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Hall Claims Belt After Dominant Third Round Finish

Hexthorpe fighter AJ Hall produced a sensational performance to claim the BMF Amateur Bantam-weight Championship with a third-round stoppage victory over Arran Oliphant in an event staged at Barnsley Metrodome.

Hall, 26, is a plumber by trade and represents HD Performance Centre. He went into the contest having won six of his eight amateur bouts matching his Scottish opponent's 6-2 record and thus setting up an evenly matched championship contest between two talented competitors.

"The opening round proved a tough and immediately gruelling affair," said AJ, "as both of us enjoyed moments of success in a closely contested battle. But as the round progressed, I found my rhythm and I took control of the bout in the second as I raised the pace and imposed my game plan. I kept up the pressure and eventually took the fight to the ground where I unleashed a relentless barrage of punches."

The referee stepped in during round three to award Hall the victory via ground and pound stoppage as the Scottish opponent was unable to defend himself intelli-

gently. Hall had demonstrated his toughness and composure under pressure throughout and came away with an impressive victory which saw the Doncaster fighter improve his amateur record to 7-2 "I was beyond delighted to secure the BMF Amateur Bantam-weight Championship in front of my coaches, family and supporters."

"I'm grateful to everyone who helped me reach this milestone. That includes everyone at HD but with special thanks to head coach Wayne Murrie and my coaches Mark Diakiese, Joe Ambler and Jack Terry. Their dedication and guidance play a key role in my development as has unwavering support from my family."

The championship victory marks another significant step in Hall's development as one of Doncaster's promising amateur mixed martial artists. With a growing reputation, an impressive 7-2 record and now championship gold around his waist, Hall has firmly established himself as one to watch on the regional scene as he continues his journey in the sport.

Senior Cup Marks 150 Years

The Sheffield & Hallamshire Senior Cup will enter a landmark season this year after the competition unveiled a special anniversary logo to mark its 150th birthday.

Established in 1876, the Senior Cup is one of the oldest surviving football cup competitions in the world and remains one of the region's most prestigious honours. The first matches in the competition were played in November 1876, while the inaugural final took place at Bramall Lane in March 1877 when The Wednesday defeated Heeley 4-3.

To celebrate the historic milestone, Sheffield & Hallamshire County FA has launched a new identity centred around the famous Senior Cup trophy. The striking gold-coloured design incorporates the number 150 within the trophy itself and will feature prominently throughout the anniversary season.



The logo was created in collaboration with Barnsley-based graphic designer Dan Wilson, with the County FA aiming to produce a modern identity that honours the competition's rich heritage while helping tell its story to future generations.

Reflecting on the new design, Sheffield & Hallamshire FA Marketing and Communications Officer Chris McEwan said: "Reaching 150 years is a remarkable achievement for any football competition, and we're incredibly proud to be custodians of this famous competition.

"When developing the new identity, we wanted to place the iconic trophy at the heart of the design as it's instantly recognisable to so

many people in our region.

"Incorporating the number 150 into the trophy itself was a simple but effective way of celebrating the competition's history while highlighting this significant anniversary."

The launch of the anniversary logo is one of a number of initiatives planned throughout the campaign as the County FA celebrates a tournament which has played a significant role in South Yorkshire football for a century and a half.

The anniversary season will officially get under way with the opening round of the 2026-27 competition, the draw for which has now been made.

Holders Worksop Town, who defeated Worsbrough Bridge Athletic in last season's final, have received a bye into the second round. The beaten finalists also avoid first-round action, while a host of other leading clubs have been handed direct passage

into the next stage.

Athersley Recreation, Barnsley Under-21s, Dearne & District, Dinnington Town, Emley, Frickley Athletic, Hallam, Handsworth, Parkgate, Penistone Church, Rossington, Rossington Main, Sheffield FC, Sheffield Wednesday Under-23s, Stocksbridge Park Steels, Swallownest and Wombwell Town have all been given byes alongside Worksop Town and Worsbrough Bridge Athletic.

The first-round draw has produced several intriguing ties.

Maltby Main will begin their campaign at home to Dodworth Miners Welfare, while AFC Dronfield travel to Bentley. Oughtibridge War Memorial face Thorncliffe Villa and Burngreave United host Kiveton Park.

Three of the ties have already been scheduled, with Armthorpe Welfare hosting Hepworth United on August 18.

South Elmsall United welcome Doncaster Elite on August 22, before Harworth Colliery take on Denaby Main four days later on August 26.

All first-round ties must be completed by August 31 as the competition embarks on a season that will celebrate 150 years of cup football in the birthplace of the game.

For clubs across South Yorkshire and beyond, lifting the famous trophy remains one of the most coveted achievements in local football. This season, with a new logo and a major anniversary to celebrate, the competition has an added sense of occasion.

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Vase Dreams Begin

After the disappointment of last weekend's FA Cup exits, attention switches to the FA Vase this weekend, a competition specifically for clubs at Steps 5 and 6 of the National League System and one that offers a far more realistic route to Wembley for South Yorkshire's non-league hopefuls.

The scale of the competition underlines the challenge ahead. A total of 601 clubs from across England entered this season's FA Vase, meaning the road to Wembley is long, but far from impossible. Recent years have shown that clubs from the NCEL and neighbouring leagues can enjoy deep runs and, with seven South Yorkshire clubs in action this weekend and several others joining later, hopes of a memorable campaign remain very much alive.

The opening tie sees Sheffield FC host Crowle Colts on Friday evening. The Lincolnshire side are relative newcomers to the Northern Counties East League, having climbed through local football before earning promotion into NCEL Division One. They finished a respectable 10th in their debut season at Step 6 and will relish the opportunity to

test themselves against one of the competition's biggest names.

Armthorpe Welfare face one of the toughest-looking draws as Trafford make the journey from Greater Manchester. The visitors compete in the North West Counties League Premier Division and were playing in the Northern Premier League Division One West as recently as last season before suffering relegation. Trafford already have South Yorkshire scalp this season after their 2-0 victory at Worsbrough Bridge Athletic in the FA Cup on Sunday.

However, Welfare head into the game brimming with confidence. They currently lead NCEL Division One after an excellent start to the season and showed tremendous character on Tuesday evening when they recovered from 2-0 down to earn a 2-2 draw with a dramatic last-minute equaliser.

Worsbrough Bridge Athletic travel to Flixton looking to put last weekend's cup setback behind them. Bridge have adapted superbly to life back in the NCEL Premier Division following promotion and sit among the early pace-setters.

Their opponents are

one of the more fascinating stories in this season's competition. Flixton are a phoenix club who have returned to senior football after an absence of almost 15 years, rejoining the non-league pyramid this season. While reborn, they are no strangers to success. Flixton reached the FA Vase semi-finals in 1995-96, won promotion to the Northern Premier League and even had their Valley Road ground officially opened by Sir Alex Ferguson.

Worsbrough will start as favourites as the higher-ranked side, but they can expect a stern examination from opponents whose history is far richer than their current status suggests.

Dearne & District's reward for lifting last season's NCEL Division One title is another meeting with fellow champions. After winning their first two games, Zeph Thomas' side then beat United Counties League Division One champions Retford FC before suffering FA Cup heartbreak against North West Counties League First Division South champions Runcorn Town, eventually losing on penalties after a replay.

Next up are Hems-worth Miners Welfare, who secured promotion

back to the NCEL by winning the Sheffield & Hallamshire County Senior League title. The Wells return to the NCEL after a three-year absence following their enforced departure due to ground-grading issues. After installing a new full-size pitch alongside their existing surface and rebuilding the club, they have fought their way back to Step 6 and now have their sights set on a notable Vase run.

Club Thorne Colliery face a demanding trip to Horbury Town. The hosts won the NCEL Division One title in 2024-25 and successfully consolidated in the Premier Division last season. Horbury also have recent Vase history against the Colliery, having recorded a 4-1 victory when the sides met in the competition last season, giving Thorne an obvious score to settle.

Penistone Church head across the Pennines to face Stockport Georgians, a club currently enjoying the most successful period in their long history. Founded in 1908, Georgians secured promotion to Step 5 for the first time ever last season after winning through the North West Counties League Division One South play-offs.



Church's greater experience at Premier Division level could prove valuable against opponents still adjusting to life higher up the pyramid.

Wombwell Town complete the South Yorkshire interest when they entertain Golcar United. The visitors are established NCEL Premier Division members and finished 10th at Step 5 last season, having narrowly missed out on promotion a year earlier. Golcar enter the tie as favourites, but Wombwell have made a strong start to life back in Division One and will believe home advantage gives them every chance of causing an upset.

Even before a ball is kicked this weekend, several South Yorkshire clubs already know they will be involved in the next stage. Rossington Main's outstanding run in last season's competi-

tion has earned them a bye directly into the First Round Proper, allowing the Doncaster side to skip both qualifying rounds and enter the competition in October.

Parkgate, Swallow-nest, Athersley Recreation, Dronfield Town and Handsworth have also been handed byes, although theirs are to the Second Round Qualifying on September 12.

The draw has already guaranteed local representation beyond that stage as Dronfield Town and Handsworth have been paired together, ensuring at least one of our clubs will continue its Wembley journey.

For clubs operating at Steps 5 and 6, Wembley remains a dream rather than a fantasy. This weekend, for most of South Yorkshire's hopefuls, that journey begins in earnest.

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Charity Cup Campaign Begins

The 137th season of the historic Rotherham Charity Cup gets underway on Thursday evening with two ties as clubs begin their bid for one of the area's most respected grassroots trophies.

The opening action sees The Gate Inn take on Whiston FC, with the match having been switched from Wath Academy to Swinton Miners Welfare (S64 8JH). Brinsworth Whitehill face Thurcroft in the other first-round encounter at Phoenix, with both games kicking off at 6.30pm.

The competition continues to be one of South Yorkshire football's great community success stories, raising thousands of pounds for local charities while providing competitive football for clubs from across Rotherham and the surrounding districts.

Last season proved a record-breaking one for the competition, with organisers announcing that £9,000 had been raised for local good

causes. The money is being distributed among a range of charities and community groups across the borough, underlining the tournament's importance both on and off the pitch.

Attention is already turning to what could be the standout tie of the opening rounds on Thursday, August 20, when holders Brinsworth DC travel to face Wickersley CC at Sorby Way.

Brinsworth DC will be aiming to retain the trophy they lifted last season, but they face a formidable challenge against a Wickersley side that continues to underline its credentials as one of the area's leading teams. The reigning Mexborough Montagu Cup winners warmed up for their Charity Cup campaign with an impressive victory over local heavyweights Westville in Sunday's top Montagu Cup fixture, further boosting confidence ahead of the visit of the holders.

Wickersley's Montagu Cup triumph last season was a landmark



achievement for the club and they will fancy their chances of adding another major local trophy to their honours list. That sets up a mouth-watering clash between two of the area's recent cup winners, with a place in the next round at stake.

The same evening

will also see Marquis, from Rawmarsh, take on Deer Park Tap at West Melton Recreation Ground on Barnsley Road, the former home of Queens United. Both matches kick off at 6.30pm.

The remaining first-round ties are scheduled for August 27 when

Westville meet Wombwell Main and Joker face Thorpe Hesley Village.

The opening round concludes on September 3 with AFC Lord Nelson taking on AFP Press Box and Groves Social meeting Swinton Ring O'Bells.

With local pride, sil-

verware and charity fundraising all at stake, the competition once again promises plenty of interest over the coming weeks. Organisers will be hoping another strong turnout from players and supporters can build on last season's record fundraising effort as the road to the 2027 final begins.





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CUP DREAM ENDS FOR HANDSWORTH

Handsworth's FA Cup campaign came to an early end for the fourth successive season as two moments of quality from Prestwich Heys secured a 2-0 victory in the Extra Preliminary Round at Olivers Mount.

The scoreline was settled by stunning strikes from Robert Worrell and substitute Bryson Appleton, although Handsworth will feel they created enough opportunities to have taken the tie in a very different direction.

Joint manager Mark Ward admitted his side had learnt plenty from the defeat.

"It was a closely contested game," he said. "We knew Prestwich like to play out from the back, so our initial game plan was to press them high. As the game progressed, we felt they were starting to hurt us by exploiting the space behind us, so we made a tactical adjustment and looked a lot more solid."

Prestwich started brightly and James Pollard was forced into action as early as the third minute, producing the first of several excellent saves after Ellis Richardson beat the off-side trap and got away a shot from the edge of the area.

The visitors enjoyed plenty of possession during the opening stages, but Handsworth gradually worked themselves into the contest. Their first effort arrived in the 22nd minute when Rion Arbouin forced Kyle Haslam into a save following a strong run from Mitchell Dunne.

A minute later, Haslam was called upon again. The ball dropped kindly to Ben Harriott from a corner and the Handsworth defender managed to force a shot through a crowded penalty area, only for the Prestwich goalkeeper to react well.

Handsworth were beginning to threaten and Thomas McNally will feel he should have

done better when he found space at the back post but failed to direct his header on target.

There was also a moment of frustration for the hosts when Prestwich defender Tobias Green appeared to foul Handsworth skipper Tyler Williams. Both the referee and assistant waved play on and, although Green then raced clear on goal, he dragged his effort wide of the far post.

Harriott's afternoon became even more eventful just before half-time. The defender was booked after arriving late into a challenge, having initially got to the ball too early in an awkward sequence that also left him requiring treatment.

Despite Prestwich seeing more of the ball, Ward felt his side had restricted the visitors well after changing their approach.

"Although they created a couple of opportunities, Jim Pollard produced a couple of tremendous saves to keep us in the game," he said. "At the other end we caught them on the counter on numerous occasions and created some good opportunities, but unfortunately we didn't make enough of those moments."

Handsworth almost

made the perfect start to the second half.

Eight minutes after the restart, Pollard's long ball caused confusion in the Prestwich defence and Arbouin beat Haslam to the bouncing ball after the goalkeeper misjudged its flight. The striker turned and sent an effort towards the empty net, only for a covering defender to race back and clear off the line.

It proved a crucial moment.

Just three minutes later Prestwich broke the deadlock through a goal worthy of winning any cup tie. Worrell carried the ball across the pitch some 30 yards from goal before unleashing a magnificent strike into the top corner, giving Pollard absolutely no chance.

"It was a fantastic strike into the top corner," said Ward. "That changed the dynamics of the game."

The contest became increasingly scrappy as Handsworth looked for a route back into the tie. Prestwich nearly doubled their lead with 11 minutes remaining when Richardson found himself unmarked but headed over from close range.

The second goal eventually arrived two minutes later and again

it was a strike of real quality. A slick passing move worked the ball to substitute Appleton on the edge of the penalty area and he unleashed an excellent finish across Pollard and into the far corner.

With the visitors now firmly in control, Handsworth were unable to find a response and it was Prestwich who celebrated progression into the next round.

Ward, however, took encouragement from aspects of the performance despite the disappointment of elimination.

"Prestwich certainly had more of the ball and sustained more attacks, but I felt our players worked extremely hard, maintained their discipline and created enough opportunities to get something from the game. Unfortunately, it just wasn't our day.

"There are plenty of positives and some important lessons for us to take forward. We need to continue working on our high press and improve our quality in possession because we made too many unforced errors at times.

"From a league perspective it's been a really positive start. Four points from our opening games gives us plenty to be encouraged by and we remain positive as we look ahead to the next challenge."

Prestwich's reward is a trip to face Dearne & District's penalty shootout victors Runcorn Town on August 22.

Ironically, Handsworth will now play Dearne on the same date which promises to be a top match.

EARLY ERRORS COST HALLAM

Hallam's first league defeat under joint managers Danny and Richard Patterson came at Sandygate as two costly early mistakes handed Lincoln United a 2-0 victory.

The Countrymen were looking to bounce back from Sunday's disappointing 3-0 FA Cup defeat at home to Irlam, but found themselves chasing the game inside the opening 20 minutes and were ultimately unable to find a way back.

Despite the result, the Pattersons were encouraged by much of what they saw from a youthful Hallam side.

"I thought we were miles better," said Richard Patterson afterwards. "That's how I wanted us to react to certain situations and they did, especially second half. We played how we can play and matched them everywhere. That's the standard we need to keep."

Lincoln arrived in South Yorkshire on the back of a 2-0 FA Cup victory at Grantham Town and settled into their rhythm quickly.

Their opening goal came after Hallam conceded a needless free-kick in a dangerous area. Goalkeeper Ben Grainger, signed earlier in the day on a short-term loan from Sheffield United's development set-up following Hugo Warhurst's injury at the weekend, came for the delivery but missed his punch. The loose ball dropped kindly for Liam Moran, who could not miss from close range in the sixth minute.

Hallam attempted to respond immediately, but their problems were compounded 15 minutes later.

Bolton Makwedza lost possession deep in Lincoln territory and the visitors broke at pace. Rio Molyneaux raced through before attempting to round Jack Dando, who brought him down just inside the area. Molyneaux picked himself up and emphatically dispatched the resulting penalty to double Lincoln's advantage.

The visitors were full

of confidence by that stage and Molyneaux continued to cause problems. Another burst forward from the winger forced Dando into a challenge that earned the Hallam defender a booking, although the presence of covering defender Alfie Smith prevented a more severe punishment.

Hallam were left frustrated midway through the half when Makwedza burst through the centre and appeared to be pulled back by a recovering defender. The midfielder managed to stay on his feet and get a shot away, but the effort lacked power and was gathered by the goalkeeper, with referee Jodie Hunter allowing play to continue.

Danny Patterson felt the difference had come down to moments at either end.

"Overall, the game's been won on two mistakes by us," he said. "In general play we've matched them, if not been the better team at

times. I think we're learning quickly in this league that you can't make those mistakes because more often than not you get punished."

Trailing by two goals at the interval, Hallam needed a reaction and they produced one.

The hosts played with far greater purpose after the break, with winger Ethan Kachosa becoming an increasingly influential figure. He repeatedly drove at the Lincoln defence and his direct running caused all manner of problems, although Hallam struggled to convert promising positions into clear-cut opportunities.

Their best chance arrived in the 74th minute. Substitute Leon Howarth found himself through one-on-one with the goalkeeper, but he failed to make a proper connection and Lincoln were able to gather comfortably.

Grainger, meanwhile, recovered well from his early error and produced several impressive saves to keep

Hallam in the contest.

"It's a young goalkeeper who's made a mistake," said Danny Patterson. "After that I thought he pulled off three brilliant saves. Dando put in a captain's performance and I thought a lot of the younger lads did really well."

The game became increasingly scrappy during the closing stages, with emotions occasionally boiling over. One such incident even saw joint manager Richard Patterson shown a yellow card from the technical area.

Although Hallam were unable to find a route back into the game, there was a sense afterwards that the performance had contained more positives than the scoreline suggested.

"The difference between this league and the one below is that mistakes get punished," said Richard Patterson.

"But we've signed players who have the ability to play at this level and they'll learn

quickly. We've got more than enough ability about us and the wins will come."

Danny Patterson agreed and believes his players can take confidence from their response after falling two goals behind.

"We don't need picking up after this one," he said. "The lads are hurting, and that's a good sign because it shows they care."

"As we came back into the dressing room, Lincoln's lads were singing and dancing about as though they'd won the cup. I told our lads to listen to it and take it in because that's where we want to get to."

"They've got experienced players who have won things and know how to manage games. That's what our group needs to learn from. If we keep performing like we did in the second half, we'll be fine."

Hallam will look to bounce back when they travel to Bridlington on Saturday searching for their first victory under

the Patterson management team.

Parkgate and Steels Fly County Flag

FA CUP ROUND-UP

Parkgate were the county's only winners on the pitch as South Yorkshire's FA Cup hopes took an early hit.

The Steelmen claimed local bragging rights and progression with a disciplined 2-0 victory over Sheffield in front of a crowd of 705.

Goals from Alex Bonnington and Bradley Gregory settled the tie, but the scoreline did not tell the full story. Sheffield manager Vill Powell felt his side had dominated possession and chances, only to be punished for two costly mistakes.

"We dominated the game with chances and possession, which means nothing because we're out," said Powell.

"They've come and done a job on us. We created 10 or 15 chances and in other games we probably score plenty of them."

Powell was particularly frustrated that both goals stemmed from errors rather than Parkgate opening his side up.

Parkgate manager Scott Mason was delighted with the way his team carried out their game plan.

"We came here with a game plan and stuck to it," he said.

"We rode our luck at times but took our chances.

"We worked really hard from back to front and kept our shape. They are a really good side and we've got to be proud of our performance tonight."

Dearne & District's first FA Cup adventure ended in heartbreaking fashion despite producing two displays that suggested they belonged at this level.

After battling to a 2-2 draw at Runcorn Town on Saturday, Zeph Thomas's side took the tie to penalties following a goalless replay on Tuesday night. However, it was the visitors who held their nerve from 12 yards, winning the shoot-out 4-1 to progress.

The outcome was particularly cruel on Dearne after they had looked set to win the original tie when Jamie Austin converted an 89th-minute penalty to make it 2-1, only for Connor Spiers to level almost immediately and force the replay.

Manager Zeph Thomas felt his side deserved more from the initial contest.

"I'm gutted for the lads because I think we've been good value to get the win," he said.

"First half was quite even and they probably had the better chances, but second half I thought we were well on the front foot.

"We had a goal disallowed which I don't think was a foul and there only looked like one team that was going to go on and win it."

Although their cup run is over, Dearne can take considerable encouragement from a first-ever campaign in the competition.

Handsworth's campaign also came to an end despite a display that suggested the scoreline was harsh on the hosts.

Prestwich Heys secured a 2-0 victory at Olivers Mount, but only after producing two moments of exceptional quality. After Handsworth had seen Rion Arbouin denied by a goal-line clearance, Robert Worrell broke the deadlock with a stunning long-range effort into the top corner before Bryson Appleton wrapped up victory with another excellent finish.

Joint manager Mark Ward felt his side had created enough opportunities to get something from the tie but admitted the quality of the visitors' finishing proved decisive.

Penistone Church co-manager Brett Lovell was left immensely proud of his players despite a 4-1 defeat at Liversedge.

Missing seven first-team players, Church produced an excellent display against higher-level opposition and took a deserved lead when Lennon O'Grady finished calmly shortly after half-time. For long periods the South Yorkshire side matched their Northern Premier League East opponents and looked capable of causing an upset.

The turning point arrived when Antony Brown equalised after a series of defensive blocks fell kindly for the hosts. A disputed penalty then allowed Ben Atkinson to put Liversedge ahead before two late Lewis Barlow goals added gloss to the final scoreline.

"The 4-1 scoreline probably suggests different, but it wasn't a 4-1 scoreline," said Lovell.

"We've run a really

good Step 4 side close today and I'm ultra-proud of the players."

Rossington Main's interest in the competition ended with a 3-0 defeat at 1874 Northwich, although the game was far more competitive than the result suggests.

Rosso created chances during a lively first half, with Brad Grayson going close on several occasions, but a defensive mix-up allowed Kevin Spinelli to open the scoring.

Rossington remained firmly in the contest until Spinelli struck again immediately after the restart. Harry Lynn soon added a third and, despite further effort from the visitors, Northwich comfortably saw out the closing stages.

Sunday brought no change in fortune for South Yorkshire's clubs.

Hallam suffered a 3-0 defeat at home to Irlam despite creating a number of opportunities of their own. Billy Hasler-Cragg scored twice, either side of an Abubakar Muhammed strike, as the visitors progressed.

Hallam co-manager Danny Patterson was blunt in his assessment afterwards.

"Not good enough, to be fair. Not good enough in every aspect of the game and not good enough in either box."

Patterson felt Hallam had opportunities to make the tie more competitive but pointed to missed chances, an early injury setback and a second-half dismissal as key moments.

Worsbrough Bridge Athletic completed a disappointing weekend

for the county's clubs as Trafford left the Totally Training Stadium with a 2-0 victory.

Scott Sephton put the visitors ahead before Harry Norris sealed the win late on. Despite the defeat, the Briggers were left reflecting on the fine margins after seeing a header crash against the crossbar and having two penalty appeals turned away.

Manager Lee Morris felt his side had more than held their own against opponents who finished two divisions higher last season.

"Two equal teams which were two divisions apart last year," he said.

"We switched off twice and you get punished against top teams."

The results may show only one South Yorkshire victory in the Extra Preliminary Round, but there was no shortage of encourage-

ment beneath the disappointment. Sheffield dominated possession and chances without reward, Handsworth were undone by two outstanding strikes, Penistone pushed higher-ranked opposition all the way and Dearne's first FA Cup campaign ended only after a penalty shoot-out.

Parkgate's reward for defeating Sheffield is a Preliminary Round trip to Pontefract Collieries, who entered the competition with a bye. Stocksbridge Park Steels also begin their FA Cup campaign in the Preliminary Round after receiving a bye and will host Wythenshawe, who progressed with a 2-0 win over Padiham. With Dearne falling to a penalty shoot-out defeat against Runcorn Town, Parkgate and Stocksbridge now fly the South Yorkshire flag in this season's competition.

The beginning of a new season is meant to be a reset. What happened before doesn't matter, it's all about the next 42 games. But just because that is meant to be the case, doesn't mean it is.

right at the goalkeeper.

Stocksbridge had further good opportunities and fans were ready to celebrate when the returning Charlie Oglesby connected with a diving header, only for the ball to go wide of the far post. Seeing these chances go anywhere but the back of the net was something Steels fans wanted to put in the past.

And in the second half, the story started to repeat. Heaton Stannington came out the stronger team and soon took advantage of that. Stocksbridge cleared a corner but only to the midfield, who dis-

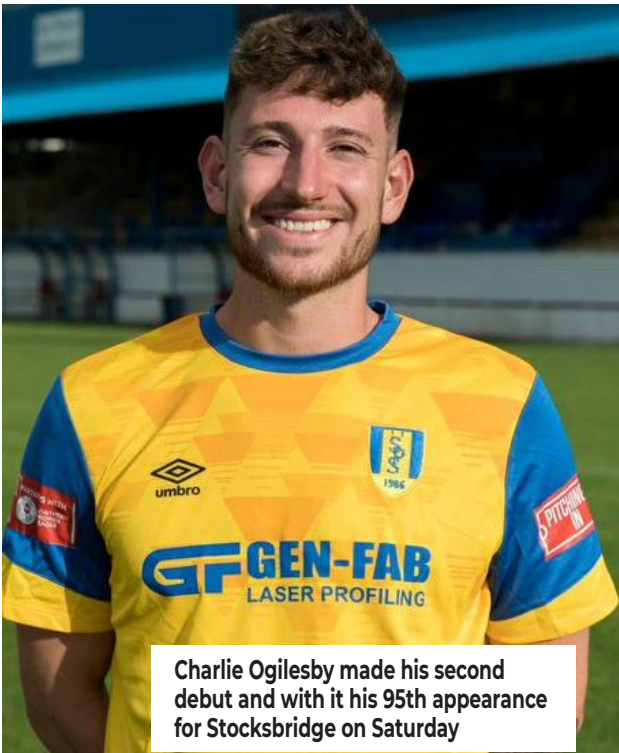
tributed it back to Cameroun Gascoigne, nephew of Paul, who whipped in his effort into the bottom of the corner.

But that dagger in the heart of Stocksbridge could go deeper and Heaton Stannington were happy to push it further in. 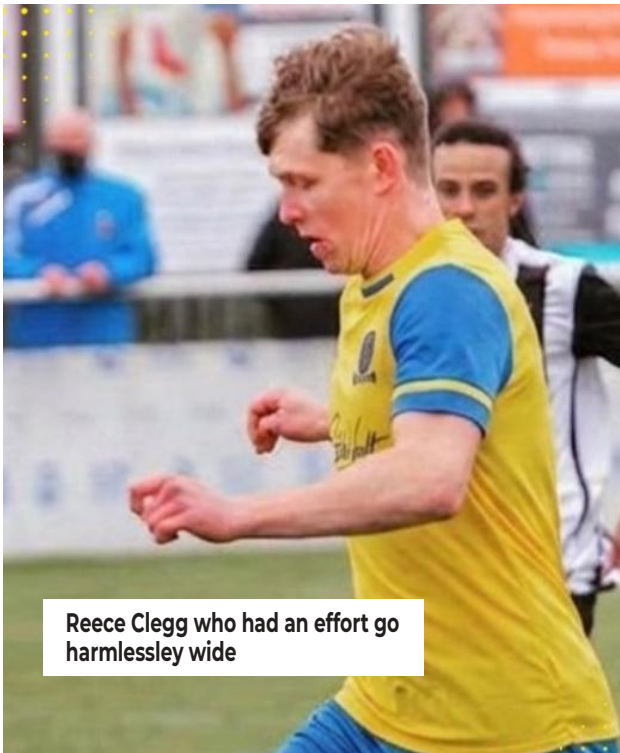
before going into the back of the net.

Cup Exit Adds To Tough Start

The opening week of Hallam's competitive season has provided an early reality check, with the Countrymen suffering back-to-back home defeats at Sandygate.

There was huge anticipation surrounding Sunday's Emirates FA Cup Extra Preliminary Round tie against Irlam. The world's oldest football ground was packed with expectation as Hallam looked to begin another memorable cup journey, but instead it was the visitors celebrating after a convincing 3-0 victory.

FA Cup afternoons have created some of the greatest moments in Hallam's modern history, and there was genuine hope that the Countrymen could build momentum following a positive pre-season campaign. Instead, Irlam proved clinical when it mattered, ending Hallam's interest in this season's competition at the very first hurdle.

The defeat was a disappointment not only because of the result itself, but also because the FA Cup remains one of the biggest opportunities available to clubs at this level. Progress brings financial rewards, increased attention and the chance to create lasting memories for supporters. For Hallam, that

dream has already been put on hold for another year.

If Sunday's setback was difficult to take, Tuesday night's Northern Premier League East Division opener against Lincoln United offered an immediate opportunity for a response.

Unfortunately for the Countrymen, the evening followed a similar pattern.

Lincoln arrived at Sandygate full of confidence after progressing in the FA Cup and showed their quality by establishing a two-goal advantage before the interval. Hallam were beaten 2-0, leaving them still searching for their first competitive goal of the campaign after 180 minutes of football.

Two defeats in four days is not the start anybody associated with the club wanted, particularly after the excitement generated during the summer. However, there is a strong argument that perspective is required.

The season is only one league game old and Hallam remain under the joint management of Danny and Richard Patterson, who have earned plenty of credit for the progress made at Sandygate in recent years. Expectations have risen alongside the club's ambitions, but one difficult week does not erase the positivity surrounding the project. A challenging start in August will not define a campaign that still has many

months left to run.

Supporters will also point to the fact that several new faces have arrived during the close season and need time to settle. Hallam's recruitment has been ambitious, bringing players with experience and proven quality into the squad.

Among those returning to Sandygate is midfielder James Matthews, whose second spell with the club was announced shortly before the campaign began. Matthews joins a group of summer recruits that includes Bubacarr Sama, Danai Rhule, Rhys Plater, Bolton Makwedza, Tom Hinton and Jacob Priestnall, all of whom were added as Hallam prepared for life at Step 4.

The club has also enjoyed some encouraging off-field developments in recent weeks. Hallam confirmed earlier this summer that Sandygate had successfully achieved the required ground grading standards, receiving the highest grade possible as the club continues to strengthen its infrastructure.

Another notable item of news over the past week was confirmation of the club's Annual General Meeting arrangements. Hallam announced details for members as the club continues to focus on its long-term future and supporter involvement while adapting to the de-

mands of competing at a higher level of the non-league pyramid.

Attention now quickly turns back to football matters.

Saturday's trip to Bridlington Town suddenly feels important. Nobody inside the Hallam dressing room will be panicking after one league fixture, but there is little doubt they will be eager to put points on the board and reignite the optimism generated during pre-season. The fixture list offers little respite, with another away match at North Ferriby following next week before the Countrymen return to Sandygate later in the month.

For supporters, the message is simple. Stick with the team.

Hallam have experienced memorable highs over recent years and those successes were built on patience, togetherness and resilience. The opening week of the new campaign has undoubtedly been disappointing, but seasons are never judged in August.

The challenge for the Patterson brothers and their players is to ensure this difficult start becomes nothing more than an early stumble rather than the beginning of a worrying trend. The response over the next few weeks will reveal far more about Hallam's prospects than the results of the past four days.

One thing is certain. After a bruising week at Sandygate, the Countrymen will be des-

perate to turn the page and give their supporters something to cheer.

Bottesford Town produced one of the weekend's standout scorelines, beating Aylestone Park 6-3 in a frenetic contest. Owen Vincent netted in the first minute and again on 61, Jack McMenemy struck twice, Jaime Ture added a brace, and Bottesford led 4-0 at the break. Aylestone Park rallied late through Saxon Nicholls, Labeed Ahmada from the spot, and Cory Pinchbeck, but the damage had long been done.

Crook Town were comfortable 4-0 winners over Pickering Town, with Glen Hargrave scoring a penalty

on eight minutes and again late on, Kobey Erratt Thompson adding a third, and Ben Scothern rounding off the scoring. Barton Town hit seven away at Deeping Rangers, inspired by four goals from Albie Collier. Horbury Town earned a 1-1 draw with Golcar United, Keenan Davies Mosley levelling after George Doyle's first half penalty.

Keighley Town fell 1-0 to Longridge Town, Harry Williamson scoring six minutes after the restart. Knaresborough Town claimed a 2-1 win over Whickham, with William Lenehan and Jonathan White on target before Josh Houghton's stoppage time reply.

Liversedge impressed with a 4-1 victory over Penistone Church, recovering from Lennon O'Grady's early second half opener to score four times through Antony Brown, Ben Atkinson from the spot, and a late double from Lewis Barlow.

Runcorn Town and Dearne & District shared a 2-2 draw, Connor Spiers scoring twice late on to rescue the home side after goals from Adam Baskerville and Jamie Austin's penalty. Skegness Town were beaten 2-0 by Retford FC, an own goal on 76 minutes followed by Bernard Nsiah Yaa's stoppage time finish.

Tadcaster Albion drew 1-1 with Glossop North End, Oliver Parker's early own goal cancelled out by Owen Warburton. Thackley struck twice in the final minutes to beat Albion Sports 2-1, with Reuben Bartkiw and Lewis Sugden's penalty overturning Talent Ndlovu's

earlier spot kick.

In NCEL Division One, Athersley Recreation and Crowle Colts played out a goalless draw. Leeds UFCA were 4-1 winners over Club Thorne Colliery, racing into a four goal lead through Omar Sanyang's brace, Fraser Day and Kalaab Daniel.

Route One Rovers delivered the weekend's most emphatic result, beating Appleby Frodingham 9-0 with Zak Khan scoring five times. Tuesday and Wednesday's fixtures delivered a full sweep of drama across the Macron Northern Counties East Football League and the FA Cup, with penalty heartbreak, late goals, and some emphatic early season statements.

The biggest crowd of the midweek came at Dearne & District, where 802 watched a gruelling FA Cup Extra Preliminary Round replay that refused to produce a goal across 120 minutes. ROUGH WEEK FOR SOUTH YORKSHIRE FOUR

UNITED COUNTIES LEAGUE

After the encouraging starts made by Sheffield FC, Dronfield Town, Maltby Main and Swallownest, it proved a far more difficult week for South Yorkshire's representatives in the United Counties League, with just a single victory recorded across the quartet.

The biggest disappointment came at the Home of Football Stadium where Sheffield FC saw their FA Cup hopes ended by local rivals Parkgate.

Vill Powell's side went into the Extra Preliminary Round tie on the back of an unbeaten start in the Premier Division North, but goals from Alex Bonnington and Bradley Gregory secured a 2-0 victory for the visitors and ended Club's participation at the first hurdle.

The result brought an abrupt halt to Sheffield's encouraging start to the campaign, although their focus now switches quickly to the FA Vase clash with Crowle Colts on Friday before they return to league action at home to Hucknall Town next Tuesday.

In Division One, Dronfield Town were unable to build on the momentum generated by successive victories over Pinchbeck United and Swallownest.

Their winning run came to an end at Stapleford Town on Saturday as the hosts struck twice before half-time to claim a 2-0 victory.

Town responded positively on Tuesday evening, however, by collecting a point from a 1-1 draw away at South Normanton Athletic.

The hosts took the lead and looked on course for victory before Sam Bebbington rescued Dronfield with a late equaliser three minutes from time.

While four points from the last four matches represents a dip from the highs of the previous week, seven points from five league fixtures still leaves Chris Milling-

ton's side within touching distance of the promotion-chasing pack.

For Swallownest, it was a week of mixed emotions.

Jamie Housley's side travelled to Cotgrave on Saturday hoping to halt a run of defeats but found themselves on the receiving end of a 4-1 reverse after the hosts raced into a commanding early lead.

The response could hardly have been better.

Back at the Swall-Siro on Tuesday night, Swallownest ground out a valuable 1-0 victory over Pinxton to end their losing run. Callum Nix proved the difference, his goal securing three much-needed points and providing a timely boost after a difficult spell.

The victory lifts Swallownest onto six points from their opening five matches and keeps them firmly in touch with the teams in the top half of the table.

At Maltby Main, meanwhile, it proved another frustrating week.

The Miners suffered a 2-1 home defeat against Harrowby United despite showing real character after the break.

The visitors established a two-goal advantage before

Shaun-Michael Tai reduced the arrears for Maltby during the second half. The home side pushed hard in search of an equaliser but Harrowby held firm to take all three points.

Things became even tougher on Wednesday evening when high-flying Shirebrook Town arrived at Muglet Lane.

Shirebrook have emerged as one of the early Division One pace-setters and underlined exactly why with a convincing 4-1 victory. Maltby's consolation could do little to prevent a third consecutive defeat, leaving the Miners looking to halt a worrying slide after the promise shown in their 4-0 victory at Clifton All Whites just over a week ago.

Elsewhere, the Division One table is already beginning to develop a familiar shape.

Clipstone remain unbeaten and among the early front-runners, while Shirebrook Town have surged to the summit after taking 13 points from their opening five matches. Southwell City continue to impress and remain firmly in contention near the top.

Dronfield, despite taking only one point this week, remain in

touch with the leading group on seven points. Swallownest's win over Pinxton moved them onto six points, while Maltby's recent struggles leave them searching for momentum after slipping into the lower half of the standings.

In the Premier Division North, Ashby Ivanhoe continue to set the early pace, while Sheffield's league form remains respectable despite the disappointment of their FA Cup exit.

For South Yorkshire's four clubs, it was not a week full of celebrations.

Yet there were still reasons for optimism. Dronfield showed resilience to rescue a point, Swallownest ended their losing run and Sheffield remain unbeaten in league action despite their cup disappointment.

With the season still in its infancy, the coming week already looks important. Sheffield have the chance to bounce back in the Vase, while Dronfield, Maltby and Swallownest will all be eager to turn isolated positives into the kind of sustained momentum needed to challenge towards the top of Division One.

The Montagu Cup quarter-final line-up is almost most complete after a gripping weekend of knockout football produced a series of closely contested ties, with holders Wickersley CC surviving the headline clash against former champions Westville.

The highest-scoring game of the weekend came at AFP Press Box, who emerged 5-4 winners against Deer Park Tap in an all-Rotherham & District Sunday League thriller.

Jamie Austin struck twice, with Matthew Langley, Justin Green-

wood and Damien Wiczorek also finding the target. Deer Park Tap pushed them all the way through goals from Billy Wright, Harley Moore, Jayden Roberts and Ousseffi Sayao, but AFP held on to reach the last eight.

Another all-league affair saw The Cottage edge fellow Barnsley Sunday League side Athersley Rec 2-1. Sam Whitlam and Zach Worral scored the goals that secured progression, while Eddie Agnew replied for Rec.

Brinsworth DC continued their impressive campaign with a 3-1 victory over seven-time Montagu Cup winners Wombwell Main. Josh Nodder was the star performer with two goals, while Joe Simpson added another. Tom Ford scored Wombwell's consolation as the County Senior League outfit bowed out.

Whiston ensured another Rotherham Sunday League representative progressed by defeating Doncaster Sunday League side ZK Dons 2-1. Blake Free-

man and Lewis McMichael netted for Whiston, with Ritchie Bakuru on target for the visitors.

The closest finish of the day came at Scawthorpe Herons, where penalties were needed after a 1-1 draw with Brinsworth Whitehill. Jack Roberts scored for the Herons and Dillon Gregory replied before the Doncaster side held their nerve from the spot to become the only Doncaster Sunday League team guaranteed a place in the quarter-finals.

The final outstanding first-round tie was also

completed, with Doncaster City Under-23s overcoming Thorpe Hesley Village 3-1 following last week's abandonment due to a serious injury. Ollie Bowes, Diar Mahmud and Harvey Scratherd scored for City, while Ian Donnelly replied for Thorpe Hesley.

Before the semi-final line-up can be completed, Doncaster City Under-23s must first face South Elmsall United Services in the remaining round of 16 tie this Sunday. South Elmsall have already caught the eye with a 5-

o victory over AFC Monkwood earlier in the competition and will be looking to join the quarter-final field.

Three quarter-finals are already confirmed. Brinsworth DC host Scawthorpe Herons, AFP Press Box welcome The Cottage, while holders Wickersley CC take on Whiston as they continue their bid to retain the trophy.

With reigning champions, former finalists and surprise packages all still in the hunt, the race for Montagu Cup glory is entering a fascinating phase.

Reds Target Promotion Glory

The 2026-27 FA Women's National League begins on Sunday with the Division One Midlands fixtures including Barnsley Women vs Chesterfield and Kidderminster Harriers vs Sheffield FC.

Barnsley started last season strongly, but suffered a dip during November through to January and then recovered to finish fourth. Once again playing their home fixtures at The Steel City Stadium, they are hoping to mount a much stronger title challenge in the months ahead.

Though they would very much wish to be playing their home games in Barnsley, that has not proved possible. The Steel City Stadium has, geography apart, significant advantages over any venue Barnsley, who are independent of Barnsley FC (hence Oakwell is not an option) could use in the town.

Craig Richardson, appointed early in the 2024-25 season continues as manager and he is optimistic about finishing as champions and so gaining promotion to the third tier which would represent Barnsley's highest ever standing.

Barnsley's defence is again expected be strong. They conceded 25 goals in their 22 League games last season, but the quirkiness of that statistic was that Barnsley conceded 5 in both games against Boldmere St Michael and also 5 in the home game against Leafield Athletic. Both those teams finished above fourth place Barnsley. Barnsley did not concede more than once in their other 19 Division One fixtures.

Adding firepower is Aaliyah Nolan who was second in the individual scoring charts in the North East Regional Women's Football League, but also top scorer for her club, with 19 for Bradford City who

finished Premier Division champions and so reclaimed their place in the fourth tier of the FAWNL Division One North.

Also new to Barnsley this season are Sami Brooks and Nicole Kemp, both of whom were at Sheffield in 2024-25. Millie Wortley and Emily Cattle have also bolstered Barnsley's ranks.

It has been another busy summer for personnel movement at Sheffield FC. Newly promoted as East Midlands Regional Women's Football League Premier Division champions in 2025, their intake included Lexie Butterworth, Alesha Gale, and Lauren Winter from Rotherham United, plus Imogen Fowler and Steph Warren from Chesterfield.

All five players were named on the team sheet in an opening game 1-0 home win (Winter scoring) over Kidderminster a year ago. Sheffield face Kidderminster in their opening game again, but this time it is Kidderminster who are at home. None of the aforementioned quintet remain at Sheffield.

A top half of the table finish (sixth) and reaching the County Cup final represented a solid return to the FAWNL. However, the dust had barely settled on last season than Sheffield announced a parting of the ways with manager Graham Abercrombie.

Several weeks later it was announced that Dan O'Hearne and Martin Powell would be taking over the managerial reins. The pair are no strangers to the women's game.

Gale, whose stay at Sheffield was brief before departing for College in USA, has rejoined Rotherham, as has Winter. Also leaving Sheffield for The Millers is Becky Kendell.

Fowler and Warren have also returned to their former pastures of Chesterfield who have also attracted the services Tilly Hallas-Potts and Butterworth, the last named having been

with Chesterfield at youth level. Butterworth's move was only announced this week showing how fluid things can be in the build up to a new season. Also known to have left Sheffield is Stacey Buxton, most likely joining Rotherham, but this had yet to be confirmed.

While Sheffield have lost a significant part of the nucleus of last season's team, their incoming players offer optimism, especially if the influx settle quickly.

Laura Bartup, an accomplished striker previously with Barnsley Women, Hull City and Leeds United, will prove an asset. Bartup is equally as dangerous outside the penalty area as in it and she has some spectacular strikes to her name.

Goalkeeper Georgia Bougas has also signed. Recently married, "Bob" (aka Georgia Wattam as per her maiden name) has appeared for several teams previously, including Barnsley and Doncaster Rovers Belles.

Ella Brennan, last season's Fans' Player of the Year at Stourbridge is another new face at Sheffield. Evie Lavery has moved from Sheffield United PGA. Central defender Eve Shepherd, who played several times for tier three Derby County last term is another new face.

Besides those moves mentioned above Chesterfield, who finished East Midlands Regional Women's Football League Premier Division champions have signed Emily Cahill (from Doncaster Rovers Belles who were relegated from the FAWNL last season). They join a club which has a strong element of former South Yorkshire players while manager Pete Jarvis was previously in that role at Rotherham United.

Pre-season friendlies continued last weekend, though not without cancellations, hastily rearranged opponents and a mixture of how much clubs were willing to divulge.

Barnsley lost 5-1 at York City, while Belles
