OBITUARY.

JOHN EDWARD THRIFT.

Born July 7, 1904; Died April 11, 1917.

IT is not often that we have to record that one of our school-fellows has passed away, and it is with feelings of special sadness that we speak of the death of Jack Thrift, of Form IIIc. He left school on Monday afternoon, April 2nd, full of health and in the brightest of spirits, to go to stay with the rest of his family at Howth for the Easter vacation. He was taken suddenly ill on Good Friday, became unconscious next day, and died on the following Wednesday. In a time of many losses we wish we could have been spared this one. He was a schoolboy of the best type. He was fond of his lessons, worked hard and conscientiously, and was near the top of his class; he was fond of his play, was a splendid runner, was proud of being the youngest boy on the Junior Cup Team, on which he was a wing three-quarter of great promise, and was looking forward with keenness to the coming cricket season; and he was excellent in his conduct, always most punctual and obedient, and very honourable and straightforward in all his actions. His life was short, but he has left a bright example behind him. To his father and mother—Professor and Mrs. Thrift—and to his brothers and sisters we wish to offer our most sincere sympathy.

THE "Roll of Honour" of our Old Boys who have given their lives for their country is lengthening. We give elsewhere a full list, as we think our readers would like to have it. Since our last number was issued six more Old Boys have fallen—D. L. Fletcher, G. J. Gibson, J. H. Hancock, C. S. Marchant, G. T. Sadleir, and G. E. Stephenson. To their families we offer our sincerest sympathy.

Donald Lockhart Fletcher (1909-14), 2nd Lieut., Prince of Wales's Leinster Regiment (Royal Canadians), died of illness in May, in Macedonia. He was the third son of Mr. Geo. Fletcher, F.G.S., Assistant Secretary of the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction, and was in Trinity when the war broke out, having entered in June, 1914. In October, 1914, he won First Entrance Prize for Natural Science, but soon afterwards obtained a Commission. Almost on the same day his eldest brother, Arnold Fletcher, who was known to us in the school as one of the Department's Inspectors, died in France of wounds received in the battle of Arras.

George James Gibson (1903-06), Canadian Cavalry Brigade, died on April 19th, at Halifax Military Hospital, as the result of gas poisoning. He was the youngest son of Mr. Edward Gibson, of Mary Street. His elder brother, Innes E. Gibson, who is serving in the Motor Transport in France, will be remembered for his trick cycling at the athletic sports.

John Henry Hancock (1910-11), Lieut., Royal Engineers, was killed by a shell on June 9th, just after the Messines battle. He was the elder son of Mr. W. H. Hancock, formerly of the General Post Office in Dublin, and now Postmaster of Cork. He was in the Engineering School in Trinity when war broke out, and as soon as he had finished his course there joined up and was given a Commission in the Engineers. His younger brother was serving in the Fleet on H.M.S. "Hercules," but is now on a destroyer.

Charles Stewart Marchant (1911-13), 2nd Lieut., Royal Dublin Fusiliers, was killed in action near Wytschaete on June 4th. He was struck in the heart by a fragment of a shell and was killed instantaneously. He was the elder son of Mr. T. F. Marchant, of Greenmount Road, Terenure, and was one of the best athletes that the school has turned out. He played for the first eleven for three years, and was a left-handed batsman with a beautiful style. In his last year, in which we reached the schools

final against St. Columba's, he had the top average of 17'64, and played for Leinster in the Inter-provincial. Since leaving he has played for Clontarf. He was also on the first fifteen for three years, and was a very good wing three-quarters. He joined the South Irish Horse at the outbreak of the war, and owing to his good shooting (thanks to the Rifle Club) he was one of the first to be sent to France. He proved a first-rate soldier. He was for a long time unwilling to take a Commission, but eventually did so in the Royal Dublin's at the end of last year. At the time of his death he was acting as Intelligence Officer to his battalion, and had been recommended for a permanent Commission. His younger brother Stanley is at Sandhurst.

Gerald Thomas Sadleir (1908-09) was the youngest son of Mr. Wm. Sadleir, "St. Finda," Sandford Road, and was killed in action on May 15th. He was in Australia at the beginning of the war and came over with the Australian Imperial Force, being attached to the Lewis Gun Section. An elder brother, has also been killed in France.

George Elwood Stephenson (1897-1900), Canadian Infantry, who was killed in France on May 10th, was the third son of the late M. J. Stephenson and Mrs. Percival, 9 Dunville Avenue, Rathmines. The fourth and youngest son, Wilson Moore Stephenson, is an Engineer in the Navy, and his sister is married to Maurice Wilkins.
