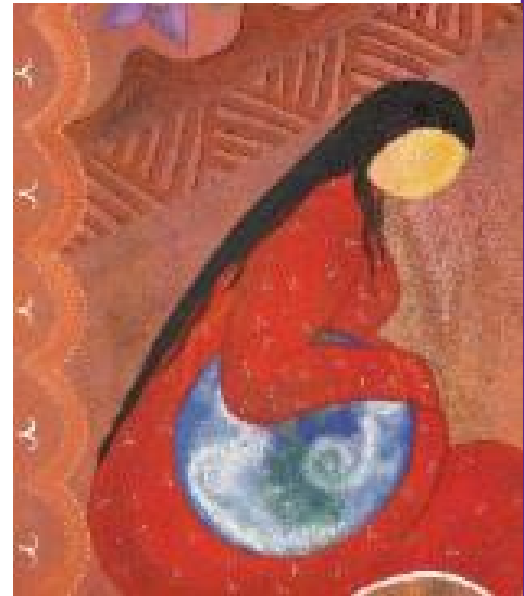

Ó:nenhste/Corn — A Story Rooted in the Earth

Our relationship with corn begins with the story of Sky Woman.

It is said that Sky Woman lived in the Sky World before falling through a hole in the sky toward an endless sea. The animals saw her coming and worked together to help her. They brought soil from beneath the water and placed it on the back of a giant turtle. And so, Turtle Island was formed.

Sky Woman had been pregnant before her journey to the new earth. Her daughter eventually grew into a young woman and gave birth to twin boys. After her daughter passed away, Sky Woman buried her in the new earth.

From her body came precious gifts—including corn, beans and squash. The Three Sisters would go on to nourish generations.

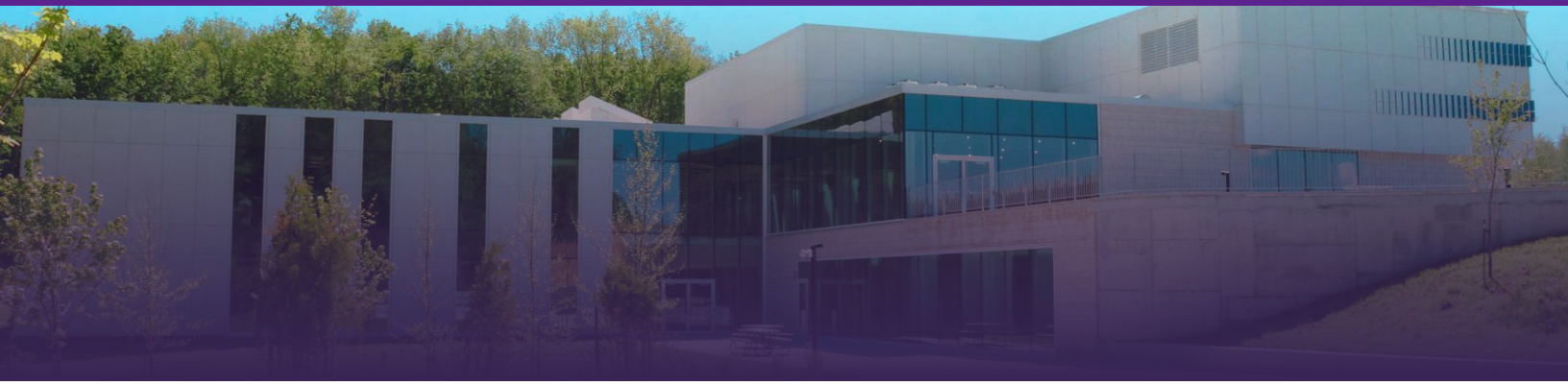
Corn Shuck Showdown

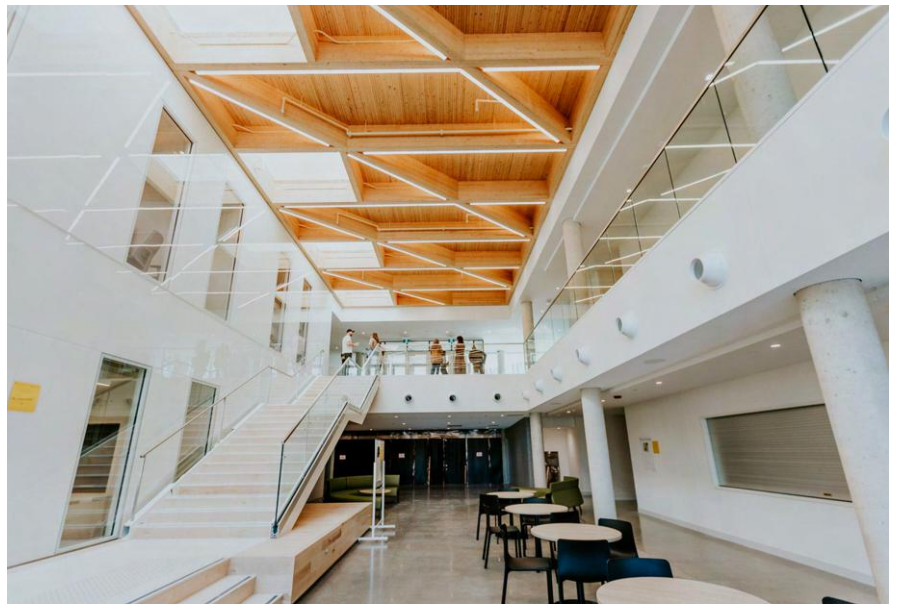

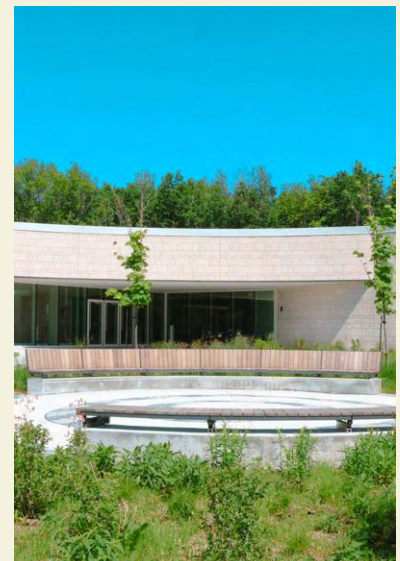

Why Does Corn Matter?

Corn has been part of Indigenous life for thousands of years. The word Maize is a Taino word for corn that means “sacred mother” or “giver of life”

It has been grown, harvested, dried, stored, prepared and shared. It has helped communities survive through seasons and has brought people together around the kitchen table and at community gatherings.

Corn can be transformed into so many things—from everyday foods to special dishes prepared for gatherings and celebrations. And it isn't just the kernels that have value. The whole plant has a story. The husks can be transformed into beautiful corn husk dolls. The cobs can be used in different traditional and practical ways. The kernels become food. The stalks and leaves return nutrients and organic matter to the land.

Corn reminds us that nothing is simply “waste.” There is value in the plant, the process and the teachings that come with it.

From Our Gardens to our Tables: Tkà:nios - It Grows!

Corn reminds us of the importance of growing food locally—and Tkanios is helping our community do exactly that.

Kahnawà:ke in Action with KEPO

While we're celebrating what grows from the land, it's important to remember the responsibility we have to protect it. The Kahnawà:ke Environment Protection Organization (KEPO) has been busy this summer preparing for the upcoming North Creek restoration project.

Their work includes invasive species removal, native plant restoration, water sampling, drone surveys, LiDAR mapping, wildlife management and much more. KEPO has also been creating opportunities for youth to connect with the land through programs such as the Lessons of the Land Youth Camp and the Adopt-a-River Program.

Because protecting the land isn't just about today. It's about making sure there is something here for the next generation to inherit.

From beautiful handmade creations to delicious food, there truly was something for everyone.

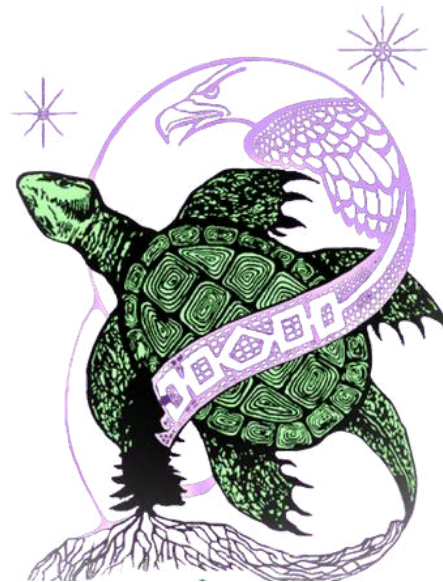


Where the drum brings everyone together

The Haudenosaunee Story of the Corn Husk Doll

The Corn Spirit was proud to be one of the sustainers of life. She asked the Great Spirit if there was anything else she could do for her people. The Great Spirit told her that a doll could be made from her husk.

The doll was beautiful, and everywhere she went, people admired her. But eventually, she became too proud of her beauty. The Great Spirit reminded her that she was meant to bring joy—not believe she was better than others. When the doll continued to admire herself, the Great Spirit took away her face. And that is why the traditional corn husk doll has no face.

The lesson? Stay humble. Be kind. Bring joy to others. And never think you are better than anyone else.

So, the next time you see a corn husk doll, remember—she isn't faceless because something is missing. Her face is missing because there is a teaching.

This summer, Zye Mayo joined the Kahnawà:ke Tourism team as one of our tour guides—and what a season it has been! As part of our amazing Welcome Center team, Zye helped welcome hundreds of guests to Kahnawà:ke and shared his knowledge of our community with visitors from near and far.

Over the summer, Zye led more than 25 walk-in tours, welcoming guests from places as far away as Germany and Singapore, as well as visitors from our neighbouring communities. From the historic village to important community sites, Zye helped guests discover Kahnawà:ke through stories, history and conversation.

Zye brought previous tourism experience to the team and quickly became an important resource at the Welcome Center. Along with guiding visitors, he helped support the team with his experience and developed his skills as an office leader, balancing the day-to-day needs of the Welcome Center with his time out in the community.



One of Zye's biggest challenges this summer was the language barrier. With so many visitors arriving from France and other French-speaking countries, not speaking French presented a challenge. But Zye didn't let that stop him. He continued to do his best to connect with visitors, share what he knew and make every guest feel welcome. His willingness to communicate, learn and find ways to connect is a great example of what Indigenous tourism is all about.

We're happy to say that Zye will continue with Kahnawà:ke Tourism as an on-call tour guide for upcoming seasons, while returning to school full time this fall and we look forward to seeing where his experience, curiosity and passion for sharing Kahnawà:ke take him next! Niawenhkó:wa Zye!

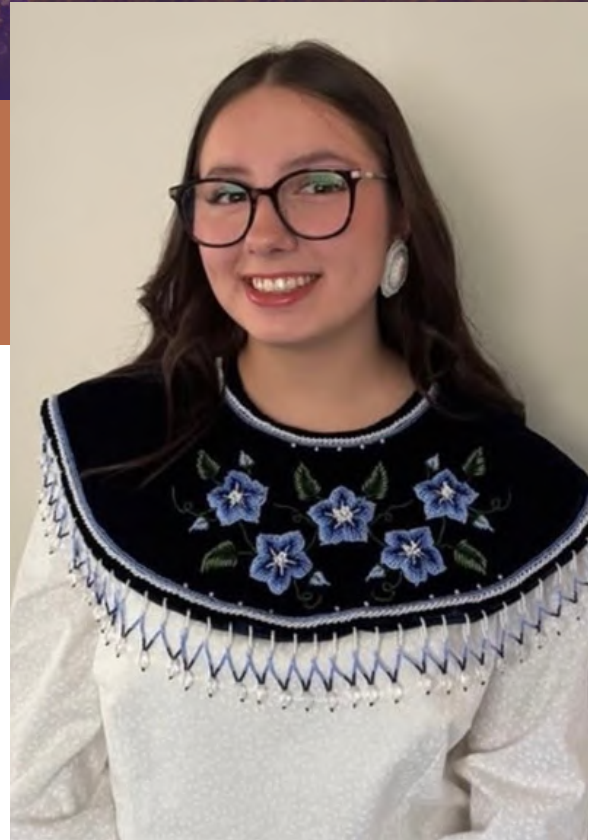


Summer in Review: Grace Myiow's Journey with Kahnawà:ke Tourism

Sharing Our Stories, Welcoming Visitors & Making Connections

July and August have been busy months for Kahnawà:ke Tourism! From walking tours through the historic village to maple-inspired breakfasts, storytelling, community visits and cultural experiences, we've had the pleasure of welcoming visitors from near and far.

Each tour gives us another opportunity to share Kahnawà:ke's history, stories, places and people while creating meaningful connections through Indigenous tourism.

A Summer Full of Visitors

Over the past two months, Kahnawà:ke Tourism welcomed more than 120 visitors, staff and community members through a variety of tours and experiences.

Our summer highlights included:

July 6 — We welcomed 8 staff from Kahnawà:ke Collective Impact for a walking tour of the historic village area.

July 7 — 10 KYC staff and architects visited Kahnawà:ke. Their day began with a catered lunch from Messy Kitchen featuring strawberry juice, corn soup, mini Indian tacos and cornbread with gravy, followed by a community tour and a visit to the new Kanatahkwèn:ke Cultural Arts Center.

July 12 — A group of 15 Collette visitors arrived at the Kahnawà:ke Marina for a light maple breakfast followed by storytelling about the history of Kahnawà:ke.

July 17 — We welcomed 20 visitors from McGill/Sing Canada for a community tour beginning at the Kahnawà:ke Welcome Center.

July 27 — 11 KSCS Prevention staff joined us for a tour of Saint Francis Xavier Mission before exploring the historic village area.

August 2 — Another group of 18 Collette visitors arrived at the Kahnawà:ke Marina, enjoying a maple-inspired breakfast and storytelling focused on our community's history and culture.

August 14 — It was a busy day at the Kahnawà:ke Welcome Center! A private group of 5 visitors explored the historic village and Saint Francis Xavier Mission. We also welcomed 35 Kahnawà:ke Education Center staff for a community tour, including stops at local KEC schools.

August 16 — 24 Collette visitors enjoyed a light maple-inspired picnic behind Saint Francis Xavier Mission before taking part in a storytelling session.

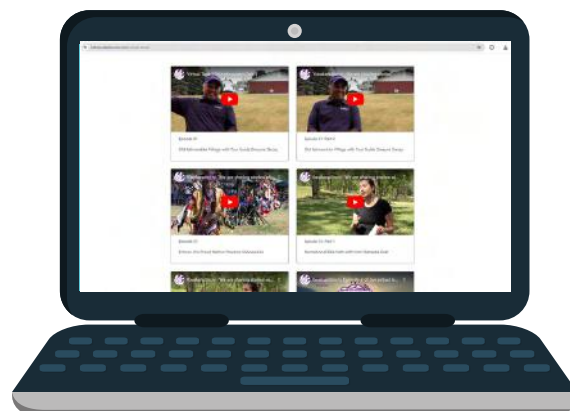
