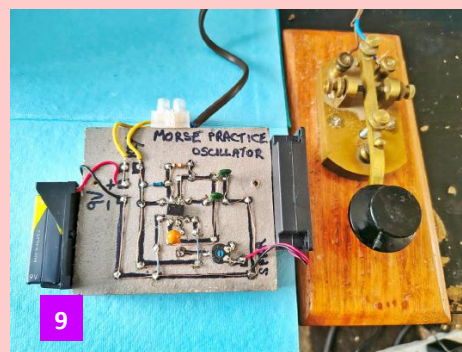

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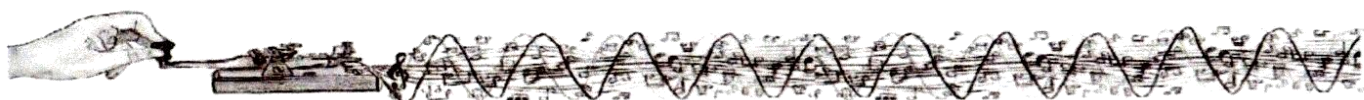

Freedom of association: a right in danger in amateur radio

Some IARU RI member societies have threatened their members with expulsion if they join EURAO, clearly violating freedom of association, a fundamental right enshrined in article 12 of the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights.



The "argument" put forward by these societies is that EURAO is a competitor, overlooking the fact that IARU and EURAO are also collaborators in areas of common interest, such as CEPT. And if they don't remember that, they should see the [joint statement resulting from the 2017 meeting](#) between both organizations.

For this reason, EURAO does not rule out taking appropriate legal action if the case arises, beyond the crude and stupid threat.

We know that it seems incredible that this mentality is still in force today, but it is and we will do everything possible to unmask and combat it. Some would need to brush up on their **HAM SPIRIT**...

EURAO Public Liability Insurance

The purpose of this insurance, with a coverage of 9.000.000 EUR, is to guarantee the pecuniary consequences of the civil liability incumbent on the insured due to consequential bodily, material and immaterial damage caused to third parties as a result of their radio amateur activities, including travel, and events organized by the subscriber, including assembly and disassembly operations.

This means, translated to our activity, a plus of relief when we do radio outside our QTH, either on the beach, in the countryside, in a park or in the mountains, as in the case of field days or SOTA.

EURAO also provides coverage in an urban environment, such as in a square, in a schoolyard or inside a classroom in a workshop with students, or with scouts in their venue or campground.

In addition to covering contingencies, this insurance is useful to obtain authorization to carry out activities in the public space, which is mandatory in some countries.

WWFF, World Wide Flora and Fauna in Amateur Radio, is encouraging licensed ham radio operators to leave their shacks and go outside operating portable in Protected Flora & Fauna areas (PFF) all over the world.

Irish Net

Active not only on Sundays, but most weekdays starting at around **16:00 UTC**, the **informal gathering on 14.156 MHz** frequently suffers from QRM during contests and DXers unaware of this long standing net of North American operators with an Irish connection. In a recent contact on 20m with W1HDP, QTH Tucson Arizona, operator Jerry confirmed that the net now also uses the **17m band operating on 18.112 MHz** moving up in increments of 3KHz. This move avoids the increased QRM on 20m and taking advantage of improved propagation conditions.

World Space Week is an international celebration of science and technology, and their contribution to the betterment of the human condition.

The United Nations General Assembly declared in 1999 that World Space Week will be held each year from October 4-10.

These dates commemorate two events:

October 4, 1957: Launch of the first human-made Earth satellite, Sputnik 1, thus opening the way for space exploration

October 10, 1967: The signing of the Treaty on Principles Governing the Activities of States in the Exploration and Peaceful Uses of Outer Space, including the Moon and Other Celestial Bodies.

World Space Week consists of space education and outreach events held by space agencies, aerospace companies, schools, planetaria, museums, and astronomy clubs around the world in a common timeframe. These synchronized space events attract greater public and media attention.

This year's theme is Rocket Revolution which focuses on the rapid transformation of Space Launch.

Have you thought how you or your club could get involved?

Perhaps you could organise a special event station for the occasion. This could incorporate **QO-100 operation** and also **operation of Low Orbit Satellites**. A display of the satellite tracking program would be impressive. Maybe organise a Space themed club night.

For those into island chasing or portable operating, **GMFF** has put together a new program called the Islands of the Republic of Ireland Award (IRIA). It looks like a solid excuse to get out with the portable gear this summer or to hunt for some new references from the home shack. The program is split into two sides: **Activators:** You need to operate strictly from the land on the island (maritime mobile doesn't count) and log at least 50 QSOs for it to be a valid activation.

Chasers: You just need confirmed contacts with the stations that are out activating the islands. The certificates are awarded in increments of 10, running from 10 all the way up to 100 different islands. 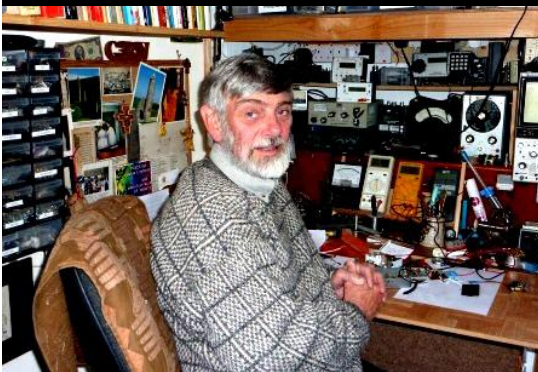

Tidal DXing

TIDAL DXING - This is taking advantage of using surrounding rising waters of High Tides that is well close to your Mobile or Portable spot by the sea. Basic rules the tide must be at least 5m at its peak and higher still the better and must be close to it and then you can run a counter poise wire into the water. The water must be sea water. Fresh water would not yield the same affect.

I have had a fair amount of experience of Tidal DXing but it started for me back in 1983. It was FM CB time, and my friend went down to Frinton on Sea, located on the Sea wall at a high tide of about 5.5M. He was on his crunch box, a Honda C90 M/C, using a DV27 and FM CB radio and he found out about tidal DXing for the first time.

The following High tide was a couple weeks away. BUT was 7m+ and went with him to same location. With myself on a Crunch box but running a DX 27 Fire stick and a FM CB and an Astatic tear drop mic running only 4 watts. The tide was so high it was coming up through the drain points of the sea wall, and we stood in water for a short time. Mainly noted was the hour before the peak of tide to the hour past peak of tide was the peak of what you could work let alone hear was bloody amazing. We were reaching up and down the coast towards south end South coast of Kent and into Yorkshire coast station. NOTE it was mainly Coastal stations we were talking too as well into Holland across the North Sea. But at one hour past the peak of high tide it switched off and went back to working. Local stations around Essex and Suffolk received me.

We had a visit from a local radio ham wondering what we were up too. Best laugh we knew of another good high tide to come in next couple of days, and he joined us with a tripod and a VHF 2m stick. At end of secession of that two-hour window, he even was even amazed how it switched on and off at said times and even he was reaching places not normally reached both SSB and FM modes on 144mhz due to the high tide.

But many years later, when I was on 11m SSB I found a good point at near Adlebrugh at the tower on the sea wall. Then using a President Lincoln 40w and a Antron 99 on top of a 20ft telescopic pole and a 3 element Yagi beam. We had a very high tide that morning and even the excess road that ducked down behind the tower was under water, tech I was cut off only way out of there was back along main sea wall on foot. Had to await a good hour

before tide dropped low enough to escape. I was nigh on an island with only a causeway out of the place.

I was reaching stupid places around world mainly east wards note and a German station came on telling me I had a NZ station calling me. Could not hear him on the beam, but was loud on the vertical, also a QSO took place talking to him on the horizontal beam - he could not hear me on the vertical, and I received him on the Vertical but could not hear him on the horizontal beam - seemed very strange. One again an hour after the tide and peaked the skip was gone.

Now I did visit a guy in Brightlingsea in a mobile that parked on the causeway next to water with simple 5/8wave whip using SSB on 11m and ran a 6mm wire into the tidal rising waters and in awe of what he was working with 100w of his vertical.

But after doing this a few times of Tidal DXing, I did an experiment. I had two friends follow me about band. One was 5 miles inland and the other was 14 miles in land from my coastal location. Tide came up made many contacts, station No1 at 5 miles in land could only hear let alone only work HALF of what I was doing and the other station further in land could only hear a half of what he could hear. They also noted the 1 hour rule prior and after the peak of tides.

Yet in recent years I had a Motor cycle Portable on my FJ1200 M/C and went down to the estuary of the Tamar River on where tide was coming in and almost covering the Quay I was sitting on. Running a FT450 10w and a 1/4w vertical for 40m with 3 counter poise wires dropped into the incoming tidal waters. The take-off was at a very low point next to Tamar bridge with a bloody great hill behind

me. Again, 1 hour prior and after the tide peak, I cracked out on 40m and 20m bands in SSB. Well surprised on where I was reaching and reports I was getting as well. The river was about a good mile or too from the sea as well.

Give it ago but do remember don't place yourself in danger and the tide must be higher than 5m tide. Perhaps try what couple guys did couple years ago - reach an island off Essex coast via kayaks and park up on island knowing the tide would nearly cover it and even they were amazed at that 2 hour window.

Now you know why Marine mobiles put out such a good signal cause there surrounded by a dirty great sea plane of salt water.



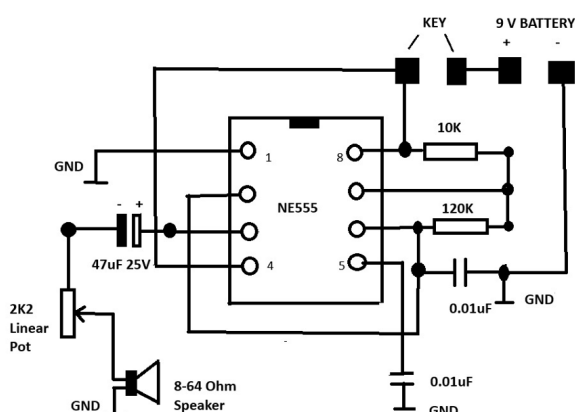

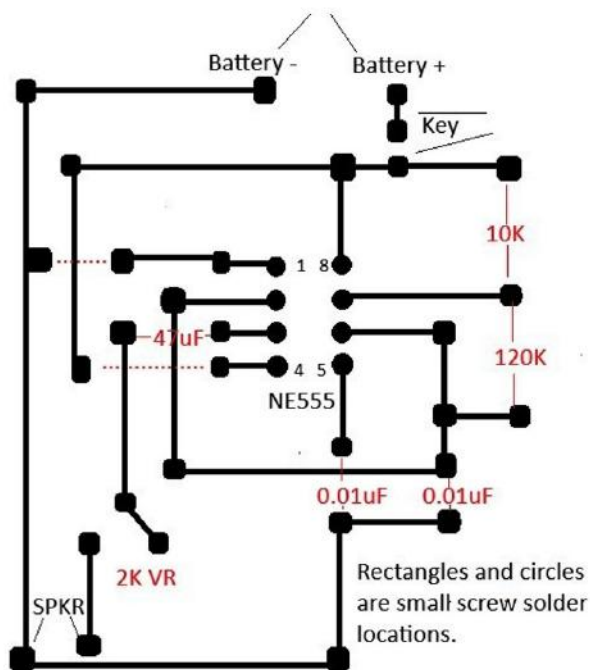
A Simple Homebrew Morse Practice Oscillator

Relatively recently, ComReg dispensed with the requirement of having to use a straight key for the 5 wpm morse code test in Ireland. While most modern rigs have built-in memory keyers, it's nice to use the traditional brass-pounder from time to time to retain this manual skill.

This home-brew project describes the construction of an inexpensive, simple morse practice oscillator. It's based on the ubiquitous NE555 eight-pin timer chip, which has been around for over fifty years now. Aside from the chip itself, the circuit uses just three resistors, three capacitors, a loudspeaker and a 9v battery box. Using the components specified, in the schematic diagram, results in a reasonably pleasant 50% duty cycle square-wave tone of around 600Hz.



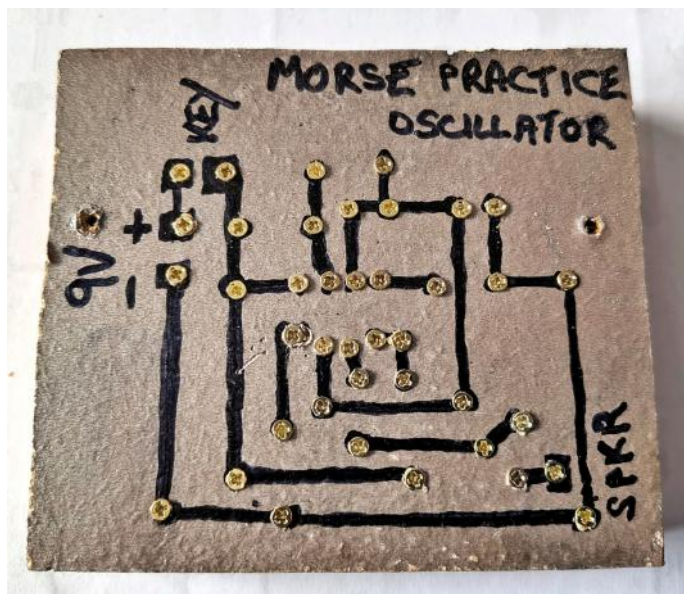
Schematic Diagram of Morse Practice Oscillator

Component Layout Plan

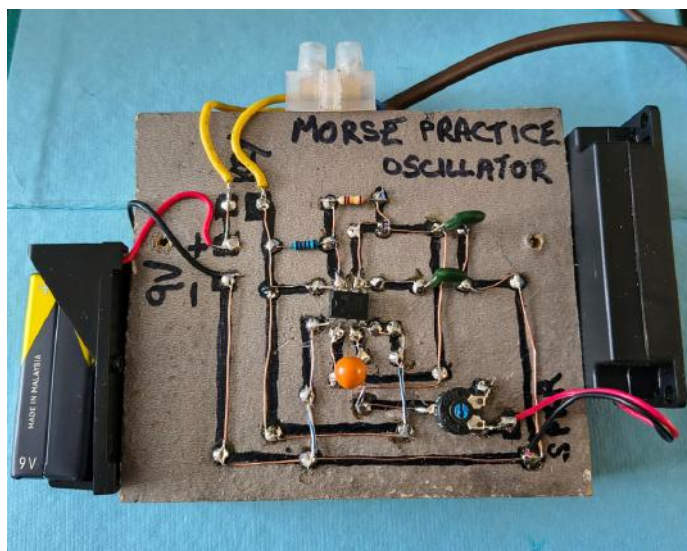
To keep things simple, I used a small off-cut of wood as a base for the project, with sub-miniature brass screws (from Amazon) as solder terminals for the components and the point to point wiring. My first task was to sketch a layout plan by referring to the schematic diagram. I tried to avoid wire straps, but I found this unavoidable at two locations (Pins 1 & 4).

I then used a permanent black marker to transfer the layout design onto the wooden base. The miniature wood screws were then inserted at the appropriate locations, flush with the surface. Tinning the screw-heads with solder in advance, made it easy to connect the components and the wiring.

Placing the small screws for the pins of the NE555 chip was perhaps the only slightly difficult part. I had to take great care to ensure that there were no short circuits between adjacent screw heads. Carefully splaying the NE555 pins slightly apart gave a little more leeway. Once this was done, I double checked with my multimeter, when the chip was soldered in place.

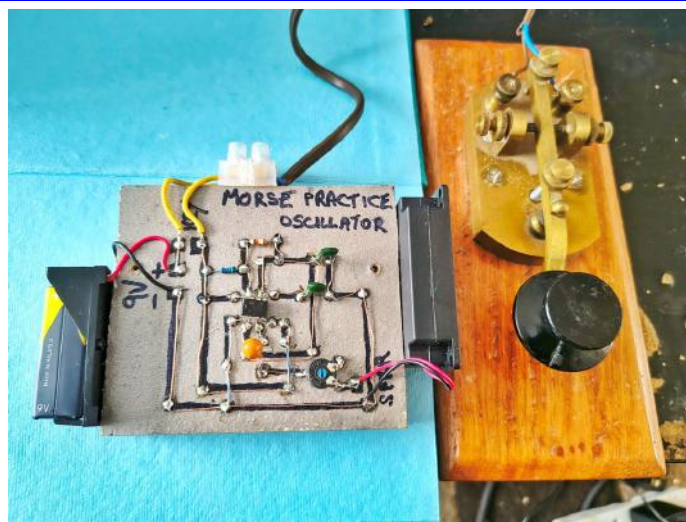

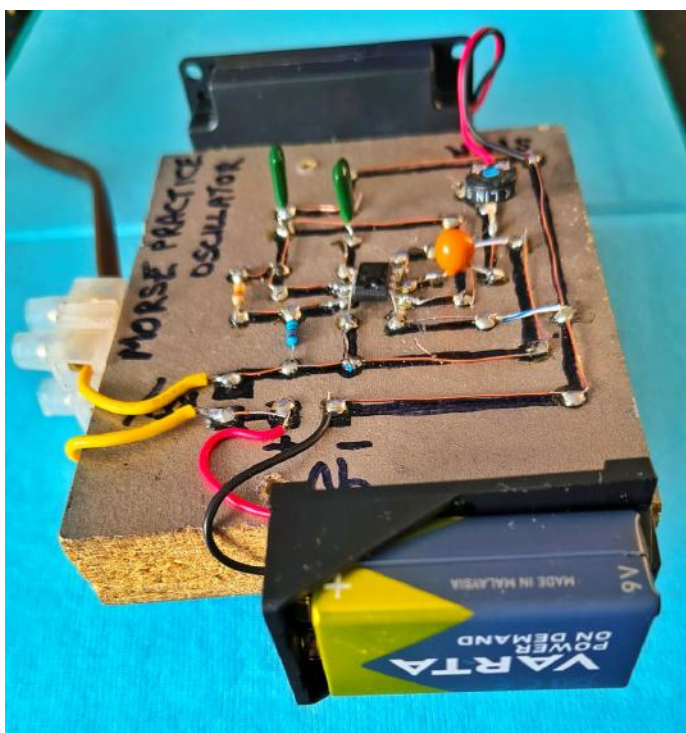

The output tone is a square wave, and I was considering adding an audio filter to round off the sharp edges. However, once the volume level was reduced, the tone sounded quite acceptable. Replacing the 120K resistor with one of a lower value results in an increase in the output frequency and of course vice versa. This can be experimented with, if the operator prefers a different tone.

I used this method of construction for simplicity, clarity, and ease of replication. I am quite pleased and satisfied with the appearance and performance of the oscillator.

Chasing Contacts in the Wild

My journey into amateur radio began in 2022, when I earned my VU3 restricted-grade licence. A year later, in 2023, I upgraded to a VU2 General grade licence — and that upgrade changed everything about how I practiced the hobby. With HF privileges finally in hand, I stopped thinking of radio as something confined to a shack and started thinking of it as something to carry into the field. Since then, forests, national parks, and wildlife sanctuaries across India have become my regular operating desk.

Why Out Doors

There is a particular kind of satisfaction in pulling a radio, a battery, and a length of wire out of a backpack in the middle of a forest and turning it into a working HF station within minutes. Parks on the Air (POTA) gave that instinct a structure and a purpose. For anyone who hasn't come across it, POTA is a global activity that encourages hams to operate from designated parks, forests, and protected areas — you can browse parks, log activations, and track your progress at <https://pota.app/>

Every activation is a small expedition: scout a legal, accessible spot inside a park boundary, set up an antenna between two trees or on a mast, get ten contacts in the log to qualify the activation, and pack out exactly as you came in. It combines the technical discipline of station-building with the simple pleasure of being outdoors, and it has taken me to places I would never have visited just to go hiking.

The Log So Far

As of this writing, my POTA account (callsign VU2UCR) shows 46 activations, starting in March 2024 and continuing right up to this month. The spread of locations tells its own story about the hobby's reach. My earliest activations were in Karnataka's forest belt — Biligiri Ranganatha Swamy Temple (BRT) Wildlife Reserve, Mahadeshwara Wildlife Sanctuary, and Cauvery Wildlife Sanctuary — all activated within a few days of each other in March 2024. Later that year I travelled further afield to Tamil Nadu's Mudumalai National Park, and then to central India for a run of activations at Satpura and Pench National Parks in Madhya Pradesh, the latter producing one of my best single-day contact counts.

Bandipur National Park, close to home in Karnataka, has become something of a regular haunt — I have returned to it again and again, refining my setup with each visit and using it to test new gear before taking it further afield. From there, the log expands outward: Wayanad Wildlife Sanctuary in Kerala, Manali Wildlife Sanctuary in Himachal Pradesh, and most recently a pair of high-altitude activations in Ladakh — Changthang Cold Desert Wildlife Sanctuary and the Karakoram (Nubra Shyok) Wildlife Sanctuary, the latter set up on a river bed at roughly 14,500 feet above mean sea level. Operating HF at that altitude, in thin air and unpredictable weather, is a completely different discipline from a quiet forest afternoon in Karnataka, and it has taught me as much about equipment reliability as it has about propagation.

Every one of these activations has been logged in Phone (SSB) mode, and single sessions have ranged from a lean ten contacts — just enough to qualify — up to nearly thirty in a good opening.

Along the way I have also picked up several POTA recognition awards for activating during the unsociable hours — early mornings before sunrise and late nights — when propagation is often at its most interesting and the parks are at their quietest.

Gear That Travels Well

My station has evolved along with my ambitions. I started with the Yaesu FT-891, which remains one of my favourites for field work: a full 100-watt HF radio in a compact, rugged chassis that survives being strapped to a backpack and set up on a rock or a tailgate. As I began carrying more gear and experimenting with different setups, I added the Yaesu FT-710 and the FTX-1 Optima to the rotation, both of which offer a nice balance of performance and portability for park-to-park operating.

For the days I want to go lighter and lean into QRP operating, I carry the Icom IC-705, the FTX-1 in low-power mode, and a DL2MAN QRP transceiver — each of these turns an activation into a genuine challenge, coaxing contacts out of just a few watts. Power comes from lithium-ion battery packs ranging from 20 Ah to 50 Ah, sized to the length and demands of the trip.

What Keeps Me Coming Back

Every activation is a small exercise in problem-solving: read the terrain, find a legal and practical operating spot, get an antenna into the air with whatever trees, rocks, or mast sections are available, and make the radio work reliably on battery power for the duration of the session. No two parks present the same set of constraints, and that variety is what keeps the hobby interesting activation after activation.

There is also something valuable about carrying a radio into wildlife sanctuaries and national parks — spaces that exist specifically because they are wild and undeveloped. Every activation is a reminder to operate lightly: no permanent structures, no disturbance to habitat, and full respect for park regulations. It has made me a more careful and considerate operator, both technically and environmentally. Operating from inside these reserves also means the wildlife occasionally shows up to supervise — elephants and wild boar wandering past the antenna at Masinagudi, on the edge of Mudumalai National Park, have both made memorable appearances mid-activation.

Looking Ahead

With 46 activations logged in a little over two years, I have no plans to slow down. There are entire states and

would encourage you to give it a shot. You don't need a big station or an elaborate antenna farm — a compact HF radio, a lightweight antenna, and a battery pack are enough to get started. Listen for VU2UCR calling CQ POTA from a park near you — I would love to work you from the field. I also film and post most of my activations on my YouTube channel, harisiramaiah, if you'd like to see the setups, the terrain, and the contacts in action.

Bridging Barriers: The Power of the Disability Net



In the vibrant world of amateur radio, the airwaves act as a great equaliser. Yet, for many operators facing physical or sensory challenges, the hobby can sometimes present unique, frustrating barriers. Providing a vital lifeline and a warm community, the weekly Disability Net has become a beacon for hams seeking connection, support, and practical solutions.

Hosted by Kelvin, MOAID, from his shack in Taunton, Somerset, this net is a testament to the inclusive spirit of our hobby. Kelvin serves as the net controller, guiding the discussion and ensuring that every voice is heard - even if, occasionally, we have to pause while someone retrieves a dropped microphone or untangles a lead that seems to have a mind of its own.

an international incident. If propagation is poor, the net shifts to the 80-meter band, operating in or around 3.743 MHz

Additionally, for those available during the week, a smaller, shorter version of the net meets on Wednesday afternoons at 14:00 on 40metres, frequency 7.103 MHz.

The purpose of the net is simple but profound: to provide a space for anyone living with a disability to connect. Whether you are visually impaired, managing issues with limb mobility, or navigating any other health-related challenge, you will find a welcoming group ready to listen

Each week, the net sees a robust turnout, often drawing 20 to 30 operators from across the UK &

Ireland. These gatherings are much more than a routine check-in; they are collaborative problem-solving sessions. Participants share advice on adaptive equipment, ergonomic shack setups, or creative workarounds—like the time we figured out how to operate a rotator with a foot switch because someone had their hands full with a well-earned cup of tea. If a station is struggling with a unique challenge, they can count on the collective wisdom of the group to help troubleshoot.

It is important to note that you do not need to have a disability to participate. We are always happy to welcome able-bodied operators who check in. These hams often provide fresh, technical perspectives, helping us see issues from a new angle—and usually, they bring a bit of extra signal strength to the party!

By coming together, sharing knowledge, and helping one another navigate the technical and physical hurdles of the hobby, this group proves that amateur radio is, and should always be, for everyone. If you find yourself on the air this Friday evening, take a moment to look for the net—you might just find the community, and the answer you've been looking for.

IRTS Hamfest 2026

Following last year's IRTS hamfest debut, this year the Hamfest returned to Mullingar over the weekend of the 8th and 9th of August in a much larger crowd than last year's.

RCU Radio Control Unit Part 5

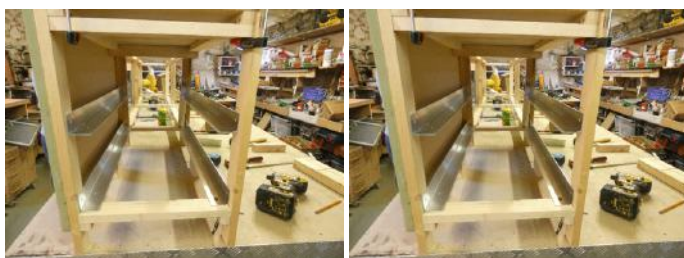
At this stage with the RCU myself, EI3HQB, and Sue, EI1826, have been busy building the furniture for inside the unit, so space is a premium so a lot of planning had gone into the design and a big consideration it that was it had to have an option for someone who may want to sleep in the unit.

This was integrated into the seating area its known as slatting here and as you can see every other strip of timber interlocks allowing one section to extend.

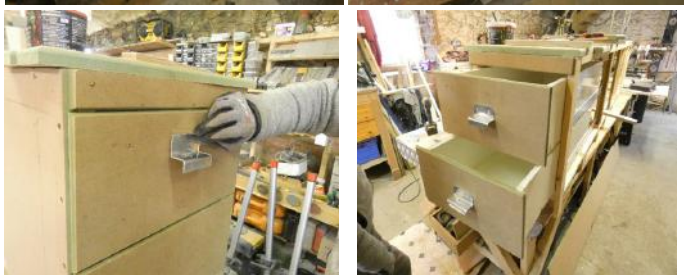


The Cushions used in the seating would drop when it was extended and you then had a comfortable bed to sleep on.

Incorporated in the same frame work would be under seating storage and at the door end two storage drawers for cups tea/sugar and cooking and cleaning items.



Even the handle grips were made from some offcuts of stepped angle aluminium we had left over with the corners rounded off they worked out a treat.



Under the desk again was going to be an area again where no space could be wasted so the upper section of the unit made for here would be the total length of the RCU and aprox 200mm square this would allow an area for storage of verticle antensns and our flag poles etc.



On a theme of keeping things simple we chose not to hinge the doors in the storage area as we said they may get damaged over time so we decided to fit the panel door into groves with simple toggle catch to keep them secure while not in use.



Both units are left short of the forward bulk head as on one side this would become the new home for the spare wheel and on the other we had two military portable mast kits that went perfect in this slot.

Three cupboards again for storage of drive on tents and gazebo pegs and also a full tool kit if needed.

The main feature of this unit would be a cooking area, this was needed again to make the unit totally independent if used on it's own so if someone was using it and wanted to catch the gry line they had the use of a cooking area for both coffee and cooking an egg or two.



At this stage and gallons of paint later the unit was now looking like a new unit, all the underside had been stripped and resealed with stone chip all cables for b r a k e s replaced and each axle fitted with new bearings and brakes it had been indeed a long journey to

get to here some weeks working for seven days at a time but when you look at the pictures you can see it was worth while and it was only to get better.



He was like Frankenstein trying to bring his monster to life a cable at a time both internally and externally.



Then the time came and Wayne hit the switch and it was like a firework display all the hard work from the members was coming to fruit we were blown away and could not stop stating into our very own mobile shack and one we had rescued from the scrap merchants



We were now at a stage where we could start to fit out the unit and maybe see some light at the end of the tunnel and get it used for what we had worked for.

And so we started final fix on all the components of the project and hopefully we had not forgot and bit at this stage.

Then you see the bench fitted and all the front panels each with its own power pole connectors / voltage meters USB connectors ready for Wayne to bring to life.



Wayne went about connecting no amount of wiring in the unit it as I said was like flood water emerging out of the control box, we left him to it as we were more of a hinderance to him asking whats that for and this one where dose that go.



Even down to the cooking area a simple application but it would prove to be a valuable asset when we hit the road.

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Why Learn Morse Code?

Signalling via electrical telegraphy dates back the 1820's and refined by Samuel Morse and Alfred Vail in the 1830's before Friedrich Gerke, together with the advent being able to transmit audible tones, developed the forerunner to the International Morse Code which we use today.

International Morse code itself was developed in 1865 and is (bar the numbers) very close to Gerke's Continental Code.

The development of Morse Code was through necessity and, 160 years or so ago through to the 1920's, the reason for learning Morse Code as an amateur radio operator was simple; it was the only way to

communicate with fellow hams.

As a side note, Morse Code sent over the air via radio transmissions is more commonly known so CW and this is what I will refer to it as from now on as that is what we will be talking about.



After all, voice comms and digital modes are quick, easy and effective so why, 160+ years on from its invention, should you put time and effort into learning CW?

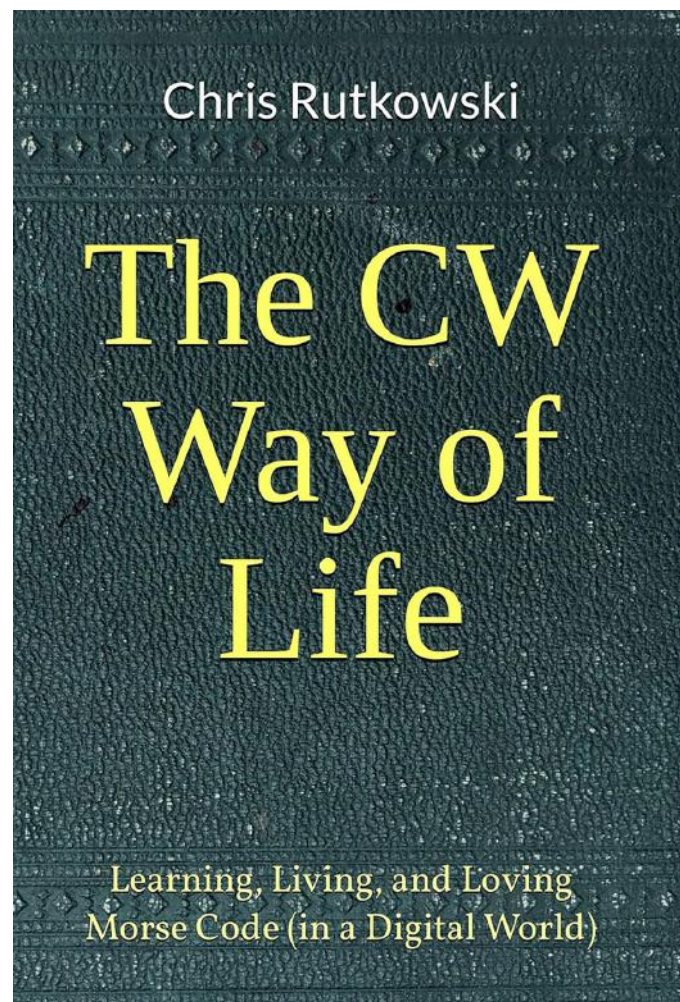
1) **It's fun.** Communicating with someone via CW is like nothing else you'll experience as a ham. Once you are proficient, receiving dits and dahs but hearing words in your head is just plain fun. Having a rag chew with another station, talking about all sorts using nothing but a very specific combination of staccato tones has to be experienced to understand just how awesome CW is as a means of communication. Chris Rutkowski in his rather excellent book, *The CW Way of Life*, describes it as a form of telepathy; planting ideas in the other operators head using nothing more than a monotone set of bleeps. As a seasoned CW operator I think this is an excellent description of CW and, having a full blown rag chew QSO with another operator in CW is just plain fun.



Following the advent of SSB voice comms in the 1920's at least until the late 1970's, CW was still most common way of communication by hams. However, as solid state technology matured, SSB and then digital modes became more prevalent.

Even as late as 2002 there was still a compelling reason to learn CW, it was a requirement of International Telecommunication Union's (ITU) licensing requirements so if you wanted to be a ham radio operator, particularly on the HF bands, you had to learn it!

These days though, the ITU have dropped the code requirement and the vast majority of licensing bodies around the world have followed suit, SSB and data modes are accessible by all and as a consequence there was a feeling amongst many hams that CW would slowly fade into obscurity and become part of amateur radio's past.



Why Learn Morse Code?

2/ The CW community. Hams are generally a friendly bunch who already have something in common and we will all have friends who we have met on-air or otherwise through being a ham that we would not have met otherwise. The CW community is a concentrated version of that ham community. The vast majority of CW operators want newcomers to succeed and will welcome them into our strange world of dits and dahs, help them learn and slowly draw them into the fold. I have made life-long friends via CW who I have never met in person yet who I know as well as any of my 'real life' friends and have not felt more a part of a community than I have as a CW operator.



3/ It's efficient. Like some digital modes, CW is an excellent low power mode. It is perfectly possible to work the world on 5W or less. It is also entirely possible to copy very weak signals, those buried below the noise floor and is therefore great for chasing DX. Because of this, it is also a fantastic mode for those who like to work /p with more and more POTA and SOTA operators discovering just how handy it is to be able to work in CW. CW rigs can be very small, very light and very power efficient. I have had many successes activating POTA spots using just a couple of watts and working hunters from North America with ease. I have also had a great time working from holiday spots around Europe; nothing quite beats sitting on a beach at sunset whilst enjoying a spot of CW!



4/ It's a challenge. One of the core tenets of ham radio is self-learning and progression in the hobby and there are few better ways of achieving this than setting yourself the goal of learning CW. It doesn't require any technical

skills, there is a high chance that you already own most of the equipment needed so the entry cost is minimal and there is a real sense of achievement throughout your entire journey as a CW operator from learning those first characters, managing to send coherent code via a practice oscillator through to the sheer joy and satisfaction of having your first QSOs. The sense of achievement doesn't diminish as you progress either. Your first proper ragchew, your first hour long QSO, the first time someone replies to your CQ call, becoming an Elmer to a newcomer; the progression and pleasure never ends.

5/ Have I mentioned it's just plain fun?

So if you have been thinking about learning CW but weren't quite sure what you'd get from it hopefully this article has helped persuade you to go for it!

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IARU Region 1 Roy Stevens G2BVN Memorial Trophy



The trophy is awarded by IARU Region 1 to any radio amateur worldwide that has best exemplified the work and dedication of Roy Stevens G2BVN in international amateur radio. Decisions on nominations submitted by member societies are made by an independent panel. It was first awarded in 1987.

At the final plenary meeting of the IARU Region 1 General Conference in Zlatibor, Serbia, which closed 5th November 2023, **Séamus McCague EI8BP** was announced as recipient of the Roy Stevens G2BVN Memorial Trophy. Proposed by the Italian National Society ARI the independent panel of five IARU Member Societies chaired by OV Vice President Manfred Mauler OE7AAI unanimously supported the proposal of ARI.

Séamus, licensed in 1967, was out-going Chair of the Public Relations Committee (PRC) of IARU Region 1 a role he held for two terms. He personally represented IARU

as a member of the European Commission's EMC Working Party and the Expert Group on Radio Equipment. Séamus was involved in the IRTS for many years at committee level and as editor of both its journal and monthly electronic publication. He was IRTS President from 2012 to 2015 and is currently an Honourary Member of IRTS

He is Ireland mentor for ARIS-EU, the programme that organises amateur radio contacts with the International Space Station.

At the 27th IARU Region 1 General Conference in Vienna in September 2026 which he attended as part of the IRTS Delegation, he was formally presented with a specially-commissioned plaque by IARU R1 President Sylvain F4GKR.

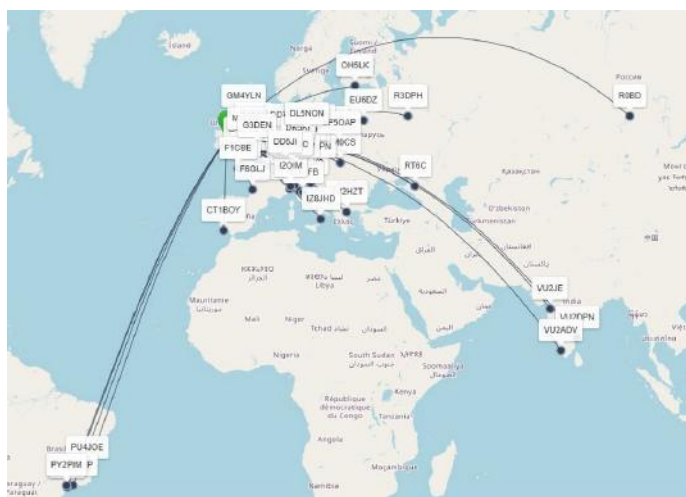
headphones for most of the contacts as the noise from steam engines blowing whistles etc made hearing through speakers nearly impossible

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MeshCore – An Independent Radio Network for the Future

How the CB Funkfreunde Hassberge are building a decentralised LoRa communication network

Rethinking radio communication

For many radio enthusiasts and CB radio operators, radio communication has always represented one fundamental idea: the ability to communicate independently. No mobile phone mast, internet connection or central service provider is required when two radio stations can communicate directly with one another.

It is precisely this principle that has led us, the CB Funkfreunde Hassberge, to become deeply involved with MeshCore.

We are actively supporting the development of MeshCore entirely at our own expense because we firmly believe that independent communication will become increasingly important in the years ahead.

Our long-term objective is straightforward: wherever technically, legally and organisationally possible, we want to establish MeshCore repeaters at suitable locations and gradually build a reliable, independent radio network covering the Hassberge region and extending well beyond it.

The first nodes in our network

One of our key locations is Pirate Hill, the well-known radio hill of the CB Funkfreunde Hassberge. A MeshCore repeater is already operating there and represents one of the first important building blocks of our planned regional network.

Another repeater is located at the QTH of CB Prepper14 and carries the name CB Funkfreunde HAS.

There is also a repeater in the Fichtelgebirge, operating under the name CB Prepper14 Gefrees.

To us, these locations are much more than individual technical installations. They represent the beginning of an infrastructure that can become increasingly capable and useful with every additional suitable site.

We are currently in contact with several organisations and potential site providers. There is a possibility that two further elevated mountain locations may be added to the network. The repeaters intended for these sites are already available.

For a LoRa-based radio network, such locations are particularly valuable. Every additional repeater at an elevated site has the potential to extend the geographical coverage significantly and connect areas that would otherwise be outside the range of a single station.

So, what exactly is MeshCore?

MeshCore is an open, decentralised communication system based on LoRa radio technology. Supported LoRa hardware can perform different functions, including acting as a companion device for messaging, a repeater or a room server.

One of its most attractive characteristics is the

ability to establish communications without relying on conventional internet infrastructure.

A MeshCore network consists of a number of radio nodes. Depending on the firmware and configuration, these nodes can originate, receive and forward messages, or provide additional services.

A repeater has a particularly important role: it extends the range of the network by forwarding suitable MeshCore packets. It is important to distinguish this from a conventional radio relay. A MeshCore repeater does not simply retransmit every packet it receives. Packet forwarding follows the rules of the MeshCore protocol.

As a result, the range of communication does not depend solely on how far two individual radio stations can communicate directly with one another.

LoRa – low power, long range

The technical foundation is LoRa, a radio technology designed for robust data communication over long distances while maintaining relatively low power consumption.

This is particularly interesting for a project such as ours. Compared with many conventional communication systems, a MeshCore node can operate with relatively modest energy requirements. This makes it possible to consider autonomous repeater installations at locations where no permanent mains electricity is available.

This opens up some fascinating possibilities.

A solar panel, battery and suitable LoRa node can form the basis of an autonomous repeater installation. For remote mountain locations, this characteristic is particularly valuable.

A site does not necessarily need a mains power supply or network connection. Instead, the key requirements are a suitable radio location, reliable energy provision and a technically sound installation.

Location is everything

Anyone with an interest in radio will know that height matters.

A repeater located in a valley can be heavily affected by buildings, woodland, terrain and other obstructions. A repeater installed on a hill or mountain, by contrast, may provide substantially better radio coverage. This is why we deliberately look for suitable elevated locations.

Height alone, however, is not enough. We also have to consider the surrounding terrain, possible obstructions, accessibility, power requirements, mounting conditions and, of course, the legal and organisational requirements of each site.

A good repeater location is therefore always the result of several factors working together.

Our Pirate Hill is an excellent example. Its elevated position combined with an established community of radio enthusiasts makes it a particularly interesting location for our activities.

MeshCore – An Independent Radio Network for the Future

A network grows with every new location

The real strength of a mesh network becomes apparent when individual radio nodes develop into a connected infrastructure.

Imagine a radio enthusiast in the Hassberge sending a message. A reachable repeater receives the message and, according to the protocol, can forward it. Additional repeaters may then extend the communication into other areas.

The result is not simply a collection of isolated repeaters. Instead, a radio infrastructure with multiple interconnected nodes begins to emerge.

MeshCore also provides mechanisms known as advertisements, through which devices can announce their presence and, depending on configuration, information such as their location.

As the network grows, this makes the infrastructure increasingly visible to its users and helps them understand which nodes and services are available.

Decentralised rather than dependent

One of the central principles of our project is decentralisation.

In conventional communication systems, essential parts of the infrastructure are controlled by service providers. Mobile communications, for example, depend on mobile network operators and their infrastructure. Internet communication depends on network and server infrastructure.

MeshCore takes a different approach.

The radio infrastructure can be built and operated by the people who actually use it.

There is no conventional mobile phone contract required for the basic radio communication, and local radio operation does not inherently require an internet connection.

This creates an interesting proposition for radio enthusiasts:

You can build your own communication infrastructure.

That philosophy fits perfectly with the CB Funkfreunde Hassberge.

Security and encryption

Security is another important aspect

MeshCore uses cryptographic mechanisms for identities, key exchange and encrypted communications. The current technical documentation describes, among other mechanisms, Ed25519 for identity and signatures, X25519 for key exchange, and AES-128 together with HMAC-SHA256 for encryption and authentication in relevant parts of the communication system.

There is, however, an important distinction to make:

Not every communication on MeshCore should automatically be considered private.

Public channels are intended for public

communication. Private channels can, by contrast, use a secret key. Security therefore also depends on correct configuration and responsible key management.

For us, this is an important principle. Modern radio technology should not merely provide range; it should also encourage responsible communication and sensible security practices.

MeshCore and emergency preparedness

One particularly interesting application is independent communication when conventional infrastructure becomes unavailable.

Power failures, disruptions to mobile networks, overloaded systems or loss of internet connectivity can affect the communication methods we normally take for granted.

An independently operated MeshCore network can provide an additional means of communication in such circumstances.

MeshCore should, of course, not be regarded as a replacement for professional emergency-service radio systems or official communications infrastructure. Instead, it can be considered an additional, privately operated communication system that may be useful for events, outdoor activities, technical projects and personal emergency preparedness.

The ability to operate repeaters using independent power supplies at suitable locations makes the concept particularly interesting for these applications.

Autonomous repeaters

radio independent of the mains supply

We therefore place particular emphasis on autonomous installations.

A possible installation may consist of:

- a suitable LoRa device,
- MeshCore repeater firmware,
- an appropriate antenna,
- a battery,
- a solar panel,
- suitable charging electronics,
- a weatherproof enclosure,
- professional installation and mounting.

The precise design naturally depends on the location and the equipment being used.

Mountain installations also require consideration of temperature, humidity, wind, snow, lightning, mechanical stress and long-term maintenance requirements.

A repeater on a mountain is therefore not simply a device that can be placed somewhere and forgotten.

Every reliable site requires planning, testing,

Our eight-person core team

- Building a network of this kind cannot be achieved by one person.
- Our community currently consists of eight active people who take responsibility for organisation,

planning, technical implementation and coordination.

- We also have additional supporters and members who follow the project, contribute ideas, show an interest in the technology or become involved when required.
- This combination is particularly important to us.
- On the one hand, we want a technically committed core team capable of actually delivering projects.
- On the other, we want our community to remain open.
- Not everyone needs to be a radio engineer.
- Not everyone needs to know how to configure a repeater.
- And not everyone needs to participate in every project.
- Interest, willingness to learn and a sense of community are equally valuable. installation, configuration and maintenance.

From individual repeater to regional network

- Our long-term objective is therefore not simply to install as many devices as possible.
- We want to develop a carefully planned regional MeshCore network.
- Different types of locations can fulfil different roles.
- Mountain locations can provide broad geographical coverage.
- Regional repeaters can connect individual radio areas.
- Private nodes can extend the communication options available to individual users.
- Room servers can provide additional functionality for storing and retrieving messages. MeshCore supports room-server functionality alongside repeater operation.
- In this way, many small technical building blocks can gradually become a much larger infrastructure.

Technology that brings people together

- For us, MeshCore is therefore more than just another digital radio project.
- It brings together several things that matter to us as CB radio enthusiasts:
- Radio technology.
- Independence.
- Community.
- Individual initiative.
- Technical knowledge.
- And above all: communication.
- The world of CB radio has changed repeatedly over the decades. New technologies do not necessarily replace traditional radio; instead, they can create additional possibilities.
- We therefore do not regard MeshCore as a competitor to CB radio.
- We see it as a complement.
- CB radio provides voice communication over radio.
- MeshCore introduces additional possibilities for digital LoRa communication.
- Both technologies can exist alongside one another.

Our journey has only just begun

The repeaters currently operating on Pirate Hill, at the QTH of CB Prepper14, and in the Fichtelgebirge are only the beginning.

Additional locations are being discussed and planned.

The equipment for these future installations is already available.

The next step is to identify suitable locations, resolve technical and organisational questions, and gradually bring additional nodes online.

We know that building a network of this kind takes time. but that is precisely what makes the project so interesting.

Every new site is another building block.

Every new connection expands the possibilities. and every radio enthusiast who becomes involved helps transform individual devices into a genuine community-owned communication infrastructure.

Our objective

Our objective is clear:

- To build a strong, independent and reliable MeshCore network for the Hassberge region and beyond.
- We want to demonstrate that the radio community remains alive and relevant in the digital age.
- We want to understand modern technology, experiment with it and use it sensibly.
- And we want to work together to create an infrastructure that is not dependent on a single commercial provider.

Our project is driven by people who do not merely talk about radio technology, but actually put it into practice.

Perhaps the next MeshCore repeater will soon be installed on another mountain.

Perhaps it will create a new link between two regions.

Perhaps many individual projects will eventually become one large, interconnected radio network.

The beginning has already been made.





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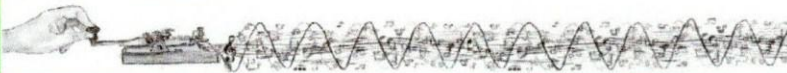
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International Inland Waterways On The Air

The event is open to all Amateurs who are boaters, cyclists, walkers and other users of the canals, rivers, towpaths, riverbanks for work or recreation. Even lakes and reservoirs that are used for recreation uses classify as an inland waterway, so there are many places for activating. Many clubs and individual Amateurs on or near the inland waterways obtain Special Event Station (SES) callsigns. Others operate mobile or portable using their own callsigns. Many more like to contact the IIWOTA stations.



EI3CC did an activation last year and we again had an opportunity to activate during the weekend of Aug 29-30 only this time we could do it from the club house as we sit on Ballyscanlon lake which is in the category needed to comply.

We have only recently moved into the club house so it was a great opportunity to be able to have an on site stop over for the weekend activation having full shower and kitchen facilities on site is a great advantage for weekend operations.

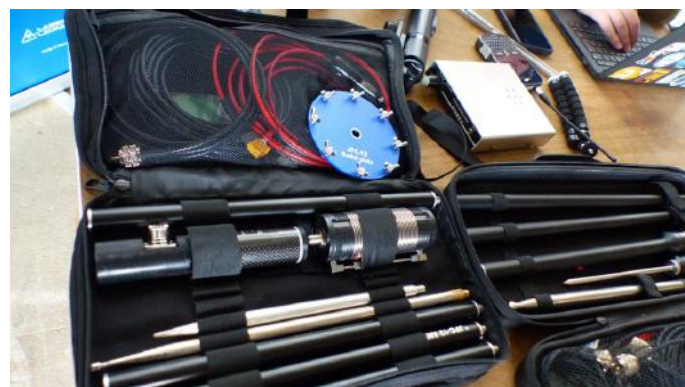

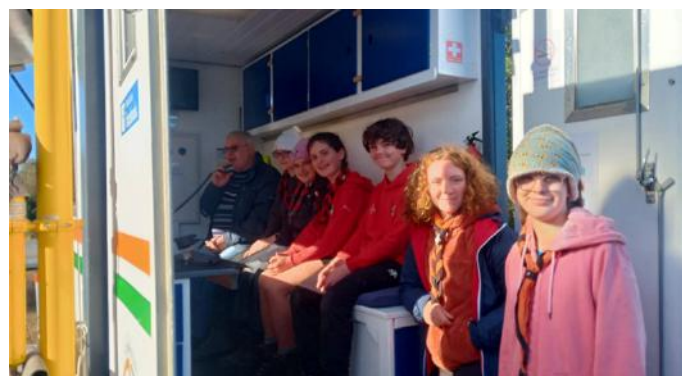

You can register your group on the [JOTA-JOTI website](#). Young people over 13 are able to register individually. However, they need to make sure that their parents/carers have been informed and that they know how to take part in the event safely.

We know you're excited and want to jump straight in, but, before taking part, make sure you have completed a [risk assessment](#).



Young people will learn about another country or a global issue first-hand, and develop communication skills too. There'll be lots of different activities to get involved in, both online and offline. 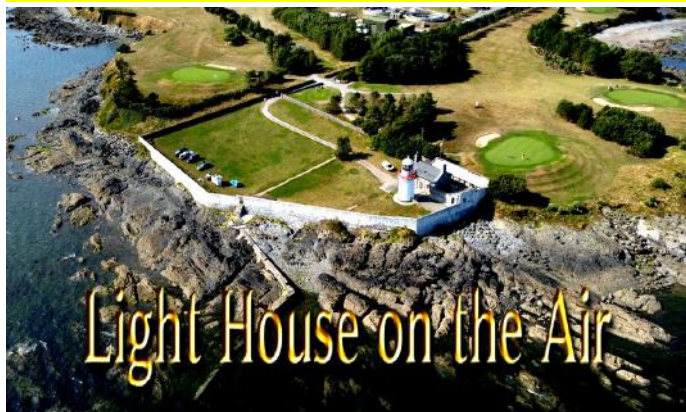

How to Pass Ireland's Amateur Radio Exam - Jorge Herculano

Unlike countries with multi-tiered amateur radio licensing systems, Ireland relies on a single, comprehensive gateway to the airwaves: the Harmonised Amateur Radio Examination Certificate (HAREC). Administered by the Irish Radio Transmitters Society (IRTS) on behalf of ComReg, the HAREC grants successful candidates a full CEPT-compliant licence with international operating privileges.

Because the examination covers everything from advanced electronics theory to Irish amateur radio regulations, success requires a focused and structured approach. Here's how to conquer the exam and earn your callsign.

1. Understand the 60-Question Split

The HAREC consists of 60 multiple-choice questions and allows two hours for completion. The examination is divided into two equal sections:

Section A (30 Questions)

Radio theory, electrical principles, antennas, components, propagation and circuit analysis.

Section B (30 Questions)

Regulations, licensing conditions, band plans, operating procedures and safety requirements.

The key point: You must achieve at least 60% in each section to pass. Scoring highly in the regulations section will not compensate for a poor result in the technical section. You need a minimum of 18 correct answers out of 30 in both sections.

2. Download the Official IRTS Study Guide

Avoid relying solely on American or British amateur radio study materials. While they can help explain radio theory, they do not cover Ireland-specific regulations, frequency allocations, operating procedures or ComReg requirements.

Instead, download the official IRTS HAREC Study Guide from the IRTS downloads page. This comprehensive guide is written specifically for the Irish syllabus and covers both traditional radio concepts and modern technologies such as Software Defined Radio (SDR).

3. Join an Online Training Course

The technical content of the HAREC can appear daunting to newcomers. Topics such as impedance, reactance, propagation, filtering and electromagnetic compatibility are often easier to understand in a structured learning environment.

The National Short Wave Listeners Club (NSWLC), Jprhe and opportunities to ask questions as you progress through the syllabus.

4. Master Ireland's Regulatory Requirements

Radio theory is universal, but amateur radio regulations are country-specific. Pay close attention to the Irish band plans and licence conditions.

You should be comfortable with:

- Irish callsign prefixes, including EI and EJ
- Band allocations and operating restrictions
- Emergency communications procedures
- Licence conditions and permitted operating practices
- RF safety requirements and exposure limits

Questions in this section are often straightforward for candidates who have thoroughly studied the official material.

5. Practise and Book Early

Keep an eye on the IRTS examination portal for upcoming examination dates and application information. Booking early helps ensure you secure a place at your preferred examination session and gives you a clear target date for your studies.

Aim for five study sessions each week, lasting approximately 45 to 60 minutes. Use one additional session for revision and keep one day free.

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Saving it from the Bin

Blending the high-performance digital frequency synthesis techniques from the Yaesu FT-890 with the operating convenience and affordability of the FT-747GX, the FT-840 adds a choice of two optional remote automatic antenna tuners and a wealth of convenient functions. For compact base and mobile stations, the FT-840 set the new standard for high-performance affordable transceivers.



As a first-time rig, back-up or main station transceiver, the FT-840 has the features and dependability that both beginners and seasoned operators will appreciate.

These radios are now getting on a bit and some have needlessly ended up in the bin, for a novice they are possibly the easiest radio's out there to operate just enough functions to get you on the air with 100w out.

On this particular Yaesu the FT-840 radio is known for its internal heating issues, particularly due to the R2213 resistor. This resistor generates excessive heat, which can lead to circuit board failure. To address this, users can increase the wattage of the resistor from 2W to 5W or replace it with a higher-wattage 30W resistor bolted directly to the metal chassis. This modification helps to lower the temperature in the area of the voltage regulators and reduces the probability of failure. The process involves replacing the original part and using the radio's case as a heat sink to ensure the internal components remain cool so let's open the old girl up and take a look inside.



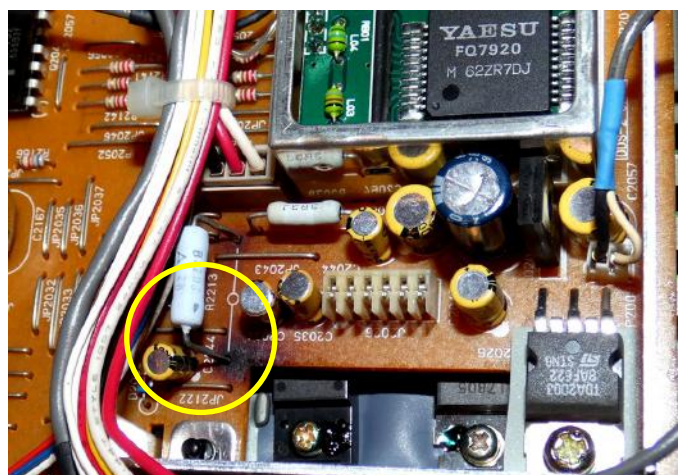
As can be seen very little inside this was a developing radio in its day and the size was being reduced from the boat anchor type with the development of the microchip and multi pin connections on the boards the obvious resistor has a dark heated area on the board so its not too hard to find the culprit.



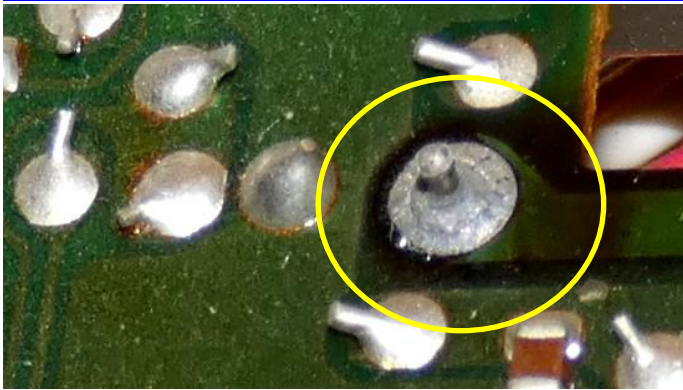
So looking around the board we can see a hot spot and the culprit a 8.2ohm/2W power resistor, It has been known and documented for some time that this resistor gets quite hot and starts discolouring the PCB and also even damaging it's solder joints on the board over time.



And there we have it simple little device but can cook the radio I lifted the lower radio cover of also to see if the board had been damaged and sure enough it was.



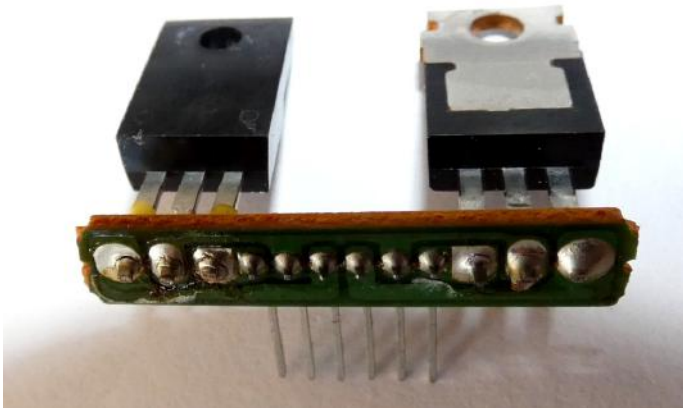

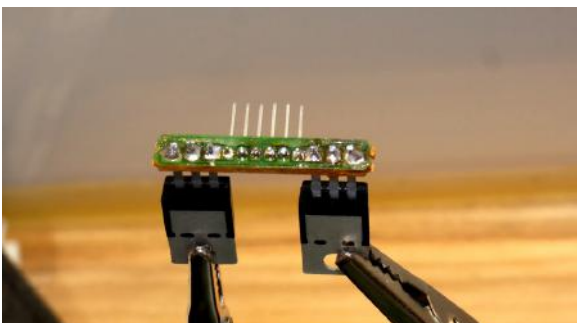
A replacement 30w chassis mount resistor was sourced and we then looked at what needed doing and I said may as well reseat the transistors and give the whole radio a good check over and it was just as well we did.



Here you can see the transistors they are mounted on a heat sink and on a small board with pins that protrude the pin connector seen here.



If you look close enough you can see some dry joints check pin one so worth while removing this component it also allows you to get at the underside of the resistor we want to remove, so this area was reflowed and was as good as new and ready to refit.

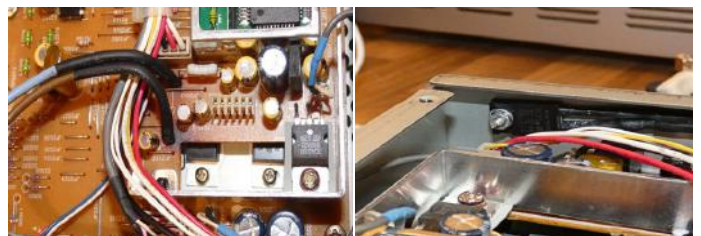


I could now get at the underside of the burnt resistor and lift it out I would replace it with a TO-220 type 8.2ohm/20W resistor, and would be mounting it to the rear panel of the radio to help cooling.

First thing is to give the resistor some legs to reach the back of the case and once soldered I then sleeved them with heatshrink and a nut and bolt for mounting.



Then it was a case of solder the ends onto the board and work out where I would mount the resistor and drill a hole as required I also reseated the transistors and was the resistor issue sorted and a straight forward modification.



So while we have the radio open we may as well check the rest of this old girl, I must point out the radio was running pre this investigation but the resistor was a known fault that needed doing anyway.



The great thing these days is everyone has a phone and as such you have a great camera and magnifier so I scanned the main board in sections and then put them up on the main screen on

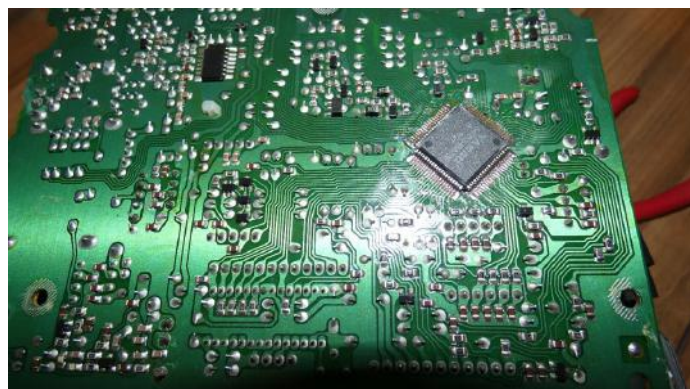

my PC and the results were astonishing dry joints everywhere I was amazed the radio worked so well.

After hours of sectioning the main board I was convinced I had found all the dry joints and reflowed them it was a bit daunting but worth it I reassembled the radio and powered it up and again it was running like it always had.

This is a handy radio for a newbie nice and easy to work and saved from the bin too so hopefully it will run on for many years.

Churches on the Air with EI3HRI



Churches and Chapels on the Air (CHOTA) was started in 2006 by John (callsign G3XYF), a Christian farmer from East Yorkshire, who wanted to bring amateur radio activity to historic places of worship. The activation has grown from strength to strength each year, and 2026 was no exception, with the most stations to sign up to the program. This year EI3HRI decided it would participate, and the operator to take on the task was John EI6JOB. Being a relatively new operator (2 years), this would be a challenge and a big learning curve.



It was decided that Clonegam Church would be the ideal setting for CHOTA, situated in the small village of Portlaw, about 7 miles from Waterford city, the church itself is nestled into the countryside, overlooking Curraghmore estate and the Comeragh Mountains.

Clonegam Church is a historic, Gothic-style estate church located within the grounds of the Curraghmore Demesne near Portlaw in County Waterford, Ireland. Originally built in 1741, rebuilt or renovated in 1791/1794, and later restored in 2001.

Notable Features:

- Fine cut-stone masonry and historic grave markers dating from around 1750 to 1950.
- Interior tombs of prominent family members, including Sir Marcus Beresford (Earl of Tyrone) and Countess Catherine, as well as a monument to the 3rd Marquess of Waterford.
- A striking 1873 white marble sculpture of a reclining woman and her baby by renowned sculptor Sir Joseph Edgar Boehm.



What started off as a very wet Irish morning in Waterford for the first activation on CHOTA. Setting up the EFHW antenna in heavy rain, and high winds, was this an omen that this day could be a struggle? Once set up, the antenna was tuned to the Yaesu FT710, the 40m band was quiet at the beginning, logging only one or two stations, We settled for 7.153 and gave the call, within minutes the Church-to-Church stations began to roll in.



After an hour or so it got quiet as the WAE Contest was in full flow, so the bands were getting busier, the rest of the time was spend turning the dial looking for other CHOTA stations. In the end we completed almost 5 hours on the activation, logging a total of 59 stations which included 31 Church to Church Stations. I have enjoyed CHOTA from my home last year, but this year decided to give a go at activation.

So, if you feel you would like to participate, why not give it a go for 2027 even if a newbie like me

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3rd Germany Berg-DX – A Fantastic Weekend of CB Radio



On September 26, 2026, the time had finally come again: the 3rd Germany Berg-DX was scheduled to begin at 22:00.

Of course, I had registered as a “head station for the CB Funkfreunde Hassberge” a week in advance. Choosing my operating location was not difficult this time. The decision was made quickly: Pirate Hill.

During the summer, we had completely overhauled the station at Pirate Hill. We removed the old antenna, refurbished the mast, installed a new antenna and coaxial cable, and extended the mast. With the work now completed, Pirate Hill was the obvious choice for the Berg-DX.

The radio gods were definitely on our side that Saturday. We were blessed with sunshine and temperatures of around 24 °C (75 °F).

Combining radio and good food

I had decided to combine the Berg-DX with a thank-you meal for my fellow members of the CB Funkfreunde Hassberge. The plan was simple: Pulled Pork prepared in a Dutch oven.

So I arrived at Pirate Hill at around 13:00.



Before making the army shelter ready for radio operations, I first lit a fire in our fire bowl. Once that was done, I concentrated on setting up the station.

The setup itself took barely ten minutes. Our permanent antenna installation uses a Sirio 827 mounted on the mast. We have a lockable box at the base of the mast where the coaxial cable can simply be connected. I only had to connect the other end of the coaxial cable, with its PL connector, to the socket inside my radio shelter.

A quick SWR check confirmed that everything was working perfectly.

Time for the first QSO.

Everything worked exactly as it should be

By then, the fire had burned down to glowing embers, so it was time to put the Dutch oven containing the meat onto the coals. Papa Whisky Sierra 6 joined me at Pirate Hill, and we spent some time making a few more QSOs.

While operating, I noticed something particularly encouraging: the 11-metre band was almost completely free of interference. That immediately increased my anticipation for the evening's Berg-DX.

At around 18:00, several more radio friends arrived. Since I had invited them for the meal, the Pulled Pork in honey-whisky BBQ sauce was, of course, ready to be served.

Unfortunately, not all of the CB Funkfreunde Hassberge members were able to attend. But there is an old saying: “Don't be disappointed by those who aren't there; be happy with those who came.”

With good food, drinks and plenty of conversation, the hours passed incredibly quickly.

Suddenly, the clock showed 21:55.

Only five minutes to go.

I headed into my radio shelter and tuned to Channel 2 USB, where the opening of the event was about to take place.

The 3rd Germany Berg-DX begins

Precisely at 22:00, the familiar opening song Bakersfield could be heard. Joachim / CB Schwarzwälder officially opened the 3rd Germany Berg-DX.

After a brief explanation of the event procedure, Joachim introduced the individual head stations and gave each operator the opportunity to announce their location and operating channel.

One by one, the head stations announced their mountains and the channels on which they would remain QRV until midnight.

When it was my turn, I proudly announced: “Pirate Hill near Haßfurt – Channel 34 USB, the home channel of

the CB Funkfreunde Hassberge”.

Once all head stations had been introduced, Joachim said goodbye to everyone and sent the participants off to their respective channels. At midnight, all stations were asked to return to Channel 2 USB for the final review of the event.

I switched over to Channel 34 USB.

And then it happened.

An incredible pile-up almost immediately, an enormous wave of stations came crashing in.

The number of stations calling was so high that there was simply no time to record individual callsigns and operators. In the end, I could only keep a tally mark for every station worked.

But what made the evening truly special were the propagation conditions. They were absolutely fantastic.

Stations from considerable distances were reaching Pirate Hill with impressive signals. Connections of 200 kilometres and more were no problem under the conditions.

The pile-up continued, and keeping up with all the calling stations was genuinely hard work. But it was the kind of hard work every radio operator enjoys.

The enthusiasm on the frequency was enormous. 103 stations from Pirate Hill

As midnight approached, I finally decided to close my log. At 23:55, my tally stood at an impressive: 103 STATIONS. I switched back to Channel 2 USB to join the final round.

Joachim asked the head stations how the 3rd Germany Berg-DX had gone.

The response was unanimous: everyone was delighted with the propagation conditions.

When it was my turn, I reported my total of 103 stations

worked. Among the locations reached from Pirate Hill were Munich, the Black Forest, the Swabian Jura, a town in Saarland close to the French border, and the Harz region, among many others.

Once again, Pirate Hill had demonstrated



what an outstanding radio location it is.

Joachim was visibly impressed by the enthusiasm coming from the stations and eventually brought the official event to a close with a “Vy 73” and “SALUTI.” The night was far from over...

For me, however, the radio weekend was not finished yet. After the Berg-DX, I continued operating together with my friends from the Bayernrunde and my friend Kucha Hans. We kept things lively on Channel 8 USB until around 04:00 in the morning. It was a fantastic way to end the night.

After only a few hours of sleep, I was back on the air at 10:00 for the Bayernrunde on Channel 8 USB. At 14:00, it was finally time to head home. Well... almost.

The shelter remained standing at Pirate Hill, because another appointment was already waiting.

At 20:00, I was scheduled to moderate the Sunday Round of the CB Funkfreunde Hassberge, transmitting from Pirate Hill on *Channel 34 USB.

A weekend that proved CB radio is alive and well

Looking back, it was an outstanding radio weekend. Great weather, good food, fantastic friends, excellent propagation and an incredible number of stations made the 3rd Germany Berg-DX something truly special. But more important than the numbers was the atmosphere on the radio.

Hundreds of kilometres were bridged by nothing more than CB radios, antennas and enthusiastic operators. Stations from different regions came together, exchanged signals and enjoyed the shared experience of radio.

For me, the weekend once again demonstrated just how much potential there is in CB radio—and how much fun our hobby can still provide.

Pirate Hill proved itself once again as a fantastic radio location. And most importantly:

The CB radio community is alive and well!

hard worked, received a few reports of QSB, same on 18mhz and 15mhz. Nothing heard on 3.7mhz.

No EI stations heard or worked but then again propagation wise conditions have been long over the past while.

John EI7FAB was calling on 145.500mhz but unfortunately nothing logged on this occasion.

HF conditions on the day were poor, we only operated for 90min as 40M was beginning to drop off, 18mhz had also dried up so we called it a day.

We then visited Major Hazell's grave in Newport Town, its located at the grounds of the old Church of Ireland which is now in private ownership, access to the cemetery is allowed.

ODX was EI8FHB who was located in IO52DF for a distance of 186km. Stevie was using an Icom IC-7300 with 50w into a Watson 627 magmount.

The 70 frequency was 70.450mhz FM with 20w into a Watson vertical mag-mount, started transmitting at

A good day out contact wise apart from some tuning issues on 29/70 which will be sorted before the next day out on the hills. From Special Forces to Joan Baez's back-stage party in a POW camp deep in the jungle, we get the war up close.



What happens if you take an American family and send them to Europe for ten years? In the summer of 2000, Bill and Elisa Meara, accompanied by 2 year old Billy and 4 month-old Maria, left their home in the suburbs of Washington, D.C. and moved to the Azores. There they experienced the highs and lows of diplomatic life on a small distant island. After three years in the Azores, they spent four years London and three years in Rome. Overseas they lived in two houses and two apartments, went to five schools, used four different health care systems, experienced one earthquake, 9-11, the terrorist attack on London, tea with the Queen, the election of Barack Obama... and all the ordinary things that families go through. They lived mostly with the locals, learned Portuguese, Italian, and a bit of Cockney, and made many friends (foreign friends!) They returned to the United States in 2010 with a changed view of the world. This is their story
