WEST BEND-MALLARD STUDENT NAMED 2026 IOWA YOUTH LEADERSHIP COUNCIL REPRESENTATIVE

Congratulations to Maddie Morey, who was named the 2026 Iowa Youth Leadership Council (YLC) representative during the Youth Tour in June. Maddie is a rising senior at West Bend-Mallard High School and was sponsored on Youth Tour by Iowa Lakes Electric Cooperative.

She is actively involved in student government, dance team, cross country, National Honor Society, 4-H, FFA and livestock judging. She is an outstanding young leader, and we are thrilled to have her represent Iowa.

As Iowa's YLC representative, Maddie will:

- Meet with the YLC group virtually between August and February, where state delegates will hear from guest speakers, participate in additional leadership development trainings, and work with their local co-ops to host National Co-op Month projects.

- Attend a four-day YLC "basecamp", which is designed to equip delegates with the resources they need for their year of service. Programming will focus on strengthening delegates' leadership, public speaking, advocacy and communication skills. They will build strong connections with fellow YLC members, the industry's senior leaders, and their local and statewide cooperatives, and learn about the cooperative industry and their role in advocating for rural America.

- Prepare and deliver a speech to her co-op board by mid-January, which will be submitted to the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA) for national YLC spokesperson consideration.
- Deliver her speech at the Iowa Association of Electric Cooperatives Annual Meeting in December.



- Attend NRECA's 2027 PowerXchange in San Diego.
- Receive a \$1,000 college scholarship from the Pioneer Trust Foundation.

FEDERAL FUNDING WILL SUPPORT IOWA COMMUNITIES

In June, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) announced that Iowa will receive more than \$9.5 million in federal funding to benefit Iowans across the state. Several electric cooperatives in Iowa are recipients of the funding. Details on the FEMA awards include:

Iowa Department of Homeland Security and Emergency

Management: \$580,889.65 to fund costs related to the management of Public Assistance (PA) grants as a result of severe storms, tornadoes and flooding in 2024.

Lyon County: \$2,290,229.05 to fund secondary roads/permanent road repairs as a direct result of severe

storms, flooding, straight-line winds and tornadoes in 2024.

City of Rock Valley:

\$2,491,040.92 to fund content replacement as a result of severe storms, flooding, straight-line winds and tornadoes in 2024.

Northwest Iowa Power

Cooperative: \$1,721,184.20 to fund permanent repairs as a result of severe storms, flooding, straight-line winds and tornadoes in 2025.

Harrison County Rural Electric

Cooperative: \$424,281.03 to fund the repair or replacement of utility poles, conductors and other items as a result of a severe winter storm in 2025.

MiEnergy Cooperative: \$419,651.54 to fund utility protective measures/mitigation reconductoring as a result of the 2020 derecho.

Southern Iowa Electric Cooperative:

\$955,233.00 to fund utility protective measures/upgrades following the 2020 derecho.

Southwest Iowa Rural Electric

Cooperative: \$355,617.54 to fund utility protective measures/retrofit following the 2020 derecho.

City of Hawarden: \$289,980 to fund property acquisitions, elevations, mitigation reconstruction and floodproofing as a result of severe storms, flooding, straight-line winds and tornadoes in 2024.

SEE IOWA'S BEST LINEWORKERS IN ACTION AT THE STATE FAIR

If you've ever wondered what it takes to keep the lights on, the second-annual Iowa Electric Utilities Lineman's Rodeo offers a front-row seat to one of the most skilled and essential professions in the utility industry.

The rodeo will take place Friday, Aug. 21, at Elwell Family Park on the Iowa State Fairgrounds. The event begins at 8 a.m., with gates opening at 7 a.m. Admission is free with paid fair admission.

Organized by the Iowa Utility Association and the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, the rodeo is supported by MidAmerican Energy, Alliant Energy, ITC and Prairie Energy Cooperative. The competition showcases the precision, expertise and commitment to safety required of lineworkers who build and maintain the electric grid.

Putting skills to the test

Journeyman and apprentice teams will compete in four challenging

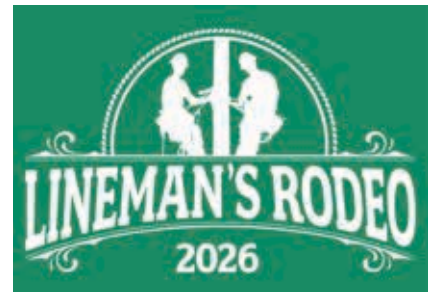
events designed to test the skills they use every day in the field. Competitions include pole climbing, cutout changes and simulated rescue scenarios. Contestants will be judged on safety, accuracy and efficiency as they complete each task.

Several Iowa electric cooperatives will be represented, including Prairie Energy Cooperative, T.I.P. Rural Electric Cooperative and Eastern Iowa Light & Power Cooperative. The event provides an opportunity for cooperative lineworkers to demonstrate their expertise while connecting with fairgoers from across the state.

Scott Meinecke, director of safety and loss control for the Iowa Association of Electric Cooperatives, and Don Kelchen of ITC will serve as event emcees.

More than a competition

In addition to the rodeo events, visitors can explore vendor and utility



exhibits throughout the day. Electric utilities, sponsors and industry partners will host tent spaces where attendees can learn more about careers in the utility industry, pick up promotional items and visit with lineworkers and other professionals.

Students and young people interested in a career in linework are especially encouraged to attend. Lineworkers will be available to answer questions about training, apprenticeships and career opportunities in this high-demand field.

Whether you're interested in utility careers or simply want to see some of Iowa's best lineworkers in action, the rodeo offers an entertaining and educational experience for the whole family.

FRUIT SALAD FOR A CROWD

- 1 ripe pineapple
- 1 ripe cantaloupe
- 4 ripe mangoes
- 2 pounds fresh strawberries
- 4 cups seedless green grapes
- 1½ cups fresh blueberries
- 3-5 cups powdered sugar

Cut pineapple and cantaloupe into bite-size pieces. Peel mango with potato peeler and cut into pieces. Cut strawberries into pieces. Add all fruit to a large bowl and add powdered sugar. Stir to form juice. Adjust sugar to taste. Serves 20

DILL PICKLE PASTA SALAD

- 1 16-ounce box rotini pasta
- 1 cup mayonnaise
- ½ cup sour cream
- ⅓ cup dill pickle juice
- 2 tablespoons dried dill
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- ¼ teaspoon pepper
- 2 cups baby dill pickles, chopped
- 1 8-ounce block Colby Jack cheese, cubed
- 1 small white onion, finely chopped

Cook pasta according to package directions, drain water. In a large bowl, combine mayonnaise, sour cream, dill pickle juice (from the pickle jar), dried dill, salt and pepper. Pour dressing over pasta and stir. Add pickles, cheese and onions. Serve immediately or chill for 1-2 hours in the refrigerator. Serves 12

RHUBARB LEMONADE

- 4 cups fresh rhubarb, chopped
- 4 cups water, divided
- ¾-1 cup granulated sugar
- ¾ cup fresh lemon juice, 4-5 lemons
- ice cubes, for serving

In a saucepan, combine rhubarb, 2 cups water and sugar. Bring to a gentle boil, then reduce heat and simmer for 15-20 minutes until rhubarb softens and releases its color. Strain the mixture through a fine-mesh sieve, pressing gently to extract the liquid. Discard solids and allow the syrup to cool. In a large pitcher, combine the cooled rhubarb syrup, fresh lemon juice and 2 cups cold water. Stir well and taste. Adjust sweetness or dilution by adding more sugar or water as needed. Refrigerate for at least 1 hour before serving with ice. Serves 6

SUPER SALAD

- 1 pound macaroni
- 1 large green pepper, chopped
- 4 carrots, shredded
- 1 onion, chopped
- 1 can sweetened condensed milk
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup vinegar
- 2 cups mayonnaise
- 1 teaspoon salt
- ¼ teaspoon pepper

Cook macaroni, then drain and cool. Add remaining ingredients and stir. Serves 15-20

CRISP TUNA-CABBAGE SALAD

- 1 5-ounce can tuna, drained
- 2 cups green or red cabbage, finely chopped
- 1 tablespoon mayonnaise
- 1 tablespoon Miracle Whip salad dressing
- 3 tablespoons plain Greek yogurt
- salt, to taste
- pepper, to taste
- onion, finely chopped, to taste, optional
- garden-fresh tomato slices, optional

Mix tuna and cabbage thoroughly. Mix mayonnaise, Miracle Whip and yogurt thoroughly. Combine the two mixtures. Add salt and pepper. Add onion, if desired. Can be served on slices of tomatoes. *Serves 2*

COLESLAW — FRESH OR FROZEN

- 6 cups cabbage, shredded
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 3 ribs celery, chopped
- 1 small green bell pepper, chopped
- 1 cup white vinegar
- ½ cup water
- 1½ cups sugar
- 1 teaspoon celery seed
- 1 teaspoon mustard seed

Sprinkle salt over cabbage and let sit at room temperature for 1 hour, then drain. Add celery and bell pepper to cabbage. Refrigerate while mixing the dressing. In a saucepan, put vinegar, water, sugar and seeds. Bring to boil and then boil for only 1 minute. Remove from heat and let cool for 30 minutes before pouring over cabbage mix. Divide into 12 serving containers to serve fresh, or in freezer bags to freeze. Keeps 2 weeks in refrigerator. If frozen, remove coleslaw for 2 hours before serving. *Serves 12*

GREEK SUMMER SALAD

- 4-5 potatoes
- 6 medium tomatoes
- 2 cucumbers
- 1 large onion
- 1 green pepper, optional

- salt, to taste

Boil potatoes, then cool until cold. Dice all vegetables and mix in large bowl. Add oil, vinegar and salt, mix well. Adjust the amount of vinegar, depending on how tangy you like it. *Serves 6-8*

Wash rutabaga well, remove top and bottom and peel. Cut into four equal pieces, then slice into ¼-inch-thick pieces. Put rutabaga and remaining ingredients into a food bag. Shake to mix. Place in refrigerator to soak for 1-2 days, occasionally turning the bag upside down. Celery, turnips and radish would also be delicious. *Serves 4*

UNDERSTANDING NERC, THE WATCHDOG FOR A RELIABLE ELECTRIC GRID

The country's electric grid, with its hundreds of thousands of miles of high-voltage power lines, is often described as a bowl of spaghetti. Yet 99.9% of the time, when you flick a switch, the lights come on.

So, who is the bulk power system's chief detangler?

That would be the North American Electric Reliability Corporation, the official watchdog of the North American bulk power system. The international nonprofit, known as NERC, sets mandatory reliability standards for all users, owners and operators of the electric transmission grid.

Monitoring the grid

To maintain reliability, NERC oversees and evaluates grid conditions with support from six regional reliability organizations that serve as its on-the-ground partners in identifying potential problem areas. Each summer and winter, NERC releases seasonal grid assessments that evaluate whether electricity supply is sufficient to meet expected demand and highlight regions at risk of shortfalls.

These periodic reports analyze conditions that can increase demand, such as heat waves and severe cold, as well as factors that can constrain generation, including fuel or equipment shortages. They also include recommendations to address current risks and help prevent future problems. When unforeseen threats emerge, NERC issues special assessments as needed.

Each year, the organization also publishes a long-term grid assessment that looks ahead 10 years to identify innovations and emerging challenges that could affect the reliability of the interconnected electric transmission network.

Providing the electric power industry with timely insight into grid reliability, potential power shortfalls and strategies to address them is essential to keeping the lights on.

Strengthening reliability and security

NERC does more than monitor the grid. The organization holds workshops and technical conferences, trains industry personnel on maintaining a secure grid, and audits owners and operators of the bulk power system to ensure they meet all reliability standards.

NERC also operates the 24/7 Electricity Information Sharing and Analysis Center (E-ISAC), which provides the power industry with the latest information on cyber threats, trends and potential solutions through alerts and advisories. E-ISAC also develops and conducts GridEx, the largest cyber and physical grid security exercise in North America.

Overall, NERC has come a long way from its humble beginnings as an industry-led voluntary grid watchdog. The Northeast blackout of 1965, which affected 30 million people, prompted electric utilities to create the organization to improve coordination across the electric grid.

Today, NERC serves as the nation's Electric Reliability Organization, overseeing the planning and operation of the bulk power system throughout North America. Empowered by the Energy Policy Act of 2005, NERC develops

mandatory, enforceable reliability standards backed by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission.

Utilities like Iowa's electric cooperatives, for the most part, are not regulated by NERC. Instead, state agencies oversee the distribution power lines that deliver electricity to homes, farms and businesses. However, NERC's oversight of the bulk power system is critical to maintaining reliable service across the country, including rural communities.

Electric cooperatives that participate in NERC activities advocate for regulations that help co-ops plan, maintain and operate a reliable electric grid.

Why it matters to co-op members

So, how does NERC affect you as a member of an electric cooperative?

NERC helps ensure the electric grid remains reliable, secure and resilient for the millions of people who depend on it every day. By developing and enforcing reliability standards, monitoring the bulk power system and identifying emerging risks, NERC plays a vital role in supporting the safe delivery of electricity across North America.

For electric cooperative communities, NERC's work provides greater confidence that homes, schools, farms and businesses will continue to have reliable power around the clock.

MORE COMFORT, LESS WASTED ENERGY

Everybody wants a comfortable home. Did you know energy efficiency upgrades not only help you save energy but can make your home more comfortable, too? If you find yourself continually returning to the thermostat on cold winter days or unable to find relief from the heat on summer days, these are signs your home may need an efficiency upgrade.

No matter the home, energy-efficiency upgrades often start with the same basic principle: Keep outside air from coming in and keep conditioned indoor air from leaking out. Insulation, air sealing and duct sealing, along with HVAC upgrades can dramatically improve your home's comfort.

Seal air leaks to improve comfort

A fully insulated home, including the attic, walls and floor, is more comfortable. It's like a blanket for your home. Air sealing is a lesser-known upgrade that keeps air from entering and exiting through cracks and gaps. Some air sealing can be done from inside the home, such as using expanding foam around plumbing pipes, adding gaskets to outlets on exterior walls, caulking around windows and weatherstripping doors.

Attics and crawl spaces offer additional opportunities to reduce air leakage. In the attic, sealing gaps around top plates, open soffit areas, cove ceilings and balloon framing helps keep conditioned air where it belongs. In the basement or crawl space, seal around plumbing pipes, vents and electrical wires. If you need help, contact a local contractor.

As a self-proclaimed energy geek, I wasn't surprised that my first project after my husband and I bought our first home was to air seal and insulate. We sealed and insulated the attic, walls and rim joists in the basement. The difference was immediate. Our house felt cozier, and the temperature swings from the furnace cycling on and off were dramatically reduced.



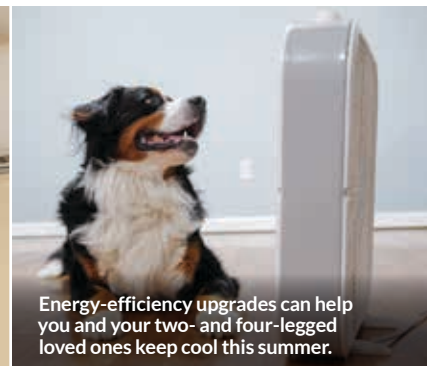

Another unexpected benefit was a noticeable reduction in outside noise. We lived about 15 minutes from the airport and close to a busy road. When the windows and doors were closed, we could barely hear the airplanes, and the traffic noise became almost unnoticeable.

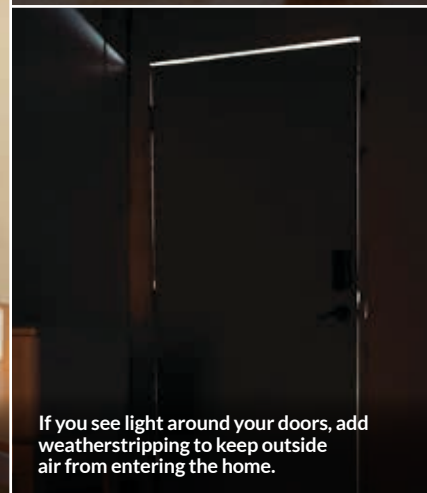
Upgrade your HVAC system for year-round comfort

Duct sealing can also improve your home's comfort. If there are leaks or disconnections in your ductwork, the air you paid to heat or cool may not reach the rooms where it's needed, creating hot or cold spots. An HVAC professional can inspect your ducts to make sure they are properly connected and sealed.

Air sealing and duct sealing can also improve indoor air quality by reducing the amount of dust, pollen, mold and other allergens entering your living space from the attic or crawl space.

If you see light around your doors, add weatherstripping to keep outside air from entering the home.

Upgrading to a heat pump can also boost comfort and efficiency. Heat pump technology is often about three times more efficient than electric resistance heat because it moves heat with refrigerant rather than generating it. Whether you're replacing an electric or gas heating system, a heat pump can provide efficient heating and cooling throughout the year.

If you already have a heat pump or any forced-air HVAC system, schedule annual maintenance and change the air filter regularly to keep it operating efficiently.

Improving your home's comfort doesn't always require a major renovation. A few strategic energy efficiency upgrades can help your family stay comfortable year-round while lowering energy costs.

IOWA LINEWORKERS TO BRING POWER AND OPPORTUNITY TO GUATEMALA

This September, seven Iowa electric cooperative lineworkers will join fellow cooperative lineworkers from Colorado and Oklahoma on a mission that extends far beyond building power lines.

Together, the 18-member volunteer team will travel to rural Guatemala through NRECA International's electrification program, bringing electricity to two remote villages for the first time.

Their work will provide reliable electric service to approximately 100 homes, a school and a newly constructed health center, creating

opportunities for education, health care and economic development that many families have never experienced.

For these lineworkers, the trip is an opportunity to use their professional skills to make a lasting difference for families living in communities without access to electricity.

Electricity changes daily life in countless ways, from providing lighting for students to study after dark to allowing health care providers to refrigerate medicines and safely care for patients. Access to reliable electricity also creates

new opportunities for businesses and improves overall quality of life.

More than bringing power

The project's impact won't stop when the lights come on.

While in Guatemala, the team will also complete a community service project by helping equip an elementary school kitchen so it can prepare meals for local children and supplying a new community health center with much-needed equipment and resources. These improvements will continue serving families long after the lineworkers return home.

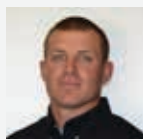

A BRUSH WITH HOPE

The picture on Facebook caught my eye right away. There was my friend Lou Blanchfield, grinning by a colorful painting with a 2025 Iowa State Fair blue ribbon.

My first thought was, “Wow, what a cool cow picture. Good for Lou!”

I figured there was a story here. It all came out when I caught up with Lou last December. “The opportunity to paint was God’s gift to me,” Lou told me, as we enjoyed a cup of hot tea in her living room. “It gave me my life back.”

I was stunned as Lou shared her incredible saga. It turns out this dear, sweet lady I knew as a dedicated community volunteer is a tough survivor with a warrior spirit. Her award-winning watercolor embodies the gift of life itself.

Beyond the blue ribbon

Lou’s ordeal began in 2019, when she began experiencing unusual symptoms, including balance issues. “I’d be in the wooded area by our farm with our grandkids, and I’d fall,” said Lou, who was 70 at the time.

Lou also recalled the time she was sweeping the deck stairs, felt faint and fell into the garden mulch. Then there were the challenges with remembering names and dates. “I thought all this might just be part of getting older,” she told me.

Things only got worse. Climbing stairs became almost impossible. It was hard for Lou to interact with people. Medical checkups didn’t provide many answers. One doctor told her it was probably COVID-19. A doctor at the Mayo Clinic finally diagnosed her problem – idiopathic normal-pressure hydrocephalus (iNPH).

This treatable neurological disorder is caused by a buildup of cerebrospinal fluid in the brain. It affects older adults and is characterized by a trio of symptoms, including balance issues/

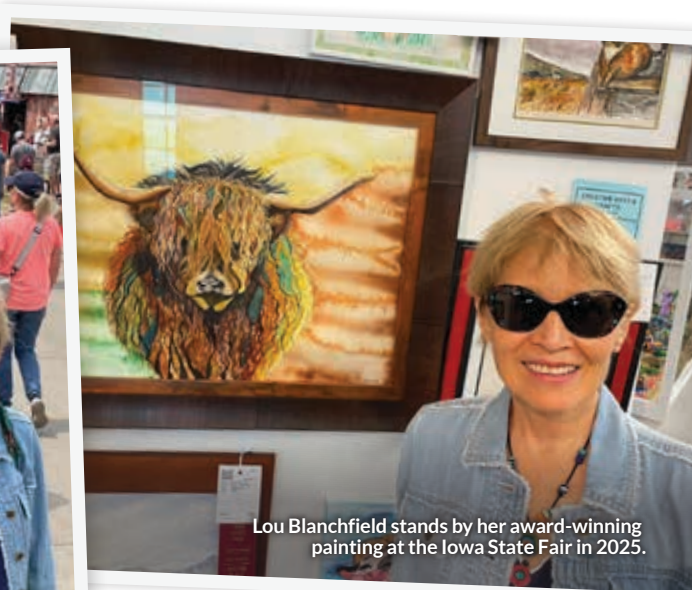
frequent falls, cognitive decline/ memory loss and urinary urgency. “I had all the symptoms – ‘wet, wacky and wobbly,’” Lou said.

While this diagnosis helped clarify some things, Lou’s health challenges weren’t over. In October 2022, Lou fell again. She’d been preparing some freezer meals during harvest and tripped on the dishwasher door. “I face planted,” said Lou, who suffered a subdural hematoma, a potentially life-threatening condition where blood collects between the layers of tissue that surround the brain, causing dangerous pressure. “I couldn’t walk. I couldn’t talk. I had difficulty thinking and lost my creativity.”

Lou told me of her fears after she met with a neurosurgeon at the University of Nebraska-Omaha. “He told me, ‘You’ll get a lot back, but there are no guarantees.’”

Perseverance, painting and a new chance at life

Still, Lou forged ahead. Her speech therapist at Stewart

Memorial Community Hospital in Lake City gave her an assignment – paint “Starry Night,” the iconic artwork by Vincent van Gogh.

“How in the world can I do that?” Lou wondered. “But then I studied that painting, and all the brush strokes were shaped like the letter C. I knew I could do that.”

Lou also hired Susan Smith, an artist from Jefferson, to give her weekly painting lessons. All this led to the creation of “Clyde,” a free-flowing, vibrant depiction of a Highland bull. Lou thought it would be fun to enter her watercolor in an open class at the Iowa State Fair. “I was 77 years old when I became a first-time fair exhibitor.”

A blue-ribbon-winning exhibitor, I might add. Lou’s remarkable journey reminds me of the intriguing words of Friedrich Nietzsche, the German philosopher who noted, “The essence of all beautiful art, all great art, is gratitude.”

Perhaps no one understands this better than Lou. “God healed me. I’ve got blessings all over the place.”
