Pastoral Letter from Pam Priestley

Dear Friends,

My greatest fear for my grandchildren, as they grow up, is the effect of social media on them. The plus side is that they are very adept in using technology, so much so that it is their advice I take when I have a problem with my iPad or mobile phone. Our 2 twelve year old grandchildren recently tried to sort out my phone until in the end, after muttering to each other and shaking their heads, told me in sorrowful but gentle tones (as though they were talking to an ill person!) that my phone was too old and couldn't manage the things I had hoped for. The phone obviously resembled its owner!

We all live in a world of instant communication with emails flying about, text messages, WhatsApp telling us what someone has had for breakfast before we reach coffee time and Alexa listening in to every conversation! It can result in a very stressful environment. We haven't got time to think or reflect before the next message comes.

At the festival of Pentecost, which we are celebrating this month, there were no mobile phones, no internet but communication was rapid, miraculous and life-changing. Jerusalem was crowded with people, lots of noise and activity when the disciples, having been left desolate by the death of Jesus were filled with God's Holy Spirit and were able to speak out to hundreds of people, all nationalities, about Jesus. The amazing thing was that all those people understood what was being said, with no translation App needed! Many, many people came to faith that day and encountered God, person to person.

God has always been the great communicator. Right through history He has wanted to make Himself known until He sent Jesus, to speak in a language we could understand. May we today give God space and stillness to speak to us, draw close to us and energeise us anew.

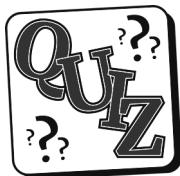

On Saturday 10th June from 10.30am-4pm, Brantwood Director, Howard Hull, will be leading a field trip around Brantwood gardens and estate. Recent ecology surveys at John Ruskin's former home, Brantwood, have revealed that the 100 hectare estate is remarkably rich in biodiversity with a high number of scarce and protected species and habitats. Howard will lead a guided walk around its historic features, from open fell top to flower rich meadow, through ancient semi-natural woodland and remnants of Atlantic Temperate Rainforest, whilst discussing the varied management techniques for the estate. There will also be a visit to the Treasury, Ruskin's glittering mineral collection. Advance booking for this event is required as space is limited. Tickets are £16, RGS-IBG members £14. Dress for weather, rugged terrain and bring a packed lunch. Please note this event is not suitable for the less physically able. Refreshments available at the Terrace Café afterwards.

On Saturday 17th June we are delighted to welcome Dr Rachel Dickinson who will be giving a talk '*Ruskin, the craft of living well and local linen industries*'. Rachel is Reader in Interdisciplinary Studies & English in the Department of English, Manchester Metropolitan Museum and Master of Ruskin's Guild of St George. This talk traces how John Ruskin used textiles to offer a vision of a happier, healthier society. Then, with particular focus on the Langdale Linen Industry and Ruskin Lace, it traces examples of local, small-scale industries that were inspired by Ruskin 'once more to spin and weave' to help rebuild and reinforce a sense of community. Tickets are £6 which includes tea/coffee and biscuits prior to the talk. Opens at 10.00am with the talk beginning at 10.30am in the Coach House Loft. Please book in advance through Brantwood.

To make a day of it, we also have on 17th June a new exhibition opening in the Severn Studio, '*Art Forms in Nature*' by Mark Butler. On 1st January 2022, Mark started a creative challenge to make a new clay design every day for the first 100 days of the year. He based all the clay designs on the amazing drawings of Ernst Haeckel. On display until 30th July.

Our 2023 Blue Gallery programme of exhibitions continues with '*Tracery – Venice and the Lakes Interlaced*' by Deirdre Kelly. This exhibition that emulates Ruskin's dedication to observation and his love of Venice and the Lakes. Like the lacemakers of the Lakes and those of Burano, Kelly has found ways to tell interwoven stories of lakes and lace and evoke journeys, by marrying new techniques to traditional crafts. Greenholme Beck Riverfly Survey – A taster session on 19th April.

Conserving Coniston and Crake volunteers arranged a river fly survey for interested new volunteers. River flies are larvae that live in becks. In this case we went to the lower reaches of Greenholme Beck. The 19th April was chosen as being a perfect sunny day for getting the net and sample trays out for counting the eight species of river flies we were interested in. The resulting score of river flies was well above the critical level and therefore the beck was considered healthy.

Celebrating the Coronation in 1953

As always, Miss Morton rose to the occasion, sweeping aside all obstacles, and, crimson of face, hammered out the accompaniment to our Patriotic Songs on the piano which the boys had, between them, dragged outside the classroom for the occasion.

Our proud parents and the various other invited dignitaries were suitably impressed with our performance, and many approving comments were later voiced over the obligatory cups of tea.

South Lakes

I've just had my bathroom re-tiled, but I'm not happy with the work. The tradesperson left to do another job halfway through and I had to chase them to finish the job. The work looks pretty rough around the edges. They also left all the old tiles and plaster for me to dispose of, which I wasn't expecting. I've now got the invoice, but I don't think the price reflects the work done or the service I got. Can I challenge this?

If the work looks unfinished or unsafe, you should be able to get the tiler to come back to fix it. You could also suggest that removing the old tiles is part of finishing the job. You are protected by the Consumer Rights Act 2015, which says a tradesperson should have completed the work with 'reasonable care and skill'. If they haven't done this, they've broken the law. The Act means you're legally entitled to ask the tiler to fix the problem (if they provided the tiles as well as the service) or get money refunded (if they just provided the service and you bought the tiles). They should fix the problem or refund you in a reasonable amount of time, without causing too much inconvenience. Ask them to fix the issue or negotiate a lower price for the work before you pay them anything.

Before you contact them, it's a good idea to take photographs to use as evidence of the problem. Make notes about what happened, including dates and times. You should also gather any paperwork and receipts - was there any prior written agreement about who would dispose of the old tiles? Was the final cost was in line

with estimates or quotes given to you at the outset of the work? If not, there is advice on the Citizens Advice website.

Let the tiler know you understand what you're entitled to. Keep a written copy of all contacts, whether you speak to them, write or email. There are template letters on the Citizens Advice website. If you're still struggling to come to an agreement, there are other steps you can take, including using 'alternative dispute resolution', which is a way of solving disagreements without going to court. There are full details about how to do this on the Citizens Advice website

Finally, after this Magazine has gone to print, we explored the Veteran Trees of Finsthwaite Heights. We hoped to record a few special veterans for the Woodland Trust Ancient Tree Inventory.

A THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH by Rev. David Gregg

JUNE 4TH : TRINITY SUNDAY

A prison chaplain on his rounds had come to a cell with two prisoners in it, who were arguing fiercely about how high their cell door was. One said 6 feet 3 inches and the other said 6 feet 6 inches. The minister produced his Bible, and showed them a little label inside the front cover. It said, "This Bible is printed on paper measuring 8 inches by 6 inches." So using his Bible he measured the door and pronounced that it was, in fact, 6 feet 6 inches high. Whereupon the one who had said 6 feet 3 inches blurted out indignantly, "Doesn't dat just prove what Oi always say, 'Yer can't believe everytink yer read in de Boible'!!"

June 4th is Trinity Sunday. In my thought for St. Patrick's Day last year, I wrote in particular of the ultimate *MYSTERY* of the Person and Name of the LORD God Almighty – the 'Three-in-one and One-in-three', and of the need to be content with what we *can* understand, and to recognise that the rest is secret.

Perhaps the greatest challenge to getting the Christian message across in our modern western society, particularly among intellectuals, is its so-called "scientific world view". It is the *credibility* of the language and imagery of the biblical writers in relation to the realities of which they speak that is the real difficulty:

"In six days the LORD made the heavens and the earth."

"This Jesus, God raised up, and of that we are all witnesses."

"At the name of Jesus every knee shall bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth."

It is the Creationist view, and the assertion of the Resurrection, and the "three-tier" view of the universe that are the problem. So, when I was invited to preach at Gonville and Caius College on Trinity Sunday, I thought I would concoct a modern parable:

A young man was reading English Literature at Gonville and Caius, and was courting a girl from Girton College who was reading Physics. One evening he took her to the Gogs (- two small hills a little way from Cambridge). He began to rave about the beauty of the sunset in eloquent and poetic terms. Much to his sadness, the girl recoiled, and said, "I didn't realize what an ignorant fellow you were. I thought everyone nowadays knew that there is no such thing as 'sunset' – the sun is fixed at the centre of the solar system, and it is the earth rotating on its axis that gives the illusion of the sun "going down"! And as for the 'beauty', well that's just the effect of the sun's rays passing through the dust of the earth's atmosphere in various permutations in the spectrum. Good-bye!"

I tried to explain how foolish it is to object to the parabolic language of the Scriptures. It is called "phenomenological" – that is how things appear to our senses from a human point of view. The principal genre of Scriptures is *story* (parable and proverb and anecdote). The language of modern science is "empirical", i.e. based on observation and experiment. The truth is that, confined as we are by time and space, the ultimate reality of God is bound to be a "mystery". Through His prophet Isaiah, the LORD has said:

"My thoughts are not your thoughts and my ways are not your ways." (Isaiah 55: 8)

We are wholly dependent for *any* human knowledge of God on what He Himself, by the Holy Spirit, has chosen to reveal through the prophets of old, and through the apostles of Jesus Christ, and through the language and (Semitic) world-view in which He has chosen to express it. We should always engage prayerfully, faithfully and humbly in our reading and study of the Scriptures, which witness to God's ultimate revelation of Himself and His truth in the person of our Lord Jesus Christ through the agency of the Holy Spirit – a *dynamic* rather than a *static* process.

Waterbird Project

Last September, I updated you on the Waterbird Project. This is a team effort by the Lakes Flying Company, to bring a replica of the original plane back to life. 12 years in the making, it is a replica of the first ever seaplane that first flew on Windermere in 1911, 8 years after the Wright Brothers. We first flew the replica in June last year and held a public display last September and had a new display last week, accompanied by two, more modern seaplanes.



The initial flight, on Thursday morning, was a success but at the display on Thursday evening, the engine failed. The pilot, who normally flies Spitfires, landed the plane in a controlled manner without further damage. Waterbird had few static displays over the weekend at Brockhole and the Jetty museum and several thousand people enjoyed the experience.

There will be future displays, we need to get the engine mended first.

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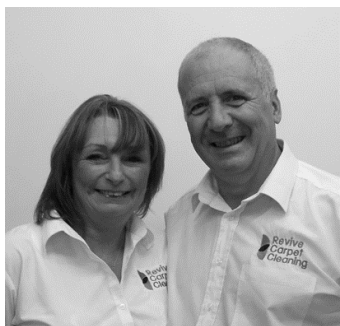
