MY CHALLENGE TO YOU

Peace does not happen by accident. It must be pursued deliberately, built strategically, and woven intentionally into everything we do. That is the challenge I am placing before the Rotary world this year.

Rotary has long recognised peace as one of our areas of focus. But I believe peace must be more than a category of work we set aside for certain projects. It must become a lens, one we choose to look through every time we plan, every time we serve, every time we ask what kind of impact we truly want to leave behind.

The Institute for Economics and Peace has identified eight Pillars of Positive Peace: well-functioning government, sound business environment, equitable distribution of resources, acceptance of the rights of others, good relations with neighbors, free flow of information, high levels of human capital, and low levels of corruption.

These pillars describe the conditions that make lasting peace possible. And when I look at them carefully, I see enormous potential for Rotary. Not because our work automatically advances peace but because it can when we are deliberate about it.

That is the key word:

DELIBERATE

A water project does not build peace on its own. But a water project designed with the Pillars of Positive Peace in mind - one that asks how equitable access to resources strengthens community trust - can begin to lay that foundation.

A vocational training programme does not guarantee reconciliation. But one that intentionally brings divided communities together around shared economic opportunity can start to build it. The project does not change, the intention does.

In Colombia, Rotary's Pathways to Peace and Prosperity programme shows us what this looks like in practice. Working in communities shaped by decades of armed conflict and displacement, the program combines economic empowerment with conflict resolution training and community-led reconciliation. Peace was not a hoped-for side effect. It was central to the design. That is the standard I am calling all of us to follow.

As you plan your next project, whatever the focus area, I want you to pause and ask one question:

HOW DOES THIS CREATE THE CONDITIONS FOR PEACE?

Consult the Pillars of Positive Peace. Find where your work connects. Then, make that connection intentional. Share what you discover with your club, your district, and your community. The more we talk about peace as a practice rather than a destination, the more naturally it will shape everything we do.

This is not about doing different work. It is about doing our work differently, with greater awareness, greater purpose, and a clearer vision of the world we are trying to build. Every Rotary project carries potential. Our task is to unlock it, not by chance but by choice.

DISTRICT GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

Dear Fellow Rotarians,

As we observe Membership and New Club Development Month, our focus naturally turns to growth. We celebrate the induction of new professionals, the chartering of new clubs, and the fresh vigor that flows into our district. We work diligently, carrying heavy buckets of enthusiasm, inviting colleagues, and hosting recruitment drives to bring new life to our meetings.

But I ask you to pause and look closely at the soil of your own clubs. Are we hauling buckets of water to a garden that cannot hold it?

As we celebrate Membership and New Club Development Month, our focus naturally turns to growth. Imagine a farmer who spends every waking hour hauling heavy buckets of water to a hillside garden, only to watch the water slip away through deep cracks in the clay. To save his harvest, he doesn't need larger buckets; he needs to build strong retaining walls. In Rotary, we often obsess over the size of our buckets while ignoring the structural integrity of our own clubs. As we near the halfway mark of our Governor's Visits, the momentum across our district is incredible. We are welcoming a massive influx of new Rotarians, with some clubs successfully adding up to a hundred new members.

However, to build organizations that last, we must put down the recruitment buckets for a moment and pick up the trowel to reinforce the true Rotary experience. Our legacy this year will not be defined merely by the record-breaking numbers we add, but by the members we actually keep. Let us ensure that every new Rotarian is given the strong, welcoming foundation they need to put down deep roots and thrive in our fellowship.

As we celebrate new clubs and new faces this month, let us also commit to the members already standing beside us. Let us put down the buckets, pick up the trowel, and ensure that every drop of potential within District 3780 is given the strong foundation it needs to thrive.

HOW CLUB ADMINISTRATION TURNS PLANS, PEOPLE, AND PURPOSE INTO LASTING IMPACT.

Before a Rotary project changes lives, someone convenes the meeting, records the plan, follow up, and keep everyone moving together. That quiet work is Club Administration. It keeps clubs organized and ready to serve through clear communication, accurate records, shared responsibilities, and coordinated action. When these systems work, members feel engaged, leaders stay accountable, and good intentions become meaningful service.

Since July, the District Club Administration Committee has joined Governor's Visits across District 3780, listening to presidents and reviewing strategic plans. Together, they have turned aspirations into defined roles, realistic timelines, accurate reporting, and measurable action. Progress is evident. As of 2 September 2026, 72.81% of 2,861 active members were registered in My Rotary, with 20 clubs achieving full registration. That same spirit of accountability extends to every commitment, including settling first-half club dues on or before 15 September 2026.

Legacy President Mhey Aldovino of the Rotary Club of Roosevelt puts it simply: "Clearer roles and follow-ups help our members stay informed, take ownership, and turn our plans into meaningful action."

Under the leadership of Legacy District Governor Rhyan Virrey and Club Administration Chairman Anton Uy, the committee will continue walking alongside every club. Because when clubs grow stronger, communities feel Rotary's heart.

WHEN ROTARY COMES ALIVE

BUILDING VIBRANT CLUBS, CREATING LASTING IMPACT

What happens when Rotarians stop simply attending meetings—and start connecting, sharing, learning, and imagining what their clubs could become?

On August 1, 2026, the answer unfolded at the PNP Bulwagang Lapu-Lapu in Camp Crame, Quezon City, where Rotary District 3780 gathered leaders and members for a day that was about far more than seminars and presentations. It was about bringing Rotary to life.

The Vibrant Club Workshop, hosted by the Rotary Club of Camp Crame, brought together club officers, district leaders, committee chairs, Assistant Governors, and Rotary and Rotaract members with a shared purpose: to strengthen the heart of every Rotary club—the people who give it energy, direction, and purpose.

A vibrant club is not defined simply by the number of its members, the size of its projects, or the awards displayed on its walls. It is defined by what happens when members feel that they belong, contribute, and matter.

That idea became the heartbeat of the workshop.

District Governor Rhyen Virrey opened the gathering with a message that set the tone for a day dedicated to strengthening clubs and transforming member engagement into meaningful service. DLF PDG Mar Reyes provided the workshop overview, connecting the day's discussions to the broader vision of building stronger and more vibrant Rotary clubs.

The morning unfolded around three essential pillars: Membership, Public Image, and The Rotary Foundation.





DGN Edgardo “Egay” Aguirre led the Membership session, challenging participants to examine how membership development can make a club vibrant. PDGs Francis Rivera, Domilo Lucenarino, and Danny Fausto enriched the discussion through a fireside chat, sharing experiences and practical strategies for attracting and retaining members.

Public Image Chair Roderick Lindayag explored how effective public image can support both membership and Foundation goals. PP Bhjorn Paingan encouraged clubs to use the Rotary Brand Center to tell their service stories with greater consistency and impact, while DICO Roel Abatayo demonstrated how technology can help clubs move closer to their goals.



The conversation continued with The Rotary Foundation. DRFC PDG Edgardo Ayento presented “The Magic of The Rotary Foundation,” followed by inspiring experiences from PDG Rey David, PP Alvin Mangona, and PP Ronnel Rodriguez. PP Rene Cantos then offered practical guidance on applying for Global Grants.

An open forum gave participants space to ask, exchange, and reflect—turning the workshop from a series of presentations into a genuine district-wide conversation.

The afternoon continued with a presentation from the First Rotary Credit Cooperative, adding another dimension to the day's learning.



Yet the true measure of the workshop's success was not found in the program itself. It was found in the conversations that continued beyond the sessions, the connections forged among Rotarians, and the ideas participants carried back to their respective clubs.

Because a vibrant club is not created by a seminar alone. It begins when members choose to show up, speak up, connect, and serve.

And when that energy moves from one member to another, from one club to another, Rotary becomes more than an organization. It becomes a movement of people creating lasting impact—together.

A simple game, a shared meal, a story, or a warm smile can mean so much to someone going through a difficult journey.

That spirit of compassion was reflected in everyone who joined the activity. Led by Legacy President Kat Dela Cruz, this gathering united 10 Sandigans, 10 Interactors, 2 volunteers, and a Rotarian from our Korean sister club. We donated food, cleaning supplies, diapers, and books to help support CHILD Haus. Yet beyond these gifts, we left something more valuable, HOPE. We join them in that they are not alone in their fight.

What began as an anniversary activity became a celebration of humanity. The smiles we witnessed reaffirmed why we serve, because every life touched, every moment shared, and every spark of hope makes the journey worthwhile.

Rain or Shine, RC Holy Spirit's 3-Month Nutrition Program Continues In Earnest

Despite the heavy rains brought by the enhanced southwest monsoon most days in August, the 3-month nutrition program of RC Holy Spirit and partners that was launched last July 31, 2026 continued relentlessly, except during days when it was too risky for the children and the volunteer moms to brave the rains. The number of children enrolled in the program has risen from 100 to 115, as of the end of August. The nutrition program which is meant to save the disadvantaged children aged 4 to 10 from the ill effects of malnutrition will continue until October. Nutritious, warm meals are served to the children every Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

To encourage the children to finish their food, RC Holy Spirit gives a pack of cookies to those who come out with a clean plate, as an incentive. This practice is also good to avoid food wastage and to make the kitchen washer's job much easier. Also, children who are exceptionally behaved are given prizes.

The 3-month nutrition program of RC Holy Spirit is In partnership with Puso ng Ama Foundation, the Missionaries of God's Love, and Brownfly Commercial & Industrial Corporation. The feeding activity is held at the Puso ng Ama (PNA) Foundation Center in Payatas B, Quezon City

Directly aligned with two of Rotary's global areas of focus—Maternal and Child Health and Disease Prevention and Treatment—the program demonstrates how sustained community action can provide a vital lifeline for vulnerable youth, regardless of the weather.

Representing RCNMH were Club President Tom Aquino Mariano, together with Rotarians Elena Canezo and Bernard Ebuén, members of the club committee handling the initiative.

The event featured several speakers and discussants who shared valuable insights and experiences on the importance of investing in the early stages of a child's life. An open forum was the opportunity to raise concerns, clarify issues, and exchange ideas with the speakers.

The highlight was the national presentation of the project by its Coalition President, former Senator Joey Lina. The presentation provided a deeper understanding of the program's direction, objectives, and the role of partner organizations in advancing meaningful interventions for children and families. For RCNMH, the workshop was an opportunity to learn, build connections, and prepare for meaningful action. The participation of the delegation demonstrates the club's commitment to strengthening its service projects through continuous learning, collaboration, and active engagement.

Bringing the Initiative to the Communities

RCNMH hopes to translate these learnings into action by implementing the project in the island and mountain communities of Mercedes, Camarines Norte, where access to essential health and nutrition services can be challenging.

We invite organizations, government agencies, businesses, civic groups, professionals, and individuals to join us through resources, expertise, partnerships, and volunteerism.

1st Rotary Club of Kagitingang Cubao Webinar

The Rotary Club of Kagitingang Cubao held its first All Club Meeting on July 18, 2026 with 2 major topics scheduled. First was the discussion on Maternal and Child Health (Rotary's July Area of Focus) and second, the fellowship on membership development.

Interactors from the Juan Sumulong High School led by their President joined more than 10 members of the RCKC as they listened to the video sharing of Honorary Member Miel Nora. A medical doctor, Dr. Nora had worked with NGOs and the DOH. In the video, he shared information on Maternal health including Maternal deaths; child health and malnutrition and adolescent pregnancies. Dr. Nora pointed out the trend showing Calabarzon as the region with the most number of Maternal deaths in 2024 followed by NCR. Calabarzon also had the highest rate of adolescent pregnancies with NCR having the lowest.

A discussion then followed. The webinar was led by the Membership and Vocational Services Committees of the RCKC. Club President Aileen Sim-Balintona, a registered nurse, welcomed the participants. PDG Dulce Coyukiat, Club Adviser, gave the inspirational message while Club youth coordinator Polly Raterta closed the webinar.

A few days after, the 2 organizing committees shared the reaction video of Club member Chi Redaja on how Rotarians can move forward with regard to MCH. Rtn Chi was formerly the National Program Director of the DSWD Kalahi CIDSS.

The webinar concluded with fellowship and games led by the Interactors.

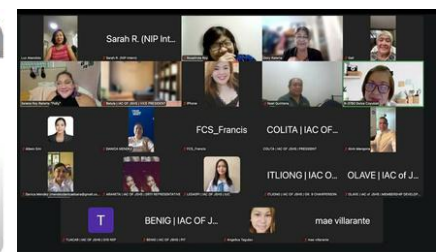

Amid the relief efforts, I met two mothers. One quietly asked for hope; another reminded us why we give it through service. Two stories, two impacts—reminding me that simply being there can make a difference.

On August 19, the RCC returned with spaghetti.

On August 27, 14 young people completed six months of formation through ACAY Missions Philippines Inc.'s Second Chance Program at Molave Youth Home (Bahay Pag-Asa). Together with IPP Pierangelo “Perry” Dominguez, I represented RC SFDM and listened to their dreams for a new beginning.

Two struggles. Two different stories. One truth:

To families, our presence says, “You are not alone.”

To young people, it says, “Your story is not over.”

And sometimes, that is where lasting impact begins.

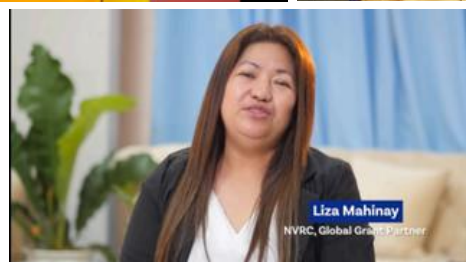

His words underscored the importance of listening in disaster response. By uniting corporate support, Rotary service, and community trust, the Rotary Club of Roosevelt showed that compassion becomes meaningful action when assistance is tailored to people's actual needs.

Katarungan Para sa Lahat, Tulong na Tapat

To kick off the new Rotary year in line with its commitment to create lasting impact, the Rotary Club of New Manila South (RCNMS) launched Project Katarungan on August 1 and 22, 2026 at the Covered Courts of Barangay Matandang Balara, Quezon City. This is the club's flagship legal aid program, to make legal assistance accessible to underserved communities.

Recognizing the financial challenge to most in the community, Project Katarungan provides free legal assistance to indigent individuals and families, as well as to barangay officials and community groups. As stated by RCNMS President, Katrin Jessica D. Guinigundo in her opening remarks: "[n]aniniwala po kami na ang batas ay dapat magsilbing instrumento ng katarungan, proteksyon, at kalayaan. Ngunit ang katotohanan ay marami pa rin sa ating mga kababayan ang hindi lubos na nakaaalam ng kanilang mga karapatan o hindi nagkakaroon ng pagkakataong makalapit sa tulong legal dahil sa kakulangan ng kaalaman, pagkakataon, o kakayahang pinansyal. Dahil dito, ang batas, na dapat sana'y para sa lahat, ay nananatiling hindi ganap na naaabot ng marami."

Project Katarungan offered a range of free legal services to members of the community. These include: pro bono legal consultations, where participants met one-on-one with volunteer lawyers to discuss their legal concerns and receive initial legal advice; document drafting and free notarization, which provided assistance in preparing and notarizing legal documents to ensure they complied with legal requirements; and community legal seminars, which presented common legal issues and available remedies in a clear and practical way for the general public. During the consultations and seminars, the volunteer lawyers—including RCNMS member-lawyers—addressed questions on a wide range of legal concerns. These included ejectment cases, property transactions such as pasalo and similar arrangements, violence against women and their children, the rights of the accused, debt-related issues, common civil registry concerns and their remedies, and labor law. Through these discussions, attendees gained practical legal guidance tailored to their specific situations.

The event drew approximately over 400 participants and was supported by 60 volunteer lawyers from Peralta Jimenez San Luis Uy Ulibas & Guinigundo Law Firm, The Law Firm of Gaspar Cañeba Franco, and other lawyers from various corporations, and legal backgrounds. Its successful implementation was made possible through the close partnership between RCNMS and the barangay. Barangay Captain Allan Franza, together with other barangay officials, attended the event, while barangay volunteers assisted with registration, crowd management, and other logistical requirements throughout the day.

More than providing free legal services, Project Katarungan created an opportunity for community members to better understand their rights and the legal remedies available to them. The initiative also reflects Rotary International's focus on Peacebuilding and Conflict Resolution by promoting dialogue, encouraging the peaceful resolution of disputes, and helping people resolve legal concerns before they develop into larger conflicts. Through partnerships like these, RCNMS continues to support stronger, better-informed, and more resilient communities.

Beyond the Presidency: UFG Presidents Unite for Their First Disaster Relief Mission

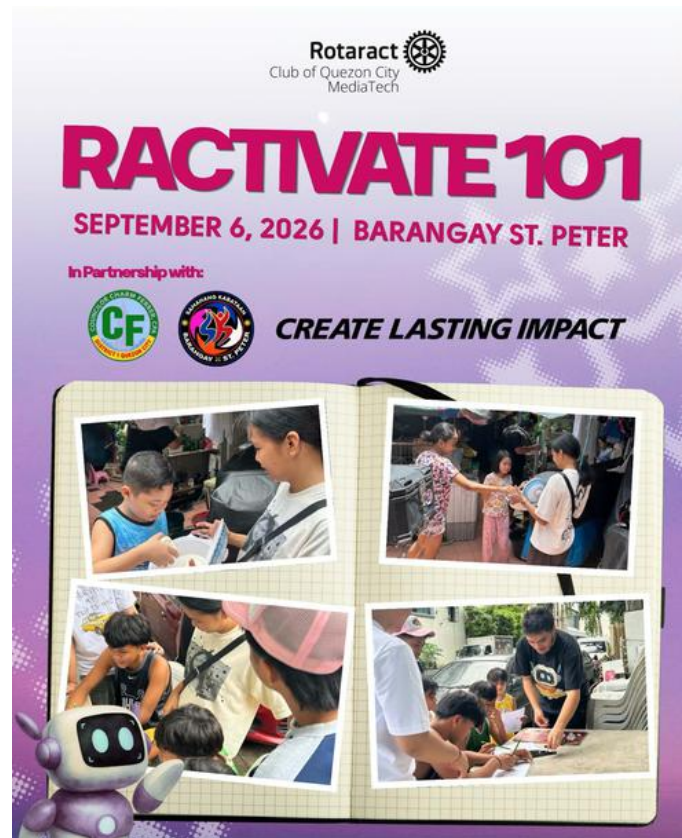
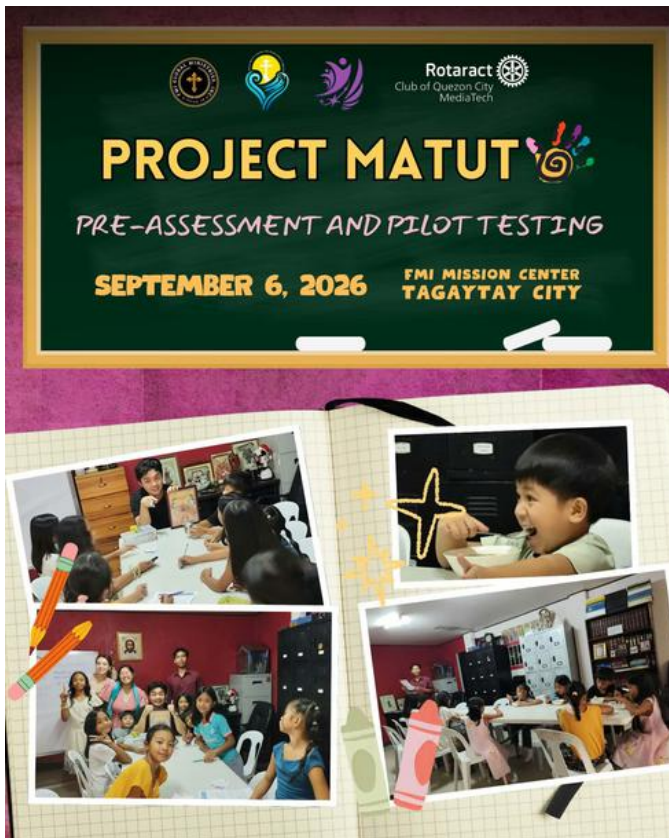

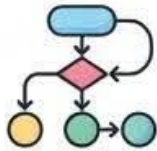

To ensure total fairness and give every single club an equal opportunity to shine on a District-wide level, we strictly accept **ONE** project writeup per club per month.



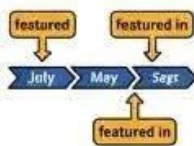
Submission Requirements:
