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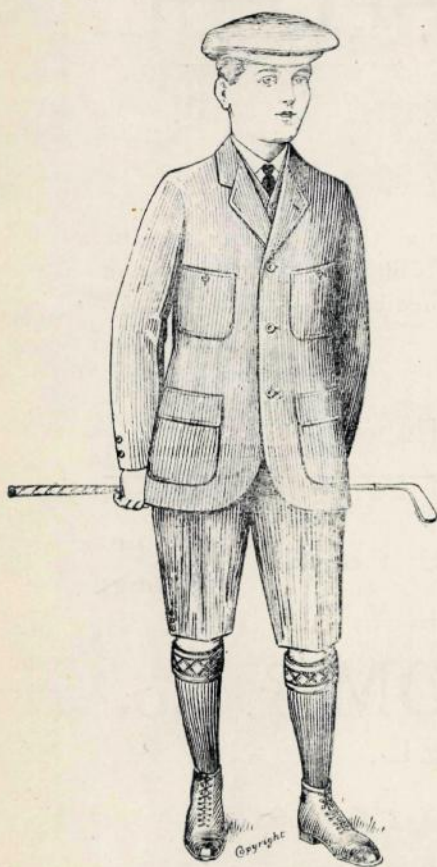

Notes on Old Boys.



WAR NEWS.

WE very much regret to announce the death of two more Old Boys who have fallen in France.

* * *

Lieut. George Victor Butler (1895-1905), 2/5 Lincolnshire Regiment, was killed on March 23rd at Ervilliers, on the Arras-Bapaume Road, in France. He was 30 years of age. When war broke out he joined the 7th (Pals) Battalion, Royal Dublin Fusiliers, and in less than six months obtained his Commission. He had seen nearly three years' service in Flanders and France. His colonel spoke of him as a most promising officer, and the adjutant wrote that on the day of his death he had rendered splendid service to the battalion, and several times got the artillery to the help of his men when they were sorely in need of it. He was the second son of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Butler, of Sutton, and all his three brothers are in the army.

Captain C. S. Burrows (1895-1903), M.C., of the 14th Northumberland Fusiliers (Pioneers), was killed in France on May 28th. He was 33 years of age, and was the son of the late Mr. A. C. Burrows. On leaving school he entered Trinity College, where he passed through the Engineering School and took his degree in 1907. He had been engaged in engineering in S. America for four years on the outbreak of the war, when he at once came home and got a Commission in the Northumberlands in January, 1915, and went to France in the following September. He won the Military Cross last November in the fighting north of Ypres. He was killed instantaneously by a shell during an attack on a trench his company were holding in the afternoon, having been in action since the 26th. His colonel wrote of him as "always cool and collected and absolutely fearless;" "the fine work and gallant leadership he displayed were simply splendid." His battalion formed part of the famous 21st Division, greatly praised by Sir Douglas Haig for their part in all the great battles since the March offensive, and one of the four who withstood the onslaught of the Germans near Rheims.

In the great battle in France that commenced on March 21st there were several casualties to Old Boys.

Two of our masters suffered in the battle. Mr. Wyon (Captain and Adjutant, South Staffordshire Regiment), was severely wounded near Cambrai on March 23rd, the upper left arm being shattered. He is now in Dr. Wheeler's Hospital in Fitzwilliam Street, and making good progress.

Mr. E. S. Ellwood, Captain, North Lancashire Regiment, was taken prisoner early in April.

* * *

F. S. Marchant (1911-15), 2nd Lieut., Royal Inniskillings, and R. G. Brewster (1905-07), 2nd Lieut., Lancers (formerly S. Irish Horse), were also taken prisoners.

The following were wounded but are all doing well, and some are back again at the front.—P. C. Bell (1909-11), Lieut., R.F.A.; R. Bell (1907-13), North Irish Horse; E. R. Gray (1900-09), Lieut., Royal Dublin Fusiliers; J. C. Robson (1908-12), 2nd Lieut., Durham Light Infantry; J. B. Taylor, M.B. (1895-01), Royal Army Medical Corps; J. P. Warner (1909-12), Captain, W. Yorkshire Regiment.

J. J. Mackay (1908-1917), 2nd Lieut. Royal Munster Fusiliers, has hurt his knee while giving instruction in bayonet fighting and is in hospital at Devonport.

We have to congratulate the following on earning distinctions:—

Dr. J. Lumsden (1882-4) has been created a Knight of the Order of the British Empire for his great work in connection with the Red Cross and S. John's Ambulance in Dublin since the beginning of the war. He was also last autumn as Director-in-Chief and Vice-Chairman of the Joint V.A.D. Committee of Ireland (excluding Ulster) largely responsible for the success of the Irish Red Cross Fund, amounting to over £63,000. Having been also made a Deputy Lieutenant for County Dublin, he is now Sir John Lumsden, M.D., D.L., K.O.B.E.

Major and Brevet Lieut.-Col. B. D. L. Anley (1886-87), C.M.G., D.S.O., Manchester Regiment, has been promoted to be Brevet Colonel.

P. C. Bell (1909-11), Lieut., R. Field Artillery, has been awarded the Military Cross.

F. W. Shea (1910-13), Lieut., R. Field Artillery, has been awarded the Military Cross.

G. B. Holmes (1908-11), Captain, A.S.C., has been mentioned in despatches.

Rev. W. T. Beckerson, B.D. (1899-1901), Military Chaplain, has been mentioned in despatches.

His elder brother, R. E. Beckerson (1897-1901), M.C., Capt., Norfolk Regiment, as recorded in our last number, has been given a bar to his Military Cross. The official record is for "conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in leading his company forward when they came under heavy fire and capturing his objective. He personally directed the attack of various sections on enemy strong points, and thus ensured the success of the operations."

The palm for the most stirring act in the war performed by an Old Boy must be given, we think, to Engineer Lieut. Commander W. A. Bury (1894-99), who was Chief Engineer in command of the "Vindictive" in the famous and successful raid on Zeebrugge on April 23rd; and again, a fortnight later, on May 10th, insisted on taking his ship into Ostend, where he sank her in the mouth of the harbour, effectively blocking the entrance. He was severely wounded in the thigh as he left his vessel, a bullet making a nasty hole and taking with it a half crown out of his pocket!

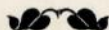

OBITUARY.

WE regret to record the death of one of the most distinguished of the earlier pupils of the School, Professor Swift Paine-Johnston, M.A., who died on the 10th June, in London, at the age of 61. He was at the School from 1872 to 1875, when he entered Trinity, gaining an Entrance Prize in German. He obtained a Senior Exhibition in 1877, First Mathematical Scholarship in 1878, and was Mathematical Student in 1879, obtaining First Senior Moderatorship and Large Gold Medal in Mathematics and Senior Moderatorship in Ethics and Logics. In 1881 he was President of the Philosophical Society. For some years he was a most successful grinder in college until, in 1898, he was elected Professor of Moral Philosophy. Three years later, in 1901, he was appointed Assistant Commissioner of Intermediate Education, from which post he retired a few years ago, since which time he has been living in London.



A Letter from Salonica.



YESTERDAY, Sunday, I and a chap called Cowley both got a pass for Salonique. About 1 o'clock we set off and got a lift on a lorry to the town. Well, believe me, it was like walking into the Arabian nights! The colours, shouting, yelling, buying and selling, people of every nationality under the sun, pushing and shoving about, cafés, booths, dancing halls, parties of Serbs wandering about the streets playing violins, and singing wonderful wild kind of music; little Turk boys in all sorts of dirty coloured clothes, jabbering and fighting each other to clean our boots; the stalls in the bazaars selling silks of every kind, and all sorts of things, and the continuous droning cry of oriental voices everywhere! Well, we made our way through the crowds to the White Tower, which is the fashionable quarter, and went into the Hotel Rome, a very big and grand place. We got a window-seat overlooking the sea, and had Italian beer and smoked—the French and Italian women never wear hats—and all sorts of people were dining. After a while we worked our way everywhere we could find. The whole thing is beyond description! But Hichens' book, and Kismet, and the Arabian Nights describe the scenes in an oriental town, and you have read them, so you know what I mean. We went into weird, half-lit cafés, where they were playing music of haunting, wild strains, and on a sort of platform a girl was dancing. At little tables groups of soldiers of nearly all countries were eating and drinking—the air was full of cooking and smoking—great bearded Russians, fine-looking but wild Serbs, little shift-eyed men that looked like Chinese, great negroes

(French colonies), and all sorts. We had all kinds of weird things to eat and drink; and while you sit at the table all kinds of beggars, in most wonderful clothes, come whining for alms, a yellow, dirty hand thrust out for money. All sorts of music-noises and drums beating; donkey and huge bullock-waggons, the oxens' head and necks decorated with tassels, beads, and coins; Greek priests and some wedding parties. What a make-up. It made your head go round and round. I had my photo (enclosed) taken in a street up against the wall, an admiring crowd of highly-coloured ruffians looking on. In the bazaars if you as much as *looked* at anything the sellers would run after you trailing huge silk shawls, oranges, wine, etc., and cling to you and shout and yell and dance about; you'd think you were never going to get away. Turkish women with little jackets of red and black, with gold and silver embroidery and yellow or white trousers, bare ankles and feet, just a kind of sandal, and a veil, and a sort of necklace of coins on their foreheads, and very dark eyes peeping at you; bright eyes and glimpses of visions through lattice windows in houses everywhere, and voices in every kind of broken English inviting you to come inside (!?) Hawkers selling sweetmeats, in trays on their heads, selling their ware; and an undergrowth of children running about under your feet everywhere.

But nothing I can say would give you an idea of it all. Well, about 7 o'clock we took the road for Dudular and the camp, and got back soon after 8, feeling very tired, but pleased. And such was my day in Salonique.

The High School War Savings Association.



PERHAPS the most striking event of this term has been the commencement of our new War Savings Association. Our Association is connected with the Leinster and Connaught Branch of the National War Savings Committee in College Green. On April 15 a meeting was held after prayers in the clock-room, when Miss Deane, the organiser for the Government, and Mr. S. W. Maddock, one of the Hon. Secs. for Leinster and Connaught, explained the object of the Association. This is to enable weekly contributions to be made to the Government for the carrying on of the war. The money contributed is spent in buying War Savings Certificates for 15s. 6d. each, which will in five years time be bought back by the Government for £1. That is, the Govern-

ment is to pay interest on the money lent at the rate of £5 16s. 1½d. per annum—the finest investment in the world. As the individual subscription of a member amounts to 15s. 6d. he is given a War Savings Certificate by the Association. Members may also buy certificates right out with a single payment.
