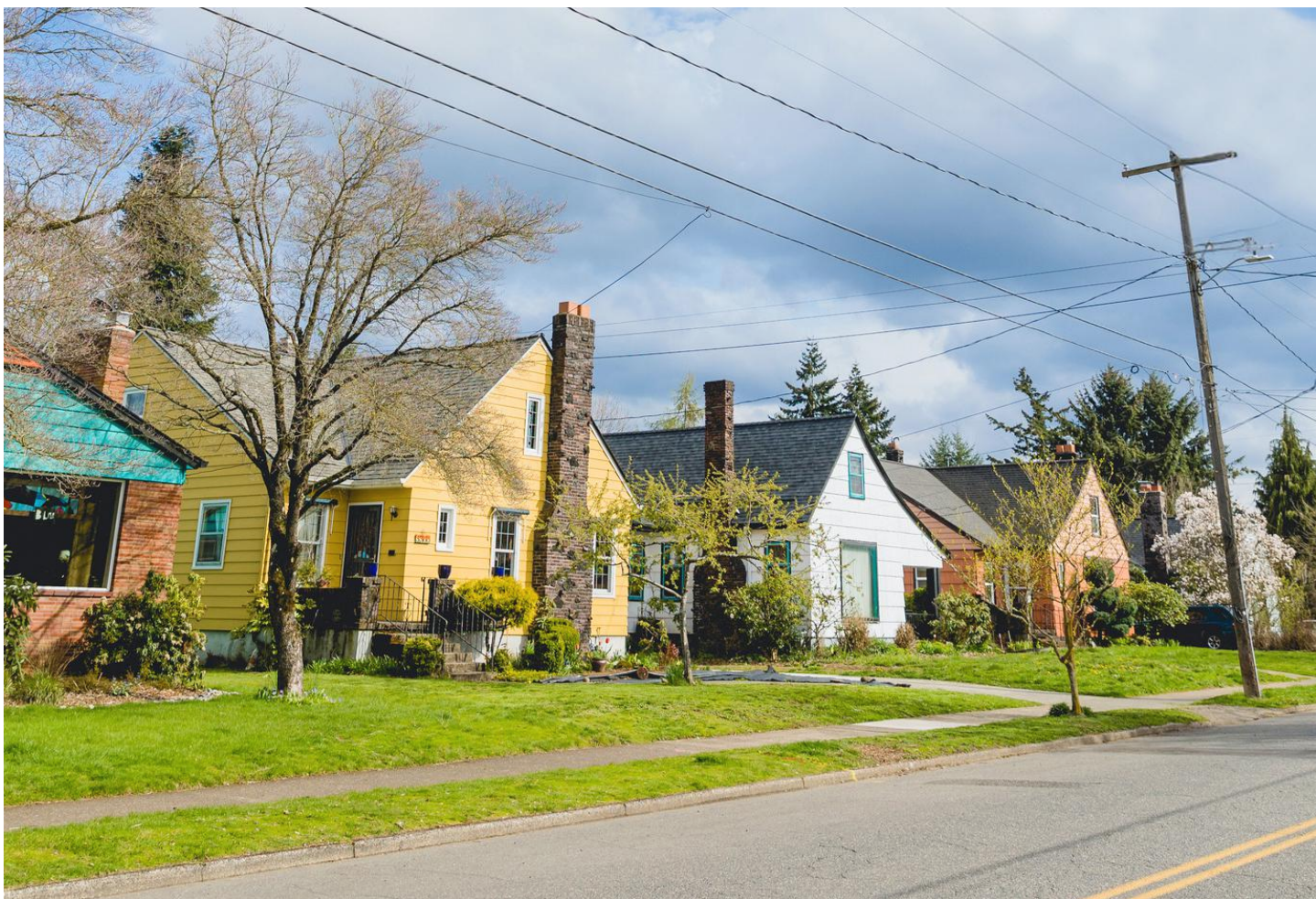

The Volunteer Difference

Local, Personalized and Swift Response

Meeting urgent needs requires more than a single service or program. It requires the ability to respond quickly, understand each situation personally, and connect neighbors to the right support before hardship deepens.

That is what makes our St. Vincent de Paul Georgia model so effective.

We bring together two powerful strengths: statewide programs and a community-based network of volunteer members, we call Vincentians serving through parish Conferences across the state. Together, they allow help to reach neighbors often before a temporary hardship becomes a deeper crisis.

This approach creates a system that is both responsive and relational, capable of addressing urgent needs while helping families regain stability.

Collectively, our Vincentians ensure that support reaches neighbors quickly and personally—bringing compassion, practical assistance, and a commitment to walk alongside families during difficult moments.

How the Vincentian Model Works

Local Vincentians

Parish-based members meet neighbors personally—often in their homes—listening carefully and understanding the full circumstances a family is facing. These encounters ensure that assistance begins with dignity and respect.

Statewide Programs

Centralized programs provide the resources needed to respond effectively, including food support, housing assistance, financial aid, and access to life-saving medications through our community pharmacy.

Personalized Solutions

Because Vincentians encounter neighbors directly, assistance can be tailored to each situation—connecting families to the specific combination of support that will make the greatest difference.

A COMPREHENSIVE NETWORK OF SUPPORT

St. Vincent de Paul Georgia responds across four essential areas of need.

Local volunteers intervene early—often preventing eviction, protecting a family's health, and helping neighbors regain stability before hardship deepens.

It's a model that works and is made possible through the generosity of donors, partners, and parish communities who ensure that Vincentians have the resources needed to respond when neighbors reach out for help.

Partnerships, innovation and shared commitment help us reach neighbors in every corner of the state with data-driven excellence.

In 2025, these partnerships strengthened our ability to respond—bringing new resources, national recognition, and expanded opportunities to serve more families across the state.



University of Notre Dame—Lab for Economic Opportunities (LEO)

St. Vincent de Paul Georgia was selected to participate in Notre Dame’s Lab for Economic Opportunities, a national initiative focused on identifying and scaling evidence-based solutions to poverty.

Through this partnership, our programs will be evaluated and strengthened—helping ensure that the support we provide leads to measurable, lasting stability for families.

Bezos Day One Fund

Day 1 Families Fund—Jeff Bezos and Lauren Sánchez Bezos

St. Vincent de Paul Georgia was selected as one of just 13 organizations nationwide to receive a \$5 million award through the Day 1 Families Fund.

This recognition—from national leaders in housing and homelessness—reflects the strength of our approach and allows us to expand services across Georgia with a clear goal: ensuring no child in our community goes without a home.



QuikTrip—Expanding Motel to Home

With the support of QuikTrip, the Motel to Home program helped move 251 families from extended-stay hotels into stable housing last year—providing a pathway from temporary shelter to long-term stability.

Corporate partners including Atlanta Gas Light, Gas South, Georgia Power, UPS, Kroger, and Publix play a critical role in this work—helping provide food, utility assistance, and volunteer support that strengthens communities across the state.



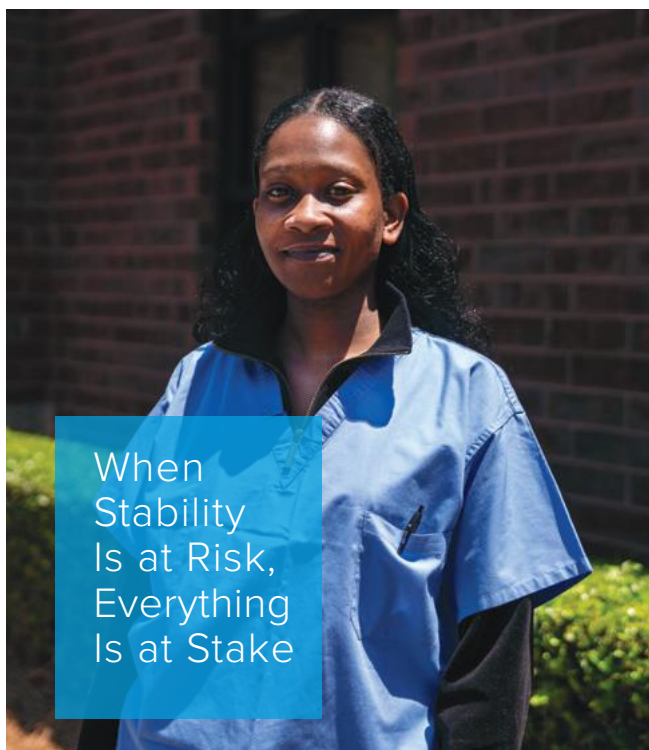
DeKalb County—Strengthening Local Response

In 2025, DeKalb County awarded St. Vincent de Paul Georgia a \$1.3 million grant to help keep neighbors in their homes and prevent housing instability.

This partnership reflects the power of local collaboration—connecting families to resources, strengthening community support systems, and responding to needs before they become crisis.

Together, these partnerships expand our reach, strengthen our response, and make it possible to serve neighbors earlier—when it matters most.

Across Georgia, families facing housing instability often need more than one type of support.

A missed payment, rising rent, or unexpected setback can quickly place a family at risk. When housing is at risk, the consequences ripple through every part of life—employment, health, education, and food insecurities. But when help comes early, the outcome can be very different. Through a combination of Vincentian outreach and targeted housing programs, St. Vincent de Paul Georgia provides housing stabilization services that help families remain safely housed and avoid homelessness.

PREVENTING EVICTION

For many families, stability can be preserved with timely support. Vincentians work with neighbors and landlords to resolve immediate housing challenges—helping families avoid eviction and remain safely in their homes.

OPENING THE DOOR TO PERMANENT HOUSING

“I could afford rent—but not the move-in costs.”

Even when families are ready for housing, upfront costs can keep stability out of reach. Through our targeted rehousing programs, families receive support with move-in expenses and connections to services that help them remain successfully housed. These programs create a pathway from crisis toward long-term stability. For some neighbors, the journey to stability requires additional time and support. St. Vincent de Paul Georgia continues to expand housing solutions that help families move step by step toward long-term independence.

SUPPORTING TRANSITION TO A BETTER LIVING ENVIRONMENT (STABLE)

Our STABLE Rapid Rehousing program provides a structured path forward. Piloted in Gwinnett County, this program helps families transition from temporary living situations—including vehicles or couch surfing—into safe and stable housing. Participants receive up to twelve months of housing support, case management and wraparound support designed to help them rebuild financial stability and remain successfully housed.

In its first phase, the program has already helped **10 families move toward stable housing.**

Marillac Moms— A New Beginning Took Shape

“It feels good to have a team that actually cares about you.”

When Jazz found her way to Marillac Moms, she was pregnant and caring for two young daughters with no place to call home. Borrowing rooms from friends and sleeping on couches, she was doing all she could to hold things together while preparing to welcome her baby boy. For Jazz, the path forward felt daunting.

Our Marillac Moms program, named for St. Louise de Marillac (1591-1660), was created as a rescue point for pregnant women experiencing homelessness. Providing the foundation to begin again, families are housed in a transitional apartment, complete with furnishings, baby supplies, food and stabilizing support. For Jazz, volunteers at Holy Spirit Catholic Church prepared her apartment, donated essential supplies and built a plan. Together, they formed a team to offer budget and life coaching, mentoring and a circle of friendship, rallying around Jazz during a critical season of transition.

Marillac Moms was launched in 2025 to meet moments just like this—providing transitional housing, essential needs and wrap-around support for pregnant mothers and children facing instability.

Three families were moved from homelessness to transitional housing in the first year of the program. Two have welcomed their babies in a safe, stable environment. Nearly 300 more women have applied for help and have been directed to life-affirming resources.

Thanks to our dedicated volunteers and donors at parishes including Holy Spirit, Transfiguration, Mary Our Queen and St. Brigid, the program is growing with more apartment openings anticipated in the coming year.

Building Pathways to Stability

When immediate needs are met, the journey doesn't end.

For families in crisis, the first step is often the hardest. It takes a plan and partnership to move from crisis to stability—restoring confidence, independence and dignity.

Through coaching, education and ongoing support, we walk alongside neighbors as they take steps toward

stability—increasing income, starting a savings account, learning how to manage money, set goals and persevere through challenges. We open the doors, and our neighbors do the work to move beyond crisis and realize their potential.



Growing Income and Opportunity

Income Advancement Program (IAP)

The Income Advancement Program helps neighbors increase their earning potential through career guidance, skill development, and individualized support as they pursue stronger employment opportunities.

Strengthening Financial Stability

Money Matters Classes

Financial education classes, conducted in partnership with Beal Bank, help participants build practical skills for budgeting, saving, and managing expenses.

Community Banking Access

In partnership with PNC Bank, the PNC Mobile Banking Unit visits our center weekly to provide neighbors with accessible banking services, financial guidance, and resources that support long-term financial wellness.

Building Life Skills and Confidence

Life Skills Coaching and Peer Support

Weekly life skills classes and peer support groups help participants create a life map, set meaningful goals, and develop the tools needed to navigate both daily responsibilities and long-term plans.

Housing and Savings Program (HANDS)

The HANDS program encourages saving, builds financial confidence, and helps participants establish stronger credit and financial foundations.

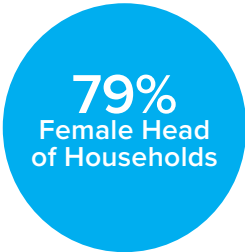

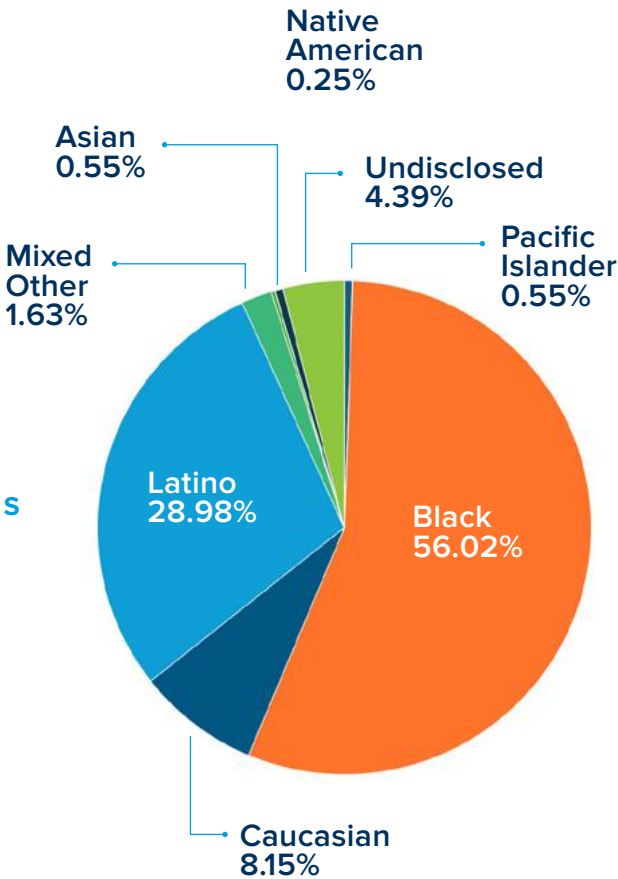

Being a Vincentian isn't simply volunteering.

Vincentians are called to serve, beyond the work of a typical volunteer. They walk alongside people overwhelmed with uncertainty and crisis. In parishes across Georgia, Vincentians meet neighbors where they are—often in their homes—listening, understanding, and responding with care.

This work is not transactional. It is personal, relational, and rooted in dignity. Help often begins with a simple conversation at a kitchen table. But in those moments, something deeper happens — neighbors are heard, burdens are shared, and hope begins to take shape. Serving beyond financial assistance and essential needs, they build relationships, reminding neighbors they are not alone and that their circumstances do not define their future.

The life you change could be your own.

A Movement of Neighbors Serving Neighbors

Vincentians serve at the local level. Working through parish- based chapters, they know the needs of their neighborhoods and find creative solutions to difficult challenges.

Vincentians build partnerships with like-minded organizations to amplify the work for neighbors in need of stabilizing resources, housing solutions, and essential needs.

RESPONDING TOGETHER IN DOUGLAS COUNTY

When Hurricane Helene impacted families in Douglas County in 2024, Vincentians stepped forward to help neighbors rebuild. Throughout 2025, that work continued as volunteers returned to assemble furniture, arrange kitchens and help families establish a new place to call home.

It is a reminder that the Vincentian mission is not just immediate response, but ongoing presence—walking alongside neighbors through each step of recovery.

FAITHFUL TO THE MOMENT—FAITHFUL TO THE MISSION

Vincentians are responding to the moment by meeting neighbors where they are and helping families move from crisis toward stability.

Responding to Immediate Need

As needs increased across our communities, St. Vincent de Paul Georgia expanded several areas of support:

Expanded Food Access

More than 40 parish food pantries increased distribution to meet rising demand.

No-Cost Community Pharmacy

Maintenance medications provided at no cost helped neighbors manage chronic conditions and avoid deeper financial hardship. The pharmacy saw an 18% increase in 2025.

Housing Stability Support

Emergency assistance helped families prevent eviction and remain safely housed during periods of financial uncertainty. These efforts ensured that neighbors experiencing sudden hardship could receive timely support and regain stability.

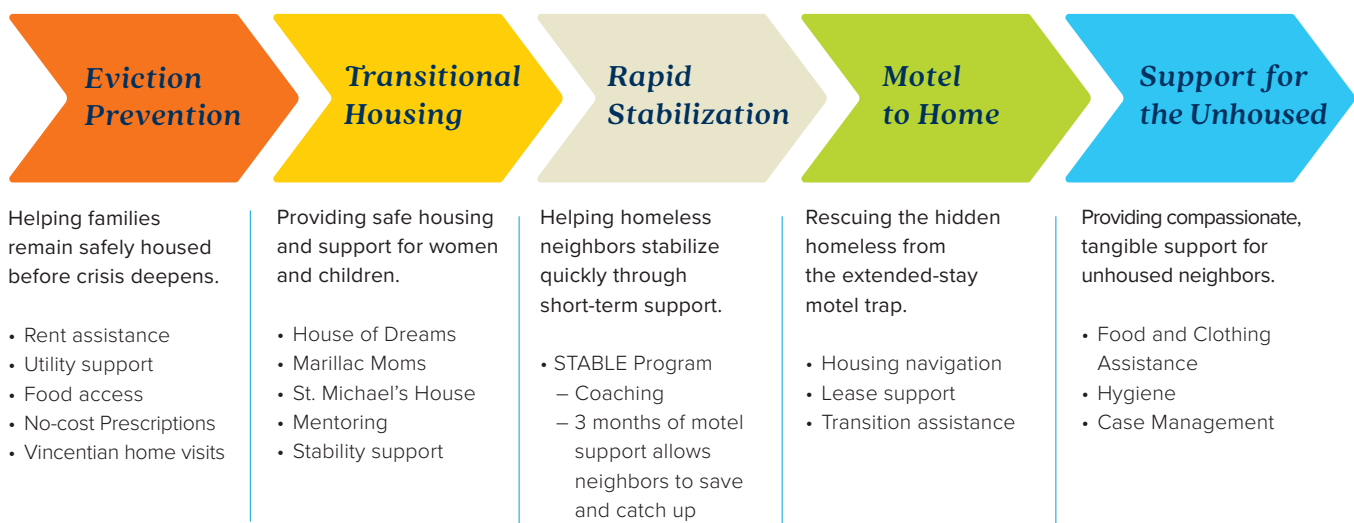
