This past spring, I had the pleasure of traveling with my son, Finn, and a group from Greensboro on the International March of the Living. Greensboro is fortunate that Rabbi Guttman and Rabbi Koren have led delegations to Poland and Israel for decades. Hundreds of Greensboro teenagers and adults have participated in this transformative journey. While we were unable to travel to Israel this year, our week in Poland was incredibly impactful.

This was my first time visiting Poland, and I had no idea how deeply moved I would be by what I saw. What we experienced was a mix of the unconscionable and a glimmer of hope. At Auschwitz and Majdanek, we witnessed the dehumanization of an entire people. In Krakow, we saw the revitalization of the Jewish Community Center under the leadership of UNC Tar Heel Jonathan Ornstein. In Warsaw, we soaked in the joy of watching our Greensboro teens dance and celebrate their Jewish identity with teens from around the world. Each of these experiences renewed my commitment to confront rising antisemitism. We owe it to the next generation and the generations that follow to do all we can.

We are fortunate to have so many opportunities to engage with our Jewish community. Each one is a chance to learn—whether about the customs connected to a Jewish holiday or the pressing issues of our time. Shared learning strengthens relationships and creates deeper connections. As I begin my term as president of the Greensboro Jewish Federation, I look forward to learning, growing, and being renewed through the many opportunities the Greensboro Jewish community offers.

## Communal Learning for Mind and Body AT JEWISH FAMILY SERVICES

When thinking of educational learning, intellectual study tends to come to mind, yet social and emotional learning is a vital part of personal growth, self-awareness, and understanding.

Jewish Family Services of Greensboro (JFS) provides multiple opportunities for this type of study through the Mental Health and Wellness Series. The series began in May 2025 during Mental Health Month and continues to feature new speakers regularly. Through these programs, JFS creates welcoming spaces where community members can explore important topics, gain knowledge, and engage in meaningful conversations.

JFS has offered programming on a variety of topics, including menopause, mindfulness, supporting and affirming gender-expansive family members, body positivity, brain health, dementia and memory care, benefits of friendship during

old age, caregiver stress, and support groups for addiction and caregiver support. These programs allow space for community members to learn about health and wellness topics, have discussions with others in the community, and ask questions directly from experts. By providing access to education and open dialogue, JFS helps foster greater awareness and connection.

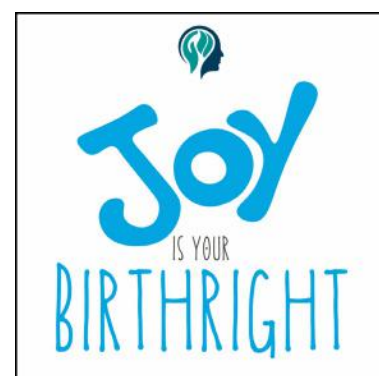
JFS is intentional about hosting programs for topics that often get overlooked and can be difficult to discuss, such as the menopause workshop held last fall. Dr. Suzanne Miller explained the physical and hormonal changes that occur during menopause; Jennifer Becker, LCMHCS, explored the

emotional impact of menopause, what's "normal," and when to seek help; and Dr. Cole Kampen discussed pelvic health changes every woman should know. These conversations provided valuable information while helping community members feel more informed and supported. The JFS Mental Health and Wellness Series is ongoing and continues to introduce new topics designed to meet the needs and interests of the community.

JFS also provides community members with education and access to various resources in the area. JFS team members regularly provide health and mental health education through individual conversations, phone calls, emails, and visits to homes and facilities. These interactions allow JFS to listen, understand unique circumstances, and help connect individuals and families with appropriate resources.

By focusing on important topics and questions that may be difficult to ask, Jewish Family Services is proud to enhance communal learning, encourage connection, and provide support throughout the community.

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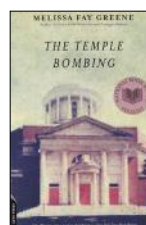

### *The Bombing of the Temple* by Melissa Fay Greene

On Oct. 12, 1958, 50 sticks of dynamite exploded outside Atlanta's oldest Reform synagogue in an attack that became a pivotal moment in the civil rights era. *The Bombing of the Temple* examines the bombing and its impact on a city and region confronting racial injustice and social change. At its center is Rabbi Jacob Rothschild, who publicly supported racial equality despite threats and opposition. **Melissa Fay Greene weaves together the experiences of Atlanta's Jewish, Black, and white communities.** Her account examines how prejudice, fear, and leadership shaped a defining moment in American history and the nation's ongoing struggle for equality and justice in the years that followed.

# THE *Art* OF SEEING ONE ANOTHER

For many people, learning begins with finding the right answer. For Israeli artist Adva Weinstein, it begins with asking better questions.

Adva Weinstein is a multidisciplinary performance maker and cultural entrepreneur. Her performance works, which have toured in Israel and overseas, are largely interactive and place the interpersonal encounter at the center of the artistic experience.

That philosophy lies at the heart of an exciting new partnership bringing Weinstein to North Carolina A&T State University for a yearlong residency through BAMAH, an organization that builds meaningful relationships between Black and Jewish communities through the arts. While the residency will introduce students to an accomplished Israeli artist whose work explores participation, dialogue, and social change, those involved see it as something much deeper than a visiting artist program. It is an invitation—for students, educators, artists, and the Greensboro Jewish community alike—to learn with one another.

As the High Holidays approach, that invitation feels especially meaningful. Jewish learning has long taught that growth rarely comes from certainty. Instead, it comes from asking questions, listening deeply, wrestling with new ideas, and allowing oneself to be changed by the people one encounters.

For BAMAH founder and CEO Flo Low, those ideas are central to the organization's mission.

"BAMAH is a cultural dialogue exchange organization that uses the arts to build meaningful connections across communities, particularly between Black and Jewish communities in the United States," Low explains. "Politics divide; culture connects."

Rather than presenting art as something to observe from a distance, BAMAH creates opportunities for artists to become part of a community over time. Residencies allow trust to develop naturally, creating space for authentic relationships, thoughtful conversations, and meaningful collaboration.

"When an artist is embedded in a university over a semester, something different happens," Low says. "Students see her in the hallway, they argue with

her in class, they bring her ideas that have been sitting with them since last week. That accumulation is where transformation lives."

## A Partnership Rooted in Connection and Learning

The partnership first began after Dr. Buffie Longmire-Avital, professor of psychology and associate dean for academics in the Honors College at North Carolina A&T, met Low at Collaboratory, a gathering of Jewish educators and innovators exploring connections between Israel and Jewish communities in North America. Longmire-Avital immediately saw the potential for a partnership that aligned with the Honors College's commitment to global learning and engaged education.

That vision quickly found a champion in Honors College Dean Dr. Margaret Kanipes, whose leadership has prioritized innovative curricular design and meaningful global exchange opportunities. Longmire-Avital credits Kanipes' support with helping transform an exciting idea into a yearlong residency that will bring students, artists, and the broader community into conversation with one another.

During her residency, Weinstein will teach the Honors College's first interdisciplinary seminar focused on generating sustainable social change through community-based artistic expression while creating experiential learning opportunities that connect students with Greensboro, its history, and its people.

"Our students are passionate about community engagement and the use of artistic expression," Longmire-Avital says. "This will be right in line with that."

But she hopes students gain far more than artistic skills.

"The ability to center authentic voice, listen compassionately, and develop skills for how to hold and

critique constructively are takeaways I hope our students gain," she says. "Art has always been a critique of the status quo and a call for change. It tells stories and truths that resonate with people on both individual and communal levels."

Weinstein's work is uniquely suited to that kind of learning because it invites participation instead of passive observation.

### The Wisdom of Asking Better Questions

"My work sits between artistic practice, community and social engagement, and education," she says. "Making art together is also a way of being in the world."

Many of her performances are built around conversation. Some consist almost entirely of questions posed to participants.

"I was always taught that questions are a form of wisdom," Weinstein says. "In an age where everyone seems to have their minds made up, being a curious questioner—and insisting on having an innocent mind open to hearing surprising answers—is a beautiful and rare thing."

It is no coincidence that this perspective feels deeply Jewish. Jewish tradition has always celebrated questioning as an act of learning. From the Passover seder to the study hall, Jewish wisdom is built not on easy answers but on conversation, curiosity, and the belief that returning to familiar ideas can reveal something entirely new.

That same spirit shapes Weinstein's approach to Greensboro. Rather than arriving with a predetermined project, she intends to begin by listening.

"A lot of my work starts with learning about the new place or community within which I am working," she explains. "It's hard—and perhaps not appropriate—to decide in advance too much about what will emerge."

She hopes to spend her first months meeting people, learning the rhythms of the city, and allowing collaborations to grow organically from those relationships.

### The Power of Reciprocal Learning

Perhaps the residency's most remarkable quality is its commitment to reciprocity. Longmire-Avital is quick to point out that this is not simply an opportunity for A&T

students to learn about Israel or the Jewish community.

"Much of the conversation around fostering relationships between Jewish and non-Jewish communities has often centered on what the non-Jewish community can learn from their Jewish community members," she says. "I hope that this residency reminds the Jewish community that learning needs to happen in both directions."

It is a powerful reminder that genuine partnership asks something of everyone involved. Participants arrive as both teachers and students.

For Low, that reciprocal spirit mirrors the Jewish tradition itself.

"Jewish learning is relational and iterative," she says. "You study a text with a partner. You return to the same passage year after year and find something new. You are expected to question and wrestle, not just receive."

As the residency unfolds throughout the coming academic year, its success will not be measured solely by exhibitions, performances, or classroom discussions. Instead, it will be measured by the relationships that continue long after the formal residency ends.

Low hopes this becomes "the beginning of an ongoing relationship rather than a one-time program."

Weinstein shares a similar hope. She doesn't expect every participant to leave thinking differently. She hopes they leave asking new questions.

"If it opened up new questions, that would be amazing," she says. "Or if it gave them a moment to connect in some way new—or renewed—to themselves, to others, to the world."

In many ways, that is what Jewish learning has always invited people to do. It asks people to remain curious, to listen before speaking, to approach one another with humility, and to believe that every meaningful encounter holds the possibility of renewal.

This residency offers Greensboro an opportunity to do exactly that.

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# PASSING THE TORCH THROUGH PHILANTHROPY at the Jewish Foundation of Greensboro

“How do we pass the torch without the flame going out?”

How can families ensure that generosity continues from one generation to the next? This question brought community members together for a conversation as the Jewish Foundation of Greensboro hosted *Family Philanthropy: Passing the Torch*. The interactive program explored how Jewish values can inspire meaningful giving across generations. The event featured nationally recognized philanthropy expert Robyn Schein of 21/64, an organization dedicated to helping families navigate multigenerational philanthropy.

Designed as both a workshop and conversation, the program welcomed donors, community leaders, board members, and affiliates to examine how charitable traditions evolve

while remaining rooted in shared values. Rather than focusing solely on financial strategies, participants explored the relationships and conversations that sustain a family's philanthropic legacy over time. The session addressed emerging trends in multigenerational giving, differences in giving styles between generations, and practical approaches for engaging younger family members in charitable decision-making.

Opening the luncheon, Jewish Foundation of Greensboro Board Chair Ron Milstein emphasized that philanthropy is about much more than managing assets. “How do we pass the torch without the flame going out?” he asked, framing the central challenge facing many philanthropic families today. He noted that while giving methods may change, the desire to improve the world remains strong across generations.

Drawing on years of experience working with multigenerational families, Schein guided participants through research, small-group discussions, and hands-on exercises that encouraged families to identify the values that shape their charitable decisions. Her presentation highlighted the importance of open communication and intentional planning, helping participants think beyond financial gifts to the lasting impact of shared purpose.

The event concluded with an invitation for families to continue the conversation beyond the workshop. Executive Director Susan Gutterman reminded attendees that the Foundation partners with donors at every stage of their philanthropic journey, whether through donor-advised funds, endowments, or legacy planning. She encouraged families inspired by the day's discussion to develop personalized charitable plans that reflect their values while strengthening the Greensboro Jewish community for generations to come.

## MITZVAH DAY 2026 Turns Compassion into Action



Mitzvah Day 2026 was a resounding success, bringing together volunteers from across the Greensboro Jewish community for a morning dedicated to service. Volunteers of all ages participated in a variety of hands-on projects benefiting local nonprofit organizations.

The day kicked off at Beth David Synagogue with registration, breakfast, and a group photo before volunteers headed out to their chosen mitzvah. One group worked with A Simple Gesture and the David D. Frazier Food Pantry, helping stock pantry shelves and organize food supplies that will support local families facing food insecurity.

At Out of the Garden, volunteers sorted fresh produce for distribution to children and families in need. Meanwhile, another team traveled to the Kellin Foundation Hope Hub, where they organized materials and prepared folders and swag bags to support the organization's ongoing programs and outreach efforts.

Volunteers at Peacehaven Community Farm spent the morning assisting with farm tasks while enjoying time with residents and supporting the farm's mission of inclusion and community engagement. Elsewhere, participants partnered with arcBARKS Dog Treat Company, making homemade dog treats that support the organization's mission of creating opportunities for people with disabilities. Additional volunteers rolled up their sleeves to donate blood through an American Red Cross blood drive, helping provide a lifesaving resource for patients in need.

Mitzvah Day was a powerful reminder of what can be accomplished when people come together in service. The Greensboro Jewish community once again demonstrated that when people work together to perform acts of social responsibility and kindness, we fulfill our shared goal for *tikkun olam*, repairing the world.





## ON THE HILL: Advocating for Jewish Social Services

Alicia Kaplan, director of Jewish Family Services, traveled to Capitol Hill with the Network of Jewish Human Service Agencies to advocate for policies that reflect the real-world impact of social service programs.

The visit focused on how changes in federal funding and policy decisions affect food assistance, housing support, and mental health services for individuals and families served by Jewish Family Services. Advocates met with lawmakers and staff to emphasize the importance of maintaining strong safety-net programs and ensuring continued collaboration between government agencies and community-based providers. The visit demonstrated how national advocacy leads to local impact. By joining fellow advocates from across the country, Kaplan helped amplify the voices of communities that rely on critical social services.

Participants underscored that decisions made in Washington have direct consequences for local communities, reinforcing the need for sustained dialogue between policymakers and human service organizations.

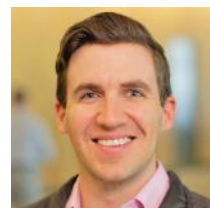

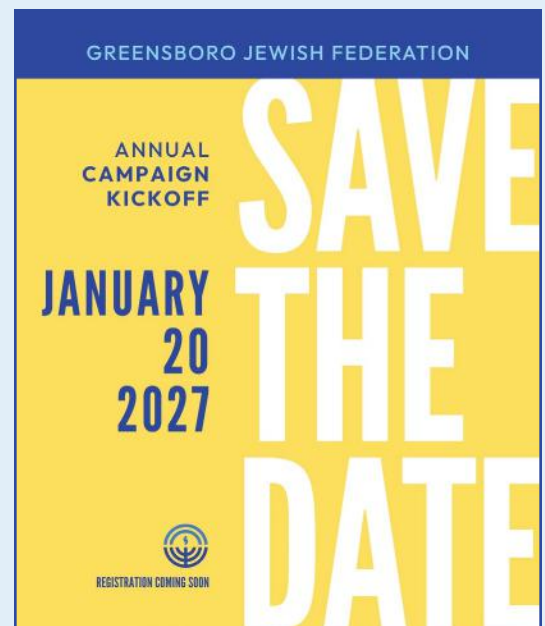

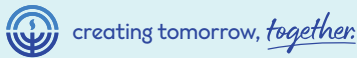


# PREPARED AND PROTECTED: Enhancing Safety Through Training



The Greensboro Jewish Federation's **Incident Reporting Form** at [shalomgreensboro.org](http://shalomgreensboro.org) provides a secure and confidential way for community members to report antisemitic incidents, suspicious activity, or safety concerns.

By sharing information, you help us respond effectively, advocate for our community, and strengthen the safety and security of Jewish Greensboro.

This season of renewal is also a time to reaffirm the Federation's commitment to enhancing the safety and security of the Jewish community. Throughout the summer, Central North Carolina Regional Security Advisor Bruce Gourlie led a series of Secure Community Network (SCN) training programs, equipping attendees with the knowledge and skills needed to protect themselves and others during an emergency.

In preparation for the High Holidays, Gourlie worked with local congregations to strengthen their security preparations for one of the busiest times of the year. Participants completed SCN's three core training programs—*BeAware*, *Countering Active Threat Training*, and *Stop the Bleed*—as well as *Guardian: Identify. Protect. Respond*. Designed primarily for ushers, greeters, and safety teams, Guardian training focused on practical skills such as identifying suspicious people, vehicles, and packages. While intended for those serving in security-related roles, the training provided valuable knowledge for everyone who attended.

Earlier this summer, Gourlie also delivered Camp Safety and Security training designed specifically for camp leaders, staff, and counselors. Participants learned practical skills ranging from reacting to severe weather to applying a tourniquet.

SCN continually updates its training programs to reflect emerging threats and best practices, ensuring participants receive the most current and effective information. "Training remains important even for those who have attended these classes in previous years," said Gourlie. "These sessions are never exactly the same. Each class includes updated information, new scenarios, and practical strategies that help keep our community safe."

## Lifelong Learning and Lasting Friendships at CHABAD



For more than 16 consecutive years, Chabad of Greensboro has invested in one of the community's most enduring forms of renewal: Jewish learning. Through the

Jewish Learning Institute (JLI), the community has offered three in-depth courses every year without interruption, creating one of the longest-running adult Jewish education programs in the region.

Over the years, hundreds of students have participated in courses spanning Jewish history, ethics, philosophy, relationships, spirituality, and contemporary issues through a Jewish lens. The classes attract participants from across the Jewish spectrum, many returning year after year to continue their journey of learning and growth.

Alongside the JLI curriculum, Chabad offers specialty classes designed to foster discussion and connection in a more intimate setting. Among them is the popular Yiddish class, which meets every three weeks and explores Jewish ideas relevant to everyday life and personal identity.

The impact of these lessons extends well beyond the classroom. New friendships have formed, bridges have been built across generations and backgrounds, and participants have found a sense of belonging within the community.

One such friendship emerged between community member Sue Stevens and longtime Greensboro resident Mankie Fedler, who met through one of the classes. Their shared learning soon developed into a cherished tradition.

"After every class, we go out for tea and catch up on life. What started as a class became a friendship," Stevens said.

At Chabad of Greensboro, Jewish learning is more than an educational experience. It is an opportunity for personal renewal, meaningful connection, and the strengthening of community ties. Through study, conversation, and shared experiences, learning continues to enrich lives and help shape a vibrant Jewish future for Greensboro.

## FROM MEMORY TO MEANING: Greensboro's Jewish Stories



Memory is delicate. It exists in people and families and can disappear with time. Meaning, however, takes shape when

those memories are preserved, carefully heard, and connected across generations.

That belief is at the heart of *Greensboro Jewish Memories: An Archive and Oral History Project*, a collaborative work between UNCG's Department of History, University Libraries, the Jewish Studies Program, and organizations across the Greensboro Jewish community. Together, these partners are gathering, preserving, and publishing historical materials that document Jewish communal life in Greensboro and make them publicly accessible through DigitalGreensboro.org. The project has been guided by a dedicated core team consisting of Dr. Anne Parsons, Stacey Krim, David Gwynn, and Marilyn Forman Chandler, whose years of leadership, research, and collaboration have been instrumental in building and sustaining the archive.

Through photographs, correspondence, organizational records, newsletters, and oral histories, the project creates a lasting record of the people and institutions that have helped shape the Greensboro community.

Since 2019, the *Archive and Oral History Project* has worked to digitize and preserve collections that might otherwise be lost to time. The archive includes records from Temple Emanuel, the National Council of Jewish Women, the Greensboro Jewish Federation, and other community organizations, as well as personal stories shared through oral history interviews.

The project recognizes that history is more than a collection of dates and events. Personal memories offer insight into how people built their lives, responded to challenges, and strengthened the Jewish community in Greensboro. Together, these stories help paint a fuller picture of the people whose commitments and sacrifices helped shape the generations that followed.

In preserving these voices and experiences, the archive does more than document history. It helps ensure that the stories of Greensboro's Jewish community remain part of the conversation for generations to come.

## BBYO: Where Jewish Learning Builds Lasting Roots



For Ethan Gers, the moment came in a supermarket. During International Kallah, BBYO's three-week Jewish learning summer program, Gers walked into a kosher grocery store for the first time. Growing up in Greensboro's small Jewish community, he had never seen anything like it. Walking through the aisles, he felt something unexpected: a sense of inclusion in society, simply for being Jewish.

Each summer, Kallah hosts around 200 teens from more than 40 countries at B'nai B'rith Perlman Camp in Pennsylvania. In the mornings, teens participate in Limmud, structured classes led by visiting rabbis and educators, where topics ranged from Israeli politics and Jewish law, to cooking and diaspora traditions. Rather than being told what to believe, Kallah encourages campers to study, debate, and decide for themselves what Judaism means to them.

For teens from smaller communities, experiences like Kallah can make Jewish life feel more connected and accessible. It did for Gers, now in his third term on BBYO's Eastern Region Board, where his counterparts span four states and represent more than 600 teens. He returned to Greensboro with a sharper sense of what Jewish learning could offer his community, and with more confidence to step into leadership beyond his own chapter.

"Kallah showed me that being Jewish can look different depending on where you come from, but we are still one community brought together by shared values. It can make a small community feel connected to something much bigger," Gers said.

For Gers, renewal came through conversation as much as study. Three weeks of learning alongside teens from around the world showed him that questioning tradition and embracing different perspectives could strengthen his connection to Jewish life.

As Greensboro's Jewish community looks to deepen engagement among its youngest members, BBYO offers teens a place to build lifelong friendships, strengthen their Jewish identity, and become part of something bigger. ## Learning Together, Honoring a Teacher at BETH DAVID SYNAGOGUE

On July 1, Beth David Synagogue gathered for a *siyyum* (celebration of completing Jewish study) marking the *shloshim* (30-day mourning period) of Anschel Weiss, z"l. The preparation extended far beyond the synagogue walls. Learners at Beth David, members of Weiss' family, and friends around the world pledged chapters of *Mishnah* (early compilation of Jewish law) so the community could complete *Seder Moed* (a section of the *Mishnah*) together, one learner and one portion at a time. In that way, the learning itself became the

gathering. The shared assignment list became an act of remembrance, as each chapter was chosen, studied, and brought back to the Beth David community.

At Beth David, Weiss was a Torah teacher, *b'nai mitzvah* tutor (Jewish coming-of-age teacher), regular Torah reader, Yom Kippur *davener* (prayer leader), reader of the *Megillah* (Scroll of Esther), and guide for adults learning to read Torah and lead services. In her eulogy, Rabbi Grace Gleason said Weiss "was never one to just do something himself more efficiently if there was an opportunity to include someone else and to teach." His students are now taking up that practice in his memory.

The *shloshim* learning project gave that practice a concrete form. *Seder Moed* was studied across the community, the work was shared, and the completion belonged to all who learned from near and far. Some participants were seasoned learners. Others entered the text in Weiss' memory, carrying a chapter, a question, or a page toward the shared *siyyum*.

Beth David's adult learning continues in that same generous spirit of shared, patient Torah study. As regular learning resumes this fall, plans point toward a rotation of teachers drawn from Weiss' students, each bringing a distinct perspective, voice, and teaching style. As students become teachers, Jewish learning renews the Beth David community, and Weiss' legacy continues to shape the congregation's approach to learning.

## TURNING THE PAGE: Jewish Living Renews Community



As the pages of the calendar turn toward a new year, Jewish communities naturally begin asking important questions. How have they grown? Where have they found meaning? How can they become the people and congregation they hope

to be in the year ahead?

Temple Emanuel answers these questions through opportunities for learning and community-building in 5787. Through classes, spiritually relevant worship, social programming, and creative youth and family opportunities, Temple Emanuel continues to provide joyful, deeply connected Jewish life in Greensboro.

"Every time we gather around a table to study Torah, discuss a Jewish value, share a story, pray, or learn a new skill together, we participate in a tradition that stretches back thousands of years," said Temple Emanuel Rabbi Educator Amy Hertz.

This is especially true during the High Holy Days. Jewish communities return to familiar texts and traditions year after year, discovering new meaning because the learners themselves have changed. The High Holy Days remind the community that renewal is possible, not because people become entirely different, but because they continue to cultivate the best within themselves.

"Jewish growth requires care and attention. Learning is one of Judaism's most powerful tools for this growth," Rabbi Hertz said. "The rhythms of Jewish life at Temple Emanuel are built around the idea that meaningful Jewish engagement is a lifelong practice of remaining open to new ideas, new relationships, and new ways of understanding ourselves and our tradition. We are renewed through every interaction and connection."



This was especially true at a recent Sisterhood event and annual meeting, *Brunch & Bouquets*. Women of all ages came together to learn the history of Sisterhood, build relationships, elect new leaders, and create beautiful bouquets for Shabbat. Participants left energized and excited about what lies ahead for Sisterhood and for their own learning and growth at Temple Emanuel.

As Temple Emanuel turns the page on a new year, opportunities for connection and learning continue throughout the congregation. From Torah study and classes to family programs, holiday gatherings, and meaningful conversations, every moment of participation adds a new page to its 120-year story in Greensboro.

# Caring Through Jewish Learning at B'NAI SHALOM DAY SCHOOL



Jewish learning extends beyond the classroom, encouraging students to apply what they learn to make a meaningful difference in the world around them. At its heart, Jewish learning is meant to be lived.

During the school year, Bnai's Upper School students put that idea into practice through a service-learning partnership with the City of Greensboro Office of Sustainability and Resilience. Meeting weekly, students explored environmental justice and sustainability while connecting Jewish values to real-world experiences.

Their classroom discussions came to life through hands-on learning across the community. Students toured the White Street Landfill and Transfer Station to better understand what happened to the waste their community generated each day. At the community gardens at Keeley Park, they learned about composting and the small steps that could make a meaningful difference in caring for the environment. A hike at the Kathleen Clay Edwards Family Branch Library gave students the opportunity to consider the importance of preserving natural spaces for future generations.

Along the way, students wrestled with important questions: How do daily choices affect the environment? Why are some communities impacted by environmental

challenges more than others? What responsibility do people have to care for the world around them?

Jewish tradition offers guidance. In Genesis, humanity is placed in the Garden of Eden "to work it and to guard it." Jewish sages teach that the world is not ours to use, but ours to protect. Through their experiences during the school year, students saw that these ancient teachings remain deeply relevant.

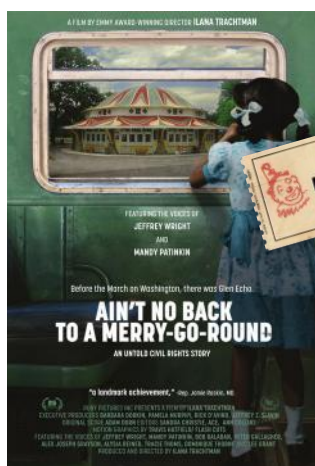
"Students learned that sustainability is about building healthier, stronger communities. It means paying attention, asking questions, and taking responsibility. I am so proud of our students' engagement, and I know we will continue to see the positive impact of this learning in the years to come," said Eva Turner, B'nai Shalom's Head of School.

By the end of the school year, students gained more than knowledge about environmental issues. They developed a deeper understanding of how individual actions connect to community well-being. In caring for their community, they discovered one of Judaism's enduring lessons: "It is not your duty to finish the work, but neither are you at liberty to neglect it."

## MOVIE NIGHT Inspires Justice and Understanding



As our community reflected on the values of justice, equality, and collective responsibility on Juneteenth, the Greensboro Jewish Federation was proud to partner with the UNC Greensboro Jewish Studies Program and the Weatherspoon Art Museum to present a screening of *Ain't No Back to a Merry-Go-Round* on June 25.

This powerful documentary shared the remarkable and often overlooked story of an interracial coalition that emerged during the civil rights movement.

In the summer of 1960, five Howard University students sat on a segregated Maryland carousel; the arrests made headlines. When the largely Jewish community near Glen Echo Amusement Park joined the Black students in picketing, the first organized interracial civil rights protest in US history was born. The unprecedented alliance helped shape the

broader movement for social change.

Through never-before-seen footage and compelling firsthand accounts, filmmaker Ilana Trachtman brought this story to life, highlighting the relationships, risks, and determination that fueled meaningful action. The film offered a timely reminder of the power of community solidarity and the impact individuals can have when they stand together in pursuit of justice.

Following the screening, attendees participated in reflection and facilitated conversation, exploring the film's themes and their continued relevance today. The discussion created an opportunity for meaningful dialogue about shared history, civic engagement, and the ongoing work of building stronger communities.

The evening reinforced the importance of building bridges across communities and demonstrated how shared action can help advance justice and understanding.

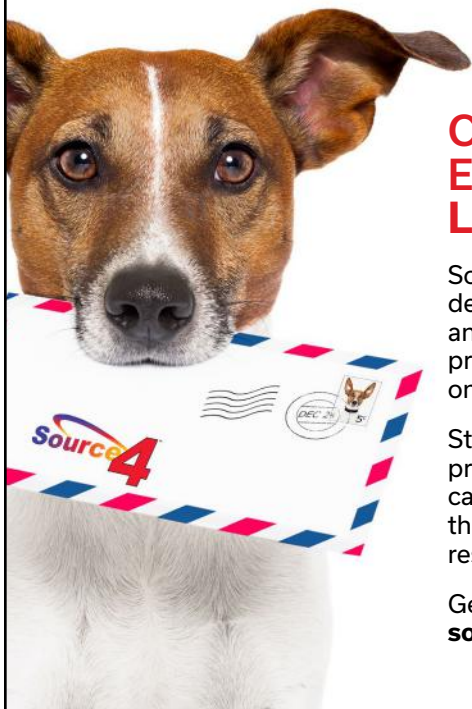
