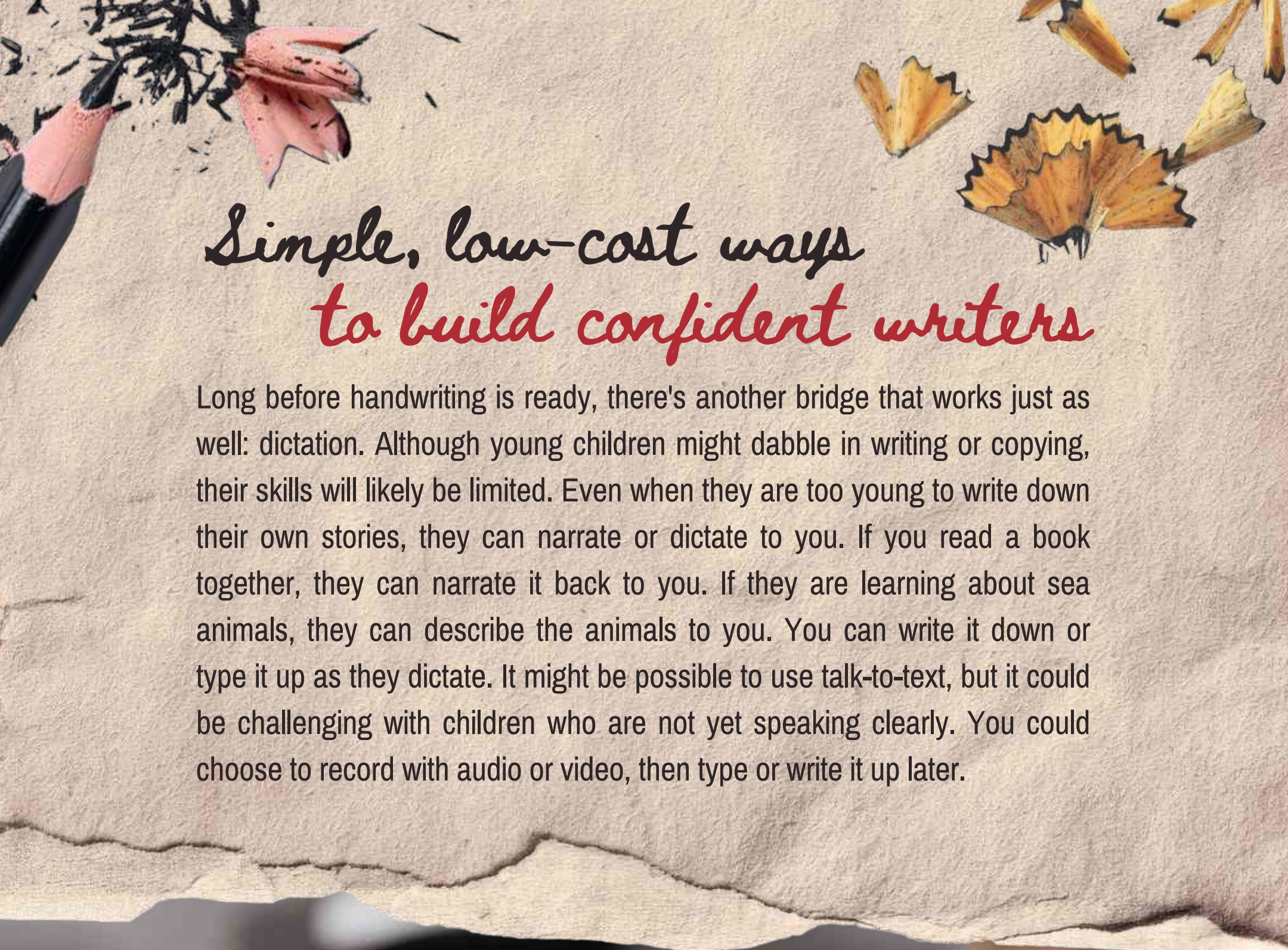


Writing Without The Struggle

Do you remember staring at a blank piece of paper, unsure how to get started? It happens to even the best writers. Let's look at some low-cost and no-cost ways to help build independent writers.

The foundation of good writing is knowing what we think. When someone has a hard time getting words down on paper, it often means they do not yet know what they think. I believe the best foundation for writing is having conversations with your children from the beginning. Show them things. Model the description: "Did you see that red truck going so fast?" As they begin to talk, help them to describe things. This type of conversation helps to develop verbal and written expression.





Simple, low-cost ways to build confident writers

Long before handwriting is ready, there's another bridge that works just as well: dictation. Although young children might dabble in writing or copying, their skills will likely be limited. Even when they are too young to write down their own stories, they can narrate or dictate to you. If you read a book together, they can narrate it back to you. If they are learning about sea animals, they can describe the animals to you. You can write it down or type it up as they dictate. It might be possible to use talk-to-text, but it could be challenging with children who are not yet speaking clearly. You could choose to record with audio or video, then type or write it up later.





Writing Without The Struggle



For years, I frequently encouraged my children to dictate to me. I wanted them to think composition was as natural as any other play. As they were able and interested, they illustrated their dictated writing. I invested in plenty of paper, a sturdy 3-hole puncher, and binders to store their writing. They loved looking at the "book" they were writing. As their handwriting improved, they copied their dictated writing. It was good copy work practice. Because it was their own composition, it planted the seed that they were writers.





Writing Without The Struggle

Before children jump directly into writing their own compositions, there is a helpful transition that many people skip. As simple as it sounds, making lists is an excellent transition that requires organizational and thinking skills, but does not require wrapping the structure of language and the mechanics of punctuation around the words just yet. Young children often love to collect things. They could start by listing the items collected. You could begin by making the list for them to copy. Later, they can do it on their own. Add other lists: a grocery list, a list of favorite colors or foods, and so on. When they can do it easily, you can uplevel the lists. Take two minutes a day to list everything they can think of about trains or words describing ice cream. Be creative and follow their interests.

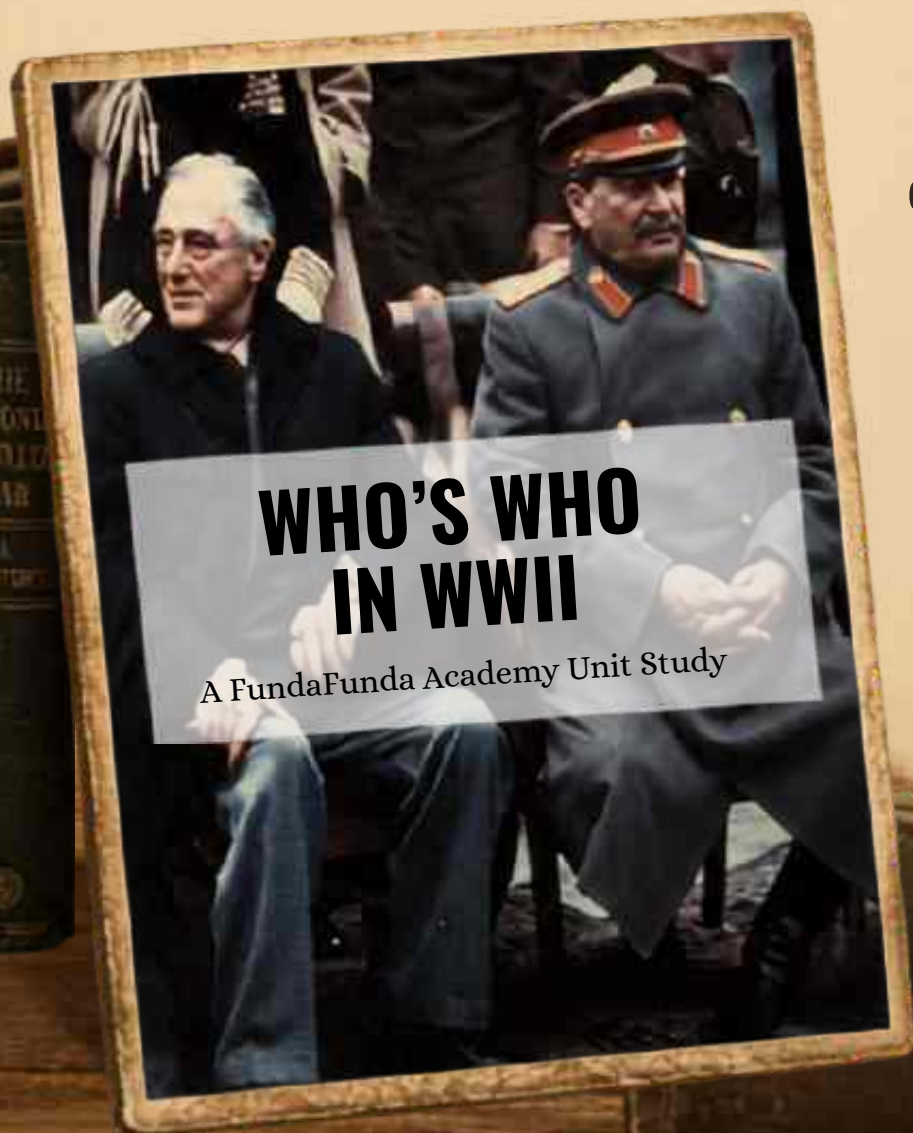

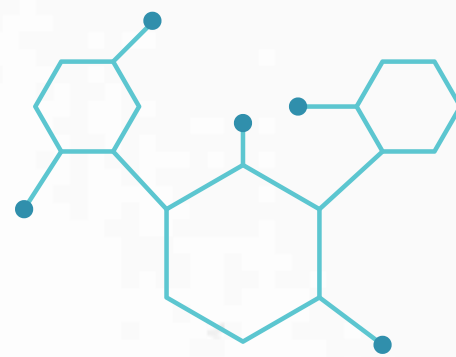

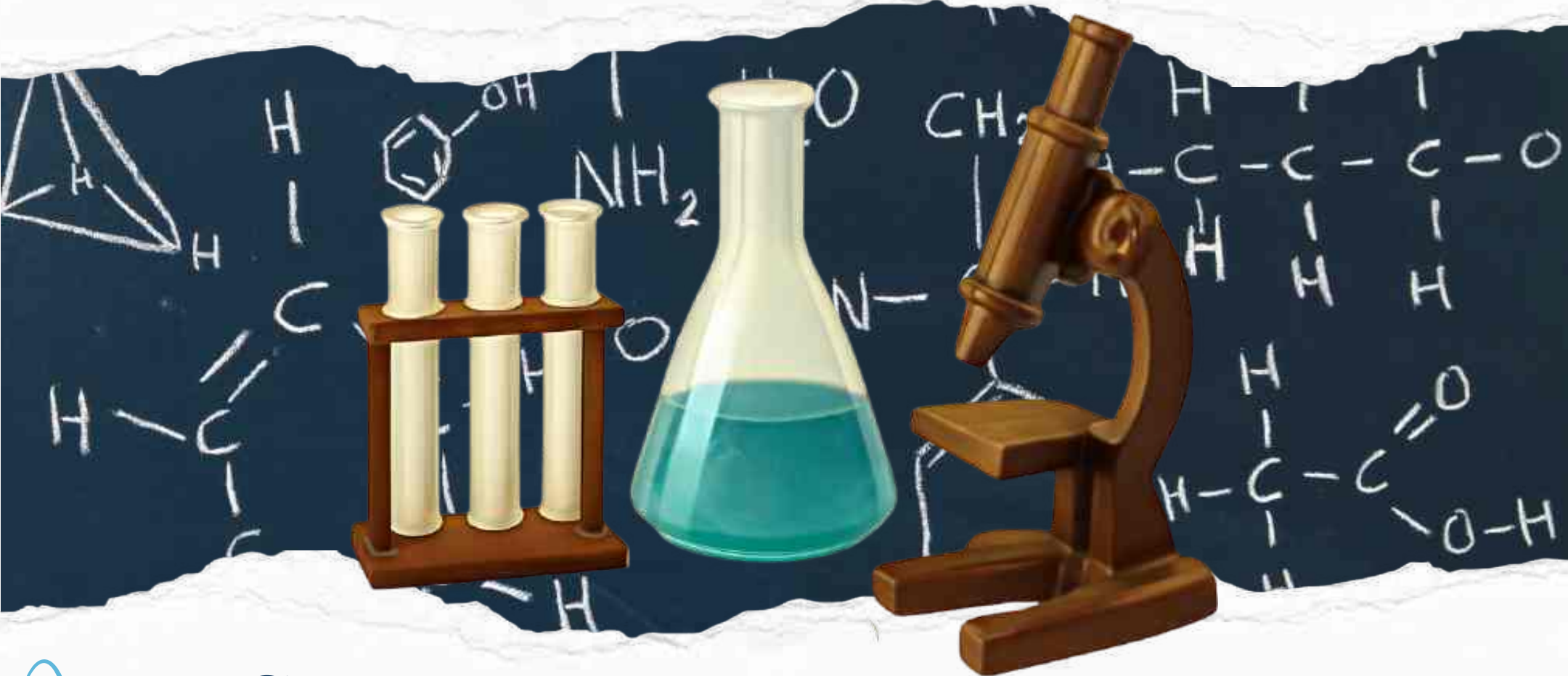

When you think about science experiments, it's easy to picture expensive kits, complicated instructions, and a lot of prep work. That's exactly what I thought too, especially in our first year of homeschooling.

I found myself buying those boxed science kits, hoping they would make learning more fun and engaging. But over time, I realized something surprising: most of those experiments were using simple household ingredients I already had in my kitchen. That completely changed the way we approached science in our home.

The truth is, you don't need fancy equipment or a big budget to create meaningful, hands-on science experiences. Some of the best learning happens with everyday items, recycled materials, and even right outside in your backyard.

Science at Home

You don't need fancy equipment or a science lab to create meaningful learning experiences at home. In fact, your kitchen already has everything you need.

Simple, everyday tools like measuring cups, spoons, and jars can easily double as science tools. Measuring cups turn into a fun way to explore both math and science. Jars become observation containers for experiments or nature finds. Even basic kitchen spoons are perfect for mixing, scooping, and experimenting.

When we stop focusing on having all the "right" supplies, it takes the pressure off and makes learning feel more natural for both you and your child. One easy way to keep that confidence going is to have everything ready before your child even asks.

Science at Home

One of the easiest ways to encourage hands-on learning at home is to make it simple to say "yes" to it, and having a designated science experiment tub does exactly that.

Set aside a container filled with safe, everyday ingredients like baking soda, salt, and baking powder. Then add a few simple tools: measuring cups and spoons, stirring utensils, droppers, and reusable containers.

Having everything in one place allows your children to explore more independently, without needing constant setup or supervision. Instead of saying, "Sorry, we can't do that, I need to save this," you're able to confidently say, "Yes, go ahead and try it." That simple shift opens the door to more curiosity, creativity, and learning.

Science doesn't have to be complicated to be meaningful. You don't need a perfectly planned lesson, expensive supplies, or a full science lab to help your child learn and explore. 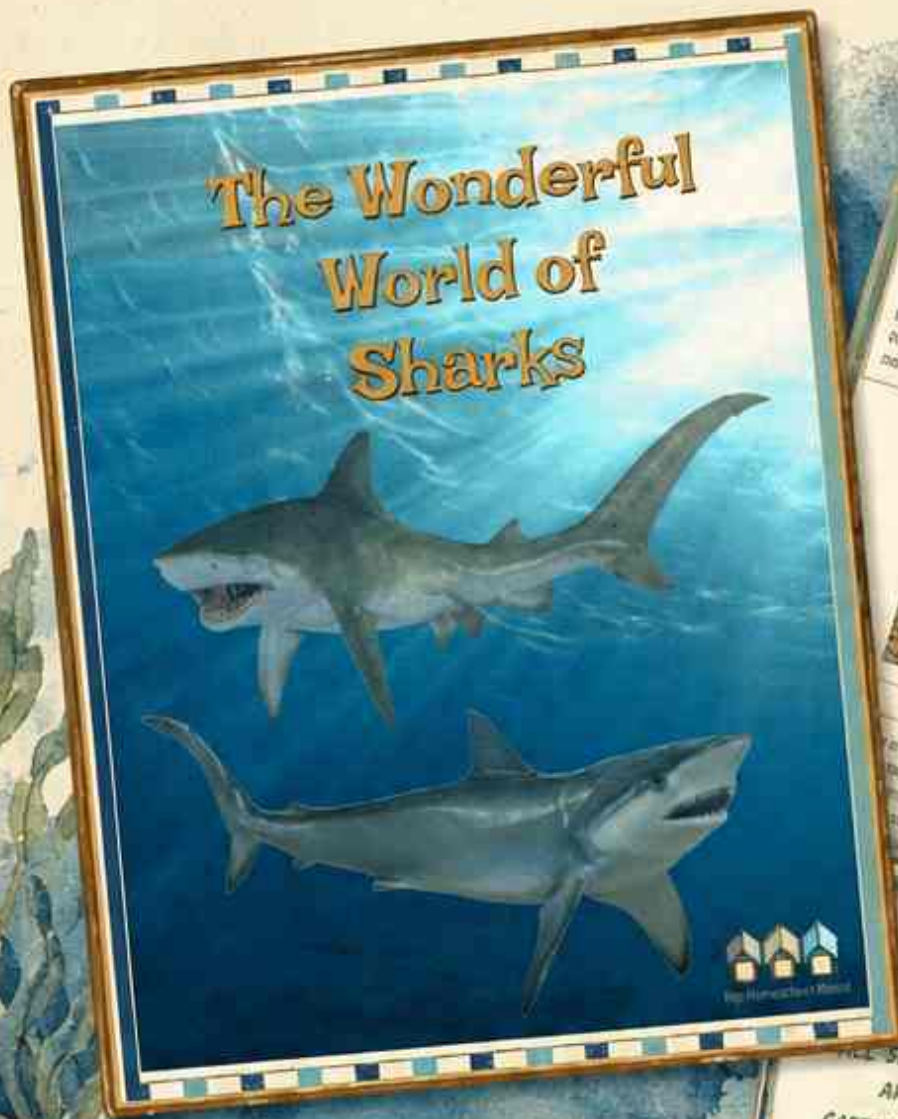
Estimate what you'll need for the year, divide it by twelve, and set that amount aside each month. Reuse materials whenever you can.

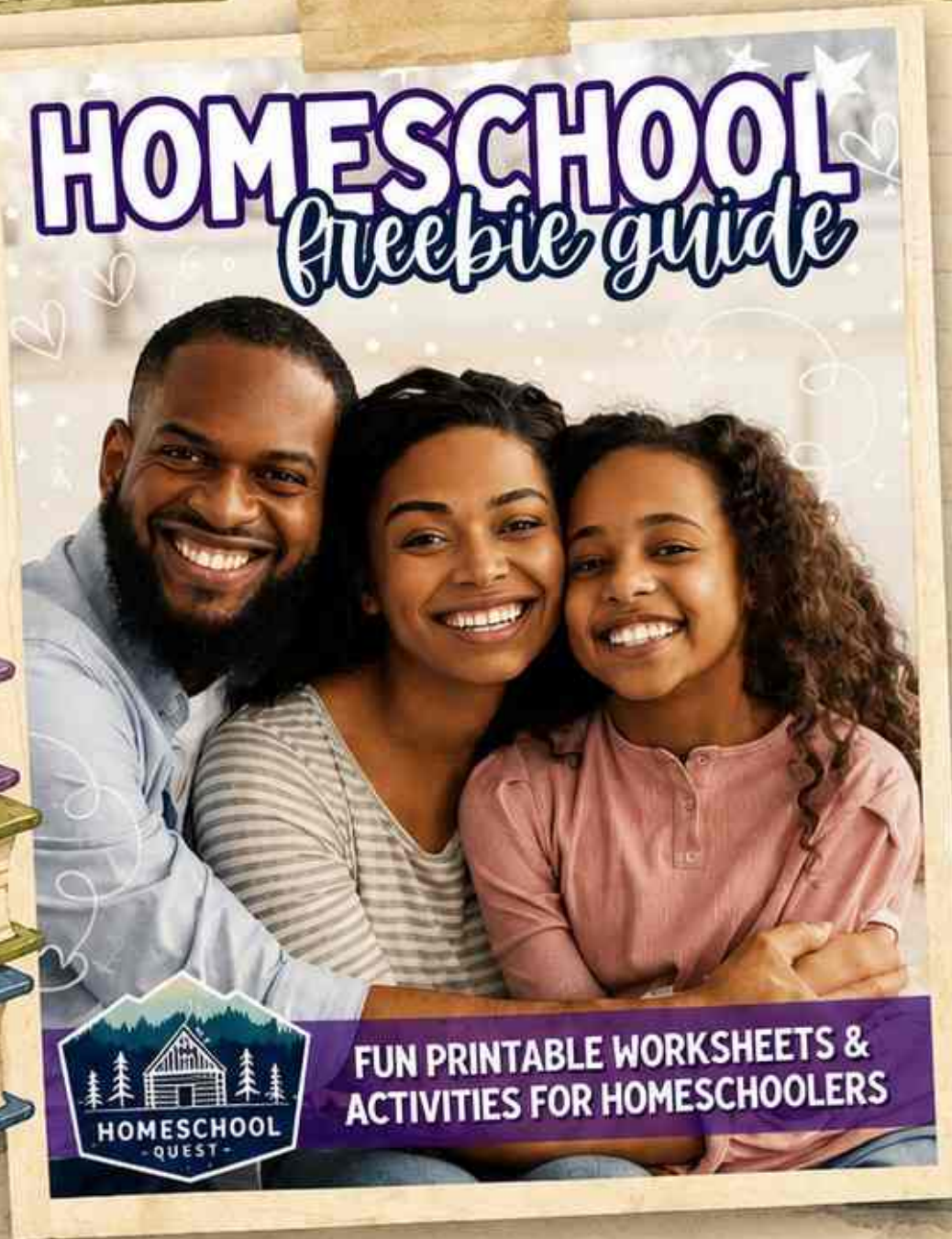

SPENDING LESS ON CURRICULUM

We started homeschooling after moving to the U.S. from South Africa. At one point, I was homeschooling four children ranging in age from preschool to teenage, all on a single income. I wasn't bringing in any money initially, and even later, when I began teaching at a co-op, it wasn't much.

At the same time, my children had big goals. They weren't just thinking about college, they were aiming for competitive universities. I knew they needed a rigorous education to both get in and succeed once there. The problem was obvious: I couldn't buy everything that looked amazing. But I also didn't want gaps in their education, and I wanted them to enjoy learning. That forced me to become very intentional about every curriculum decision.





SPENDING LESS ON CURRICULUM

At first, I assumed I needed a full curriculum for every subject. It didn't take long to realize that wasn't necessary, or even the best way to do it.

Each of my children had different strengths and interests. I began focusing more on the subjects they were likely to pursue further, making sure they had strong foundations in those areas. I came to see that spending less mostly came down to prioritizing where money would make the biggest difference, not cutting things out. Once I knew where to prioritize, the next step was finding ways to save everywhere else.

Saving money mostly came down to being strategic about where it went, not lowering quality.

Whenever possible, I chose non-consumable materials. Whether it was books or self-paced courses, being able to reuse them with multiple children made a significant difference over time.

Used curriculum is also widely available through local sales, Facebook groups, and online marketplaces. It takes more effort to find, but the savings can be substantial, especially for content-heavy subjects. At one point, I even swapped curriculum with a friend who was using the same program at a different level.





SPENDING LESS ON CURRICULUM

The library became one of our most valuable resources. I often purchased the curriculum guide but borrowed the required books. Libraries also offer documentaries, foreign language resources, and online courses.

Some of the most meaningful learning came from electives I created myself. One child studied meteorology, another linguistics, and another game theory. I combined secondhand books, free online resources, and projects to build half-credit courses tailored to their interests.





SPENDING LESS ON CURRICULUM

Those strategies added up fast. Spending less on curriculum did require more time. I had to research carefully and think through each purchase. I didn't always get it right the first time, but being intentional forced me to focus on what truly mattered.

As a result, my children were well prepared. They were all accepted into competitive universities, took AP exams without formal AP classes, earned strong ACT and SAT scores, received scholarships, and succeeded in college. My oldest daughter now has a PhD and lectures at a university in the Netherlands. Homeschooling high school for college-bound students on a budget is absolutely possible. It just takes spending wisely instead of spending more.

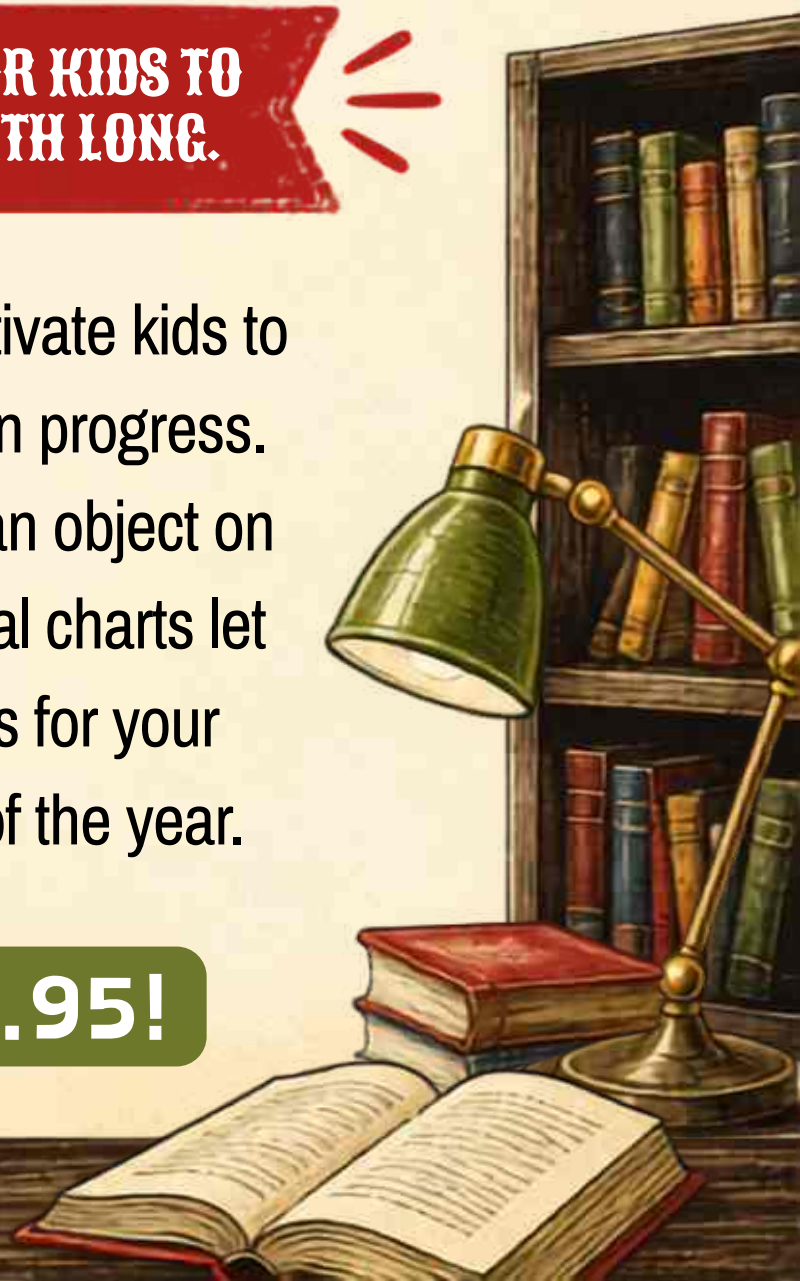

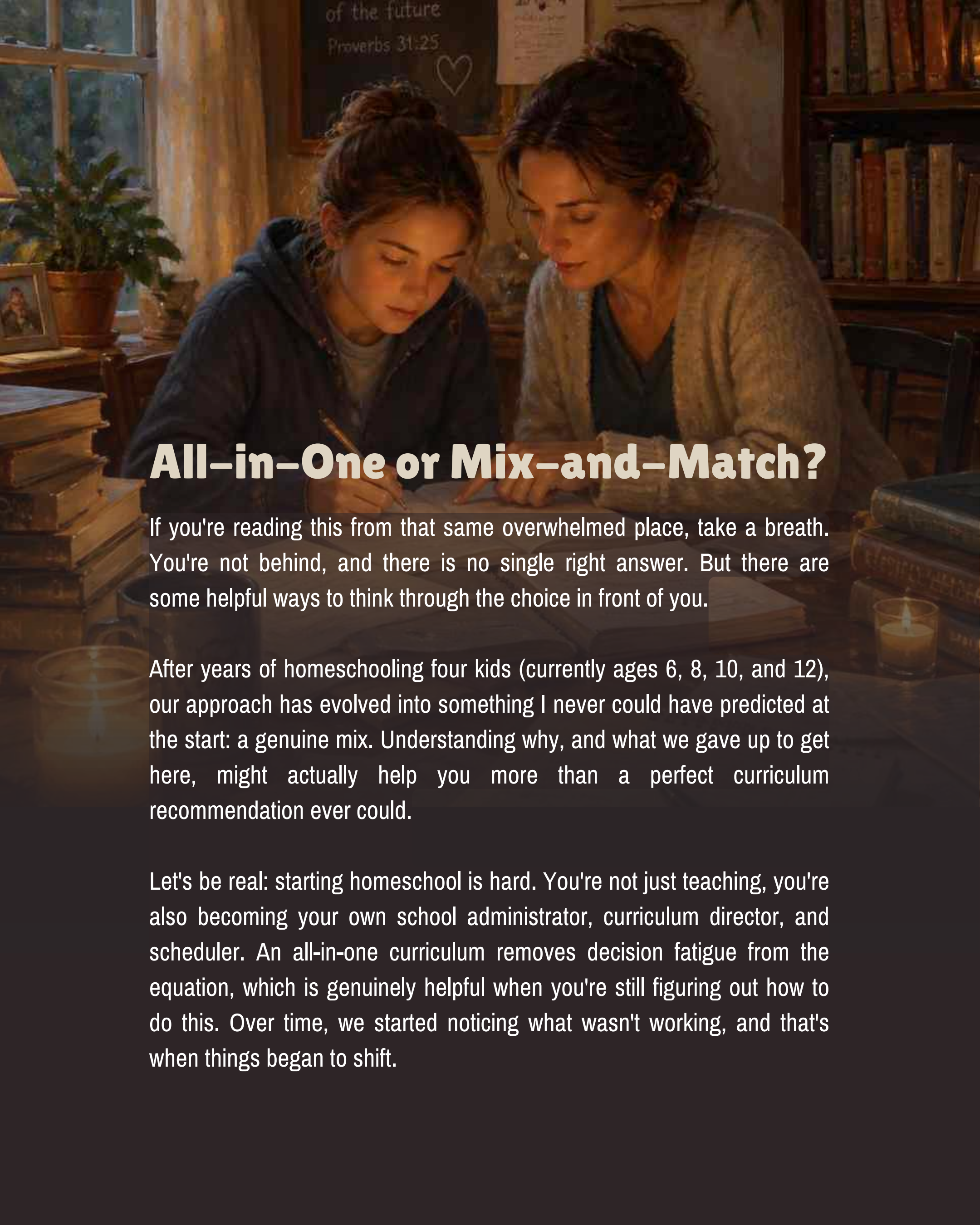

All-in-One or Mix-and-Match?

If you're reading this from that same overwhelmed place, take a breath. You're not behind, and there is no single right answer. But there are some helpful ways to think through the choice in front of you.

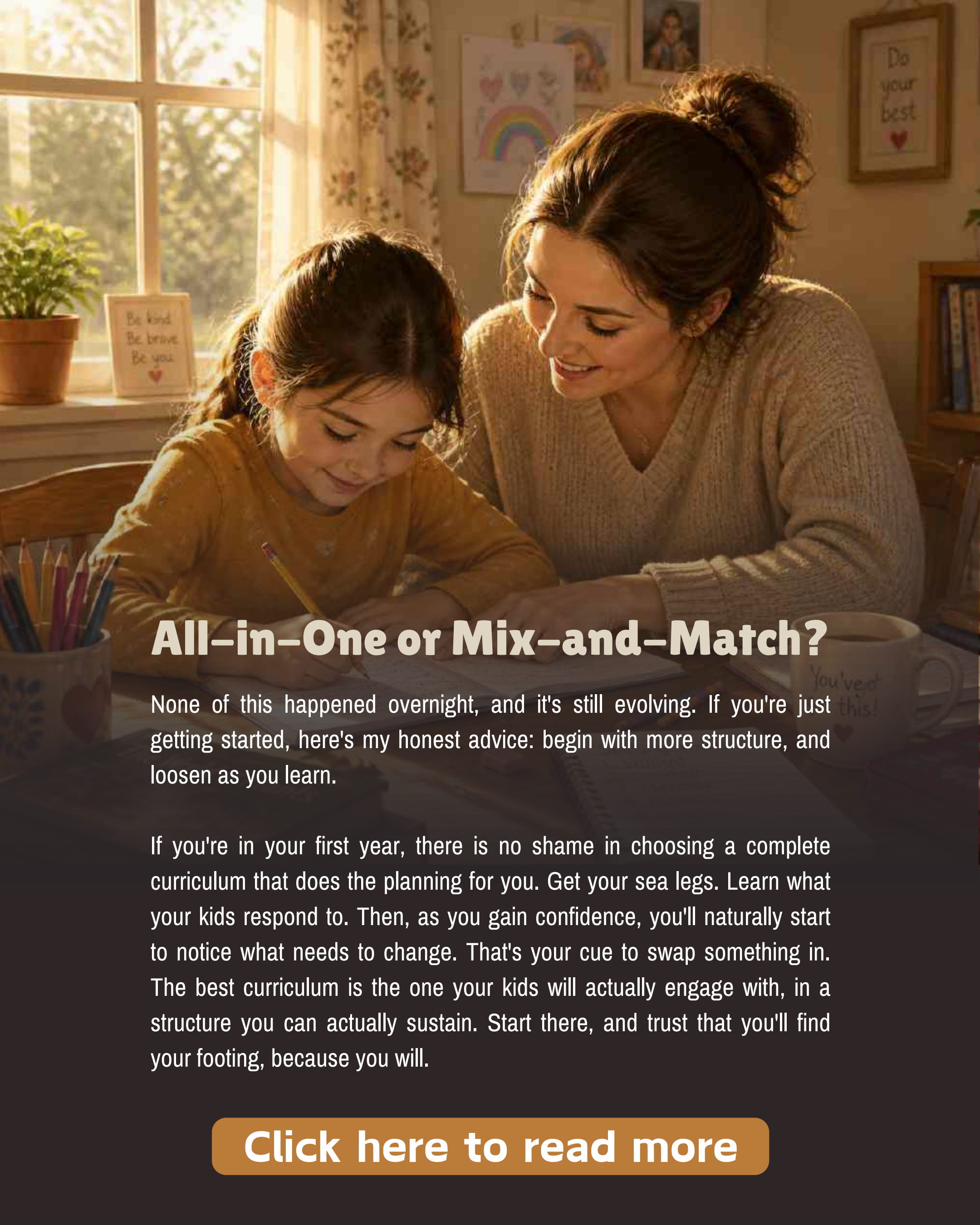
After years of homeschooling four kids (currently ages 6, 8, 10, and 12), our approach has evolved into something I never could have predicted at the start: a genuine mix. Understanding why, and what we gave up to get here, might actually help you more than a perfect curriculum recommendation ever could.

Let's be real: starting homeschool is hard. You're not just teaching, you're also becoming your own school administrator, curriculum director, and scheduler. An all-in-one curriculum removes decision fatigue from the equation, which is genuinely helpful when you're still figuring out how to do this. Over time, we started noticing what wasn't working, and that's when things began to shift.



All-in-One or Mix-and-Match?

In our home, we use Horizons for math because it's structured, incremental, and our kids genuinely feel successful with it. We use The Good and the Beautiful for language arts because it's beautifully presented and literature-rich without being overwhelming. Nearpod handles our science and social studies in an interactive, tech-friendly way the kids actually look forward to. Music is a whole family affair too: Hoffman Academy, YouTube tutorials, and a lot of patient practice on piano, guitar, ukulele, mandolin, and drums.



All-in-One or Mix-and-Match?

None of this happened overnight, and it's still evolving. If you're just getting started, here's my honest advice: begin with more structure, and loosen as you learn.

If you're in your first year, there is no shame in choosing a complete curriculum that does the planning for you. Get your sea legs. Learn what your kids respond to. Then, as you gain confidence, you'll naturally start to notice what needs to change. That's your cue to swap something in. The best curriculum is the one your kids will actually engage with, in a structure you can actually sustain. Start there, and trust that you'll find your footing, because you will.
