Also, our pumpkin is now in the hallway where even MORE people can see it.

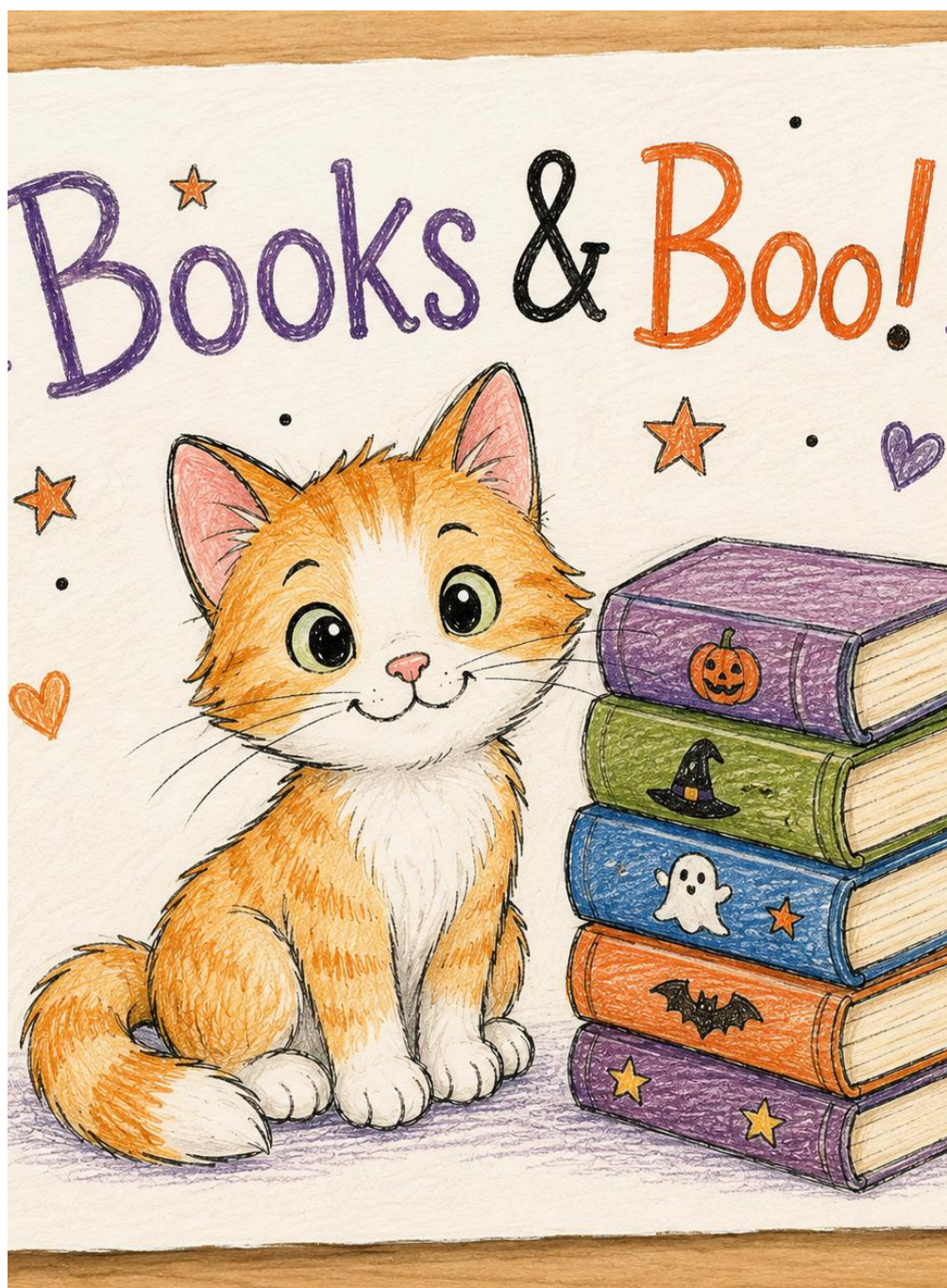
Sometimes solving a problem can make the original idea even better.
