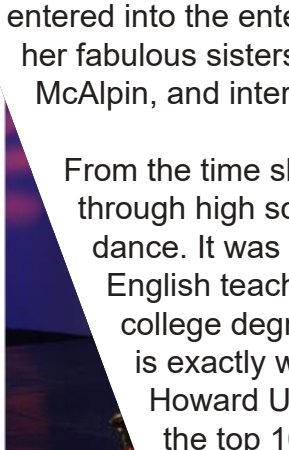
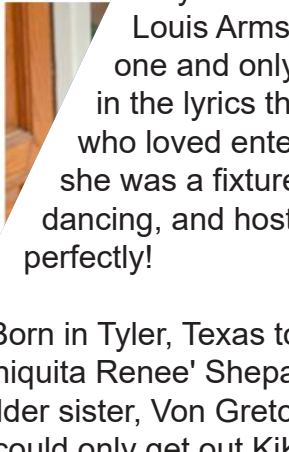
Chiquita "KiKi" Shepard

If you are familiar with the song "It's a Wonderful Life" by Louis Armstrong, you might think he was singing about the one and only, KiKi Shepard. Kiki's spirit was perfectly described in the lyrics throughout the song. KiKi was a versatile performer who loved entertaining. Whether on film, television, or the stage, she was a fixture on American television for over 30 years; acting, dancing, and hosting. That was KiKi's natural arenas and they fit her perfectly!

Born in Tyler, Texas to John and Dorothy Shepard on July 15, 1951, as Chiquita Renee' Shepard, she was renamed 'KiKi' five days later by her older sister, Von Gretchen, who could not pronounce Chiquita She could only get out KiKi, and it stuck. All three sisters grew up and entered into the entertainment world. KiKi was enormously proud of her fabulous sisters, renowned international model, Von Gretchen McAlpin, and international artist Cassandra Shepard.

From the time she could walk from kindergarten all the way through high school, it became apparent that KiKi's first love was dance. It was her true passion. Her mom, Dorothy Shepard, an English teacher for over 50 years, told KiKi she had to get her college degree and then she could follow her dreams, and that is exactly what she proceeded to do. KiKi graduated from Howard University with a BA in Business Administration in the top 10% (ten percent) of her class, promptly laid her degree in her mother's hands and announced her decision that a professional dance career would be her future.

During her time at Howard University, KiKi met and learned from the late great dancer/choreographers Mike Malone and Louis Johnson, both of whom opened the doors of a professional dance career for her through the DC Repertory Dance Company. Mike Malone encouraged and trained her to follow her dreams of professional dancing, under the tutelage of ballet master Charles Augins, and then, mentor, teacher, and acclaimed choreographer Louis Johnson opened up the New York-based professional world of dance for her after leaving Washington, D.C.



During her time at the DC Repertory Dance Company, KiKi performed in such notable ballets as – The Balls, Spirit in the Dark, When Malindy Sings - where she played Aretha Franklin, No Outlet, For All We Know, and Genesis, Juba, & Other Jewels: A Songstep of Black America, and Changes, to name a few..... all directed and choreographed by Mike Malone and Louis Johnson.

One of KiKi's most favorite and most challenging memories while at the DC Repertory Dance Company was performing in the ballet, "No Outlet." The ballet followed the story of a magnificently talented dark-skinned Black Ballerina who could not make it in the White Dance World because of the color of her skin, which finally drove the young ballerina crazy. This ballet told a true story that affected so many dancers of color as they strived to break color barriers in the dance world. It was an experience and story KiKi could identify with wholeheartedly. She once stated, "I too, could not blend in with the white ballet world because of the darkness of my skin, but I still knew I was exceptional. Others' opinions would not stop me. I was determined to excel in the world of dance. And I did!!!"

KiKi's six-year dance journey in Washington, D.C. culminated in the DC Repertory Dance Company's appearance at FESTAC, the 2nd WORLD BLACK ARTS' FESTIVAL in Lagos, Nigeria in 1977. What an amazing and memorable experience.

Upon her return to the US, KiKi knew it was time to make that move. In 1978, she struck out for the bright lights of New York City and Broadway. This big move laid the foundation for the next thrilling and amazing 11 years of her career.

Once KiKi arrived in New York, she hit the ground running. She was immediately cast in the first national tour of the hit musical "Bubbling' Brown Sugar," choreographed by the legendary Billy Wilson, and went on to perform across America. She then returned to New York and Broadway production for 2 years. Shortly after that, KiKi was called to do the first international tour of Bubblin' Brown Sugar with most of the original cast in Amsterdam and Paris, France. The French press called her legs "simply beautiful."

KiKi performed in other hit Broadway productions for ten straight years such as, "Alice" with Debbie Allen and Paula Kelly, choreographed by Talley Beatty "The Wiz," choreographed by George Faison, "Comin' Uptown" with Gregory Hines, choreographed by Michael Peters. "Reggae" choreographed by Otis Sallid: "Your Arms Too Short to Box with God" choreographed by Talley Beatty, for over 5 years, featuring Jennifer Holiday, and later, Patti Labelle and Al Green. She also danced in the pre-Broadway show Sing, Mahalia, Sing, choreographed by George Faison.

From 1977-1989, KiKi appeared in the movies: "The Wiz" starring Diana Ross, 1977, choreographed by Louis Johnson; "A Rage in Harlem" in 1981, starring Gregory Hines and Forest Whitaker, choreographed by Otis Sallid; "Cotton Club", 1984 starring Gregory Hines,



choreographed by George Faison and Arthur Mitchell; "The Josephine Baker Story", choreographed by George Faison, starring Lynn Whitfield and Kene Holiday; in 1995- 97 "Ms. Evers Boys", "Harlem Nights", and "Sunday Evening Haircut". She also appeared in videos with Roberta Flack, Glenn Jones, Betty Carter, Cameo, Evelyn Champagne King, Earth, Wind, & Fire, Aretha Franklin at Radio City Music Hall, and the final performance with Lionel Richie and the Commodores, also at Radio City Music Hall.

KiKi collaborated with the amazing choreographer Ed Love for over 7 years, where she performed and assisted on videos like "Pink Cadillac" with Aretha Franklin, and taught Mariah Carey how to walk up and down stairs without looking down in one of her earliest videos. She also assisted Mr. Love in the creation of the fantastic musical "American Jukebox," a fabulous farce where 50's rock & roll artists take two young kids on a tour of the music of the 50's, the amazing songs, and R&R history,,, all inside a big jukebox!! KiKi stepped in many times and performed the Tina Turner role to Rollin on the River, and the killer 4-minute-long dance number, "Devil in a Blue Dress". KiKi and Ed Love also choreographed numerous commercials during their time together and created and choreographed a visitor's commercial for the island of Cancun, Mexico where KiKi danced the role of the Sun Goddess.

KiKi was blessed to be a part of two outstanding All-American national productions with choreographer/director Michael Peters. The first was the 100th anniversary of Coca Cola presented in Atlanta, Georgia. The second was the 100th Anniversary of the US held all over New York City. A huge full city and national celebration.

In 1989, a little-known TV show called "It's Showtime at the Apollo" changed her life completely. KiKi was originally cast as one of six dancers and as the assistant choreographer to Otis Sallid. After only three episodes, Otis departed the show, and with his blessings, KiKi became the choreographer for the new late-nite variety show and choreographed the now famous white feather fan dance opening, and the finale that ran for over 12 years.

KiKi quickly became best known as the Apollo 'Queen of Fashion.' For 15 years, she starred as the smashing co-host of the original "It's Showtime at the Apollo" with four co-hosts



including Sinbad, Steve Harvey, Mark Curry, and Rudy Rush. Every weekend, the public rushed to the television to see what KiKi would wear as she introduced and graced the stage with budding performers on Amateur Nite. KiKi was featured in the Apollo Minute, and she also became the host of the Amateur Teens segment. She performed on the show with the dancers and also did a special dance performance with Freddy Jackson.

In 1993, KiKi decided to expand her career into acting and moved to Hollywood, California to test the waters in television and film. After the end of the run of "It's Showtime at the Apollo" the same producers called her with great news. A new late-nite variety show, shot in Los Angeles, and KiKi would be the Host of the show. The new show was called NBC's "Live in Hollywood" which KiKi hosted for two seasons. Then, along came TV ONE'S Game show, "The Bid Whist Party Throwdown," a great show which aired for one season.

KiKi was blessed to appear in numerous TV sitcoms, movies, and studio films. Guest starring roles include "Everybody Hates Chris," "NYPD Blue," "LadyBoss," "Family Law," "Yes Dear," "General Hospital," "A Different World," and she costarred as 'Trelawney' in the Hulk Hogan action series "Thunder in Paradise". Other film credits include: the awardwinning film short, "Sunday Evening Haircut" written by and starring Reginald VelJohnson and Victoria Rowell's "BlackJack Christmas" movie airing on BET.

Ms. Shepard's notable stage venture, "Moments in Time- An Interview," was a conversation with today's movers and shakers from all walks-of-life. Interviews highlighted the lives of Phylicia Rashad, Obba Babatunde, Lynn Whitfield, Tamara Tunie, Mike Epps, Terrence Howard, Camryn Manheim, and Vivica Fox. KiKi's one-woman show, "Its Showtime...An Evening with KiKi Shepard", premiered at the Black Academy of Arts and Letters in Dallas, Texas, where critics called her an "Utter Delight". The show traced her 20 years in the dance world before embarking upon an acting career.

Through the many accomplishments and accolades KiKi achieved, she was most enthusiastic about her work raising awareness, advocacy, and education about Sickle Cell Disease.

In 1993, at the request of Glynn and Jo-An Turman, KiKi appeared as a celebrity guest at a golf tournament in the Bahamas for the Sickle Cell Disease Association of America. That experience triggered a memory of a doctor's visit in New York where she was told that she had the sickle cell trait. KiKi immediately went to the then National Director and said, 'use me,' and they did!! She toured the country as a national spokesperson and celebrity host for 10 years, raising awareness of SCD. When the national leadership team moved from LA to Baltimore, KiKi started sponsoring her own bowling tournament for Sickle Cell Disease awareness. The bowling tournament became so well-attended and loved; it convinced her to start her foundation. In 2006, with the support of some very dedicated advocates, family, and friends, KiKi began her personal path of advocacy to raise awareness and educate the

public about Sickle Cell disease. In 2006, she established The KIS Foundation, Inc. which strives to improve the social health and quality of life for patients and families living with Sickle Cell Disease.

Today, KiKi's KIS Foundation hosts an Annual Celebrity Golf Classic, a backpack drive-thru give-a-way, COVID-19 Recovery Relief Box, and scholarships for Sickle Cell warriors.

Up until her passing, KiKi continued to mentor young people and encourage education. She was most proud of her two grand nieces, Lauryn Alexis, and Taylor Vaughn. She raised them for over twenty years in her role as Aunty/Mom, and they are two great young productive women. She is also proud of her nephew, Steph McAlpin, who is pursuing a career in acting.

KiKi was also a dedicated and active member of the Delta Sigma Theta Sorority Inc.



KiKi Shepard lived a life full of love and energy. Her smile lit up any room she entered, and her spirit will always soar to the highest.
