KARAMU HOUSE HISTORY

On June 15, 1915, two Oberlin College graduates, Russell and Rowena Jelliffe founded the Playhouse Settlement at the corner of East 38th Street and Central Avenue. With a vision that was revolutionary at the time, the couple set out to create a gathering place where people of different racial, ethnic, religious and socioeconomic backgrounds could meet and bond. The early years of the twentieth century witnessed a large influx of African-Americans from the South. Resisting pressure to exclude their new neighbors, the Jelliffes insisted that all races were welcome at the Playhouse Settlement and they soon discovered that the arts provided the perfect common ground. The institution quickly became a magnet for many of the best African-American artists of the day. Dancers, printmakers, actors and writers all found a place where they could hone their crafts. The first theatrical productions at the Playhouse Settlement were staged in 1917.

In 1920 the Jelliffes sponsored the Dumas Dramatic Club, later renamed the Gilpin Players in 1922 after the noted Black actor Charles Gilpin. A theatre was acquired adjacent to the settlement house in 1927. In the 1930s the Gilpin Players began to collaborate with Karamu alum, Langston Hughes. In 1940 a modern dance troupe trained by Marjorie Witt Johnson, won the praise of Life magazine for its appearance at the New York World's Fair.

Following a fire which destroyed the theatre in 1939, the entire Playhouse Settlement was renamed Karamu House in 1941. Karamu's Early Childhood Development Center was built in 1945 at East 89th Street and Quincy Avenue. In 1949 through the aid of Leonard Hanna, Jr. and the Rockefeller Foundation, Karamu boasted two theatres: the 200-seat Jelliffe Theatre and the 100-seat Arena Theatre at the same location.



ABOUT KARAMU HOUSE

A JOYFUL GATHERING PLACE

Over its 110+ year history, Karamu has educated and cultivated generations of aspiring youth in all professions. It has developed a national reputation for nurturing African-American actors, artists and dancers. Among the notable performers who refined their crafts at Karamu and later found success in their fields were visual artists Charles Sallee and Elmer Brown, literary giant Langston Hughes, stage and film actors Robert Guillaume, Bill Cobbs, Ron O'Neal, Vanessa Bell Calloway, Richard Brooks, Debra Byrd, James Pickens Jr., Imani Hakim, Durand Bernarr, and Onya Nurve to name a few. The great Ruby Dee has also been associated with Karamu House.

Today, Karamu is being reborn as a beating heart for the entire community, regardless of race, ethnicity, sexual orientation, gender identification, or age, and retains its Historic identity as “a place of joyful gathering.” Core programs include a five-performance, socially-relevant and professional quality, theatre season; arts education in drama, music and dance for all ages; and community programming, such as a lecture series, and spoken word and music performances, that invite participation, engagement, reflection, and a re-commitment to cultural values. Karamu House also enjoys national prominence, being recognized as the oldest Black producing theatre in the nation and is on the U.S. National Register of historic Places.

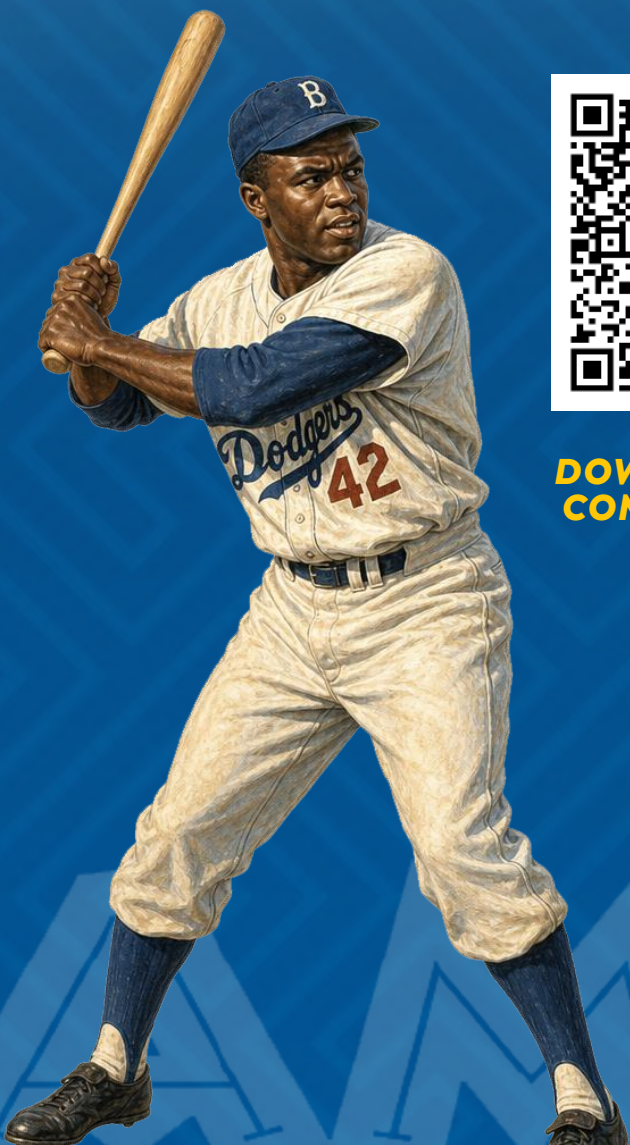

The integration of Major League Baseball (MLB) was far more than a sports milestone; it was a foundational catalyst for the broader American Civil Rights Movement. Breaking baseball's "color line" challenged institutional racism, altered public perceptions, + signaled a wave of social change that would reshape the United States. However, progress is rarely simple. This guide will introduce you to the real-world history in 1947, the deeply human struggles of the individuals

involved, + the complex community debates surrounding racial integration + social justice.

DIRECTOR'S NOTE

I am humbled and deeply grateful to Tony F. Sias and Karamu House for entrusting me with the opportunity to direct ***Mr. Rickey Calls a Meeting*** by Ed Schmidt as the opening production of this season.

At first, I was daunted by the responsibility of directing a play centered around such profound figures in African American history: Jackie Robinson, Joe Louis, Bill "Bojangles" Robinson, Paul Robeson, and Branch Rickey. Each carried an extraordinary legacy, and together they represent a pivotal moment in American history. While Branch Rickey becomes the catalyst for Jackie Robinson's introduction into Major League Baseball, this story reaches far beyond baseball. It explores courage, sacrifice, identity, responsibility, and the cost of breaking barriers.

I am honored to work with a remarkable cast who have embraced the challenge of bringing these men to life, not simply through imitation, but by exploring their physicality, philosophies, relationships, and the spirits of the legacies they carried.

My hope is to immerse our audience in the culture, atmosphere, and tensions of 1947. I want you to feel as though you have entered that room and are witnessing five extraordinary men wrestling with questions that remain relevant today.

This production is also deeply personal. This is my first directing experience at Karamu House, an institution where I spent several years as an actor, performing in works including Toni Morrison's *The Bluest Eye*, George C. Wolfe's *The Colored Museum*, and *Dream on Monkey Mountain*. Karamu was also the first institution I came to when I returned to Cleveland after graduating from Columbia University during a difficult time in my family's life.

Artists such as Langston Hughes, Ruby Dee, James Pickens Jr., and Imani Hakeem have left their legacies within these walls. I am grateful to now contribute my own small piece to that continuing legacy.

Thank you to my extraordinary cast, crew, designers, and to each of you for supporting this production.

My hope is that together we honor the ancestors, celebrate the past, challenge the present, and help carry Karamu House toward a rich and bright future.

Jimmie's recent directing credits include August Wilson's *Two Trains Running* at Beck Center for the Arts. He is looking forward to directing Ed Schmidt's *Mr. Rickey Calls a Meeting* at Karamu House. Other directing credits include *Brownsville Song/B-Side* for Tray at Dobama Theatre; *The Art of Longing* by Lisa Langford at Cleveland Public Theatre; *To Kill a Mockingbird* by Harper Lee, *Clybourne Park* by Bruce Norris, and *A Raisin in the Sun* by Lorraine Hansberry at Weathervane Playhouse; *The Lower Depths* by Maxim Gorky and *The America Play* by Suzan-Lori Parks at the University of Akron; and *The Split Show*, *How Blood Go*, and *The Bomb* by Lisa Langford through Tri-C, Convergence Continuum, and Cleveland Public Theatre.

Additional directing credits include *The Glass Menagerie* by Tennessee Williams; *For Colored Girls Who Have Considered Suicide/When the Rainbow Is Enuf* by Ntozake Shange; *Jitney*, *Two Trains Running*, *Gem of the Ocean*, and *Joe Turner's Come and Gone* by August Wilson at Cuyahoga Community College; *365 Days/365 Plays* by Suzan-Lori Parks at Cleveland Public Theatre; *The Colored Museum* by George C. His work in new play development includes *Underground Griots* by Natalie Parker and Keith Josef Adkins at Cleveland Public Theatre, the National Black Theatre Festival, and HERE Arts Center in New York; *Wilberforce* and *Hollis Mugley's Only Wish* by Keith Josef Adkins at Cleveland Public Theatre, the National Black Theatre Festival, and the New York Hip Hop Festival; *The Bacchae* by Wole Soyinka at Cleveland Public Theatre and Columbia University; *Song* by Daniel Gray Kontar; and *InCogNegro* by Lisa Langford at Cleveland Public Theatre. He has also directed *MLK Day*, an original work by Jimmie Woody.

Jimmie received his M.F.A. in Acting from Columbia University. He served as a fellow with Cleveland Public Theatre as the recipient of the Joan Yellen Horvitz Directing Fellowship for the 2025–2026 season and was a 2012 Creative Workforce Fellow in Theater.

In 2013 Mr. Morris was Keynote Speaker at Alabama State University on African Americans In Scenic Design, He also owns a company "Second Soul" that specializes in 3d Character Design and Animation. He is currently Technical Director/Resident Scenic Designer for Weathervane Playhouse in Akron Ohio. Mr. Morris holds a B.A. in Scenic and Lighting Design from Kent State University.

INDA BLATCH-GEIB COSTUME DESIGNER

Inda has been a costume and production designer for over 1,000 projects spanning 37 years, across 4 continents. Commercial design for Krylon, Bryant & Stratton, Footlocker, The West Virginia Lottery's national campaigns, Ohio Lottery, Microsoft, Under Armor, McDonald's, TroyBuilt, Meijer, and the Original Mattress Factory, Cleveland Cavaliers' 1970-80's themed videos, national spots and design for half-time shows including mascot shield design and pyrotechnic sword. Concert and festival design include Machine Gun Kelly's US/European tours, ESTFEST and Wolstein Arena productions. Specialty microphone stand designs for MGK and Bear. Set styling for Harper's Bazaar UK Scarlett Johansson cover and spread, catalogue set styling for Foundations and Kilgore Trout. Her designs have been showcased in exhibits at the Smithsonian, with film projects including Ohio Art Direction of The Signal starring Laurence Fishburne and The Con. Theatrical Design includes the special off-Broadway Production of Kris Kingle: The Musical, Cleveland Play House's production of Native Gardens, and multiple productions for the Colombian National Opera. BRIELLE MCGREW WIG ARTISAN

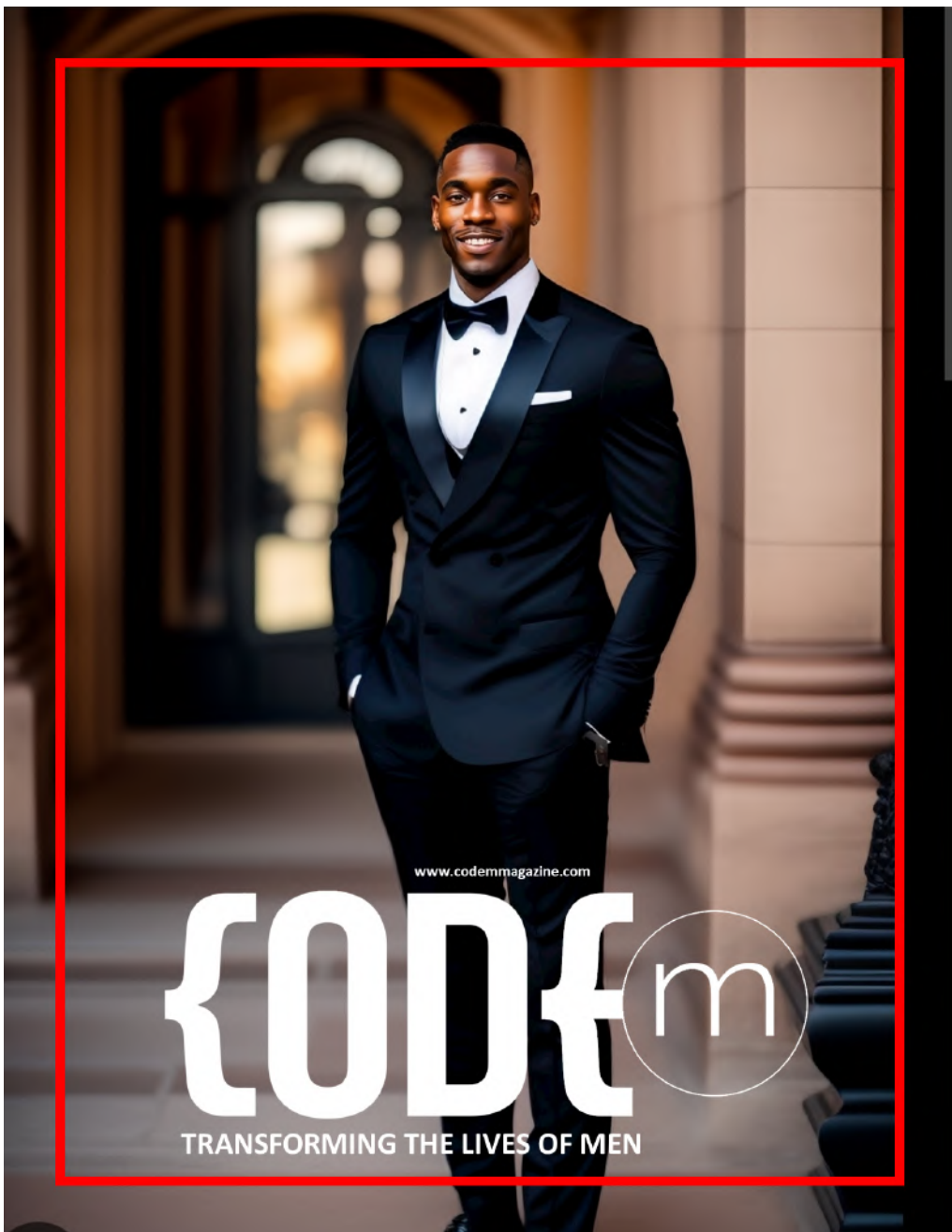
