Editorial.

Since our last issue, the greatest Peace, and perhaps the most momentous one in the history of the world, has been signed, putting the final touches to that gigantic struggle in which almost every nation in the world participated, and in which pride and militarism were crushed beneath the forces of Right and Civilisation. In looking over the events of the war, one cannot but have a feeling of thankfulness and joy that at last the Victory, which had been in doubt for so long, has been gained by our Empire and its allies. Who will forget the few periods of doubt and anxiety, during which people began to tremble, and to think of what would happen if the invader were to succeed in his hopes of ruling the world? Who will forget the glorious days when our allied armies gained their victories in the field and hurled back the intruder? And who, indeed, will ever forget the closing stages of the war, the great advance, which compelled the Germans, hemmed in, to ask for an armistice, and finally to sign this Peace? Yes, truly our hearts must be full of thankfulness, for we belong to a victorious Empire. Just as in ancient times the Romans used to declare public thanksgivings for any big victory of their armies, so, too, have we followed their example by holding public festivities and thanksgivings, and well can we join with Shakespeare in saying—

“O God, Thy arm was here;
And not to us, but to Thy arm alone,
Ascribe we all!”

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But in the midst of our rejoicings, let us not forget those who went out to fight for their King and Country. Especially, as we talk of the School, it is necessary for us to remember those of our Old Boys, some of whom made the Supreme Sacrifice on the field of battle, for they all “did their bit,” and, we are proud to say, did it well.

It has been decided to erect a memorial to these Old Boys, as a lasting token of what the School did in the Great War, so that those who follow after us may look upon it with pride, and try to uphold the example set by those boys who did all they could to keep up the honour of their School.

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As regards the School itself, since 1914 we had been unable to hold our annual sports. This pleasant function has at last been resumed, and the Sports held at Lansdowne Road this year proved a complete success. We hope that we shall be able to continue holding these Sports each year, for they are a great attraction, not only to the boys themselves, but also to the parents and others.

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The results of the Intermediate Examinations have been published, and the School has as usual upheld its good name. In particular we congratulate the winners of distinctions, especially N. Shapira, who obtains first place in Classics and Latin Medal in the Senior Grade, as well as a Composition Prize, R. E. McGuire, who obtains a Senior Grade Exhibition, and in the Middle Grade, I. E. Jones and W. C. G. Proctor, whose all-round success we think is not surpassed by any one in the Middle Grade. We are starting now on a new year of study, and it is for each boy to see that the School does as well again next year, or perhaps even better, for we can only achieve a good result by working in the right manner for it.

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There are two changes on the School Staff this term. We are glad to welcome back Mr. Wyon after three years of war, during which he rose from the ranks to be captain and adjutant in his regiment, was mentioned in despatches, and was badly wounded in the great battle in March of last year. During his absence the French was thoroughly taught by Mr. Kelleher, as shown by this year's Intermediate results.

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Mr. Dodds towards the end of the Summer Vacation accepted the post of Lecturer in Classics at University College Reading, and Mr. Richardson has come back to his old school to fill the gap as the Senior Classical Master. His school and college record is too recent to be forgotten. He is one of the best men we ever turned out, which is no mean praise, and he has always been one of our most loyal supporters.

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During the holidays the Lord Lieutenant requested that

Irish Schools should have an extra week's holiday in commemoration of the victory of the Allies and the signing of peace. His message came too late to arrange for the extension of the Summer holidays without some inconvenience, but the Headmaster promised us on the reopening of school that the holiday would be given us in the middle of the autumn term.

We are glad to notice that the Athletic Committee have arranged to have a Swimming Gala again this year in the Iveagh Baths. The Baths have not been open regularly this year owing to labour difficulties and the price of coal, and we have not been able to do as much as we wished for the swimming this spring and summer, but we are sure the Gala on October 1st will be a success.

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The War Savings Association is continuing its work in the School, and we hope there will be a large number of subscribers again this year. Up to last midsummer the contributions amounted to over £500.



War Memorial to Old Boys.



A Public Meeting of Old Boys, parents, and present pupils was held in the School on Wednesday, April 9th, to inaugurate a memorial in honour of the old boys of the School who have fallen in the war. The chair was taken by Mr. E. H. Alton, M.A., M.C., F.T.C.D., in the unavoidable absence of the Bishop of Down. He proposed the following resolution:

"That there should be a permanent memorial in the School in honour of the Old Boys who have been killed in the Great War."

The motion was seconded by Mr. R. R. Smylie, B.L., supported by the Headmaster, and unanimously carried. Mr. S. W. Maddock, D.L., J.P., proposed, and Mr. C. H. Darley, M.A., seconded, that the following Committee be appointed to collect subscriptions and to carry out the erection of the memorial.

It is proposed to place a large commemorative stained glass window in the clockroom, with tablets on either side of it, on which will be inscribed the names of the old boys who have fallen.

A circular with the names of the Committee, of the old boys who have been killed, and of the preliminary list of subscribers was drawn up before the holidays. Its publication was delayed by the long printers' strike in the summer, but it is now being issued to the old boys and parents. It is hoped to reach every old boy, and if any old boy has not received a copy, the Committee hope that he will ask for one. Any other friends who are interested in the school or in the memorial will gladly be sent a copy on application. The preliminary subscriptions amount to close upon £200.



Notes on Old Boys.

Since our last number was issued the death has been announced officially of Major F. M. Taylor, M.C., R.A.M.C. (1895-1901), younger son of Sir J. J. Taylor, C.B., Assistant Under-Secretary, Dublin Castle, on March 17th last. He served with distinction in France, and then volunteered for service in North Russia. He was cut off during a raid on the Murmansk front, and it was hoped for some time that he had been made a prisoner. Unfortunately this was not so.

- Surgeon Commander T. W. Myles (1888-96), M.D., F.R.C.S., B.A., R.N., has been given the Order of George I. by the King of the Hellenes. He has already been honoured by the King of Italy with the Order of the Crown of Italy.

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The King has sanctioned the promotion in the Order of St. John of Jerusalem of Captain W. C. Stevens (1888-95), M.D., R.A.M.C., to be a "Knight of Grace," and of Mr. A. L. B. Moore, to be an "Honorary Serving Brother."

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- J. I. Mackay (1908-17), is now on "General Staff Intelligence" at General Headquarters, Cairo, with the rank of Lieutenant. He has written us some of his experiences in Palestine in another column.

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- E. S. O. Dunlop (1905-12), is a Lieutenant on the Staff of the Financial Adviser at Constantinople, and has just passed the qualifying examination for Class I. and the Indian Civil Service.

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- A. J. Whitty (1907-12), is going out to New York as American Manager for Messrs. Cantrell and Cochrane.

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- J. Cornick (1914-17), has been awarded the Medical Scholarship in Trinity College of £40 a year for two years in Botany, Chemistry and Physics.

After a lapse of five years, this important event took place at Lansdowne Road on Wednesday, June 25th. The Balls-

bridge ground was unobtainable owing to its occupation by the military for war purposes. Our hopes of a fine day seemed to have been doomed to disappointment in the morning, which turned out to be wet, but they were raised again when the weather changed, and for the rest of the day it was gloriously fine. The attendance was large, and although the Sports had not been held since 1914, the function was a complete and enjoyable success, every arrangement being carried out without hitch of any sort. Unfortunately two of the best Seniors, R. E. McGuire and P. B. Foster, were hors de combat that afternoon.

The Throwing the Cricket Ball Competitions were held at Belgrave Square, on Monday, June 23rd. The Senior event was won by R. E. McGuire, with a throw of 71 yards, while W. E. Lewis carried off the Junior event, with a throw of 64 yards.

The Sports commenced on Wednesday, at 1.30 p.m., with the Senior Long Jump, for which there were nine entries. R. D. Stephens secured the first place with a jump of 15 feet 3 inches, E. R. Colwill coming second with 14 feet 3 inches. C. E. Digges, who jumped splendidly, spoiled all his jumps at the take off. The Junior Long Jump was won by W. H. Jolley, with a jump of 15 feet 3 inches, beating R. M. Johnston by 10 inches.

In the 100 yards (under 11) Handicap, which was the next event, two heats were necessary. A. F. Smith (4 yds.) and A. Cunningham (scr.) came first in each, and in the final A. Cunningham was first with A. F. Smith and W. Heath respectively second and third. Time 14 4-5th seconds. The two heats of the "Under 12" were won by B. Stewart (2 yds.) and J. Berry (5 yds.). The latter won the final, A. Charles (scr.) coming second, and B. Stewart third. Time, 14 1-5th seconds. There were three heats in the "Under 13," the winners, M. W. d'Alton (5 yds.), G. B. Thrift (2 yds.), W. H. Squires (4 yds.), with three others, qualifying for the final, in which d'Alton was first, Thrift second, and E. C. Reeves (scr.) third. Time, 13 secs. There was some exceedingly good running in the four heats of the Hundred Yards "Under 15," in which W. H. Jolley (scr.), E. M. Wright (1 yd.), W. S. Cunningham (2 yds.), and R. P. McGarrigle (2 yds.) were successful, while in the final, which was well contested, E. M. Wright proved the victor, W. S. Cunningham coming second and R. P. McGarrigle third. Time, 11 4-5th secs.

The three heats of the Senior Race proved quite exciting, G. H. Townsend (scr.), F. D. Matthews (scr.), E. R. Colwill

(2 yds.), coming first, J. D. Rooney (3 yds.), M. H. Rooney (2 yds.), and C. E. G. Digges (2 yds.) being second. In the final E. R. Colwill won fairly easily, R. G. Cunningham (2 yds.) coming second, and M. H. Rooney third.

The next event was the Junior High Jump, H. F. Nelson (4 ins.), cleared at 4 feet 4 inches, the next after him being W. H. Jolley (scr.) and G. E. Abbott (3 ins.), who tied for second place. There was some good jumping among the Seniors, E. R. Colwill reaching the height of 4 ft. 7 ins., D. C. Swayne and C. E. G. Digges following close behind.

The various heats of the 220 yards Handicap, named "Under 12," "Under 15," and Senior, were now run. In the first division, A. Cunningham (scr.) came first, running very well in 34 2-5th secs.; J. Berry (8 yds.) was second, and G. Heath (4 yds.) with B. R. Stewart (6 yds.) tied for third place. There were two heats in the second division, in which W. H. Jolley (scr.), E. M. Wright (scr.), H. J. Byrne (2 yds.), and D. L. Golding (6 yds.) qualified for the final. This was won in fine style by E. M. Wright, who, running well, covered the course in 29 seconds, one second longer than his time in his heat; D. L. Golding obtained second place, while W. H. Jolley and H. J. Byrne shared the position of third. The Senior 220, in which there were two heats, was one of the best races of the afternoon. G. H. Townsend (scr.), C. E. G. Digges (5 yds.), M. Rooney (6 yds.), in the first heat, and F. D. Matthews (3 yds.), R. G. Cunningham (6 yds.), E. R. Colwill (6 yds.), in the second, qualifying for the final. This was well worth watching, G. H. Townsend coming from scratch, running with excellent judgment and passing all the others, while C. E. G. Digges and R. G. Cunningham came second and third respectively. Time, 28 seconds.

There was a big entry for the Siamese Race, which calls for little comment; the winners were D. L. Golding and W. H. Jolley (1 yd.), with A. W. Robertson and H. D. Gorman (7 yds.), second.

The Quarter Mile "Under 15" was the next race run. It was easily though well won by G. I. Rush (25 yds.), after whom came in order W. S. Cunningham (15 yds.), and P. McGarrigle (15 yds.). Time, 61 seconds. The Senior event was more evenly contested, M. H. Rooney (25 yds.) coming a good first, with C. E. G. Digges (20 yds.) a close second, G. H. Townsend (scr.) finishing up third. Time, 63 2-5th seconds.

The Sisters Race came next, in which Eva Burchill, Eva Thrift and Betty Foster were successful in the order named.

There was a very large entry for this, and another year the Committee should consider the advisability of having a junior and senior race, as some of the smaller runners hadn't much chance.

The Hurdles were now set up. There were four heats in the Senior Race, which resulted in the final being won by D. D. C. Swayne (scr.); W. C. G. Proctor (owes 2 yds.) obtained second place, and E. R. Colwill (owes 2 yds.) came third. In the Junior Event the result was as follows: 1st, G. B. Thrift (scr.); 2nd, G. E. Abbott (owes 3 yds.); 3rd, E. S. Ballagh (owes 2 yds.). The next item was the Half Mile (over 15) Handicap. W. G. C. Buckley (50 yds.) well deserved the post of honour, finishing the course in 2 mins. 26 secs., though G. E. Dodds (40 yds.) came near to drawing level, with W. C. G. Proctor (30 yds.) close behind.

For the Sack Race there were no less than 37 entries, though not so many competed, and it furnished much amusement. E. R. C. May was first, G. A. Rice second, and V. E. Coe, 3rd.

The Old Boys' Race had not many supporters, and was won by I. Isaacson, L. Simon coming second.

The Mile Race also proved to be one of the most interesting of the afternoon. W. W. Watkins (100 yds.) led from the very beginning and ran well throughout, finishing up first. Great credit is due to R. D. Stephens (25 yds.), who steadily diminished the distance between himself and the leader, also to G. E. Dodds, who also ran very well; the former was second, the latter third.

The Boot Race (under 15) was won by E. A. Connolly; V. E. Maxwell and C. G. Monson were second and third respectively. In the Consolation Races, the "Under 12" winners were R. W. Reynolds, D. G. McCauly, H. Burchill; the "Under 15" were J. H. Morton, J. R. W. Fleming, H. McHoul, and the Seniors were H. Campbell, E. J. Montgomery, T. G. Squires. The Challenge Cup for the best performance was won by E. R. Colwill, who gained an aggregate total of 13 points.

Much credit is due to all the officials, for their services at the Sports, to whom most of the success of the day is due.

Mrs. White very kindly distributed the prizes at the conclusion of the races.

The Band of the Dublin Metropolitan Police, under the supervision of Mr. A. J. Norris, attended and gave an attractive selection of music.

A Visit to Jerusalem.

Tuesday, 22/4/19.

Having obtained a week's leave for the purpose of visiting Jerusalem, we, my friend Gardner and I, left Kantara at 11 P.M. on the night of Monday, 21st. of April, and travelled

the Palestine Military Railway, via the Sinai desert, Raffia, Belah and Gaza, and arrived at Lydda (Ludd) at 7 a.m. on Tuesday morning. We had breakfast in the N.A.C.B., and here I met a chap called Wolfson, of the Royal Fusiliers, whom I had known when I was attached to a Battalion of that Regiment, and after breakfast we left Lydda for Jerusalem.

The railway here is the British Broad Gauge now, but was originally Turkish Narrow Gauge (1 metre). The line winds through a narrow gorge, called a "wadi," passing Ramieh, with its famous old Crusader's tower, and other villages. The scenery is very fine, the hills being wild and rugged. The entire way is up-hill, but the engine, imported from England, and still bearing the well-known letters, L.S.W.R., managed to get us to Jerusalem at 11 a.m.

We drove to the Fast Hotel, by the Jaffa gate, where we had lunch, then a snooze until tea-time. After tea we wandered round the outside of the old city walls, and saw the Golden Gate, the Jaffa Gate, the Chapel marking the scene of the Martyrdom of St. Stephen, the Governor-General's House, the Mount of Olives, Brook Kedron, and the Garden of Gethsemane (from the latter a very good view of the Mountains of Moab and the Jordan Valley is obtained), then back to the hotel for dinner.

Wednesday, 23/4/19.

At 8.30 a.m. we started out on foot, and passing the old Turkish Post Office and St. George's, we ascended the Rabbi's road to Kilo 2, where, looking back, an excellent bird's-eye view of Jerusalem can be had, the bright red tiles of the German Colony giving a crude modern appearance to an otherwise antique-looking scene. We continued down the road to Kilo 7, passing through a district where there was particularly hard fighting after our occupation of Jerusalem in November, 1917. At Kilo 7 we left the main road and struck up the old Egyptian Roman road, past the native village of Shaffat, up the hill known as Kerbet Adaseh, or "the ruins of Adaseh." After resting a little, we struck across and climbed the famous hill of Tel-el-Ful. Here were many signs of the war, chunks of shells, shrapnel bullets, rifles, ammunition, Turkish bayonets, and parts of Turkish uniforms and equipments, German machine guns, and many unexploded bombs, marking the height up which the Turkish troops attacked. They attacked ten times in succession here. There are numerous British graves on the top of this height, but the Turks never succeeded in getting the hill.

Striking across country from this hill we again joined the

main road below Kerbet Adaseh. About a mile from Jerusalem a Ford van overtook us, and the driver offered us "a lift," which we gladly accepted.

In the afternoon we went about the town, and did a little shopping until tea-time, and afterwards we strolled down the Railway Road to the Vale of Kedron, where the view towards the Mountains of Moab is very fine.

Thursday, 24/4/19.

At 9.30 this morning we left Jerusalem on the ration lorry for Jericho, and drove out by the Mount of Olives and Bethany. From Bethany the scenery is truly magnificent, the road (as are all the roads in the Jordan hills) winding in and out, up and down, and corkscrewing in such a bewildering way that at times one can hardly tell exactly in what direction our destination really lies. At last, running along the sides of Wadi Kelt, we came in view of the plains of Jericho. Ahead of us were the huge rugged masses of the Mountains of Moab. Over 20 miles away across the plain, the sandhills of the Jordan showed up white as snow in the dazzling sunlight, to the southward the Dead Sea lay shimmering, and to the north arose the bluff crest of the Mount of Temptation, marking the eastern limit of the Jordan hills. Descending by a very steep road to the plains, the heat becoming absolutely oppressive, Jericho was finally reached.

The town itself is a very miserable place; it is about two miles from the site of the ancient Jericho, flat, hot, dusty, almost empty; half-bred jackals snarled at us as we passed by, and slunk away into the doorways of the low grass-topped mud huts that flanked the main street, and the cry of "Oranges, Oranges, Effendi,—ver' nice, ver' clean," came from the indescribably filthy hovels which represent the shops of the city. Any inhabitants there were, were sitting or lying in the shade of the olive trees, or of the walls, and looked at us with that stare of blank indifference, so typical of the rural Bedouin Arab. The only troops now garrisoned here are mostly Indians, as white troops cannot live in the Jordan valley. The valley is fever-stricken, and infested with scorpions, poisonous lizards, and the malarial mosquito, making it unendurable for the white man in summer. The Bedouin is unaffected, and sleeps on sideless bivouacs of stretched skins.

High up on the sheer side of the cliffs of the Mountain of Temptation there is a Greek Monastery set into the side of the rock, like an eagle's nest; the ascent to the Monastery is steep, and exceedingly dangerous, so, as we were pretty tired, and our time was limited, we did not attempt it.

The lorry was to return to Jerusalem at one o'clock, but two o'clock came and went, and still no lorry turned up. As we were waiting, a small staff car came up the hill, unoccupied, except for the chauffeur, who told us he had been to the River Jordan (7 miles from Jericho), and that he was out to break the record from Jordan to Jerusalem, if he could manage it. He took my friend and myself up in his car, and I shall never forget the excitement of that ride back to Jerusalem; the road has no walls, and takes hairpin turns, with sheer cliffs up and down, on either side, for hundreds of feet, in places. Up till then, the record time for the distance was 1 hour and 45 minutes. Our driver did it in 1 hour and 30 minutes. It was a glorious run.

Friday, 25/4/19.

This morning we climbed the Mount of Olives, from the top of which we had a splendid view all round for about 30 miles; we passed a German Hospice on our way, and returned by the Rabbi's Road to the Damascus Gate, having seen Mary's Chapel and the Garden of Gethsemane.

Saturday, 26/4/19.

At 9 o'clock this morning we took a gharry and drove out past the Jaffa Gate to Bethlehem, by way of the Hebron Road. The first object of interest was a small well, known as Mary's Well, situate by the side of the road, about half-way to Bethlehem. Later we passed what was pointed out to us as Rachel's Tomb.

Bethlehem is situate on a steep hillside with Beth Jaral to the right, on a similar hill. The village of Bethlehem is small, with very narrow streets, the shops and industries being much more primitive-looking than in Jerusalem, but the place on the whole is much cleaner than the latter city. The women of Bethlehem wear a distinctive head-dress—a conical-shaped red cap, over which is draped a long white veil, which reminds one of the drawings of the Fairy God-mother in "Cinderella."

Having driven through streets so narrow that the people on foot must needs go into doorways to allow us to pass, and under archways so low that our driver had to bend double to keep his hat on, we arrived at an open space where we procured a guide to show us the various places of interest in the neighbourhood. This gentleman first took us to his own home and supplied us with cups of tea, very black (no milk) and very sweet, but on the whole, very nice. After drinking the tea, we were shown the Place of the Nativity, and various Tombs, Chapels and Churches, but these places are

absolutely ruined by the distinctions and differences of the various religious (Christian) Sects represented here. The Greek, Armenian, Syrian, and Roman Catholic Churches are all well represented. In the Church of the Nativity there are many altars of different denominations, and each with its own section of the Church carpeted off, so that a Roman Catholic at his altar dare not go on the carpet of an Armenian, and *vice versa*. It was horrible, and somehow made one feel that though Christianity was sound, the Churches were not. To think that such differences can exist in these places, places that are the heart and bed-rock of the Christian faith. There must be something wrong.

A highly placed officer speaking in the lounge the other evening said that the cant and superstition of it all only tended to strengthen unbelief more than anything else, and this was said, not jeeringly, but bitterly. For instance, in some one place the Greek Church say that our Lord did something or other here, the Armenians say not at all, *over here* is the spot, and show you the exact black tile in the pavement (incidentally the pavement was placed there many years after the death of Christ), then the Roman Catholics break in, and say you are both wrong, *over here* is the real spot, and show you a foot mark on a rock. Bethlehem has been somewhat of a revelation to me.

Monday, 28/4/19.

Leaving the hotel at 9.30 on this, our last morning, we went for a walk round the walls, and entered the city by the St. Stephen's Gate. The streets of Jerusalem (within the walls) are practically impossible for wheeled traffic, as they nearly all go up in steps, are very narrow, and are arched every few yards, which gives them a wonderfully quaint and Eastern appearance.

Our first visit was to the Mosque of Omar. We then visited Solomon's Tomb, and place of Judgment, and also many ruins of the old Temple and the Golden Gate. The windows of Solomon's Tomb are iron barred, and the Moslems of Jerusalem who desire any special favour for their children, come and tie a small piece of rag or ribbon to these bars as an offering, and pray for the favour they want. Wandering through evil-smelling streets and the native markets we followed the "Via Dolorosa" and "The Stations of the Cross," passing the Tomb of Veronica, and the place where Simon of Cyrene was met, and visited the Church of The Holy Sepulchre, finishing our walk by a further tour of the markets, before returning to our hotel for a much needed rest, prior to starting on our return journey to Kantara, after a most enjoyable and interesting experience.

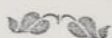
