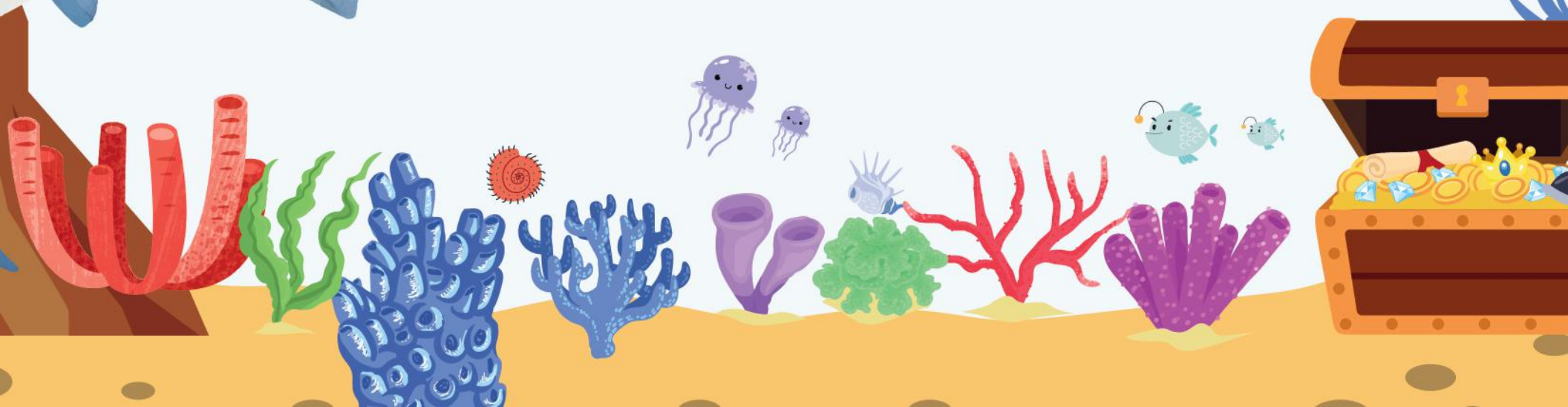

Welcome to the Grand Strand!

Get ready for an epic coastal adventure! South Carolina's Grand Strand is 60-miles of continuous oceanfront perfection. It stretches from Little River down to Murrells Inlet, making it one of the most famous and fossil-rich coastlines on the East Coast.

DID YOU KNOW?

Millions of years ago, the ocean covered much deeper inland. As the coastline shifted, ancient fossils were preserved in underwater beds - and today, the waves wash them right up to our sandy shores!

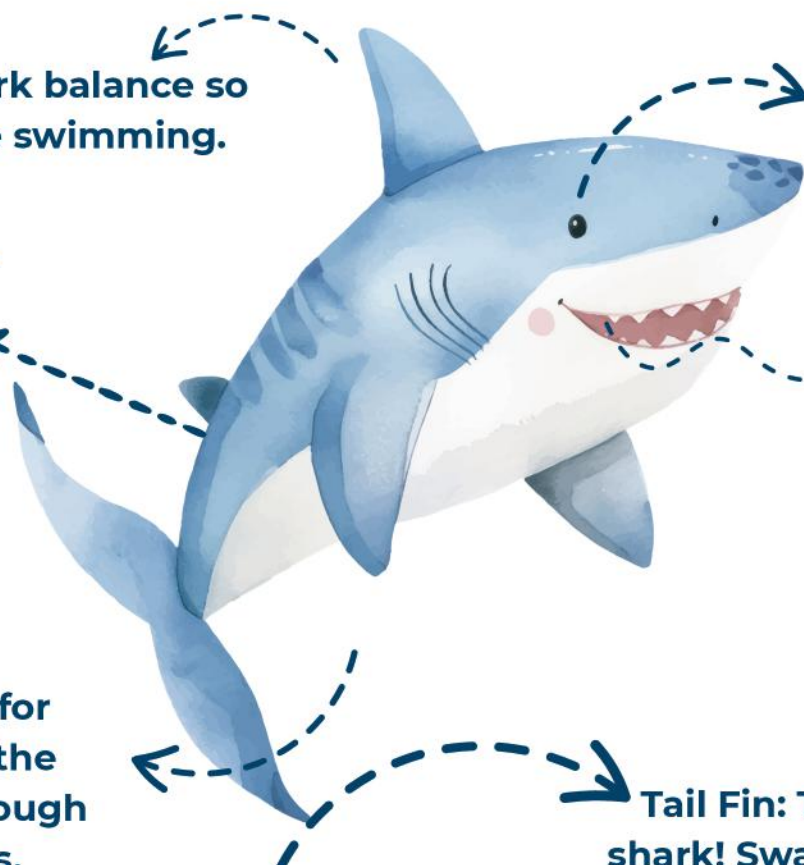
DID YOU KNOW?

Sharks have been swimming in the world's oceans for over **400 million years** - that means sharks were around long before the first dinosaurs walked the Earth!

What is a Shark?

Sharks are incredible ocean creatures called fish, but they are very special! Unlike most fish that have bones made of hard bone (like humans), a shark's entire skeleton is made of **cartilage**. Cartilage is the same flexible, lightweight material that makes up the tip of your nose and ears! Because it is much lighter than bone, it helps sharks swim fast and stay buoyant in the water.

Cool Shark Anatomy



Dorsal Fin: Helps the shark balance so it doesn't roll over while swimming.

Skin: Covered in tiny tooth-like scales called dermal denticles. These scales help them swim smoothly in the water.

Eyes: Sharks can see very well in dark water.

Teeth: Sharks have multiple rows of teeth and they continuously grow! When one falls out, another one moves in.

Pectoral Fins: Used for steering and lifting the shark up or down through the ocean currents.

Tail Fin: The primary engine of a shark! Swaying this tail side-to-side propels the shark forward.

How do Sharks Move & Breathe?

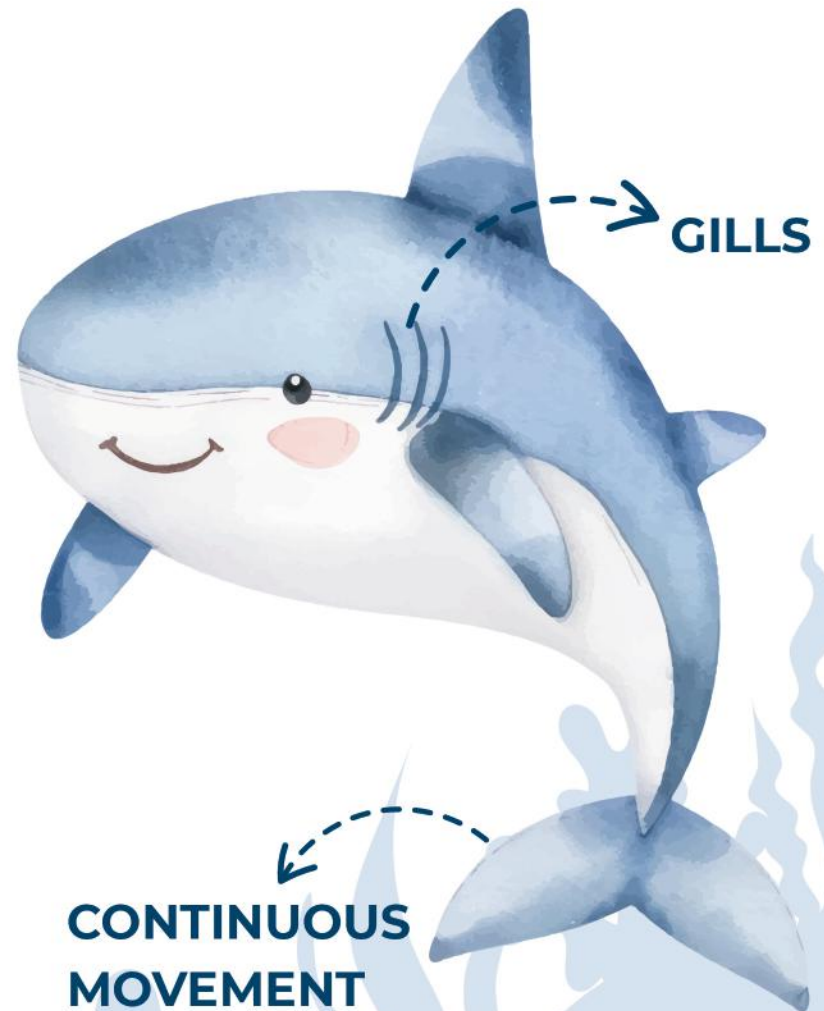
UNDERWATER BREATHING



While humans use lungs to breathe air, sharks use gills to take in oxygen from the ocean water. As water passes over the gills, tiny blood vessels absorb the oxygen they need to survive.

BUILT FOR SPEED

Most fish have an air bladder inside to help them float, but sharks do not! To stay afloat in water, they rely on their lightweight cartilage skeletons and constant movement, even while they are resting!



What Do Sharks Eat?

Sharks have a huge variety of diets depending on their size and species! Most sharks are **carnivores** (meat-eaters) that help keep the ocean ecosystem healthy and balanced by hunting older or weaker sea life.

- Small & Medium Sharks: Eat small fish, crabs, shrimp, squid and clams along the seafloor.
- Large Sharks: Hunt larger prey like stingrays, bigger fish, and occasionally marine mammals in deeper offshore waters.
- Whale Sharks (The Giants!): The largest sharks in the ocean don't eat big fish at all - they are filter-feeders that scoop up tiny **plankton** and tiny shrimp!

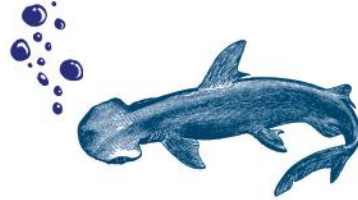

DID YOU KNOW?

Coastal sharks are naturally shy, timid creatures! While smaller species inhabit our coastal ocean waters, they actively avoid humans and prefer to stick to their natural diet of fish, crabs, and shrimp.



Bonnethead Shark

Average Size: 3 - 4 ft. long

Key Feature: A smooth, shovel-shaped head

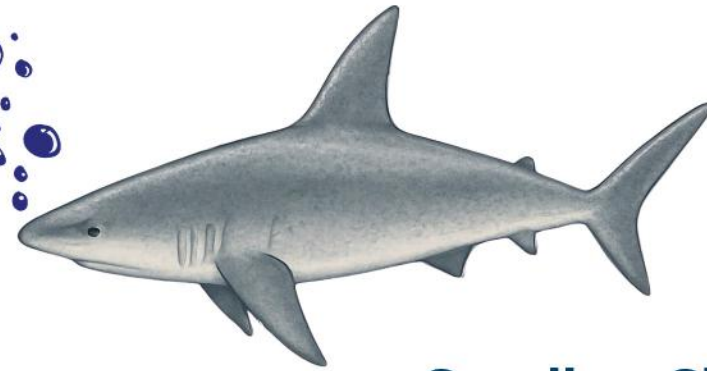
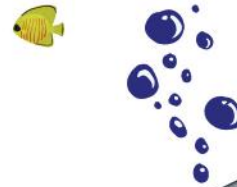
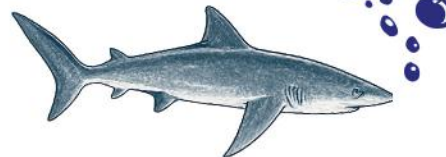
Habitat & Diet: Inhabits shallow coastal waters and estuaries, spending its time hunting for crabs, shrimp, and small fish along the seafloor.

Atlantic Sharpnose Shark

Average Size: 2 - 3 ft. long

Key Feature: Sleek, slender body with a long, pointed snout and distinct white spots along its sides.

Habitat & Diet: A small, fast-swimming coastal shark common along the South Carolina coast, feeding primarily on small schooling fish.



Sandbar Shark

Average Size: 5 - 6 ft. long

Key Feature: A very tall, prominent triangular dorsal fin on its back.

Habitat & Diet: Prefers swimming over smooth, sandy sea bottoms in gentle ocean currents just offshore, preying on flatfish and crustaceans.

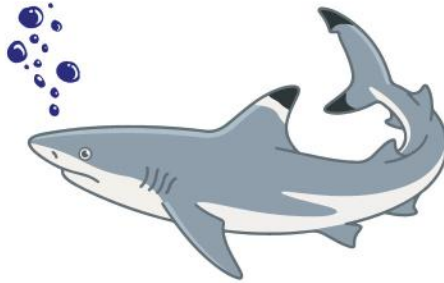

Blacktip Shark

Average Size: 5 - 6 ft. long

Key Feature: Distinctive dark black tips on its dorsal and pectoral fins.

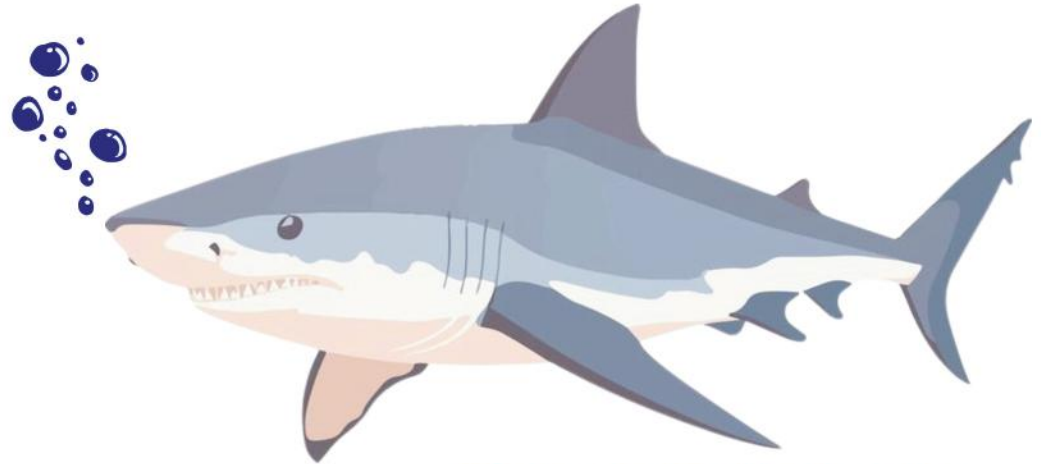
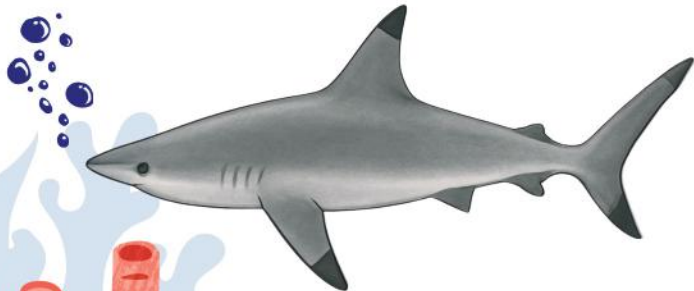
Habitat & Diet: Famous for leaping high out of the water while chasing schools of fish in offshore waters.

Spinner Shark

Average Size: 6 - 7 ft. long

Key Feature: Slender body with dark-tipped fins, named for its acrobatic spinning leaps.

Habitat & Diet: Hunts in schools in deep coastal waters, spinning through the water to catch fast fish.



Tiger & Bull Sharks

Average Size: 7 - 12 ft. long+

Key Feature: Tiger sharks have dark, tiger-like stripes; Bull sharks have broad, heavy-set bodies..

Habitat & Diet: Large ocean predators that stay in deep offshore waters far away from swimming areas..

Sink Your Teeth Into This!

How to Hunt for Fossilized Shark Teeth on the Beach

Shark teeth come in all shapes and sizes, each one a unique fossilized treasure from the sea! While spotting a fin in the surf can be exciting, the real treasures of Myrtle Beach are often hidden right underneath your feet. Collecting shark teeth is a favorite pastime for beachcombers of all ages.

Best Local Spots to Search for Shark Teeth

- **Right Outside Your Resort!** The beachfront directly in front of any of our oceanfront properties.
- **Myrtle Beach State Park:** Rich natural tide lines and shell beds.
- **Huntington Beach State Park:** Quiet, expansive beaches with great wash-ups.
- **Garden City Beach:** Excellent tide pools and gravel patches.





Pro-Tips for a Successful Hunt

Master the Art of Beachcombing

1. **Search the Tide Line:** Focus your search on the wet sand right along the water's edge - especially 1-2 hours after low tide or right after an ocean storm when waves churn up deeper fossil layers.
 2. **Target the Shell Beds:** Don't scan plain white sand! Walk along the dark patches of broken shells, coarse gravel, and debris lines where waves naturally drop heavier items.
 3. **Look for "Black & Glossy":** Fossilized enamel has a unique, smooth, shiny surface that reflects sunlight. Scan for glossy, jet-black, triangular shapes popping out against dull shells.
 4. **Beat the Crowds:** Take advantage of early mornings! Fewer beachgoers on the sand means higher chances of finding undiscovered fossils washed up overnight.
 5. **Bring the Right Gear:** You don't need fancy tools, but bringing a mesh bag or a small sifter/strainer makes it super easy to scoop up shell beds and rinse away sand.

Ripley's Aquarium of Myrtle Beach

- **The Experience:** Walk through the famous Dangerous Reef tunnel surrounded by giant ocean sharks, or book a Glass Bottom Boat Adventure to ride right over the main shark tank!
- **Highlights:** Live feeding shows, touch tanks with stingrays and small sharks, and interactive marine biology exhibits.



Myrtle Beach State Park Nature Center

- **The Experience:** Tucked right along the coast, this nature center features interactive touch tanks, ocean exhibits, and ranger-led programs.
- **Highlights:** Ask the park rangers to help identify the fossilized shark teeth you found on the beach, or join a seasonal beachcombing walk!

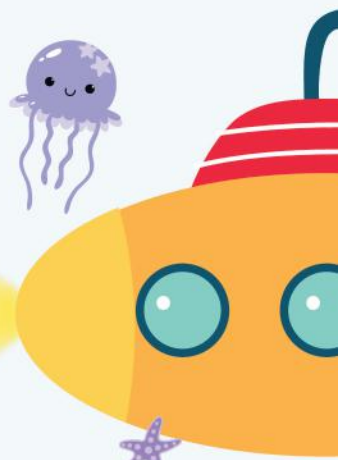

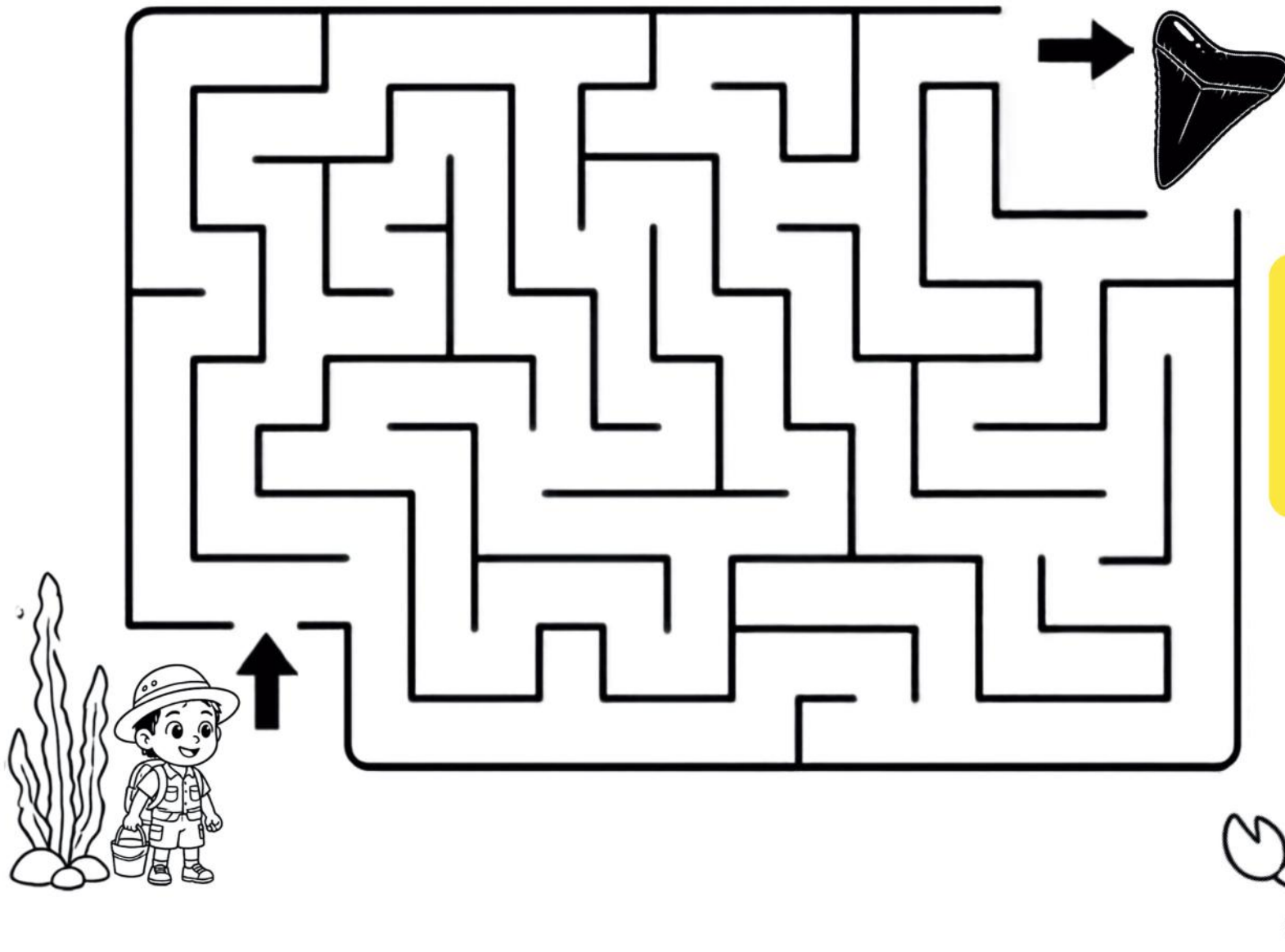

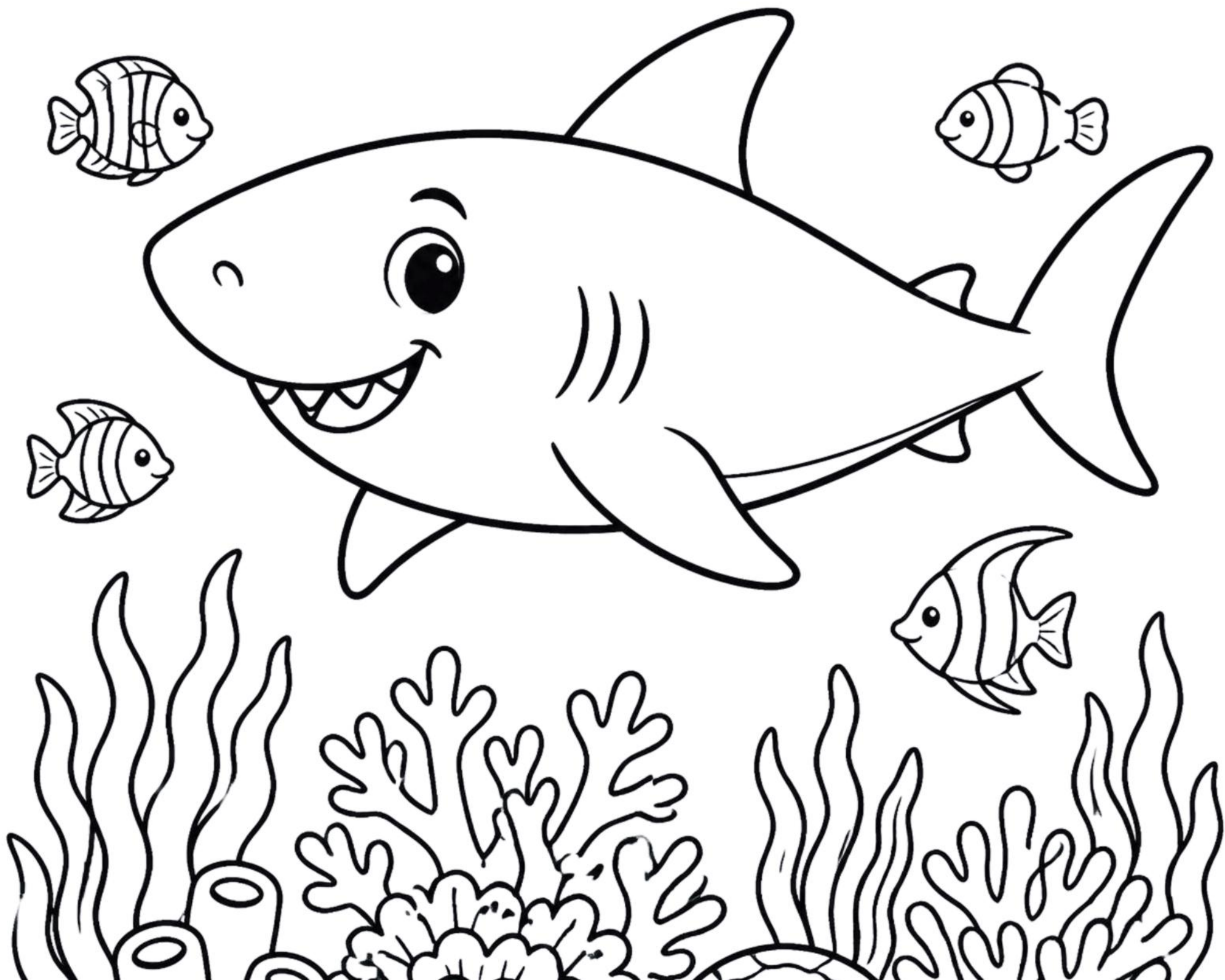
The Great Shark Tooth Maze!

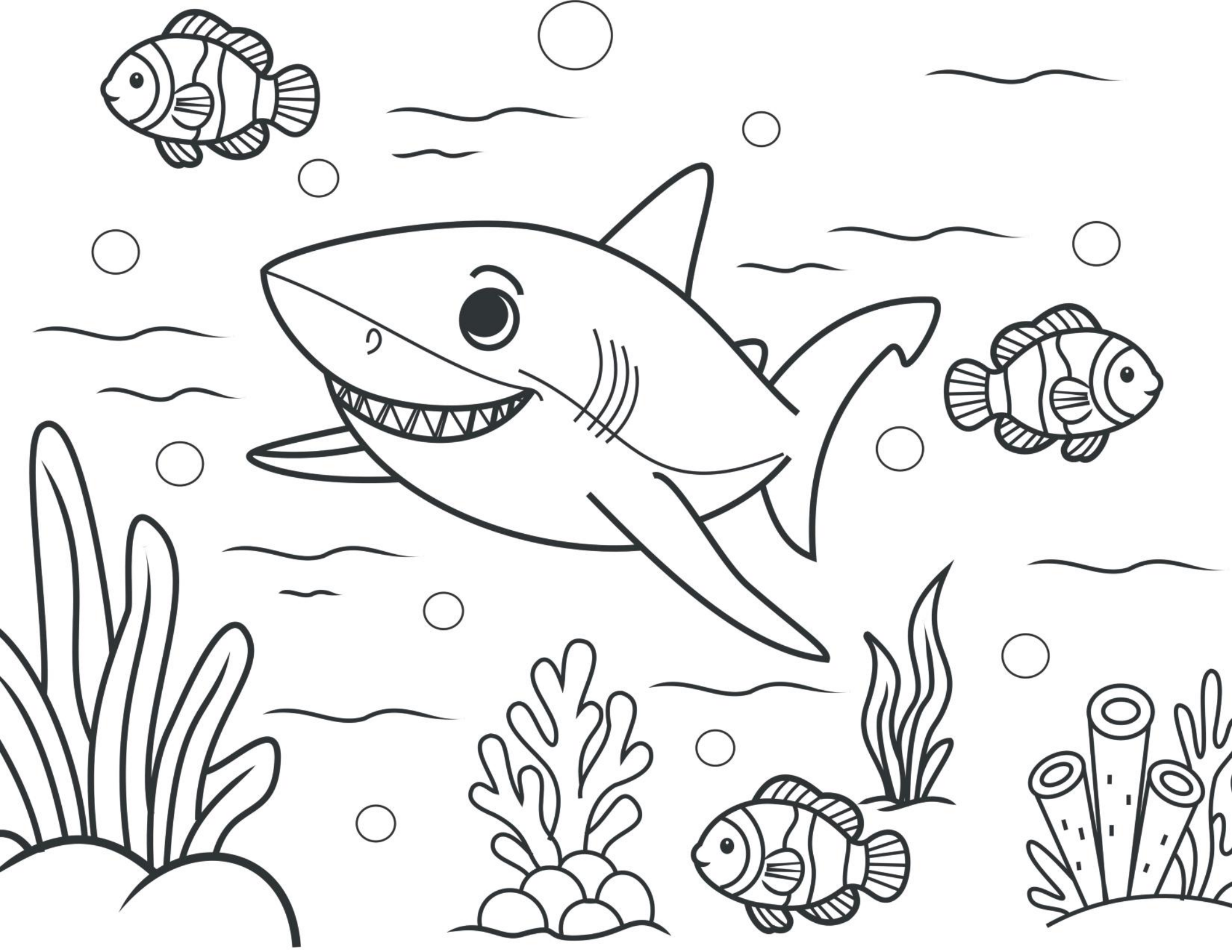

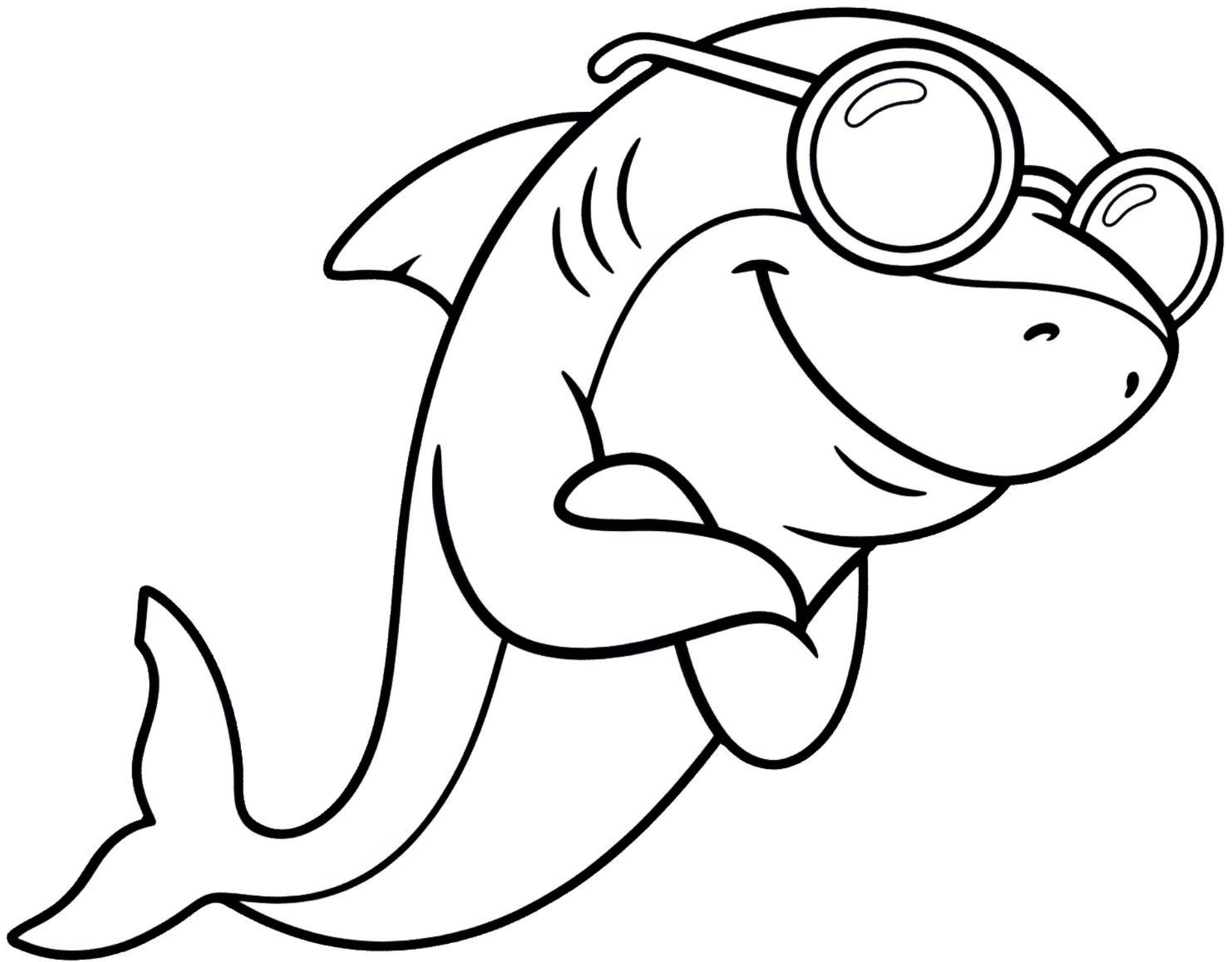


FUN FACT:
