A London Air Raid.



LONDON raids have come to stay. At time of writing there is no other topic discussed with more feeling. The entire population have become experts on meteorology. The moon has never been more unwelcome and the hours of its rising and setting have never before been known by so many people.

London has been attacked from the air by both airships and aeroplane. The Zeppelins are no more to be feared and it is common history to all why their excursions have been curtailed.

Londoners dread to think what amount of damage could have been done by these monsters in the days of passive defence. It was late in the year 1916 when the first Zeppelin was brought down on English soil in flames, a never to be forgotten sight witnessed by hundreds of thousands of people.

It was a week later when another effort was made by several

Zeppelins, I suppose as a reprisal for their lost "sheep." This time they came in greater numbers and they were seen to approach. They approached nearer to be recognised by our searchlights, which began to play about in the skies. The characteristic droning of the powerful engines are heard for miles. One is seen to dive into a cloud as it reached the capital, on its death dealing mission.

We are ready for them but they don't seem put out, nor do they mean to be kept out. They change their course repeatedly and zig-zag to evade the gun fire which has opened upon them. Our plucky men in aeroplanes also search for their prey. There is little hope for a Zeppelin once she is kept in focus of searchlight, when she is a wonderful spectacle, like a lighted cigar.

It is hellish yet fascinating. It is difficult at times to distinguish between the loud explosions and gun fire. All London is astir. The excitement is intense, all are waiting for the destruction of the vampire. The barrage ceased for a short while, but the Zeppelin is not escaping; she is being closely followed by our flying men.

Suddenly the sky became bright and a flame was seen to grow into a tremendous fire which lighted up the sky. The flare was seen for miles round. It reminded me of my school days when we experimented with magnesium wire but of course on a more expensive scale. The Zeppelin was seen to break in two and fell to the ground, very little being left of its crew.

The Gotha Aeroplane is more difficult to cope with. It has had a successful career but we hope to conquer this form of raiding as well as the other form. Air raids are being taken as a matter of course, perhaps because we are reconciled to the fact that we are better defended, that "take cover" warnings are effective and given in good time for the majority to seek shelter. The maroons are sounded as soon as the enemy has crossed the coast. Motor cars race through the main thoroughfare, with illuminated notices. Red lights are shown on conspicuous places, tram cars and omnibuses stop and all vehicular traffic is at a stand-still. The shelters are advertised on all lamp-posts, and special constables, wearing steel helmets, advise pedestrians on the way to the nearest refuge. In a very short while after the warning, the roads are desolate and none except those on air raid duty are to be seen during the bombardment.

Immediately the "all clear" is given the ambulances become busy in conveying the injured to hospitals. Telephones hum with anxious inquiries of the welfare of their kin and friends.

Most people overlook the difficulties of reaching their homes and there are many, as raids come at most unexpected times. We must give credit to the Royal Flying Corps on the coast for their wonderful work in keeping them back as often as they do.

Football Notes.

Then we had to meet Blackrock College in the second round, who knocked us out. However, we hope that next year's team will meet with more success, as indeed they ought, for there are a great many promising players amongst the Juniors, who had such bad luck in being knocked out by Castleknock in the second round.

HIGH SCHOOL (S.C.T.) v. BLACKROCK COLLEGE (S.C.T.).

This match was played in Lansdowne Road and resulted in an easy win for Blackrock, who crossed our lines five times in the first half, in addition to getting a penalty goal. High School played somewhat better in the second half, and succeeded in keeping their opponents out, but for one score. The High School forwards have seldom given a poorer display. The backs never got a chance of attack, but their defence was very sound, especially in the second half. Bardon and Child were the pick of the forwards, whilst Scales, Matthews, Milligan and M'Crea were most prominent in the back line.

Notes on Old Boys.



WE have many distinctions to record this month.

To begin with, three old boys—F. N. Greer, Jas. Sealy and R. L. Leonard have been made K.C.'s (King's Counsel).

F. N. Greer (1881-1887), who was made a C.B. (Companion of the Order of the Bath) some time ago, is Parliamentary Draughtsman to the Irish Office in London. He entered Trinity College with the High School Exhibition in 1887, won Second Classical Scholarship in 1889, and graduated in 1889 with the Brooke Prize for Classics, being Third Senior Moderator in Classics (with Gold Medal), and First Junior Moderator in Modern Literature (with Silver Medal). He was called to the Bar in 1893.

Jas. Sealy (1886-1894) entered Trinity with the High School Exhibition in 1894, won Third Classical Scholarship in 1896, and graduated in 1898 as Third Senior Moderator in Classics (with Gold Medal and Special Prize and Exhibition). He was also on the Irish Rugby International team for several years, and had the great distinction of scoring a try against England in his first international match. He was called to the Bar in 1902.

R. G. L. Leonard (1889-1897) entered Trinity with the High School Exhibition in 1897. After winning many distinctions in the Law School, including the Reid Scholarship, he obtained Fifth Classical Scholarship in 1903, graduating the same year as First Senior Moderator in Legal and Political Science (with Gold Medal and Special Prize and Exhibition). He was called to the Bar in 1899.

The following old boys have obtained the Military Cross for services in the war since our last issue :—

R. G. Beckerson (1897-1901), Captain, Norfolk Regiment, has been given a bar to the Military Cross which he won in April, 1917. His brother, Rev. W. T. Beckerson, B.D. (1899-1901) has been serving as Military Chaplain with the Ulster Division since 1916.

J. H. Barbor (1895-1906), Captain, Army Service Corps, Rev. S. Hutchinson, M.A. (1891-95), Army Chaplain, 2nd Lieut. Conn. S. O'Grady (1904-05), Royal Flying Corps, Special Reserve and E. Philippe (1900-01) have all been awarded the Military Cross.

The only one of these whose special services we have seen mentioned is O'Grady, whose official record is that he won the M.C. "for conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in leading fighting patrols against superior numbers of enemy aircraft." He has himself brought down three enemy machines completely out of control, and others were seen to be destroyed, and his dash and determination when outnumbered by the enemy have continually won the highest praise.

We stated in our December number that Captain O. V. Burrows, R.A.M.C. (1900-02), had won the Military Cross. The official statement has now been published stating that "for forty hours he worked unceasingly succouring the wounded, about 300 of whom passed through his hands during that period."

Fleet Surgeon T. W. Myles (1888-96) has been awarded the Order of the Crown of Italy by the Italian Government for services at Valona. He now has charge of a Brigade of Royal Naval Marines at Salonica.

2nd Lieut. E. R. Gray (1900-09), 2nd Royal Dublin Fusiliers has been awarded a special parchment certificate for his services at Cambrai. The certificate runs—"I have read with much pleasure the reports of your regimental commander and brigade commander regarding your gallant conduct and devotion to duty in

the field on November 20th, 1917, and have ordered your name and deed to be entered in the record of the Irish Division.—W. H. Hickie, Major-General Commanding 16th Irish Division."

G. Chester Duggan (1906-1903), of the Admiralty Office in London, has been appointed Officer of the Order of the British Empire, the new order established in January.

Dr. Lumsden (1882-84) is to be congratulated on raising, through the *Irish Times*, the fine sum of £62,000 from the three southern provinces for the Red Cross Funds.

The following have been mentioned in despatches:— Captain W. H. Crotty (1907-10), Royal Irish Fusiliers; Rev. E. R. Day (1891-1900), Military Chaplain; and Lieut. J. R. Ellison (1901-06), Royal Army Veterinary Corps.

Captain W. H. Crotty is at present in hospital at Wandsworth, having been wounded, but is nearly well again. His brother, R. E. Crotty (1907-08), has also been wounded, but has recovered.

Captain H. B. Goulding (1903-09), R.A.M.C., was, we regret to say, taken prisoner at Cambrai and is now at Carlsruhe.

It is now officially announced that Captain A. B. E. Hillas, 7th Gordon Highlanders (1890-94), having been reported wounded and missing, was killed last May.

Lieut. J. Mackay (1908-17), Munster Fusiliers, has earned rapid promotion and has been appointed Gymnastic Instructor to his battalion at Aldershot.

R. Bell (1907-13) was also at Cambrai with the N. Irish Horse. His brother Jack is still at Aldershot.

* * *

P. R. G. Fennell (1909-15) was home on leave in February. He was in the fighting last summer in Belgium, but has now moved further south.

W. H. Thrift (1908-17) has finished his course in the O.T.C. at Trinity, and expects soon to get his Commission.

* * *

A. W. Wallen (1910-17) having finished his O.T.C. course in Trinity is now taking a course of training in Cambridge.

E. A. H. Heard (1909-12) has joined the North Irish Horse.

R. H. Wright (1909-15) is now in training at Oxford as a Flight Officer.

* * *

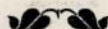

Egoism and Genius.



THE apologists of Goethe argue that genius has an orbit of its own. If, say they, it moved through the orbit of common-place lives, it would not be genius, but common-place; not that its orbit is necessarily eccentric, but it must often appear so, because its sweep is wide. When Goethe, who is put forward as the great example and justification of the egoism of genius, was a child of three, his mother naturally enough delighted in his traits of infantine ambition. He strutted across the street to join his companions, and when she asked him if he meant to distinguish himself from them by these airs of consequence? "I *begin*," he said, "with this; later on in life I will distinguish myself in far other ways." Again, when she told him that the conjunction of stars at his birth presaged greatness, and he pressed her with so many questions that she asked, "Why must you have the assistance of the stars when other people get on very well without?" he replied, "I am not to be satisfied with what does for other people." The egoism of genius once determined as a fact, bears—not the blame—but the responsibility of the inconstancy. Goethe was a genius, and therefore was egotistical for the world's good.

Every family, in a small, insignificant sense, has its genius.

The merely clever fellow is to all intents and purposes a genius to the dull boy. He has intuitions, glimpses, perceptions, aspirations to which our heavy friend is dead unless roused by the other's fire. We can conceive a world in space where our most inspired poet or philosopher would be slow and torpid by comparison—beaten by everybody in the race; we can conceive another world where even we ourselves *might* make a brilliant figure. The genius under this change of circumstance, whatever his positive range, however far his perception, insight, and gift of expression might carry him, would be master of himself, modest in his pretensions, and alive to the rights of others; while there can be no doubt that under the supposed elevation in the scale, our own sense of justice would lose force—that is, supposing society is no wiser than we know it. It is that grand competitive examination called the world—the common judgment of men which alone determines the real geniuses from the aspirants; which alone can single out those who overtop their fellows as the elect spirit overtops the world.

We know that great minds are sent into the world for great ends; that it was not intended that they should leave things just as they found them; but as long as they are simply human, this tone of subservience is harmful to both sides, and has bad results. We see this in private life and in school. There is nothing we believe that more upsets the character, more unfits it for the wear and tear of life, than for it to be allowed to grow up under habitual adulation.

The egoism which is being so carefully fostered has few of the marks of vulgar selfishness, and scarcely shows itself to common observers, and least of all to proud and loving flatterers, until the change comes that must come with time. The family court breaks up; some of the schoolboys get moved to a higher form; the members become subject to other influences, or wake to a sudden independence; and the egoism that has been fostered to an unmanageable size, finds itself thwarted where demur or opposition is least expected.

Some men of genius, like Goethe or Swift, make no show whatever of self-sacrifice. Their youth shows as keen an eye to their own individual interest as the maturity of the most calculating man of business. We often say, how such a one has gone off, and how the word has spoilt him: a generous youth turned into a calculating old age. But, in fact, generous youth, especially youth encircled with the halo of genius, is the great deceiver of mankind. The precocious boy, by the audacity of his young philosophy, soon surprises his parents out of their painfully acquired knowledge of life; or he shames their practical religion by his own lights; the world has its spoilt favourite like the family or school, and follows his lead with the same misplaced docility. We see no difference between apologists of the man of genius proving things must be right because the genius does them,

and the doting mother reversing her own notions of right and wrong.

"Self-love or Egoism," says Larochevoucauld, "never rests quietly outside the self, and lingers with strange objects like the bees with the flowers, only in order to draw from them what it requires." Selfishness of an obvious sort is amongst the first studies of a youthful observer. Of course, too, each is quick to discern in the other that egoism of vanity or priggishness, which breaks out in empty boastings and the perpetual I, I, I of forward youth, until the world's lessons admonish a more moderate carriage and behaviour. Whenever society or school dares to administer this lesson individual selfishness is kept within bounds, and not suffered to override the community.

What is wanted in the universal system of education is that the clever ones should not swamp the rest; but no profusion or lavishness of nature can prevent this—the big trees will overshadow the little ones. Take, for example, the attitude of idolators towards intellectual leaders. Admiration is at first only an extension of egoism. Aristophanes, in Plato's *Symposium*, consequently explains this by the gods having cut men in half so that the two halves wander about longing and searching for each other. Aristotle has said something similar: "Benefactors seem to have more love for those they have benefited than these have for the benefactors . . ." We find the same in craftsmen; for every craftsman loves the work of his hands more than it would love him if it came to life. During the proscription of Sulla sons sometimes betrayed their fathers, but never *vice versâ*.

Egoism is essentially an influence which exempts a man from the obligations he feels to be binding on others; the typical egotistical genius seems to us to live under the easy creed of the man with the full purse; he has no thought of making up in some future period the present aggression. If he is to serve the world at all it is by serving his nearest neighbours while he can. He and they are in the same boat, and must in wisdom as well as in equity make common cause. However, we have no notion, by anything we can say, of modifying the enthusiasm for genius—God's gift to the world, and the delight of all who are not sunk below every inspiration. Genius, or what passes as such, must ever carry all before it. But, nevertheless, let those who have to be content with plain, good, common sense for their daily fare be content. All reading and experience go to show that those profit by the genius who don't live too near him, as those are most loyal into whose heads it never enters to go to court; and if fate does throw us in his way, it is better to respect ourselves, remembering we are no nearer his height by a weak disparagement and ready surrender of our own position.

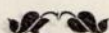


Examination Results.

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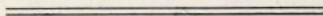
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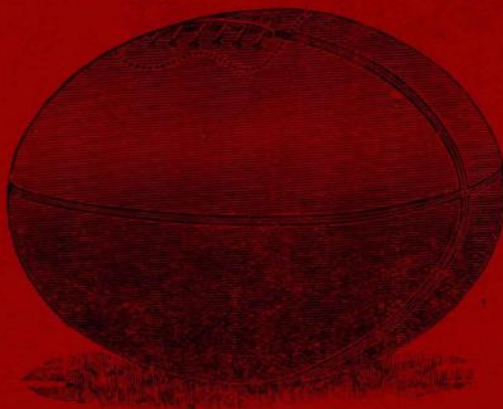
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
