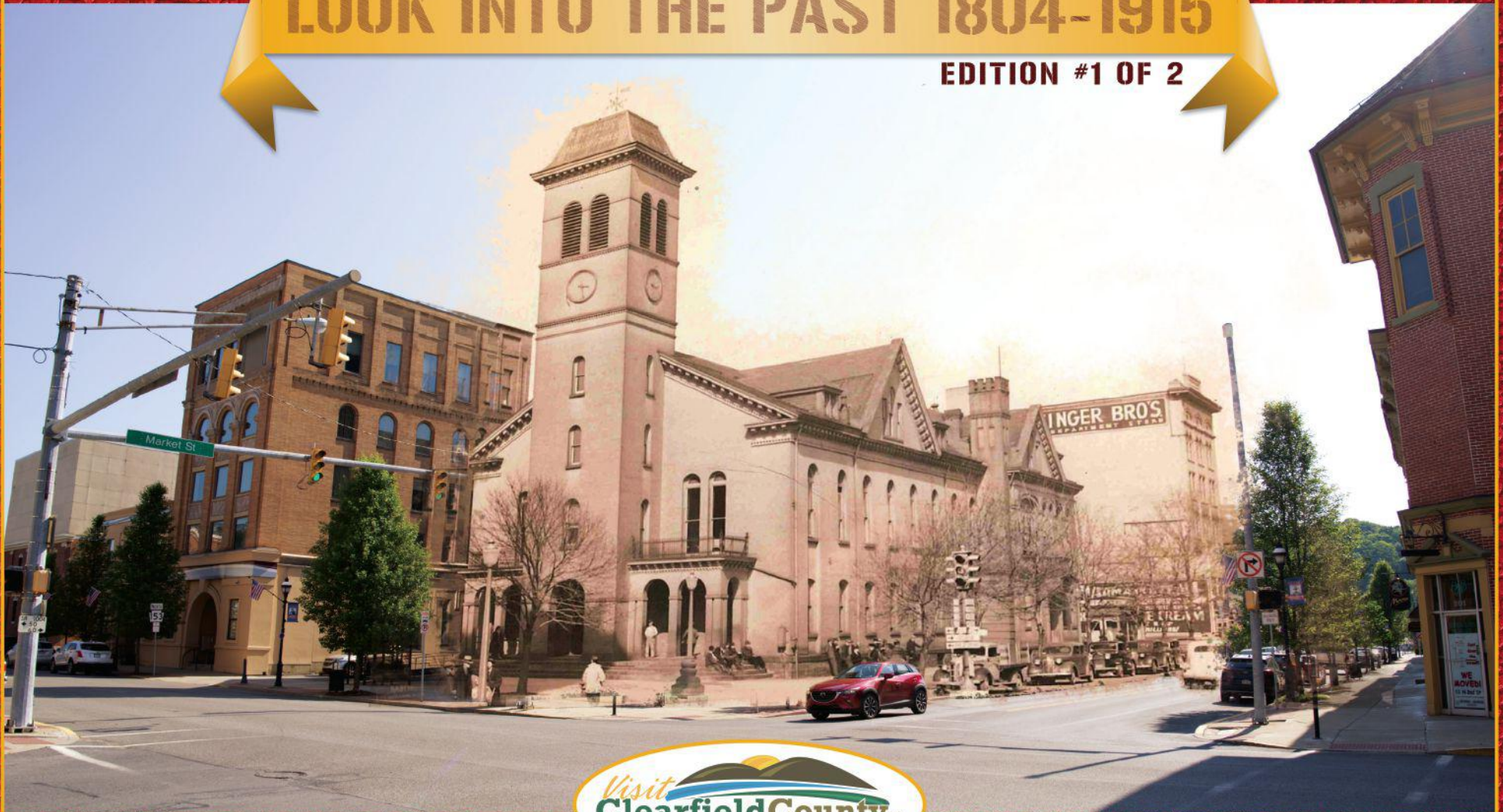

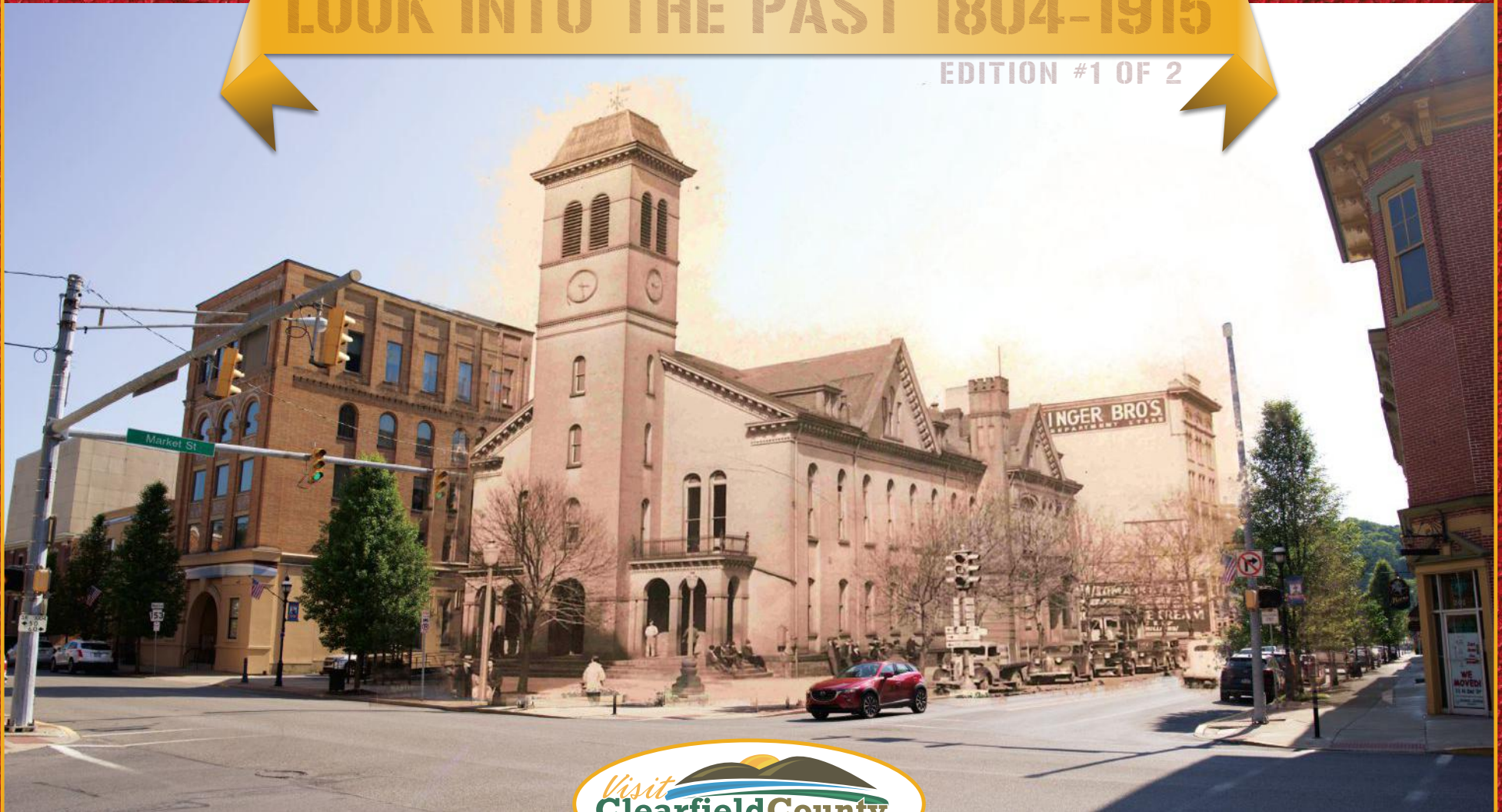

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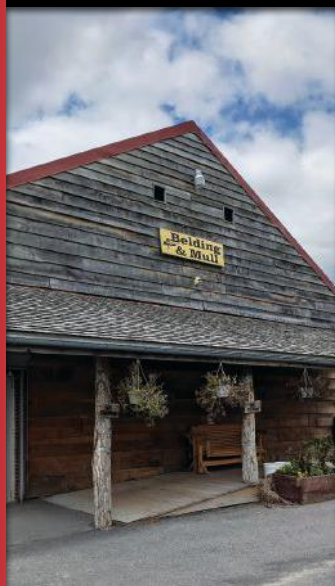

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Clearfield County Jail

The first jail in Clearfield County was built between 1820 and 1841. It was a log structure located at 105 S. 2nd St. in Clearfield and is one of the oldest buildings in town. The second jail was built on the site of the former Opera House on Market Street, directly behind the courthouse. The land was purchased from Martin Nichols, Sr., for \$300, and the construction was carried out by Martin Nichols, Sr., and Jonathan M. Nichols for \$3,500. The third jail, constructed between 1870 and 1872 by George Thorn, is a two-story stone building that still stands today and is home to a newly remodeled distillery. The front of the building was used for the sheriff's apartments, and the rear was used for jail purposes. The contract price for the jail was \$68,000 but ended up costing much more due to additional expenses. The structure and the yard were constructed completely from white and yellow sandstone. The cells were built on both sides of the hall, with 12 on each side: six above and six below. The land for this jail was purchased from William Bigler for \$7,000.

The county's initial trade involved bituminous coal, which continued for many years. The coal was loaded onto arks, capable of holding 1,200 to 1,500 bushels. The construction of dams on the Susquehanna River brought an end to this trade, as the chutes in the dams were obstructive. Low-sulfur bituminous coal was mined all over the county until the peak year of 1918.

William Bigler

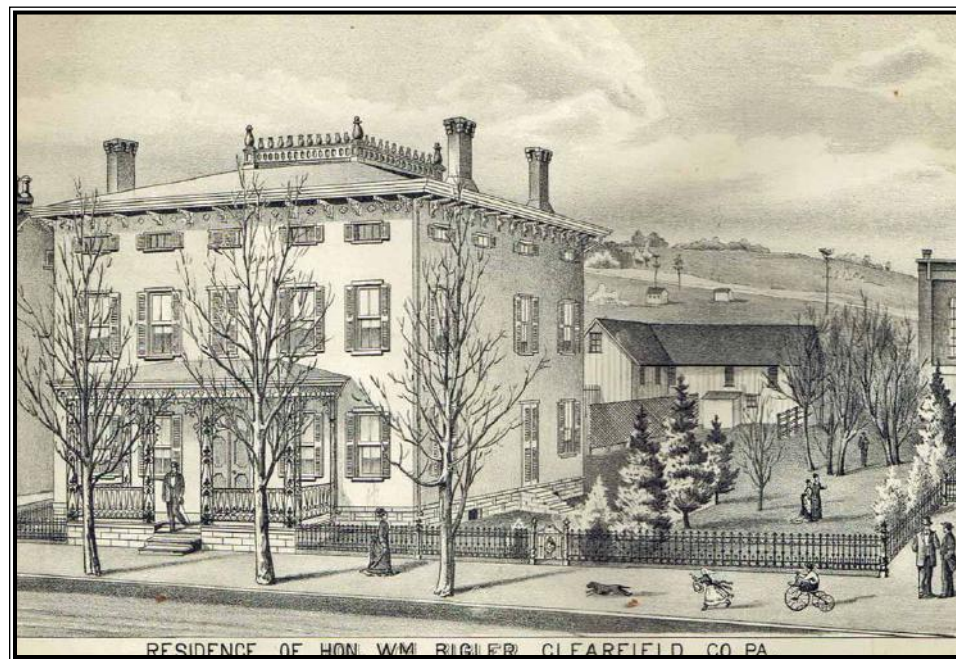


William Bigler arrived in Clearfield County in 1833 and founded the Clearfield Democrat newspaper. In 1836, he married Maria Jane, daughter of Alexander B. Reed, and together they had five children: Reed, John W., William D., Edmund A., and Harry F. After getting married, he sold the newspaper and joined his father-in-law's lumber business as a co-partner. Between 1845 and 1850, his lumber business became the largest producer of building supplies on the West Branch of the Susquehanna River, earning him the nickname "The Clearfield Raftsman."

In 1842, Mr. Bigler was elected to the state senate and was re-elected in 1844. Although he was unsuccessful in his candidacy for the office of governor in 1848, he was eventually elected as the 12th

governor of Pennsylvania in 1851. Following his term as governor, he served as president of the Philadelphia and Erie Railroad Company for a year before being elected to the United States Senate, where he served until 1861.

In 1876, he played a significant role in the Centennial Exhibition in Philadelphia. From the time he arrived in the county until his passing, William Bigler was a prominent figure in social and political life. Additionally, he was involved in the lumbering industry and amassed a notable real estate portfolio. He loved hunting in the forests of Clearfield, where he was known as a skilled marksman. He captured a young bear during one hunting trip and brought it home alive.

Two other townships were carved out of the old Chinklacamoose, Pike, and Lawrence townships. Pike Township was named in honor of General Zebulon Pike, and Lawrence was named in honor of Commodore Lawrence a naval hero.

The first courthouse was built on land donated by Abraham Witmer. Mr. Witmer also donated three additional lots for an academy, a market and a county jail.

Clearfield County Fair

The Clearfield County Agricultural Society organized the first Clearfield County Fair in October 1860. There was a disagreement between Clearfield and Curwensville regarding the location of the fair. James Leonard, G.L. Reed, and Richard Shaw offered six to 10 rent-free acres of land near Clearfield, while John Patton and William Irvin made a competing offer for Curwensville. The dispute was settled based on which town could raise the most money for the fair. Clearfield won by a narrow margin, raising \$510 compared to Curwensville's \$488.50. The fair was held on Oct. 16, 1860, on Old Town Road at the farm of Ralph Guelich; it lasted three days. There were prizes in 46 divisions, including various livestock categories, carpentry, tailoring, shoemaking, and basket weaving. Almost 5,000 attendees visited the fair on the first day. It brought in \$1,896.55, of which \$1,549.99

was spent, leaving a small balance for the next year's fair. The fair continued at this location until 1870, when it moved to the Clearfield Driving Park.

In September 1924, the grandstand at the fairgrounds opened. The grandstand was built with a capacity of 3,000 people and the option to add more seating if needed. The grandstand also had space underneath for vendors and concession stands, which are still used today. The fair has been held at this location except for 1895 and 1896, when it was temporarily held in Grampian to use a 10-mile track on the W.C. Russell farm adjoining Grampian Park. The fair wasn't held regularly for the next 15 years, but it did bring in acts like airplanes, hot air balloons, parachuting, speeding cars, and high-wire acts. The fair showed the most profit in 1925, with receipts showing \$22,500.



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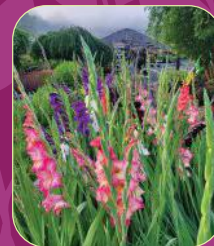


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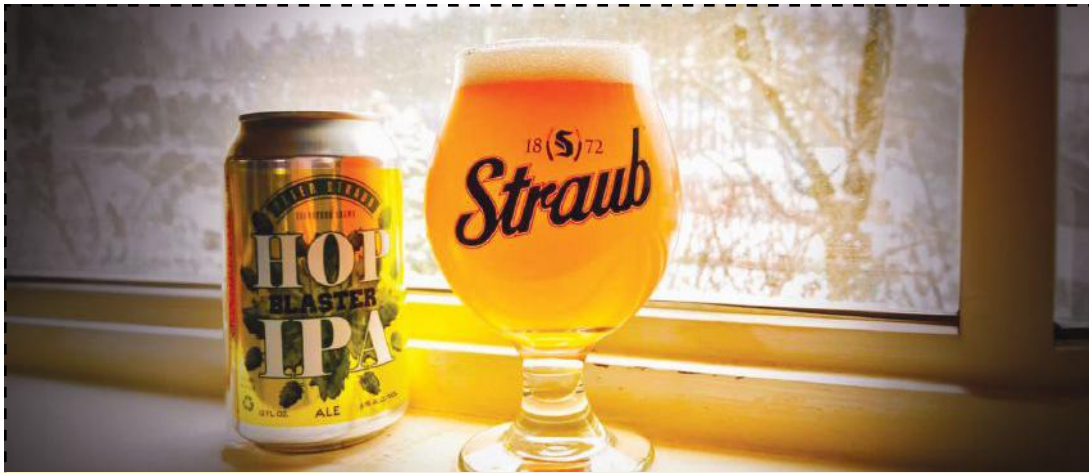

Saint Francis of Assisi Roman Catholic Church is located on S. 2nd St. in Clearfield, Pennsylvania. The parish was founded in 1830, and the present church building was built in 1886. The church is constructed of white stone, with one tall steeple topped with a gold cross. The interior of the church has been significantly renovated since the church's early days. The stained-glass windows include the images of many saints.

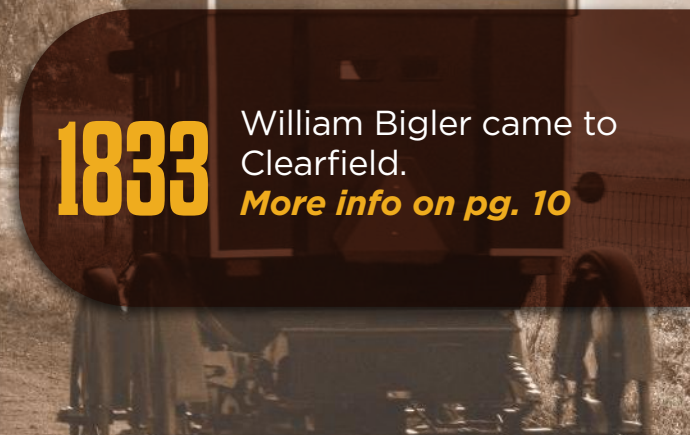

Lumbering emerged as a business in 1837 and achieved success by 1842, despite facing low prices. The process involved felling trees, squaring them with axes, and transporting them to the river as rafts. Raftsmen navigated these rafts down the river to market, encountering excitement and danger along the way. Production of logs and cut lumber dominated the economy until 1910. White pine and hemlock floated down the West Branch of the Susquehanna River from 1837 to 1917.



1838

Clearfield Cemetery is said to be the oldest regularly laid-out cemetery. It was the tract of land in the east part of the town. The land was donated by Alexander B. Reed and Richard Shaw. The deed is found on the record as Jan. 7, 1853, but is known to have been used before that date. The cemetery is about three acres in size. The present-day Clearfield County Cemetery is located north of the previous land and is about 20 acres, eight of which are cleared and plotted. This cemetery was opened in December 1881.

Family Fun

CLEARFIELD

Float down the **West Branch of the Susquehanna River** on a tube, raft, canoe or kayak, or take a stroll on the brand-new riverwalk located between the **Market Street and Nichols Street bridges**. Then, have a picnic lunch at **Lower Witmer Park**.

Mountain bike the **Clearfield-to-Grampian Rail Trail**. The 11-mile cinder trail is mostly flat and follows the West Branch of the Susquehanna River. The trailhead is located off **Old Town Rd., Clearfield, PA 16830**.

Visit **Grice Community Museum** and learn how the Grice business history started. View over 70 collector cars from the 1930s through the '90s. See over 400 trophy game mounts of deer, elk, bear, lions, African game and much more. Open Memorial

Day Weekend through Sept. 30. Located at **119 N. 4th St., Clearfield, PA 16830**.

Practice your skateboarding skills at the **Clearfield County Fairgrounds Skate Park** near Mill Road, or challenge your friend to a tennis match at the courts inside the grandstand oval. Located at **Stadium Dr., Clearfield, PA 16830**.

CURWENSVILLE

Take a self-guided walking tour of **Bilger's Rocks**, a 300-million-year-old geological phenomenon created by frost wedging. Explore 20 acres of massive rocks that tower up to five stories high and measure up to 20 feet thick. Located at **1928 Bilger's Rocks Rd., Grampian, PA 16838**.

Picnic at **Irvin Park** and play pickleball, basketball, or tennis on the free courts. Bring a fishing rod and try your luck along the

banks of the **West Branch of the Susquehanna River**. Located on **Irvin Park Rd., Curwensville, PA 16833**.

Get your picture taken next to the **Doughboy Statue** and read the names of those who proudly served in World War I. Learn about the Bucktail Regiment at the nearby **Bucktail Memorial**. Download the free geocaching app and use your smartphone to find the Bucktails & Doughboys cache. Located between **State Street and North Street in Curwensville, PA 16833**.

Wander one of many hiking trails at **Curwensville Lake Recreation Area** and read about the Lumber Heritage Region or **Curwensville Dam**. Try out the playground equipment and take a picnic lunch. Bring your fishing rod and reel in the big one or relax on the beach. Located at **1256 Lake Dr., Curwensville, PA 16833**.

COALPORT

Take a step back in time at the **Coalport Area Coal Museum**. See artifacts donated by family members of former coal miners who wished to have their memories preserved. Located inside the **Coalport Community Building** at **961 Forest St., Coalport, PA 16627**.

DUBOIS

Stop by the **Winkler Gallery of Fine Art** to see a children's carousel made in 1896 by W. H. Halstead in London, England. Marvel at a collection of paintings created by elephants. Located at **36 N. Brady St., DuBois, PA 15801**.

Cruise the indoor streets of **DuBois Harley-Davidson**, located at **101 W. DuBois Ave., DuBois, PA 15801**. After that, stop by nearby **City Park** along Parkway Drive. Play a pickup game on the courts or run, walk or bike the **Beaver Meadow Walkway**.





Take in a baseball game at the beautiful **Showers Field Complex**. The field is home to the DuBois Area High School and Penn State-DuBois baseball teams. Located just off **Maple Avenue, DuBois, PA 15801**.

HOUTZDALE

Ride a horse on the **Houtzdale Rails to Trails**. Or walk, hike or bike the trail and stop near **Minit Mart** to read about the infamous 1893 Walter L. Main circus-train wreck. On-street parking is available along **Hannah Street, Houtzdale, PA 16651**.

JANESVILLE

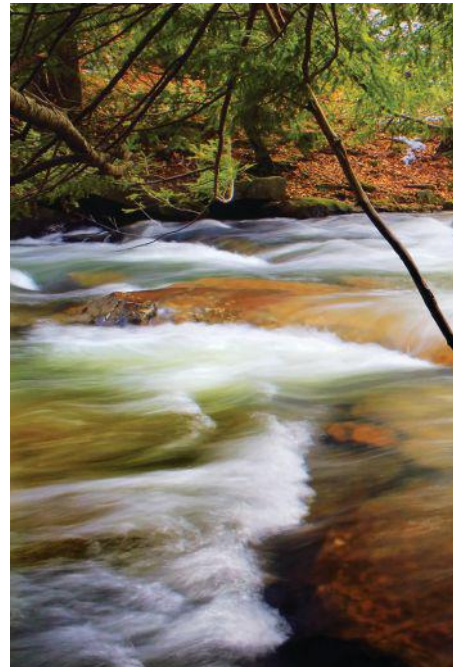
Bring your boat to **Janesville Dam** for a fun-filled day of fishing, or play a game of catch at adjacent **Mountz Memorial Park**. Located at **525 Walnut St., Smithmill, PA 16680**.

PENFIELD

Parker Dam State Park offers many year-round environmental education and interpretive programs at no cost. Through hands-on activities, guided walks and evening programs, participants gain appreciation, understanding, and develop a sense of stewardship toward natural and cultural resources. A small-scale, interpretive maple-sugaring operation runs throughout March. Apple-cider making is demonstrated each October at the annual Fall Festival.

A small environmental education center, attached to the park office, offers interpretive displays, games and children's books to look over.

The Lou and Helen Adams Civilian Conservation Corps Museum near



the breast of the dam educates visitors about the life and times of the corps members. It is open Sunday afternoons during the summer season when volunteers are available or upon request. Wayside exhibits interpreting a 1985 tornado are along Mud Run Road near **Tyler Cabin**.

Enjoy a nice sunny day, build a sandcastle on the beach, and take a dip in the fresh, cool waters at **Parker Lake** or go birdwatching. Located at **28 Fairview Rd., Penfield, PA 15849**.

Enjoy a family picnic at **S.B. Elliott State Park**. Picnicking amidst towering pine and oak trees is a treat for the whole family. The park offers ample parking, tables, three reservable picnic pavilions, drinking water, and non-flush restrooms. Located along **Old Route 153, Penfield, PA 15849**.

Then, visit nearby **Shagger's Inn** in **Moshannon State Forest**, a shallow-water impoundment that provides critical wetland habitat for an abundance of wildlife and

a close, secluded spot to canoe, kayak, fish, hunt, view wildlife, and picnic. The wetland contains one of the few nesting areas in PA for osprey. Waterfowl are common in spring and fall. The surrounding **Moshannon State Forest** is an excellent place to find scarlet tanager, purple finch and wild turkey. Other wildlife includes beaver, black bear, and white-tailed deer.

Spend a day at **Quehanna Wild Area**, the state's largest wildlife area. Bring your binoculars to **Hoover Farm Wildlife Viewing Area** and listen for the majestic bugle of bull elk. Take in the eye-popping beauty of the largest stand of white birch in the Eastern U.S. and visit the monument at **Marion Brooks Natural Area**. Then, take a walk on **Quehanna Trail** and watch for wildlife. Quehanna Wild Area is located along Quehanna Highway in Cameron, Clearfield and Elk counties.

BLOODY KNOX CABIN



Tom Adams built his log cabin in Kellytown, Knox Township, in 1861. He lived here with his wife, son, and daughter. Adams enlisted in 1862 and deserted from the 149th "Bucktails" in 1863. In December 1864, known deserters held a party in the cabin. Soldiers were tipped off and marched to Kellytown to make arrests. After Adams was killed, the cabin was occupied by the Barnett family.

Capt. Southworth marched troops from Philipsburg to Knox Township. On the night of Dec. 13, 1864, Co. C 16th VRC (Veterans Reserve Corp) of the Union Army surrounded Tom Adams' log cabin in Kellytown and requested the surrender of deserters and draft dodgers. Deserter Tom Adams fired and killed Federal soldier Edgar L. Reed of New Hampshire. Shots were fired, killing deserter Adams in the yard. Adams is buried in St. Aloysius Cemetery. Reed is buried in the Union Cemetery in Philipsburg. Eighteen men were arrested that night at the log cabin in Kellytown, and within a month, 150 more were incarcerated. Only New York City had more civil violence than Clearfield County during the Civil War, which ended four months later.

Location. 40° 53.469' N, 78° 27.685' W. Marker is in Olanta, Pennsylvania, in Clearfield County. Marker is on Curwensville Tyrone Highway (Pennsylvania Route 453) 0.1 miles west of Kellytown Road, on the right when traveling west. Located at the Bloody Knox Log Cabin site.



1840

On April 21, 1840, Clearfield (the county seat) was incorporated as a borough after becoming detached from Lawrence Township and entitled to administer its own affairs and elect its own officials. It was then declared "The Borough of Clearfield".

1841

The first wooden Presbyterian Church in Clearfield was built, with Rev. Fredrick Gregory Betts as pastorate. The present church was completed in 1869.

1846

Fr. John Batiste Berbigier came to Frenchville and coordinated the building of the first Frenchville church, rectory, and convent in the town. The church was struck by lightning in 1863, and a new one was finished in 1870. It was celebrated with a community picnic. The tradition continues today with the annual Frenchville Picnic.

1847

The first big flood happened in the fall of this year. Ringgold Mill, property of Kratzer & Barrett, was lifted from its foundation along Clearfield Creek and washed into the river. Fences, haystacks, chicken coops, dams, bridges, and lumber were carried away.

1850

Gates Hardware opens in this year and is still in operation today. It is the oldest family-operated business in Curwensville.

CLEARFIELD COUNTY HISTORICAL TIMELINE

Curwensville became the second borough of Clearfield County. Curwensville was named for John Curwen in 1799. Once the borough was established and local government formed, the town started to make improvements like sidewalks, bridges, and water systems. The town, because of the river and lumber trade, started to do well financially.

1852

The first Clearfield County Fair was held.

The cornerstone of the new courthouse was laid on June 4, 1860. They placed within the stone a tin box that contained the names of officers of the federal, state, county, and borough government, ministers, a copy of the Bible, and past and present newspapers. The construction continued in the spring of 1860 but was not completed for nearly two years. They needed to rebuild a portion of the tower due to a miscalculation made by the architect which caused uneven pressure on the columns.

1861

The Civil War begins, and Clearfield County sends hundreds of men to fight. Colonel Edward A. Irvin marches the Bucktails from Curwensville to Tyrone to join the war.

St. Patrick's Day flood, March 17, 1865. On the West Branch of the river, bridges, dams, lumber and rafts, houses, fences, and everything movable in its path were swept away. Many men drowned trying to secure or save rafts on the river.

1866

William H. Miller built a covered bridge that spanned Anderson Creek for 83 years. It was 120 feet long and 16 feet wide and could hold up to four tons. He was paid a total of \$2,300. A replica was constructed from the original lumber and can be seen at the VFW on River Street in Curwensville.

1867

In October, Mary Miller was indicted by a grand jury for the murder of her husband. She was tried before Judge Samuel Linn and a jury. She was convicted and was the first person hanged in Clearfield County.

1870

Houtzdale was granted a post office. John Brisbin was the town's first postmaster.

1870

With lands purchased from the Honorable William Bigler, the third county jail was built at the north end of 2nd Street by George Thorn, of Clearfield. The land purchase cost was \$7,000, but the structure cost was considerably more at \$68,000 per the contract. However, with other expenses, it was a much higher figure.

1871

John DuBois Jr., who was known as the "lumber king", opened up the northwest of the county with ventures that included a box factory, iron mill, and tannery. By 1900, all the trees on the DuBois family lands had been depleted.

The Pie Opera House

The Opera House block, built by Justin J. Pie around 1873-74, was Clearfield's most impressive business structure. It was centrally located on Market Street and connected to the courthouse by an iron bridge from the second story across the alley.

The ground floor primarily housed businesses such as the Regal Five and Dime store and multiple law offices. The opera house was located on the second floor at the rear of the building and could be accessed by a wide stairway leading in from the street. It had a seating capacity of 750. The third floor was used as a printing office for the *Clearfield Republican* and the lodge room of the O.U.A.M.

On Feb. 27, 1917, a fire broke out in the early morning and quickly consumed the structure. Chief J.D. Connelly and his firefighters responded swiftly to prevent the fire from spreading to the county courthouse and the Leitzinger Brothers store. Despite their efforts, the Pie Opera House was beyond saving.

The town of Rumbarger, which later became the city of DuBois, was established by John Rumbarger Jr.

Houtzdale was made a borough on March 20, 1872.

Long & Brady established a hardware store in DuBois named Long, Brady & Co. in 1876. In the summer of this year, the first suitable schoolhouse was built, known as the "Central Schoolhouse of DuBois". This was a one-story structure with two large and capacious rooms. Before the construction of this building, children had to attend the "White School", which was too small to accommodate all the children. The town continued to grow in size and in 1879, two more buildings were built, one each in west and east DuBois.

P.S. Weber opened a large and exclusive dry goods and notion store in the Knarr block of Courtney Street. Changes were so frequent in town that at one point there were close to 100 stores and other business establishments in DuBois.

First County Commissioners

Governor Thomas McKean appointed Roland Curtain from Centre County, John Fleming from Lycoming County, and James Smith, whose county is not mentioned, as commissioners. Their task was to recommend a suitable location for the county seat and report their findings to the secretary of the commonwealth. The commissioners ultimately selected land Abraham Witmer donated as the Clearfield County site. On Jan. 28, 1812, the General Assembly passed a law stipulating that the appointed commissioners would cease their authority and transfer jurisdiction to the elected commissioners, except for the selection of jurors, for which the commissioners of Centre County would retain control. The election took place in October of that same year, resulting in the selection of Hugh Jordan, Samuel Fulton, and Robert Maxwell as the first elected commissioners of Clearfield County.



First Fire Company

As we all know, what goes up must come down. So, on the fateful day of June 18, 1888, a fire broke out at John Baker's hotel near the railroad crossing on West Long Avenue. The wind blew the fire toward Main Street, then switched directions and started up West Long Avenue. It consumed everything in its path. Firefighters dynamited buildings trying to stop the progress of the flames, which ultimately spread the fire even farther. Once the wind stopped, the fire went out. By the time the fire ended, it had destroyed

everything in its path that bordered Long Avenue, Stockdale Street, East Scribner Avenue and beyond Main Street. The good thing that came out of the fire was no lives were lost, and the DuBois Volunteer Fire Department was founded.

On June 25, 1888, the first company was formed: Volunteer Second Ward. James Whithall became the first fire chief. Additionally, the first Firemen's Parade was held in June 1893.





Tom Mix

Thomas Hezekiah Mix was born Jan. 6, 1880, in Mix Run, Pennsylvania, approximately 62 miles north of State College, to Edwin Elias Mix and Elizabeth Heistand. He grew up in nearby DuBois, where his father, a stable master for a wealthy lumber merchant, taught him to ride and love horses. He worked on a local farm owned by John DuBois, a lumber businessman.

The American film actor and the star of many early Western films between 1909 and 1935 appeared in 291 films, all but nine of which were silent films. He was one of Hollywood's first Western stars and helped define the genre as it emerged in the early days of cinema and was known as the "King of Cowboys."



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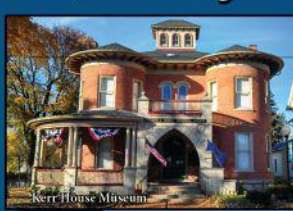
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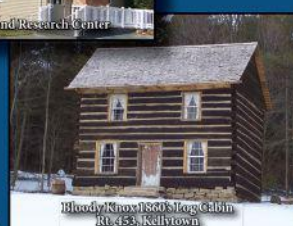

Curwensville's first steam tannery was started by William S. White and Sons. It had many owners, and in 1897 when a fire damaged the building it was the Elk Tanning Company. The tannery was rebuilt but was destroyed by another fire a few years later.

Clearfield County
Population - 43,408

Railroads arrived, reaching the county seat, Clearfield, and DuBois in 1874. The New York Central and the Buffalo, Rochester, and Pittsburgh railroads connected with the county to obtain coal, and railroad maintenance shops arose in DuBois.

1879

1881

The town of DuBois was incorporated at the January term of court in 1881. At the March term of court in 1883, the division of DuBois was made. "Rumbarger side," or "West DuBois," was designated as the First Ward; the "central" part, or the Second Ward, represented the mercantile, or business, center of town; "East DuBois," or "DuBois side," was designated as the Third Ward sector.

In March 1882, the first volunteer fire department was organized in DuBois. The town council appointed a chief marshal and two assistants, whose duties included taking charge during fires and managing the entire force of firemen and any citizens present. It consisted of a president, two vice presidents, a treasurer, and a secretary. In 1886, the borough authorities built a brick building with a truck room on the first floor, and a fireman's hall and council room on the second floor. The officers were elected at the first meeting.

1883

On Aug. 1, the First National Bank of DuBois City opened its doors on Long Street. It had the latest improved vault and superior money safe specially constructed for this bank. F.K. Arnold was the bank's first president.

1883

McCrory's five-and-dime store chain, founded by John G. McCrory, opened in the borough of DuBois. The store offered a variety of items and remained open until the 1980s.

1884

The "Independent Hook and Ladder Company" was organized. Captain G.W. Woodring was president of the first fire department.

1884

In the spring of this year, yet another ice flood occurred. The iron bridge built to replace the "Goodfellow bridge" was carried off its piers and floated down the river on the ice until it sank to the bottom opposite the Beech Creek station. On its path, it struck and carried away the west part of the Market Street Bridge.

1885

In January 1885, the town council passed an ordinance granting the right of way to W.U. Telegraph Co., establishing an office in the central part of town at the Nicholson House. Then in August of the same year, the council passed an ordinance granting right of way to Central Penna. Telephone Co., establishing its office on the corner of Long and Courtney streets and providing telephone connections with Luthersburg, Curwensville, and the county seat (Clearfield).

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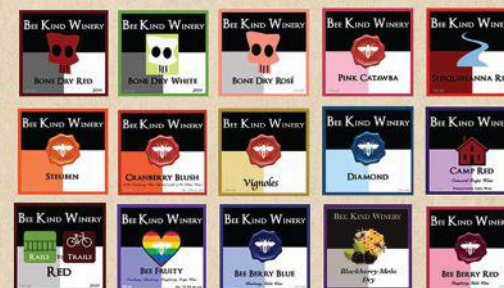


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The Dimeling Hotel



The Dimeling Hotel is a historic hotel located in downtown Clearfield, Pennsylvania. The seven-story, 120-room hotel was completed in 1904 and opened in 1905. It was designed by Louis and Michael J. Beezer of Beezer Brothers, an architectural firm based in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. The building was constructed using a fireproof floor system patented by the Beezer Brothers.

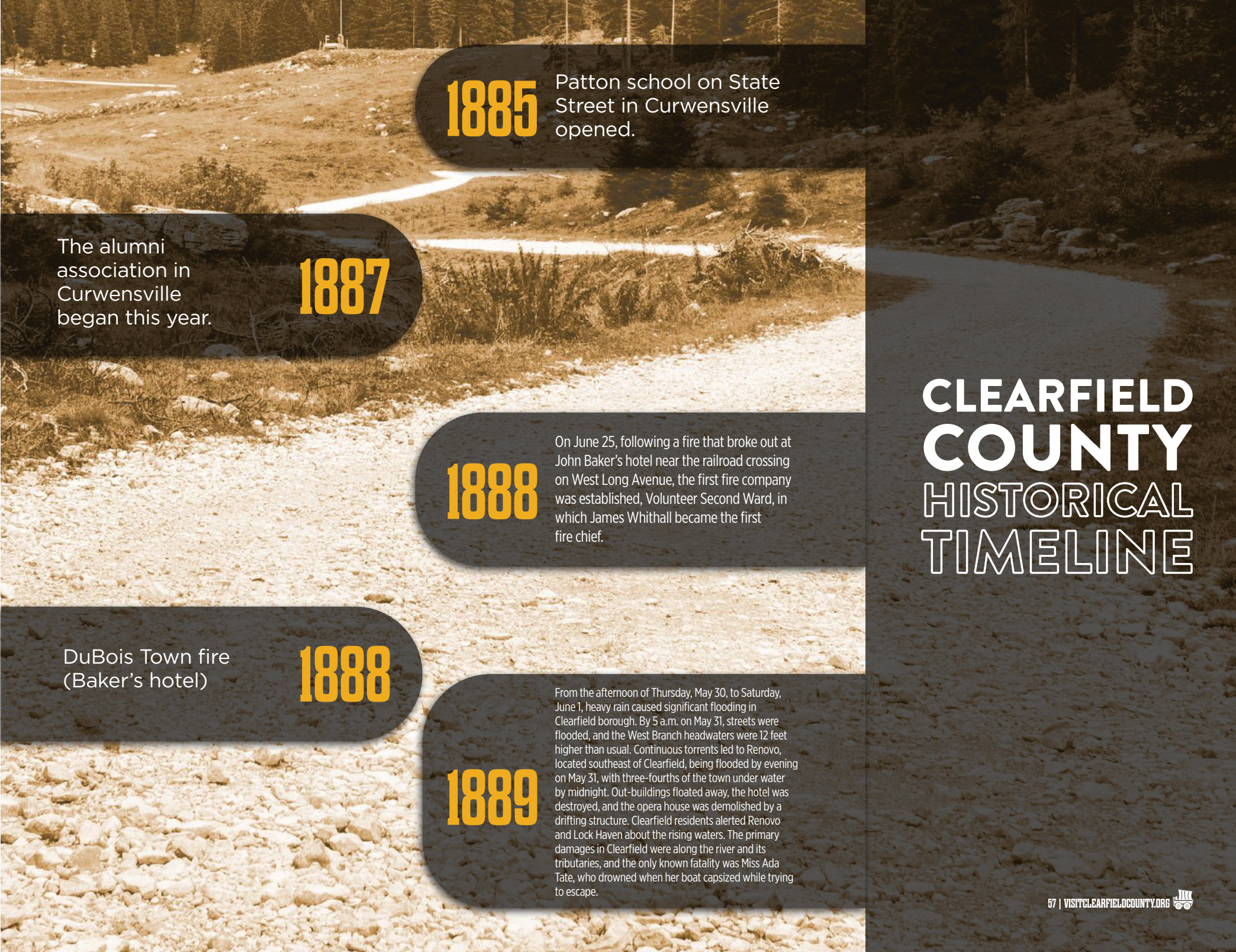
Edmund S. Shuck purchased the hotel in 1923 and the failing Clearfield National Bank, which was housed in the Dimeling building, in 1933. The Dimeling had a ballroom that covered an entire floor and was known for its glamorous events, but after Edmund purchased the bank, he converted the offices into a coffee shop. The hotel closed its doors in 1977.

In 1998, the community decided to save this historic building. Investors agreed to buy the building for \$1 and turn it into affordable senior housing. They closed the portion that was the coffee shop because it needed

much repair. The construction took nearly two years.

In 2022, the Mature Resources Area Agency on Aging decided to reopen the coffee shop. It will take much time and money to restore this part of the building's history, and the community looks forward to the restored coffee shop.

The Dimeling was known for hosting many famous people throughout the years, but it was also known for tragedies like the suicide of Walter L. McJunkin in 1915. Mr. McJunkin, an assistant cashier at Clearfield National Bank, was found lying in bed with a gunshot to the head. After the front desk tried to call his room and got no answer, they sent a bellboy to check on him. McJunkin was face down on the bed with a revolver in his hand. As an assistant cashier of the bank since its organization in 1892, he was a valued and trusted employee. His death deeply saddened the citizens of Clearfield and cast a pall of gloom over his many friends.

On June 25, following a fire that broke out at John Baker's hotel near the railroad crossing on West Long Avenue, the first fire company was established, Volunteer Second Ward, in which James Whithall became the first fire chief.

From the afternoon of Thursday, May 30, to Saturday, June 1, heavy rain caused significant flooding in Clearfield borough. By 5 a.m. on May 31, streets were flooded, and the West Branch headwaters were 12 feet higher than usual. Continuous torrents led to Renovo, located southeast of Clearfield, being flooded by evening on May 31, with three-fourths of the town under water by midnight. Out-buildings floated away, the hotel was destroyed, and the opera house was demolished by a drifting structure. Clearfield residents alerted Renovo and Lock Haven about the rising waters. The primary damages in Clearfield were along the river and its tributaries, and the only known fatality was Miss Ada Tate, who drowned when her boat capsized while trying to escape.

The first brickyard in Curwensville was completed by the Curwensville Fire Brick Co.

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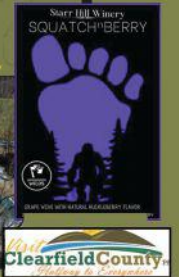


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Train Wreck of 1915

In 1915, the Altoona and Philipsburg Connecting Railroad, also known as the Alley Popper, staged a dramatic train wreck for a movie called *The Valley of Lost Hope*, directed by Romaine Fielding. The two trains, starting about a mile apart, were set on a collision course while the engineers jumped to safety. The crash, witnessed by thousands of onlookers, cost over \$25,000 but was considered an investment as it was used in at least four other productions by the Lubin Manufacturing Company. Eventually, the railroad became known as the Pittsburgh and Susquehanna Railroad.

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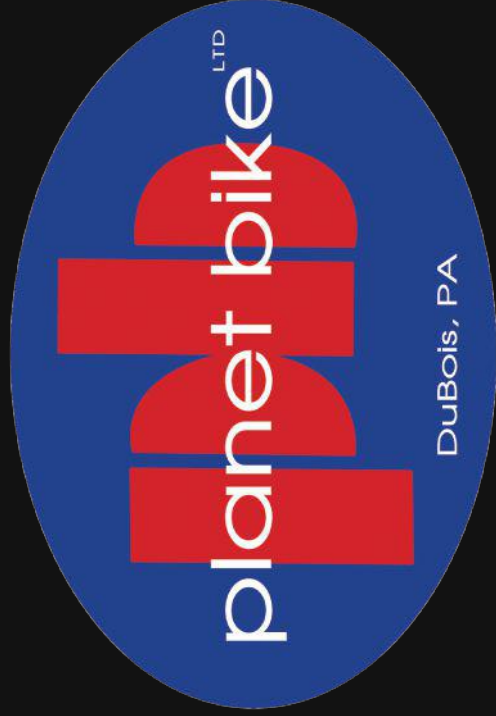
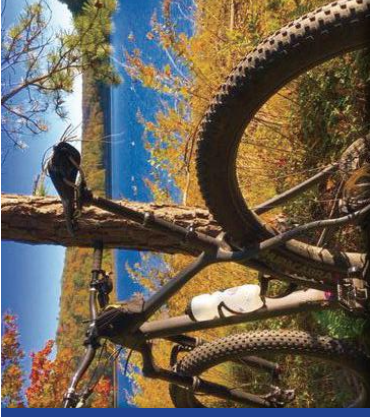
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
