Hurst Ambulance Billing Subscription

The City of Hurst is offering residents an ambulance subscription service to help offset the costs of emergency ambulance transportation. Insurance companies routinely do not pay the entire amount of ambulance transportation, leaving the patient responsible for paying the bill's balance.

The purpose of the subscription service is to cover the amount not covered by your insurance provider or Medicare. If a person does not have health care insurance, this program covers emergency medical services delivered prior to hospital arrival. An average ambulance transport can cost anywhere from \$1,400 or greater. The 2027 ambulance subscription year cost is \$75 per household. We strive to offer the most affordable prices for our citizens, while continuing with excellence in patient care. Medicaid recipients are not eligible for this program. Existing customers for the Ambulance Subscription service are able to renew in October. New customer enrollment will open November 2, 2026, and end December 31, 2026.

DIY Rainwater Harvesting Workshop

Capture water while it rains this fall to use on your landscape later! Join our workshop to learn how, then build your own rain barrel to take home for only \$25.

Rainwater harvesting is great for North Texas because you can keep some of the rain we get during the spring and fall to use during our hot and dry summers. Even a small roof area can produce a usable amount of water during an average rainfall. From huge cisterns to small DIY barrels, capturing rainwater can be done by anyone. Attend this workshop to learn the ins and outs of rainwater harvesting and purchase a discounted barrel to take home!

Learn about:

- How much water your roof will produce in a year
- Where to put your rain barrel to capture the most water
- How to install a barrel
- How to hook up and use your new water source
- How to build your own 50-gallon rain barrel with just a few supplies from the hardware store

Registration and pre-payment is required for attendance. More than one person from your household can come to the workshop with the purchase of one barrel/ticket, but only one barrel/ticket per household. This workshop is in-person and includes a class about rainwater harvesting basics and a demonstration on how to build a barrel. After the class portion, you will get to build your own rain barrel to take home. This is an educational opportunity and class attendance is required to get a barrel.

FIRE Prevention WEEK

October 4-10

The theme for 2026 is “Charge into Fire Safety: Safe Charging is a Superpower!” This campaign focuses on educating the public about everyday charging habits that can help reduce the risk of lithium-ion battery fires and keep homes and communities safer.

Lithium-ion batteries supply power to many kinds of devices, including smart phones, e-scooters, smoke alarms, toys, even cars. Here are six safety tips to keep in mind when charging.



Cheap charger? Don't chance it. Use the cord and charger that came with your device or one approved by the manufacturer.

Why it matters: Using the wrong charger can damage the battery and increase the chance of fire. Cheap or off-brand chargers may not meet important safety standards.



Soft surface? Hard pass. Charge on a hard, flat surface like a table, desk, or bare floor.

Why it matters: Devices and chargers create heat during normal charging. Soft surfaces like beds, pillows, and couches can trap heat and block airflow, which can cause a battery to over-heat.



Fully charged? Time to unplug. Unplug your device when it is fully charged.

Why it matters: Leaving a device plugged in can increase heat and stress on the battery.



For tools and rides, charge outside.

Charge large items like e-bikes, scooters, and power tools outside when possible. Do not block exits when charging.

Why it matters: These batteries are larger and store more energy. Fires can grow quickly if the battery fails.



Feels hot? Stop using it. Stop using your device if it feels very hot, starts to swell, smells strange, leaks, smokes, or makes popping or hissing sounds.

Why it matters: A damaged battery can overheat and start a fire.



On a flight? Keep it in sight. When on a plane, keep devices where you can see them while charging. Tell a flight attendant if you notice a problem with your device.

Why it matters: If a battery overheats or fails, it is important for the flight crew to be able to respond quickly.

ACCEPTED ITEMS:

- Any non-hazardous bulk items such as scrap metal, loose brush, old fencing material or other debris (no commercial).
- Electronic equipment recycling including computers, TVs, DVD players and cell phones.

NOT ACCEPTED:

- Tires & explosives.
- Construction materials, such as shingles and sheetrock.
- No more than six (6) fence panels will be accepted, unless a fence permit is shown for the address.
- Brick and rock need to be containerized.
- Compressed gas.
- Pharmaceuticals or sharps.

Residents must present their current driver's license or photo identification AND current Hurst water bill. Service does not include the disposal of hazardous waste or non-compactable waste.

Hurst Public Library unveils new stained glass mural

On July 17, the Hurst Public Library hosted a dedication and unveiling event for a new Art in Public Places stained glass mural installed in the Library's lobby.

This vibrant piece was made possible through the generosity of the Friends of the Hurst Public Library, Julie Dial, and a third special donor. The artwork honors the late Lou Dodson, a longtime Library Board member and beloved HEB ISD teacher.

The stained glass mural captures the joy and wonder of reading and celebrates the limitless power of imagination. Its dreamlike composition blends themes of family, fantasy, and the far-reaching impact of

literature through vivid, flowing color.

Casa Loma Art Glass, a family-owned stained glass studio based in Florida, designed, fabricated, and installed the piece, which is approximately 20 feet long and 6 feet tall, divided into five panes of stained glass, and inset into the existing window system with a custom frame.

Household Hazardous Waste Collection and Document Shredding

October 10

It's important to properly dispose of hazardous waste to protect the environment and ensure our community's safety. On October 10, you can bring your hazardous waste for collection. Please bring an ID and a Hurst water bill.

Accepted items: automotive fluids (10-gallon limit), batteries, cleaners & degreasers, cooking oil, lawn/garden/pool chemicals, light bulbs, and paint (limited to three five-gallon containers).

Items not accepted: ammunition or explosives, appliances or electronics, building materials, bulk trash and yard waste, butane or propane cylinders, medicines or sharps, and tires.

Document shredding will also be available as a way to help our community members prevent identity theft and protect personal information. This past summer, we shredded 3,140 pounds of paper! Three box limit, no larger than 15" x 12" x 10", accepted. There is limited space available for document shredding. Document shredding operates on a first come, first served basis.

6 Stones will be on-site collecting clothing donations from Hurst residents.

Proper disposal of household hazardous waste and other potential surface water pollutants is a concern to all. Should you become aware of any improper disposal of any stormwater or surface water pollutant, call the City's hotline at 817-788-7212.

Land study gives insight on potential for future development

On August 13, we hosted a Public Open House to share information about existing conditions in the area and gather community feedback on future possibilities.

Residents who attended weighed in on key issues, priorities, and their vision for future redevelopment.

Hurst sees continued activity across the City



Primark

The first half of 2026 reflected continued growth and momentum in the City of Hurst. In Adkins Park, more than 20 residential permits were issued for homes valued at over \$1,000,000, demonstrating strong and sustained interest in Hurst's newest neighborhood. From January to June, over 100 Certificate of Occupancy applications were submitted. New businesses include Jimmy's Pizza and Burgers, Perfumania, Senior Care of North Texas, Primark, Master Wok, Talent Yoga, Trendy Treats, Café Filipino, Charley's Cheesesteaks, Everything Halal, Handel's Ice Cream, and The Coffee Shop.

The Coffee Shop is a unique collaboration between the City of Hurst and HEB ISD, offering real-world experience for Culinary Program students, the Gene A. Buinger Career and Technical Education Academy, and the Moving into Adult Roles and Communities (MARC), which supports students ages 18–21 with special needs as they transition into adult roles. Architectural and Interior Design students, along with Welding Program students, also contributed to creating the space. Since opening in April, The Coffee Shop has welcomed more than 10,000 visitors and served over 4,000 beverages. Handel's Ice Cream, which opened in May, has already seen more than 10,000 visits in its first two months.

Looking ahead, Jam & Toast at the Shops at North East Mall and Mardel Christian Bookstore will be opening by this publication's release, with several additional retailers and restaurants currently exploring

locations in Hurst.

North East Mall continued to perform strongly, attracting more than 2.1 million visits during the quarter—an increase of 100,000 over last year. Sales tax collections are up 2.48% year-over-year.

Tourism indicators also improved, with 171,000 visitors traveling from over 50 miles away between January and June, including 126,300 overnight stays. Visitor spending reached an estimated \$11.4 million, up 6.4%, with total visits increasing 5.3%.

Commercial occupancy remains steady at approximately 91%.

New Fire Engine 201 joins Station 1

Hurst dedicates yellow truck honoring longtime color tradition

In July, we celebrated the addition of our new fire apparatus, Engine 201, with a push-in ceremony. City council, staff, and our community helped clean the truck and push it into the bay of Fire Station 1 where it will reside. This engine marks a special moment in Hurst. You'll notice it looks a little different this time. Hurst is returning to its historic yellow fire apparatus, honoring the longtime tradition that defined our fleet for decades. Our last in-service yellow unit has reached its 20 years of service now that the new Engine 201 is officially pushed-in to operation.

This engine features all-electric tools, a brand new hose, and updated equipment. As we have traditionally operated, this engine will serve on the front line for 10 years, then an additional 10 years in reserve service. Engine 201 is going to serve our community well, and we are grateful to add this innovative engine to our fleet.
