Our Quaker values

At Sidcot, our Quaker values of Simplicity, Peace, Integrity, Community, Equality, and Sustainability (or SPICES) are integral to Junior School life.

These values are not just words on a page; they form the beating heart of our school community. They provide a gentle, guiding compass for how we treat one another, how we approach our learning, and how we interact with the world around us.

We are proud to be an inclusive and diverse community, and we warmly welcome families of all faiths and none. Whatever a child's background, they will find Sidcot Junior School to be a place where they are truly known, valued, and encouraged to let their lives speak.

SPICES

Simplicity: We encourage our children to focus on what truly matters—kindness, curiosity, and friendship—finding joy in the everyday experiences of childhood and learning to live adventurously.

Peace: In our classrooms and playgrounds, children learn the art of listening, empathy, and peaceful conflict resolution, taking individual and collective responsibility for maintaining a harmonious environment.

Integrity: We nurture a culture of honesty and self-reflection, empowering children to develop strong moral principles and to act with sincerity in everything they say and do.

Quakerism in practice

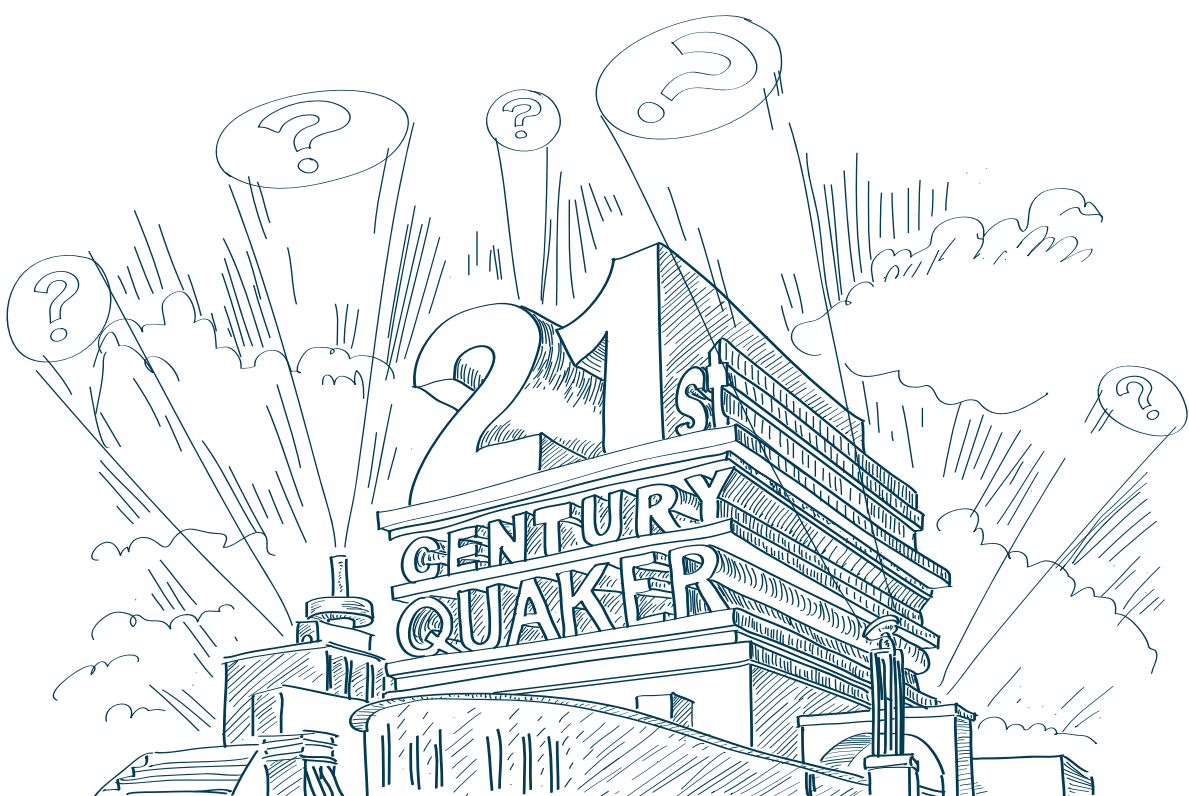
A key aspect of Quakerism that we adopt within the Junior School is Meeting for Worship; a moment for pupils to come together and sit in silence, and if anyone feels they want to speak, they do so.

You'd be surprised how quickly our lively young pupils settle into the silence and learn to welcome the quiet space.

Meeting for Worship also helps to build pupils' confidence in speaking out. They get to voice their opinion knowing that they will be fully listened to, and, in turn, they learn how to listen respectfully to others.

Each Meeting has a theme, which is chosen by the Elders, a group of pupils from Year 6 who meet each week to organise the Meeting. Throughout the year, The Elders get together with local Quaker groups for games, activities and discussions. They are also invited to attend QSpace, a Quaker youth group, as an after-school activity.

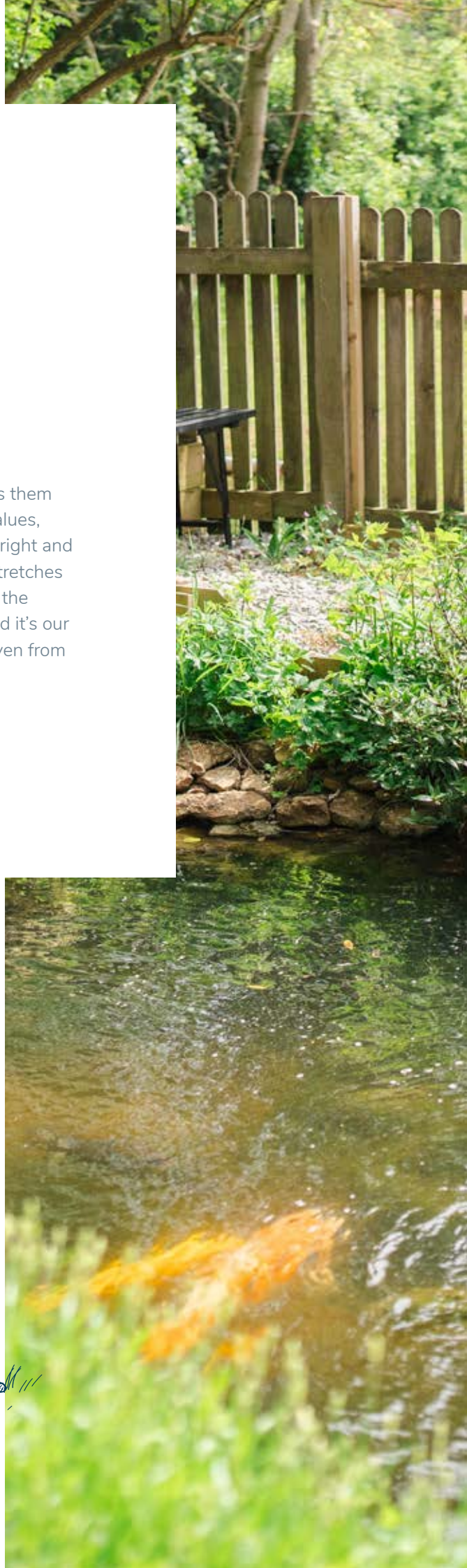
The School's approach to behaviour management is designed to be supportive and nurturing, and follows a restorative practice model. This ties in with our Quaker ideals of equality with every child's voice being heard.



Peace and global studies

Developing a broad, global perspective is an important element of our Learning Wheel.

Each week, pupils in Years 1 to 6 join a lesson that encourages them to think about how they fit in to the world. They think about values, their own and other people's. They discuss what we mean by right and wrong. They think about the global environment, and how it stretches beyond the School's setting in rural Somerset and out beyond the confines of the country. These are big things to think about and it's our experience that children engage enthusiastically with them, even from a very young age.

Sustainability matters

As a proud Eco-School, sustainability is woven into the fabric of school life.

Our enthusiastic and dedicated Green Team meets regularly throughout the week, taking part in gardening projects, wildlife conservation activities and a range of initiatives designed to help care for our local and global environment.

Environmental education is an important part of our curriculum, with every class taking responsibility for different aspects of our eco-work throughout the year. Pupils research key environmental issues, lead projects and share their learning with the wider school community through class assemblies, presentations and campaigns. This approach empowers children to become confident advocates for positive environmental change.

Our eco-programme explores a wide range of themes, including:

- Fairtrade and ethical trading
- Reducing, reusing and recycling
- Sustainable fashion
- Food waste and composting
- Litter awareness and community clean-ups
- Water conservation
- Reducing single-use plastics
- Biodiversity and wildlife protection
- Sustainable living and climate awareness

Through practical, hands-on experiences, pupils develop a deep understanding of environmental responsibility and discover how small actions can make a significant difference. Whether planting vegetables in the school garden, creating habitats for local wildlife, running recycling campaigns or promoting waste reduction initiatives, our children learn to care for the world around them while developing leadership, teamwork and problem-solving skills.

By encouraging active participation and a sense of stewardship from an early age, we inspire our pupils to become environmentally conscious citizens who are ready to make a positive impact on the future of our planet.

Empowering future leaders

Beyond the classroom, we offer a variety of initiatives that encourage pupils to think big and Let their Life Speak:

- **School Council:** Students have a voice in shaping school life, developing leadership skills and taking initiative.
- **Charity fundraising:** Children actively participate in fundraising events, fostering a sense of social responsibility and supporting worthy causes.
- **Community outreach projects:** Pupils engage with the local community, learning the importance of social connection and giving back.
- **Green Team and Green Earthlings:** Sustainability is very important to our pupils. Children on these teams meet once a week to plan activities and carry out any eco-school business.

Developing global citizens

We provide opportunities for pupils to connect with their peers from around the world, fostering a sense of global citizenship. These may include:

- **International learning:** Pupils broaden their horizons by interacting with students of different cultures on a daily basis. Senior School boarding students often come to the Junior School to discuss important parts of their heritage and cultures, and share their stories and experiences.
- **Cultural celebrations:** We celebrate many international events, from Lunar New Year and Christmas, to Black History Month and Ramadan. These events provide a great opportunity for our students to learn about the world in a fun and interactive way.

Emotional health

Our classrooms have a family feel and an atmosphere of mutual respect. Our pupils know they are being treated with fairness, that their views are listened to and their decisions respected.

We have a strong PSHE Curriculum which puts in place the key building blocks of respectful relationships and teaches our pupils to be healthy – both physically and mentally.

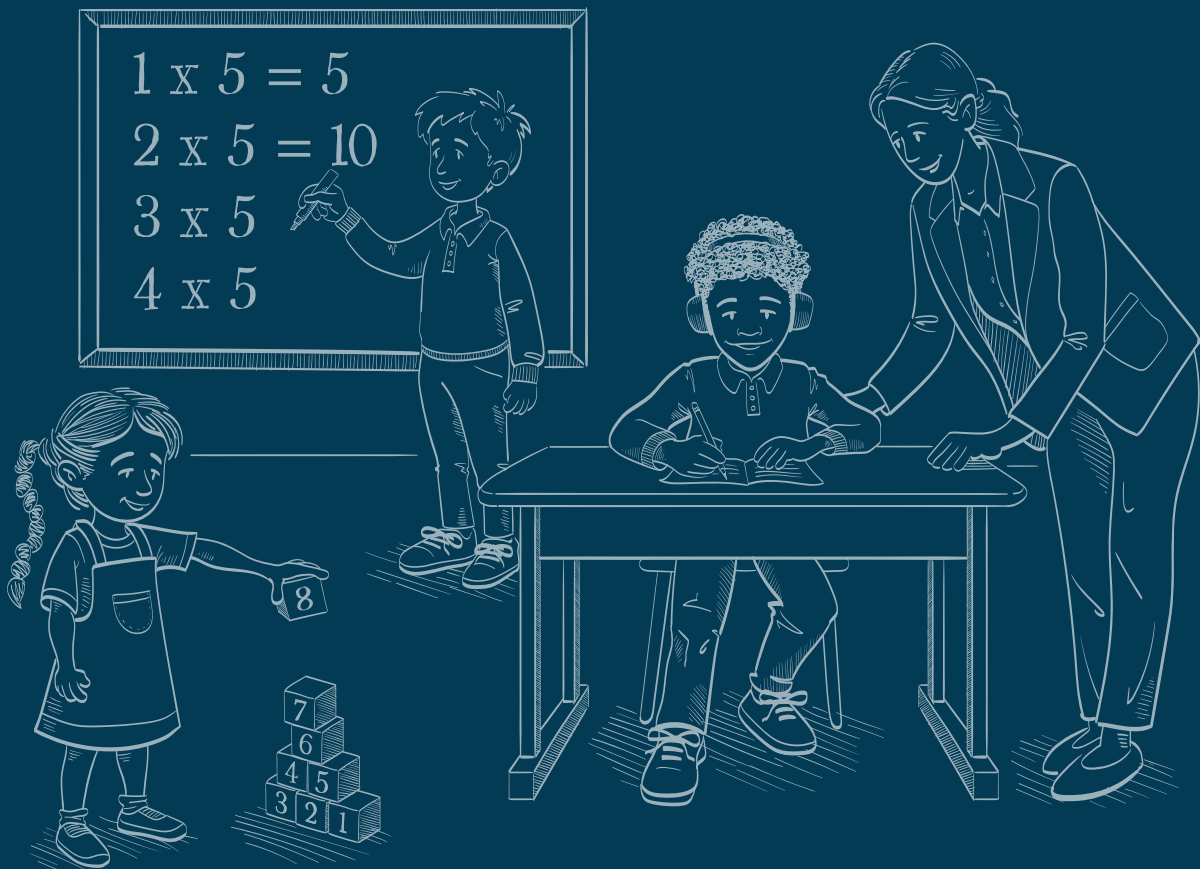
Developing emotional literacy is important to us at this early stage. We teach our pupils to recognise and name their emotions so that they are able to speak up and communicate their feelings. We believe in the importance of our pupils knowing that their voice will be heard, and we make sure that they understand what it means to be in a safe environment – not only in the classroom, but also online and in everyday life.

When disagreements arise, as they will, we help our pupils use the skills of peer mediation and to have restorative conversations. We encourage them to be creative and use social stories to develop empathy and confidence around opposing points of view. In this way, our pupils learn to listen and come to understand, and not be frightened by difference and disagreement.



Tailored teaching

At Sidcot Junior School, we believe every child is unique. That's why we offer a tailored teaching approach that goes beyond simply following a curriculum. Our small class sizes, combined with a commitment to a nurturing and child-led environment, ensures your child receives the individual attention they deserve.



What does tailored teaching look like at Sidcot?

Understanding your child: We take the time to get to know each pupil holistically. This allows us to fully understand your child's strengths, interests, and how they like to learn so that we can create a personalised learning experience which fosters their individual talents and engages them fully.

Nurturing curiosity: Our teachers encourage exploration and discovery, sparking a lifelong love of learning in every child. This builds confidence and a sense of ownership in their educational journey.

Deeper understanding: Children are more engaged when learning aligns with their interests and learning styles, leading to a deeper grasp of concepts.

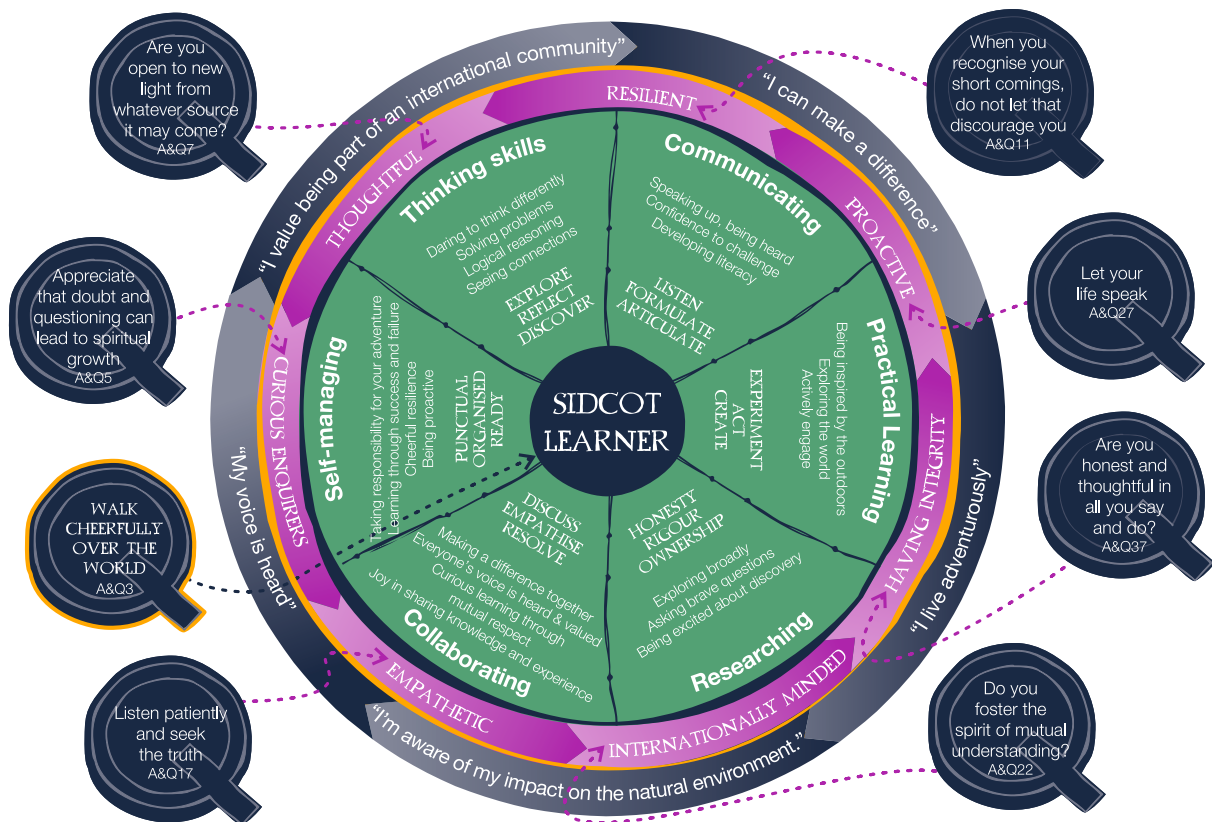
Increased confidence: A focus on individual strengths empowers children to take ownership of their learning, build confidence in their abilities and respond positively when being challenged in their learning.

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Our curriculum

Each week pupils have lessons in a wide range of subjects.

These may be held in the classroom or, where appropriate, outside, in our Forest School, in a yurt, or in the facilities we share with the whole School, including the Arts Centre, Drama Studio, Science Laboratories, Sports Centre, and Library. The timetable also includes plenty of opportunities for Creative Arts each week.

At Sidcot School, we are committed to the education and academic pursuits of our pupils, tailoring our curriculum to encourage self-exploration and a focus on what matters to each individual child. What matters at Sidcot is that children learn and develop in the subjects they are taught and that they grow their passions, hobbies, and self-esteem too. We do this by creating a holistic approach to education.

In the classroom

Our pupils learn in small classes, typically of 14 to 18.

We make a start on academic work early, bringing it to life with imaginative exercises and activities that give children experience of collaboration, giving and receiving feedback, and plenty of practice in oral skills.

Active learning

Throughout the School, we encourage children to be interested in their own learning.

This extends to prep, where pupils are asked to complete project-based learning at home, which they bring in and share with their class.





What's it like to learn adventurously?

It's fun and it's challenging. The key to it is our teachers.

They are not tick-box teachers, and they don't practice tick-box education. They create a family feel in the classroom, a supportive structure with clearly defined boundaries to make each child feel safe and empowered.

They give their pupils plenty of space and time to explore and experiment. They find out what each child can manage and then help them to work with confidence, supporting them to stretch and challenge themselves.

Assessments



We don't enter our children for external national testing.

We know that assessments can be useful in helping teachers decide a child's next steps. However, they mustn't interfere with children's well-being or their enjoyment of learning, so our teachers collect the same assessment information in more discreet and less pressurised ways.

We want our pupils to experience education as being about expanding possibilities and discovering potential, not just passing tests.



Fulfilling potential

Academic enrichment

At Sidcot School we recognise children are all at different stages in their learning and development. Whilst some pupils may need additional support, others are more able and need to be stretched and challenged. As a team, we carefully monitor the academic progress and attainment of our pupils throughout the year and adapt our provision accordingly. Some pupils are identified as gifted and talented in a particular subject area, and some pupils in J5 and J6 may be encouraged to be a Lead Learner in a particular area. Those who are Lead Learners are supported by the subject lead teacher and given extra opportunities to further develop their understanding, knowledge and broaden their experiences in their area of skill.

Learning support

Our Learning Support Department forms a strong part of the pastoral system and reflects the caring ethos for which Sidcot School is well known. The School is highly experienced in providing support to pupils with mild to moderate learning support needs. The department provides extremely high quality specialist teaching and support. The focus is on improving literacy and/or mathematical skills to enable pupils to engage with the mainstream curriculum and to become independent learners. Staff in the department also act as advocates for individual pupils in their relationships with teaching staff and other pupils.

Bursaries

Bursaries take the form of means tested discounts for new (and sometimes existing) pupils. These are intended to help a child enter the School and the majority will continue for the duration of their time at Sidcot. Others offer short-term support and may be available in cases of unexpected financial hardship.

Applications for September must be made by early January (please see website for deadline dates). Bursaries are reviewed annually and are awarded in line with our Bursary Policy and Procedure. The Bursary Policy and Procedure document and application form are available to download on the Admissions section of our website under Scholarships and Bursaries.

Specialist teachers

A world of opportunity with lessons in Science, Languages, Art, Drama, and Sport delivered by skilled specialist teachers.



Music

There is a wide range of musical opportunities for every pupil at Sidcot. Each child has the chance to learn a musical instrument, taught by specialist teachers.

Music is an integral part of the curriculum from Pre-School to Year 6, where children are introduced to the foundations of reading music and exploring music-making. As the children move into Year 2 and beyond, they can attend solo instrumental lessons, provided by a peripatetic teacher.

In addition to weekly classroom lessons, Sidcot provides the opportunity for children to play and explore music collaboratively in the School orchestra, small groups, weekly singing assemblies, the School choir, and After School Music Clubs.

Music at Sidcot is very inclusive and all children are given the opportunity to perform in a variety of different concerts and performances throughout the School year.





Art and Drama

At Sidcot Junior School, we believe that a truly well-rounded education extends far beyond the traditional classroom. Through our dedicated specialist teaching offer in Art and Drama, we provide pupils with a vibrant outlet for imagination, self-expression, and personal growth.

Guided by passionate educators who bring deep subject expertise and enthusiasm to every session, children are encouraged to step outside their comfort zones, explore new creative dimensions, and build lasting self-confidence.

Our specialist art lessons are designed to nurture individual creativity within a supportive and inspiring environment. Pupils are given the freedom to experiment with a diverse range of media, techniques, and concepts, learning how to translate their ideas into visual masterpieces.

By celebrating each child's unique artistic voice, we cultivate a deep sense of pride and passion for the subject, with vibrant student artwork regularly exhibited around the School for the entire community to enjoy.

Parallel to this, our specialist drama provision immerses children in the dynamic world of storytelling and performance. Through engaging drama sessions, pupils naturally develop essential life skills, including powerful communication, collaborative teamwork, and a stronger sense of self.

Whether they are exploring character roles or working together on group performances, children find their voice and discover the joy of creative collaboration in an atmosphere that champions individuality.

Languages

All children from Reception to Year 6 have specialist language provision. We believe that an awareness, understanding, and enjoyment of languages and culture are essential in the modern world.

Our pupils learn French, German, Spanish, and Chinese. They are also introduced to other languages, such as Italian and Russian, taught by international students, during our annual International Week of Languages.

All children from Reception to Year 6 have one language lesson per week. Those in Year 6 can continue with their French using the Linguascope programme that prepares them for learning French in the Senior School.





STEM

Our Science Labs have recently been renovated providing a modern facility for pupils in all year groups to use.

Junior School pupils are able to visit for Physics, Chemistry, and Biology lessons to utilise the high-quality equipment and spacious laboratories for interactive lessons.

In addition, Science learning is regularly taken outside the classroom. This includes exciting trips such as to 'We The Curious' and local farms, sessions in our on-site Observatory to view celestial objects up close, utilising our on-site Forest School to understand natural Science in action, and running an annual STEM fair.

Our STEM fair is a highlight of the annual calendar, with students undertaking specialist learning in a range of STEM topics, and then utilising this learning to create STEM businesses that provide a product or service at the fair, raising money for charity. Previous innovations have ranged from creating a healthy recipe book using food donation items to raise funds for a local housing charity, to creating palm-oil free bakes to raise money for a sustainable animal charity.







Sports

A whole range of sports are on offer at Sidcot: football, rugby, hockey, cricket, netball, tennis, athletics, horseriding, golf, basketball, dance, and many more.

From their earliest years with us, all our pupils have regular sports sessions, starting with PE lessons and swimming sessions in Pre-School and Reception.

In Years 1 and 2, children have two PE lessons a week. Years 3 to 6 have one PE lesson and a games afternoon. All children have a weekly swimming session.

Sports at Sidcot Junior School are both competitive and inclusive. We aim to make sports enjoyable and exciting for all students, emphasising the importance of finding joy in competitive sports and physical activity. We focus on ensuring that children experience the joy of winning and accomplishing personal goals rather than solely striving to be “the best”.

The Junior School makes full use of the School’s excellent facilities, which include a 25m swimming pool, a 4G hockey surface, tennis courts, an all-weather pitch and an athletics field.

We run several extracurricular sports clubs and activities every week and have a packed schedule of fixtures against other schools throughout the year with some excellent results.



Equestrian

Sidcot Equestrian Centre is another gem the School has to offer to pupils who wish to pursue riding as a sport.

The Equestrian Centre at Sidcot School provides students with fantastic opportunities to engage in horse riding and horse care, integrating equestrian activities into the broader school life.

For Junior School pupils, equestrian provision is tailored to build both hands-on confidence and practical skills. From J1 pupils can take part in stable management sessions and for those who want to learn to ride, they can participate in riding lessons at our partnered Equestrian Centre, Urchinwood from J4-J6.

Forest School

Our weekly Forest School programme provides a unique and enriching experience for children of all ages. Immersed in the natural world, students develop a love for the outdoors, fostering a sense of wonder, curiosity, and respect for the environment, whilst being challenged in their learning.

Through a range of hands-on activities, children:

Location

Sidcot Junior School is located in Winscombe, North Somerset. Set among stunning green spaces, we are close to Bristol and Bath, and Weston-super-Mare is only 8 miles away.

Our location on the A38 and minibus routes across the county mean that we're accessible for families based in Bristol and throughout Somerset.





School transport

We provide a broad network of school transport to accommodate your family's needs when it comes to the school run. Whether you live in Bristol or Somerset, we make every effort to provide a solution for our busy parents.

We currently run 13 set minibus routes with multiple stops throughout the area. Each route has a dedicated minibus driver who your child will come to know well, providing continuity and a friendly face.

In the Junior School, pupils are able to use the school bus service from Year 3 onwards. On arrival at Sidcot, Junior School children are escorted into the building by our fully trained bus drivers.

In addition, we arrange shared taxis for smaller groups or for those who wish to take school transport less frequently. Our minibus routes are reviewed regularly to ensure we provide the best options for our parents and those considering Sidcot for their families.

Junior School trips

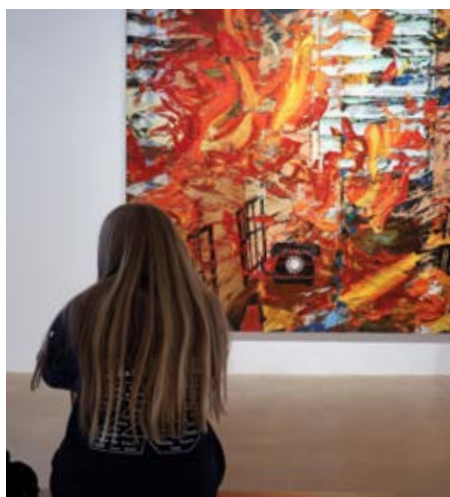
Sidcot School is situated in a beautiful rural location in North Somerset.

With stunning North Somerset as our home and a host of towns and cities nearby, it's no wonder that we love taking our Junior School pupils on school trips. Our staff arrange school trips to galleries, museums, sporting fixtures, and local events. Recent trips have included a visit to the Roman Baths, Nothefort, We the Curious, residential trips to Kilve Court, and lots more!

During the summer term, the entire school takes part in an on-site summer trip to make the most of our beautiful School grounds and facilities. It's a fun-filled day with various activities such as climbing, art, enjoying tasty ice creams, and bouncing on a bouncy castle. This special day is a highlight on our School calendar, offering all students the chance to relax and have fun with their friends as the School year ends.





Food

Pupils at Sidcot enjoy a wide variety of globally inspired tastes and flavours, with meals freshly cooked onsite using healthy and local ingredients whenever possible.

Provision is also made for special dietary, medical or religious needs. Alongside main meals, pupils can also enjoy our salad bar, including pasta and baked potatoes.

During morning break, Junior School pupils enjoy a varied options of fresh fruit, vegetables and/or biscuits alongside a refreshing beverage.





Pre-School

During their time at Pre-School, children will follow the Early Years Foundation Stage curriculum. In practice, this involves play and activities designed to develop skills and talents in literacy, mathematics, understanding the world and expressive arts and design.

Teaching within these areas addresses the three prime aspects of the curriculum: Communication and Language development, Physical development and Personal, Social and Emotional development.

Children can enter our Pre-School when they turn three years old and are developmentally ready to manage their own hygiene and personal needs. We accept Local Authority Early Years funding up to a maximum of 15 hours of per week until the term following a child's fifth birthday. We expect children to start with a minimum of four sessions and this needs to incorporate a whole day.

Our Pre-School children make use of many of the School facilities such as the Swimming Pool, Library and Refectory, as well as the lovely woodland Forest School. Regular activities include creative arts, cookery, dance, music, PE and plenty of outdoor play.

Baby & toddler group

Sidcot Toddler Group takes place Monday to Friday during term time and is run by highly qualified and experienced Early Years professionals.

It provides an opportunity for parents/carers and their young children to get to know other local families in a friendly and welcoming environment.

Our weekly sessions consist of: Pony Club, where our adorable Shetland Ponies aim to give children a gentle introduction to riding and pony care while gaining confidence and having fun; Forest School, where children can come and explore our forest area and partake in activities based around natural resources, using tools, mud, clay, flora and fauna; Our Stay and Play session where children can be independent and are offered activities that help them socialise with other children; Swimming sessions, introducing babies and toddlers to the water and incorporating rhyme, music, and movement.

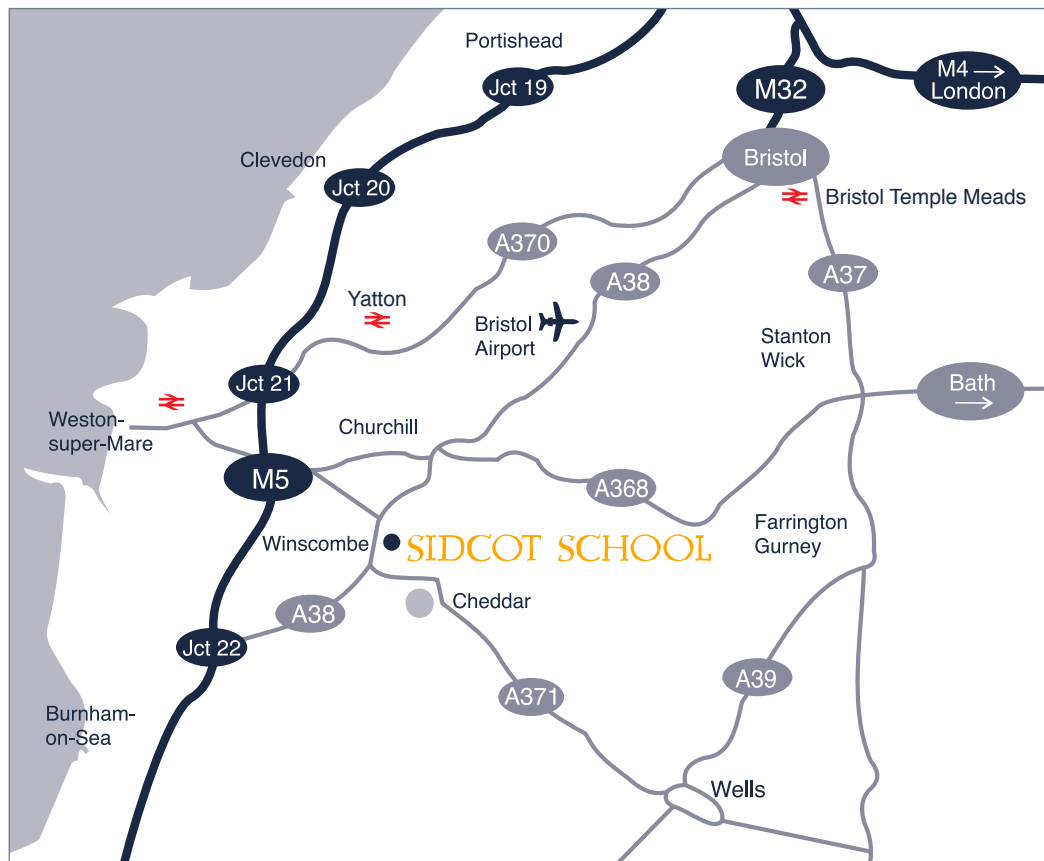

The application process

From enquiry to application, our Admissions Team is happy to help you discover whether Sidcot is the right place for your child. The following steps outline our application process, though the order may vary according to individual circumstances.

Apply

Complete the application form and return with the registration fee of £105 along with your child's most recent school report and a copy of their passport and birth certificate. If your child requires learning support, please also supply the relevant reports about their specific needs - for example, an Educational Psychologist report, or IEP (Individual Education Plan). Upon receipt of an application, a reference will be requested from your child's current setting.

Taster sessions

Taster sessions are an entry requirement for the Junior School, following an application. For Junior School pupils, the Taster Programme lasts two consecutive days. For Pre-School pupils and pupils for Reception, it's two half day sessions.

Offer

As soon as possible after the application and taster sessions, we will be in touch to let you know whether a place is offered.

Acceptance

To accept your place at Sidcot, please read the Parent Contract and return the completed Acceptance Form with the deposit and completed Medical Card. Shortly afterwards, we'll email our joining instructions, which will include all the practical details you will need.

Fees

Deposit & registration fee

For those joining Pre-School, no deposit or registration fee is payable. For pupils joining any other year group, a deposit of £1,000 to secure your place and a £105 registration fee to cover administration costs is payable.

Pre-School & Junior School day fee

The day fee includes snacks and the majority of after school activities. **Lunches are included within the day fee, though charged on your extras invoice.**

After School Care is free for the first hour up until 16:30 and will incur a small cost beyond this point. Those in After School Care are welcome to have supper at an additional cost in the Refectory at 17:30. Breakfast Club provides supervision from 07:45 to 08:30 and includes a varied breakfast at an additional cost.
