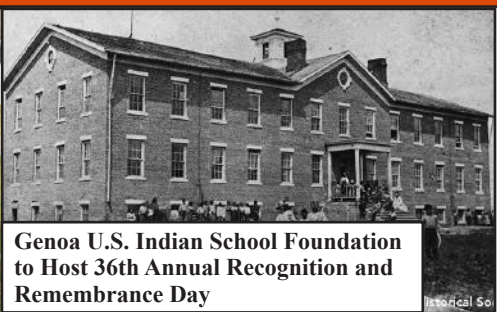

Protecting Our Water: Winnebago Tribe Hosts AI Data Center Teach-In

SLOAN, Iowa – For the Winnebago people, water is more than a resource. It is a living relative, a source of life and an essential part of who we are as Hōcāk people. That responsibility to protect the water brought Tribal leaders, representatives of neighboring Tribal Nations, Salix residents and members of the public together on Wednesday, September 9, for a Hyperscale AI Data Center Teach-In at the WinnaVegas Casino Resort Event

Center. Hosted by the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska in partnership with the Brave Heart Society, the gathering was organized in response to a potential 900-acre data center development involving Google and MidAmerican Energy near Salix, Iowa. MidAmerican Energy holds options on approximately 900 acres of agricultural land recently annexed into the City of Salix and has been evaluating the site for possible development as a large-scale data

center campus. Google has expressed interest in exploring a future data center at the location. While the project has not been finalized, its proposed size and proximity to the Winnebago Reservation have raised serious concerns about its possible effects on water, energy, agricultural land, infrastructure and surrounding communities. The Teach-In followed the Winnebago Tribal Council’s formal

Primary Candidates Advance to the General Election

[Winnebago, NE] The Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska Primary Election for Winnebago Tribal Council was held on Tuesday, September 1, 2026. Eligible voters made their way to the Blackhawk Community Center gym to cast their ballots from 8:00 AM to 8:00 PM. The results included a total of six candidates that received votes,

including two write-in candidates. The upcoming General Election list of candidates includes Eugene DeCora, Sr.; Craig Cleveland, Sr.; Damon Payer; Keely Purscell; Darla LaPointe (write-in); and Brian Chamberlain (write-in). The General Election will be held on Tuesday, October 6, 2026, at the Blackhawk Community Center gym with polls open from 8:00 AM to 8:00 PM. Three seats are open on the nine-

member Winnebago Tribal Council, with each position carrying a three-year term. Important dates leading up to the election include a deadline to submit requests for absentee ballots on Friday, September 25, 2026, and mailed out to registered voters by Monday, September 28, 2026. opposition to hyperscale data centers. On July 20, 2026, the Council adopted Resolution No. 26-170, strongly opposing their development on or near the Winnebago Indian Reservation, within ceded lands or treaty-protected areas, and anywhere such development could adversely affect the Reservation or its citizens and residents.

The Tribe's position is rooted not only in environmental concerns, but also in a cultural and spiritual responsibility to protect the lands and waters that sustain all life. The resolution identifies concerns surrounding the immense amounts of water and electricity hyperscale facilities may require, as well as their potential effects on regional energy reliability, consumer costs, air quality and public health.

During the Teach-In, Winnebago Tribal Councilwoman Keely Purscell spoke from the heart about the declining health of the Missouri River and asked those in attendance to think of the river as they would a beloved family member. “The Missouri River is operating at 14% of health,” Purscell said. “I used the example of our mother. If our mother’s kidneys, if our mother’s heart was only operating at 14%, what would you do? What would you do to help her? You would get the best experts. You would do everything you could to fight for our mother.”

Her words captured the heart of the gathering. The Missouri River is not simply a body of water near the Winnebago Reservation. It is woven into the Tribe's history, identity, culture and way of life. The Winnebago Tribe itself is known in the Hōcāk language as Hōcāk Njšoc Hacı, meaning "Ho-Chunk who dwell by the river." Protecting the Missouri River means protecting the health of the community, the survival of cultural practices and the ability of future generations to continue their relationship with the land and water

Three sessions were held throughout the day. A morning presentation brought together the Winnebago Tribal Council and representatives of invited Tribal Nations. An afternoon session was offered to Salix residents, followed by an evening presentation open to the general public. By extending invitations to surrounding Tribal Nations, the Winnebago Tribe recognized that environmental impacts do not stop at reservation, county or state boundaries. Water connects communities, and a development of this scale could affect lands, people, and natural resources throughout the region.

The invitation also emphasized the importance of standing together as Tribal Nations. Indigenous communities have cared for these lands and waters since long before present-day borders were drawn. Their treaty rights, cultural knowledge and responsibilities to future generations must be included in decisions that could permanently change the region.

Attendees received blue “Water Protector” T-shirts featuring a design by

Virginia Snake-Bumann. More than a keepsake, the shirts served as a visible reminder of the responsibility shared by everyone in attendance. To be a water protector is to understand that clean water is not guaranteed and that protecting it requires people to remain informed, speak up and act with future generations in mind.

The event's co-host, the Brave Heart Society, brought its own longstanding commitment to cultural restoration and water protection to the gathering. Based on the Yankton Reservation in South Dakota, the organization describes itself as the revival of a traditional cultural society for women working to "call home the spirit of the culture."

The Brave Heart Society was formed by a community of grandmothers in 1994 and operates under the guidance of the Kumsi Circle, a group of community grandmothers. Its mission is to enhance and preserve Dakota, Nakota and Lakota culture for future generations while creating strong families grounded in cultural values, morals and worldview. Its work includes language revitalization, coming-of-age programming, community gardening, land-based education, cultural restoration and water protection. The organization's involvement helped ground the Teach-In in an Indigenous understanding that environmental advocacy is inseparable from culture, community and love for future generations.

Hyperscale data centers provide the computing power needed for artificial intelligence, cloud computing and other data-intensive technologies. Depending on their size, design and cooling systems, the facilities may require substantial amounts of electricity and water. As AI infrastructure expands across the country, communities are being asked to consider whether promises of economic development outweigh potential long-term effects on water, land, public health, utility costs and quality of life. For Tribal Nations, these questions also involve sovereignty, treaty rights and the responsibility to protect places that hold cultural and spiritual meaning.

The Teach-In was not only about understanding a proposed development. It was about ensuring that Tribal Nations and local residents are not left out of decisions that could affect their homes, their water and their children's future. It created a space for people to learn, ask questions and stand together while there is still time to be heard. It also sent a clear message: progress cannot come at the cost of the water and communities that make life possible.

The Winnebago Tribe's response to the potential Google and MidAmerican Energy development reflects a responsibility carried across generations: to care for the land, defend the water and leave a healthy home for those still to come. ‘Let me’ versus ‘Let us’

Our nature - our sinful nature is one of
a ‘let me’ do attitude. ‘Let me’ do this or
‘let me’ do that, rather than ‘let us.’ Even
when we come together we tend to be not
fully engaged as we are in our own
little world on social media. Our phone
moves us more and more to self-centered
and independent actions. Independent
lifestyles not only cuts out others - in-
cluding family members - spouse, child,
parent, etc., it also cuts out Creator God.

Creator God would rather have us
come near to Him together. Let us reflect
on these Sacred Words found in the book
of Hebrews: ‘Therefore, brothers, having
freedom of speech for entrance into the
holy places by the blood of Jesus, which
he inaugurated for us as a new and living
way through the curtain, that is, [the
way] of his flesh, and [having] a great
Priest over the house of God, let us come
near with a true heart in the fullness of
faith, having had our hearts sprinkled
from a bad conscious and having had our
body washed with pure water’ [Hebrews
10:19-22 Kleinig translation].

The faith of the true believer is truly
all about us - inclusive. It begins with
our triune God - Father, Son and Holy
Spirit! And then it includes, by the grace
of God, countless others. All of us are
not worthy on our own to be invited to
be a member of God’s family. It is by
the grace of God and the pure water of
Holy Baptism that we are welcomed into
God’s family.

It is the blood of Jesus, our great Priest

that we are allowed to come near - to-
gether. The pure water of Holy Baptism,
along with all of its blessings, namely
the forgiveness of one’s sins, is received
through a true heart in the fullness of
faith.

An attitude of ‘Let me’ refuses to come
near to Mauna in the way that Mauna
wants us to come near to Him. It is in
one’s own faith or ‘MY WAY’ type of
attitude that leads one away from Creator
God.

An example of a ‘My Way’ type of
faith would be the self-centered and
self-righteous attitude of the Pharisee
who entered the temple to pray. We
pick up in the eleventh verse of chap-
ter eighteen of the Gospel of St. Luke:
‘The Pharisee stood up and prayed about
himself: ‘God, I thank you that I am
not like other men—robbers, evildoers,
adulterers—or even like this tax collector.
I fast twice a week and give a tenth of all
I get’ [Luke 18:9–14 (NIV84)].

On the other hand, an attitude of ‘Let
us’ is blessed with having a true heart in
the fullness of faith that moves one again
and again to ‘let us’ come near to God,
Father, Son and Holy Spirit. We who
believe in Jesus have access to enter into
the holy places - God’s loving presence.
And we, believers in Christ Jesus, are
moved by his Spirit to gather together on
a weekly basis to receive God’s gifts, be
reassured of His blessings as well as to
encourage one another in our daily walk
with Jesus as our Good Shepherd leading
us to walk in his ways.

WCHS Welcomes New Advanced CT Scanner

Winnebago, NE –The Winnebago Comprehensive Healthcare System has installed and begun using a new state-of-the-art CT machine. Providers and patients alike are excited to welcome this advancement in patient care that offers significant improvements to the diagnostic imaging capabilities of this Native-serving hospital and clinics. A computed tomography (CT or CAT scan) is a medical imaging test that uses X-rays and a computer to make detailed cross-sectional pictures of the inside of your body. United Imaging uCT ATLAS 4cm is a 160-slice CT system that features a 0.25-second rotation speed, an 82-centimeter ultra-wide bore, and a 700-pound table capacity, enabling fast, detailed imaging of patients of all shapes and sizes. This advanced, AI-powered technology allows us to create images with the least amount of radiation exposure available on the market. This new machine will expand access to high-end diagnostic imaging previously unavailable within a 75-mile radius of Winnebago, Nebraska. “This is a significant advancement for WCHS and our community,” said Austin Schanzenbach, Chief Transformation Officer. “This technology gives our patients access to advanced diagnostic imaging closer to home while also helping us identify cardiovascular risk earlier, expand cancer screening and diagnostic capabilities, and find

disease before it becomes more difficult to treat.” The uCT ATLAS 4cm offers advanced, potentially life-saving imaging capabilities, including cardiac, whole-organ, and stroke imaging, 3D imaging, and an accelerated CT workflow. Cardiovascular disease is the leading cause of death in Native Americans, with rates about 50% higher than those of white Americans. “The silent killer” is a common medical nickname for high blood pressure (hypertension) because it causes dangerous internal damage without showing any early warning signs. Hypertension (high blood pressure) is a major contributing risk factor for the development of coronary artery disease. Coronary artery disease (CAD), more commonly referred to as heart disease, leads to reduced blood flow and oxygen to the heart muscle, which can result in chest pain, heart attacks, and long-term heart damage. One example of how this technology can benefit patients is that WCHS can now offer coronary artery calcium scoring. Calcium scoring is a quick, noninvasive scan that detects calcium buildup in the heart’s arteries, which is often one of the earliest indicators of coronary artery disease. With the Fall equinox approaching, what is your favorite fall tradition or activity?



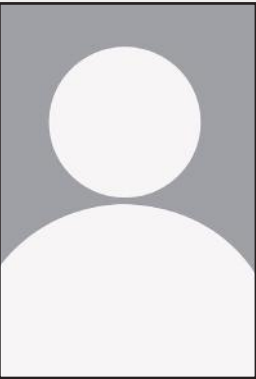

THE BENEFIT OF CULTIVATING HEMP

Benefits of Hemp

- Hemp oil is rich in vitamin E and acts as an antioxidant
- Hemp oil may reduce your risk of heart problems
- Whole hemp seeds are an excellent source of fiber
- Hemp seeds are a healthy source of plant-based protein
- Hemp seed oil can be used as a cooking oil in the same ways as olive oil

Why grow hemp?

Hemp grows more vigorously than corn, but requires less water, pesticides, herbicides, and fertilizer, earning it a reputation as a sustainable crop. The plant has over 25,000 known uses and is potentially an eco-friendly alternative for other crops commonly produced on an industrial scale.

What are the ideal growing conditions?

Hemp seeds are sown directly into where the plants are to grow. They should be planted after the average date of last frost has passed. The seedlings require irrigation for the first six weeks whenever the soil is dry.

At the Water's Edge: Hōcāk Artist Truman Lowe Honored at the Smithsonian

Washington, D.C.-- While on vacation, I visited the Smithsonian's National Museum of the American Indian in Washington, D.C., where I experienced Water's Edge: The Art of Truman Lowe, the first major retrospective dedicated to acclaimed Hōcāk artist Truman Lowe.

I originally stopped by to capture B-roll for future seasons of The Big Voice's WOIPERES series, in which I plan to explore Hōcāk art and artists. Still, I was not prepared for how deeply the exhibition would affect me.

Born in 1944 and raised near Black River Falls, Wisconsin, Lowe grew up speaking Hōcāk and learning from a creative family. His mother made split-ash baskets, his father carved basket handles and both practiced beadwork. As a child, Lowe gathered rocks along the Black River and used them to create drawings.

Long before his work entered the nation's most prominent museums, he was a Hōcāk child creating with materials gathered from his homeland.

Lowe earned degrees from the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse and UW-Madison. He later became an art professor and chair of UW-Madison's art department, educating and mentoring generations of students.

In 2000, Lowe was appointed curator of contemporary art at the National Museum of the American Indian. He served until 2008 and helped curate an inaugural exhibition for the museum's Washington location. There is something especially meaningful about seeing him honored in the same institution he once helped shape.

Lowe's work has been collected by institutions including the Smithsonian American Art Museum, Metropolitan Museum of Art, Whitney Museum of American Art, Milwaukee Art Museum and Eiteljorg Museum. His many honors included a National Endowment for the Arts Individual Fellowship, an Eiteljorg Fellowship and the Wisconsin Visual Art Lifetime Achievement Award.

Water's Edge features almost 50 sculptures, drawings and paintings spanning Lowe's career. His minimalist sculptures, made from willow branches, feathers, wood and other natural materials, evoke rivers, streams, waterfalls and canoes. My mother's maternal side is Wākjexi Hikikarac, or Waterspirit Clan, and I have always felt deeply connected to water. Walking through the exhibition felt like entering the woodlands and waterways of our Hōcāk homelands. The willow flowed like water, and the canoes seemed to carry memory. Before I knew it, nearly two hours had passed.

Lowe's art reminds us that water is more than scenery. It carries people, histories, teachings and relationships, connecting us to place and to those who traveled the same waterways before us.

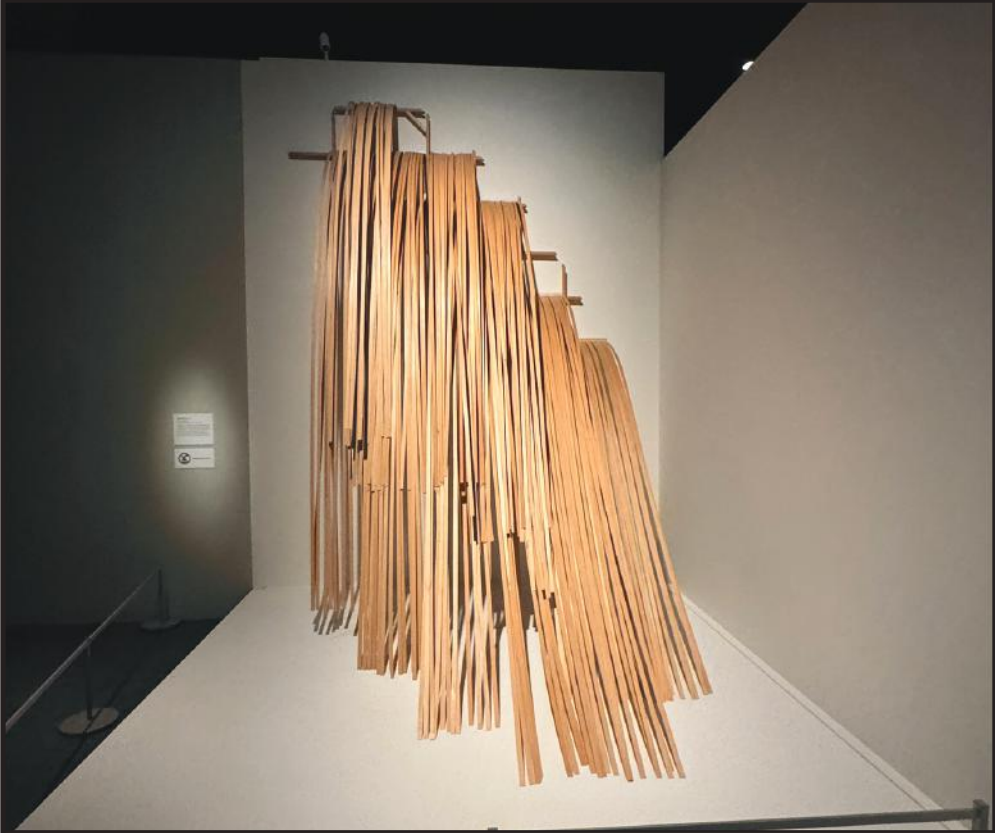
Seeing Hōcāk art honored at the Smithsonian filled me with pride. Our people have always been artists, designers and storytellers. Too often, Native art is treated only as something belonging to the past. This exhibition recognizes Lowe as a major contemporary artist whose Hōcāk identity was not separate from his success, it was at the heart of his work.

There is something powerful about seeing your people reflected in a national institution with dignity, care and importance. It tells our young people that Hōcāk creativity belongs in these spaces and reminds the world that we are still here, still creating and telling our own stories.

For me, Water's Edge became more than an assignment. It was an opportunity to feel seen and to witness a Hōcāk artist's life and legacy honored on a national stage.

I left proud of everything Truman Lowe accomplished, proud of the people and homelands that shaped him, and proud to be Hōcāk.

Water's Edge: The Art of Truman Lowe will remain in Washington, D.C., through January 18, 2027, before traveling to the Milwaukee Art Museum from April 9 through August 1, 2027.



Genoa U.S. Indian School Foundation to Host 36th Annual Recognition and Remembrance Day

GENOA, NEBRASKA — The Genoa U.S. Indian School Foundation will host its 36th Annual Recognition and Remembrance Day on Saturday, 26 September 2026, bringing together former students, descendants, tribal communities, historians, educators, residents, and visitors for a day dedicated to remembering and honoring the children who attended the Genoa U.S. Indian School.

The event will take place from 10 AM to 4 PM at the St. Rose of Lima Community Center and the Genoa U.S. Indian School site. The annual gathering offers an opportunity to learn about the school’s history, recognize students’ experiences, and celebrate the connections that continue to bring families and communities together.

The Genoa U.S. Indian School operated from 1884 until 1934 and was one of the federal government’s largest and longest running off-reservation Indian boarding schools. Today, the former school site serves as an important place for education, historical research, and remembrance.

The day’s activities begin at 10 AM with a Welcome and Opening Ceremony and building blessing from William St. Cyr of the Omaha and Winnebago Tribes of Nebraska, followed at 10:45 AM by a presentation from Jill Hanson titled “Frank Hamilton: From Hampton Normal to Genoa, A Boarding School Life Cut Short.” The presentation will offer an opportunity to learn more about Frank Hamilton, a former student who passed away at the school.

At 1 PM, the Memorial Presentation will provide a special time for reflection and remembrance. We will honor those who passed away since the last Recognition and Remembrance Day and pay special memorial to those students who died at the school and those buried in the cemetery.

Following the memorial, at 1:15 PM, the Foundation will hold its Scholarship Presentation and Former Winners’ Panel, featuring former scholarship recipients Aaron LaPointe, Alexis Zendejas and Kateri Hinman Petto.

Aaron LaPointe has become a respected leader in the Winnebago community. He serves in senior leadership with Ho-Chunk, Inc., where his work has included tribal agriculture and economic development. LaPointe has been involved in efforts to reclaim tribal farmland, strengthen food sovereignty, promote traditional Indian corn and encourage Native youth to consider careers in agriculture. He has also served on the Nebraska Farm Service Agency State Committee and has been recognized nationally for his leadership and community contributions.

Dr. Kateri Hinman Petto has also built a career centered around community, culture and service. Of the Omaha, Winnebago and Seneca Tribes, Petto is a Clinical Pharmacist as well as board president of Healing Ribbons. This Indigenous organization promotes cultural identity, healing and wellness through gathering, traditional arts, storytelling and community connection. Her work reflects the importance of preserving cultural knowledge and creating opportunities for Indigenous people to connect with their heritage.

Alexis Zendejas’ career reflects the importance of service and advocacy. A member of the Omaha Tribe of Nebraska, Zendejas earned her law degree from the University of Arizona James E. Rogers College of Law in 2019. Her legal career has included work in Tribal and Federal Indian Law, family and juvenile

law, the Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA), and Tribal-State-Federal relations. Her commitment to tribal families and children has been evident throughout her legal career. Zendejas has represented the Omaha Tribe in Indian Child Welfare Act proceedings, including a case that reached the Iowa Supreme Court, where she argued for the Tribe.

The panel is intended to be more than a discussion about academic accomplishments. It allows current students, families, and visitors to hear directly from people who once stood where today’s scholarship applicants stand and to learn how their connection to the Genoa Indian School’s history has continued into adulthood.

Food and fellowship will once again be an important part of Recognition and Remembrance Day. From 11:30 AM to 1 PM, Indian tacos made by Rez Eats and served by Twin River FBLA will be available. Indian tacos are free for honored guests and \$10 for all others. The meal provides another opportunity for former students, descendants, visitors, and community members to gather, share stories, and enjoy time together during the day’s activities. The event will conclude with an Ice Cream Social at 3 PM.

Throughout the day, visitors can participate in guided tours of the Interpretive Center and Research Center, visit Native vendor booths, and view entries in the Student Art Contest. The Student Art Contest features artwork created by current students and inspired by the Genoa Indian School and its former students. The contest gives young people an opportunity to explore local history and express what they have learned through art.

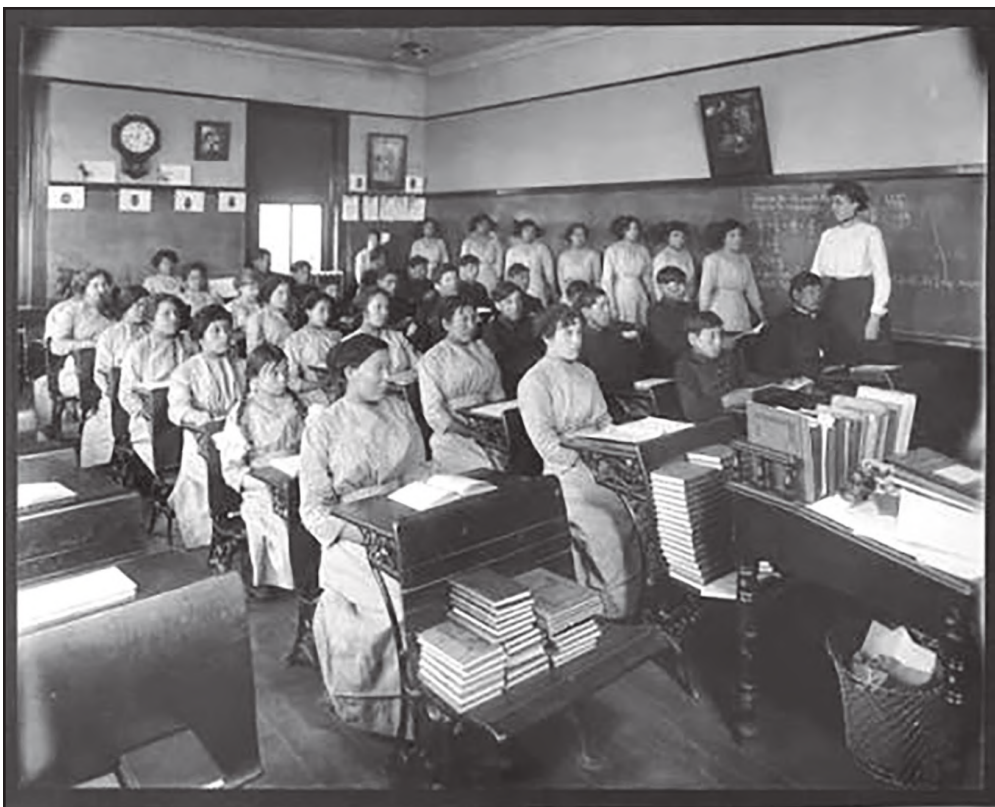
The Research Center also provides an important resource for descendants and families interested in learning more about relatives who attended the school. Preserving records, photographs, and stories helps ensure that the lives of the students who attended Genoa are remembered for generations to come.

Recognition and Remembrance Day is more than an annual historical program. It is a day to remember the children who attended the Genoa U.S. Indian School and to recognize the families and communities whose histories remain connected to the school. The event also gives people unfamiliar with the history of the Genoa Indian School an opportunity to learn about the institution and its former students. By bringing descendants, former students, educators, historians, tribal communities, and the public together, the Genoa U.S. Indian School Foundation continues to create a place where people can remember, discuss, and pass on history to future generations.

The Genoa U.S. Indian School Foundation invites everyone to attend the 36th Annual Recognition and Remembrance Day on 26 September. Whether you attend to honor a family member, learn more about the Genoa Indian School, support the Foundation, participate in educational activities, or spend the day with the community, visitors are welcome.

The stories of the children who attended the Genoa U.S. Indian School are an important part of Nebraska history and the history of many Native families and nations. Recognition and Remembrance Day helps keep those stories alive while honoring the people whose lives are forever connected to Genoa.

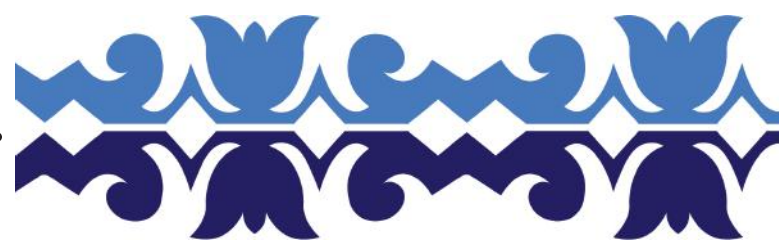
