BINGHAM ARTS GRANTS

Creating a Ripple Effect for Arts in Clemmons

“The partnership with the Shallow Ford Foundation helps us create opportunities that bring people together and strengthen our community in meaningful ways”

Starting in 2023, the Shallow Ford Foundation hosted the Bingham Arts Series, inviting Clemmons residents to experience music, art, and performance together. Inspired and funded by Thad and Mary Bingham's deep love for the Clemmons community, the series reflected their belief that arts and cultural experiences help communities thrive.

In 2025, the Foundation built on that legacy by transitioning from hosting events to awarding Bingham Arts Grants instead, empowering local nonprofit organizations to plan and lead arts and cultural initiatives and expand their impact throughout the community.

One of the first projects funded through the program took place this Spring at the Jerry Long Family YMCA, where residents helped create two community murals through a grant awarded to the Associated Artists of Winston-Salem. Over two days of painting, people of all ages added their own brushstrokes to a shared vision.

The finished murals are eye-catching, vibrant, and welcoming, but their deeper significance lies in how they were created.

What began as blank brick walls became a lasting reflection of creativity, collaboration, and community pride. Today, the murals serve as a reminder of what can happen when people come together to create something meaningful for the place they call home.

That same spirit of collaboration extends beyond a single project. In Clemmons, it is reflected in a growing partnership with the Village of Clemmons to expand access to arts and experiences that bring people together.

Behind many of those experiences are Village of Clemmons leaders like Assistant Manager Amy Flyte and Events Coordinator Lynette Fox, whose work helps bring residents together and strengthen connections.

"The partnership with the Shallow Ford Foundation helps us create opportunities that bring people together and strengthen our community in meaningful ways," said Amy Flyte, Village Assistant Manager. "Whether through the arts or the new StoryWalk, we're focused on making Clemmons a place where people feel connected, engaged, and proud to call home."

This collaboration reflects the Foundation's broader approach to impact. By listening, partnering, and investing in local ideas, the Foundation helps communities shape their own futures. Through the legacy of donors like Thad and Mary Bingham, the Foundation continues to transform generosity into opportunities that strengthen communities and enrich lives across the Northwest Piedmont.

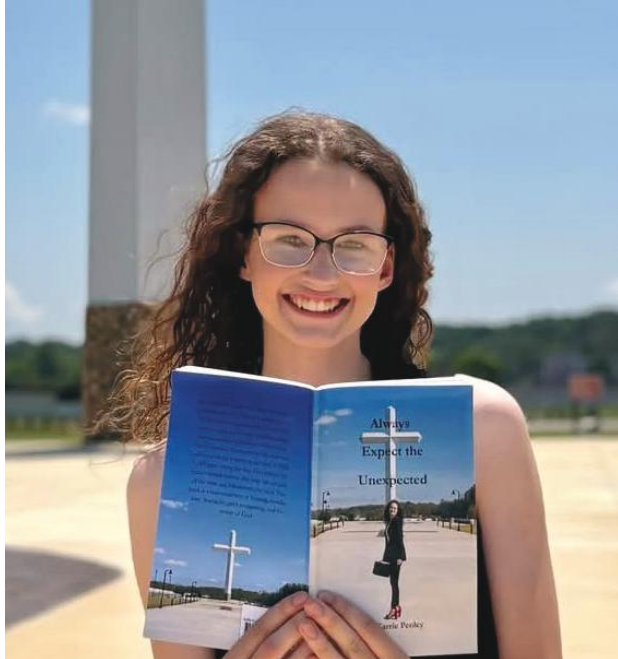

Always Expect the Unexpected

How a Shore Scholar turned challenges into strengths.

Carrie Penley has learned that life rarely unfolds the way we expect. In fact, the phrase that best describes her journey is the title of the book she wrote about it: *Always Expect the Unexpected*.

A graduate of Starmount High School and a Shore Scholar, Carrie is now at William Peace University majoring in Writing with a minor in Communications. Looking back, she sees how much her path has changed, and how those unexpected turns helped shape who she is today. As Carrie puts it, “Some of the best things come from the unknown.” Three years ago, she never imagined she would be attending a university three hours from home on scholarship.

Carrie's journey through the Shore Scholars program began while she was in high school after a teacher encouraged her to apply. Although nervous at first, she decided to take the chance. For a student who describes herself as “very shy and reserved,” the experience pushed her outside her comfort zone and, she says, “helped me become the best version of myself.”

“Shore Scholars gave me the confidence and tools I needed to speak up and figure things out.”

As a first-generation college student, the guidance was especially meaningful. “Everything about it was new, how to apply, how to ask questions, how to speak up,” Carrie says. Shore Scholars helped her navigate unfamiliar territory and build confidence for the future.

That confidence became critical right before starting college when a severe asthma attack forced Carrie to completely reorganize her plans. Instead of beginning college as a full-time, in-person student, she had to move fully online and quickly adapt to a new reality. “My whole world flipped,” she says. The experience was challenging, but it also showed her how much she had grown.

Wanting to encourage others facing their own challenges, Carrie decided to share her story. She independently published *Always Expect the Unexpected*, a book focused on resilience, hope, and overcoming adversity. Within two days of its release, the book became a number-one bestseller and sold more than 1,000 copies. A copy of her book can be purchased through Amazon.

Reflecting on her time in Shore Scholars, Carrie says the program helped prepare her not only for college, but for life. It taught her how to, “speak up, ask questions, and work with people. Those are things I use every day now.”

For donors and community members who support Shore Scholars, Carrie offers a simple message of gratitude: **“I would want them to know that their support and commitment truly make a difference. I know how much I've grown over the past four years, and I'm very grateful. What they're doing matters.”**

EDUCATION GRANT HIGHLIGHT

Creative Learning Support Comes Full Circle

How a classroom grant connected education, career readiness, and local nonprofit impact.

This year, a Creative Classroom Grant from the Yadkin County Education Foundation Fund helped transform classroom learning into community impact for students at Forbush High School.

Awarded in 2024, the Making It Real – Creating Marketing Merchandise project challenged students to move beyond textbook concepts and develop branding, marketing, and product design skills. Using equipment such as a heat press and 3-D printer, students transformed their ideas into tangible products while gaining experience that aligns with future careers.

During the 2025–2026 school year, that learning extended beyond the classroom through a partnership with the Historic Richmond Hill Law School in East Bend, a nonprofit dedicated to preserving the legacy of North Carolina Chief Justice Richmond M. Pearson.

Students served as marketing professionals, developing branding concepts, merchandise prototypes, and event ideas designed to increase awareness of the historic site among younger audiences. In doing so, they applied their skills while providing valuable support to a community organization.

What began as a classroom project evolved into an authentic real-world experience. Students applied marketing, branding, design, and project management skills while serving a local nonprofit, receiving feedback from community leaders, and seeing firsthand how their work could make a meaningful impact.

The project represents a full-circle moment for the Shallow Ford Foundation. A grant designed to support innovative teaching grew into an opportunity for students to gain career-ready skills while helping strengthen a local nonprofit organization. Through DECA and hands-on learning, students bridged the gap between education and career readiness while contributing to their own community. The result is a ripple effect of impact—educators gained resources to innovate, students gained practical experience, a nonprofit received valuable support, and Yadkin County benefits from stronger future leaders. The Shallow Ford Foundation is proud to be part of projects and partnerships like this that bring learning to life and create lasting impact far beyond the classroom.

Stokes County Education Foundation

The launch of the Stokes County Education Foundation Fund marked an exciting new chapter for the Shallow Ford Foundation. Although Stokes County was initially outside our traditional service area, growing connections and a shared commitment to education inspired the creation of this new partnership with Stokes County Schools.

In its first year, the fund awarded 10 Innovative Classroom Grants totaling nearly \$23,000. Supported by community contributions, these investments are already helping educators create innovative learning experiences that inspire curiosity, strengthen skills, and prepare students for the future.

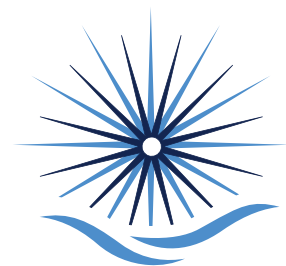
