DEVILS HALL HIKE

Date & Time: Saturday, Sep 26, 2026 | 7:00 AM
Location: Guadalupe Mountains National Park



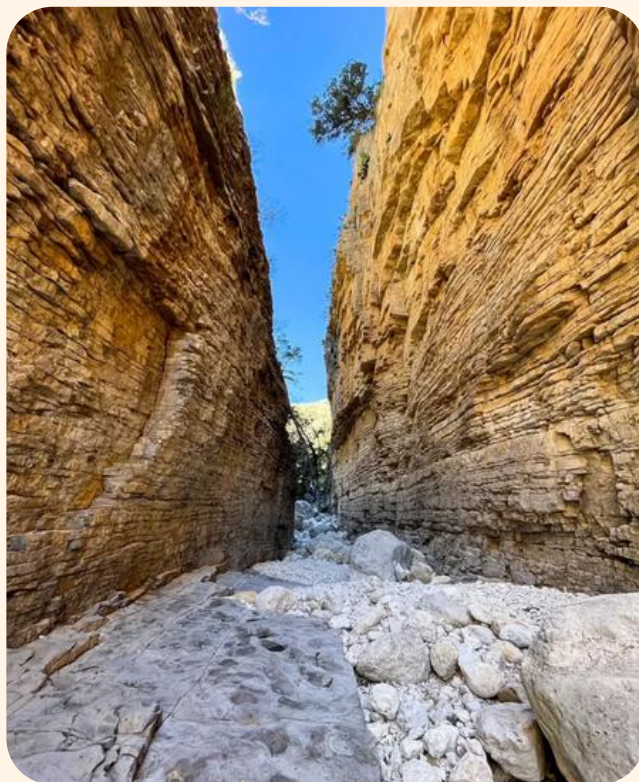
The route to Devil's Hall departs from the Pine Springs Trailhead and is 4.2 miles round-trip. After the first mile the trail leads to a rocky wash which takes hikers to an impressive natural rock staircase leading to a "hallway" formed by steep canyon walls. The wash portion of the route requires the hiker to scramble over large boulders and other debris. This route offers spectacular views of geologic formations, steep canyon walls, tall trees, and mountaintops. **NO PETS ALLOWED**

Distance: 4.2 miles
Duration: ~5 hours
Difficulty: Strenuous
Best for: Children 10 and over

IMPORTANT: Much of this route crosses loose rock and a boulder-filled wash, with some scrambling required. Sturdy hiking shoes or boots and trekking poles are highly recommended.

This moderate walking tour (~2 miles) explores one of the Southwest's most striking volcanic maar craters. Participants learn about volcanism, mantle xenoliths, and eruption processes while traversing sandy and rocky terrain. Ideal for teens and adults, this trip offers a rare opportunity to stand inside a volcanic feature and understand the forces that shaped it.

We will investigate the rocks that make up the Franklin Mountains and what they can tell us about El Paso's geologic past. This hike includes great overviews of the west side and the east side, and from here we will discuss formation of the mountains and its relationship to water resources.

Location: Doña Ana Arch Trail, Las Cruces, NM



The Doña Ana Arch Loop is a natural-surface trail winding through the desert badlands of the Doña Ana Mountains near Las Cruces, New Mexico. The route features unique geological formations, including a natural sandstone arch and several small caves, set against a backdrop of panoramic view of the Rio Grande Valley and the Organ Mountains.

Distance: 3.2 miles
Duration: ~3 hours
Difficulty: Strenuous
Best for: 10 and over

IMPORTANT: Terrain is typical of the high desert, with rocky ridges, sandy arroyos, and loose soil. Please no children under the age of 10 years old. **4x4 is required** to reach the trailhead.

Date & Time: Sunday, Oct 18, 2026 | 9:00 AM**Location:** Oro Grande, NM

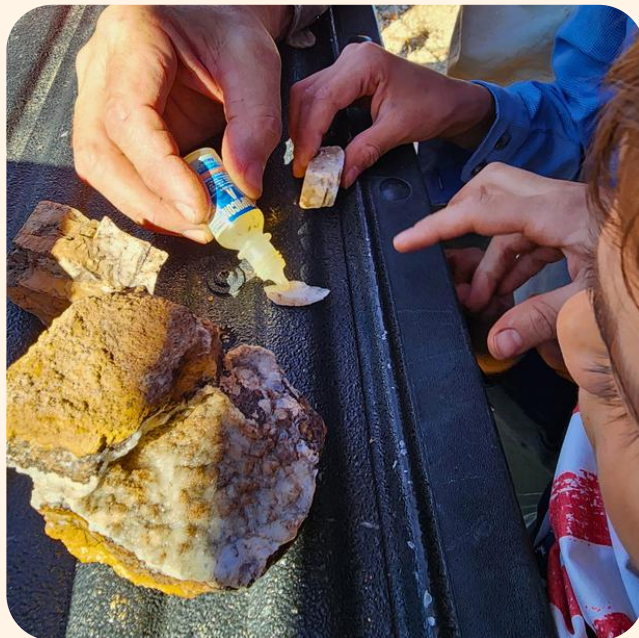
Join us for an exploration of the Oro Grande Mining District where we will look at the geology, mining history, desert botany, while rockhounding for colorful mineral specimens. Participants will see abandoned mining features that are remnants of the operations and mineral resources that drew early prospectors to the area. Along the route, we will also focus on native desert plants, discussing the unique plant species and hybridization in this area. Rockhounding is a key component of this trip, and participants will have opportunities to collect colorful mineral specimens (where allowed), including hematite, magnetite, quartz, garnet, chrysocolla and malachite.

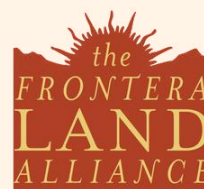

LOST DOG SPOOKY HIKE

Date & Time: Saturday, Oct 24, 2026 | 8:00 AM**Location:** Lost Dog Trail

Join us for a meaningful morning at the Lost Dog Nature Preserve, where outdoor recreation meets community connection and conservation. This trip includes a special partnership with Rescue Runners 915, a local nonprofit that helps shelter dogs get exercise, enrichment, and visibility outside the shelter environment. Eligible participants will be paired with a shelter dog to walk during the hike, supporting both physical activity and socialization for these pups. Participants will hike approximately two miles through the Lost Dog Nature Preserve, a protected area stewarded by Frontera Land Alliance.

Distance: 2.5 miles**Duration:** ~3 hours**Difficulty:** Moderate**Best for:** Adults 18 and over

IMPORTANT: Participants must be 18 years or older to be assigned a shelter dog. **No personal pets are allowed** to ensure the safety of shelter dogs; one dog per vehicle. All dog-handling guidelines provided by Rescue Runners 915 must be followed.

CRETACEOUS GEOLOGICAL TREASURES – SIERRA DE JUÁREZ

On this hike, we will travel back to the Cretaceous Period, when the region was covered by a sea rich in marine life. Along the trail, we will discover rocks that record ancient marine and magmatic events and see how these processes shaped the beautiful landscape we observe today.

POTRILLO VOLCANOES / DESERT SUNSET

Date & Time: Saturday, Nov 7, 2026 | 2:00 PM**Location:** Potrillo Mountains

The aim of this trip is to observe the land forms of the young volcanic features caused by the relatively recent activity along the Rio Grande rift basin, just west of El Paso. We will visit two volcanoes with very different expressions, one a crater-style structure and the other a steep-sided classic cinder cone. There will be two short hikes on the trip (the second is optional) and we will view the sunset from the top of the cinder cone volcano with stunning views of the borderland.

We will begin at the El Paso Museum of Archaeology on Transmountain Road, make two stops along Transmountain to examine Precambrian and Paleozoic rock formations, visit the Great Unconformity at McKelligon Canyon and conclude our tour at Mt. Cristo Rey to discuss the formation of the Rio Grande Rift and its role in shaping the Franklin Mountains and surrounding landscape. This tour is designed for anyone interested in learning how over a billion years of geologic history are recorded in the rocks of the El Paso area. 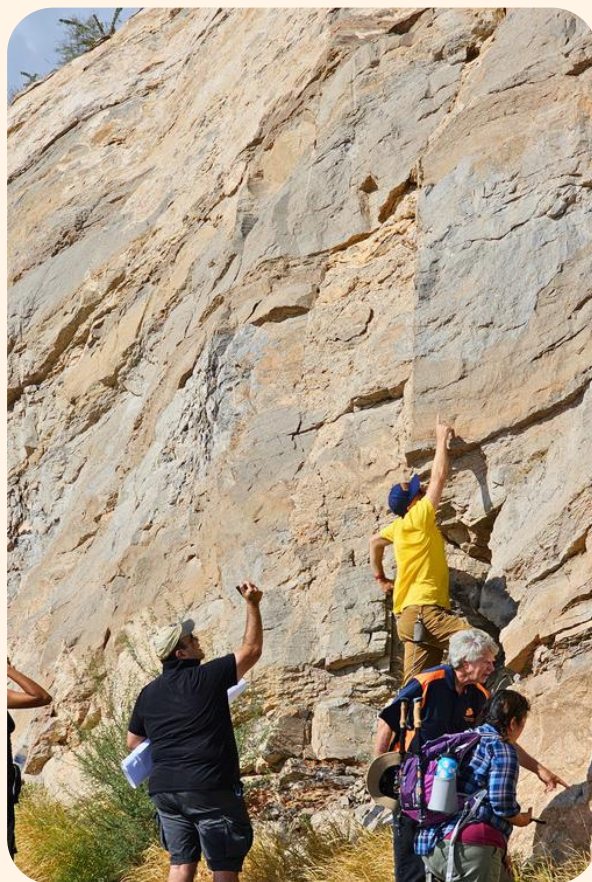

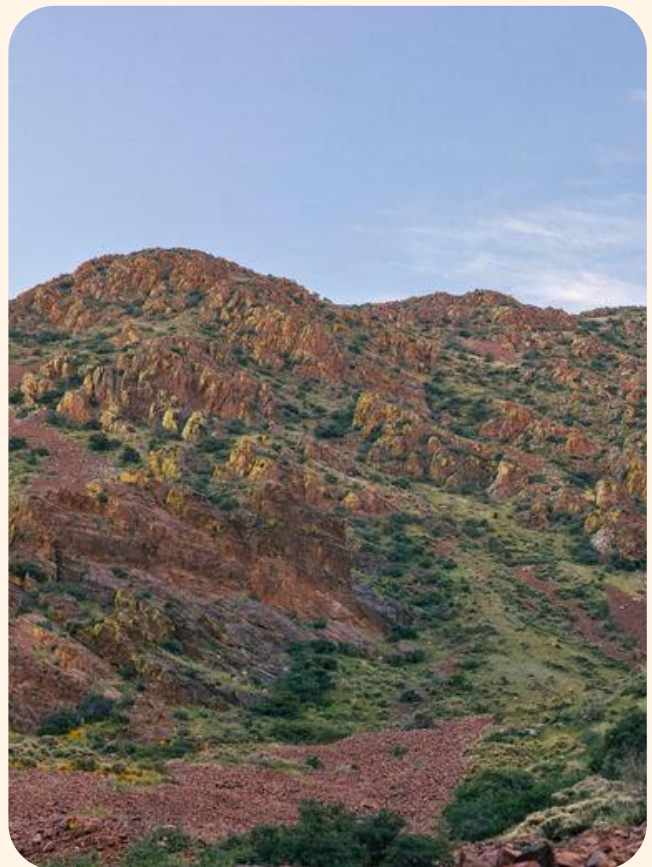

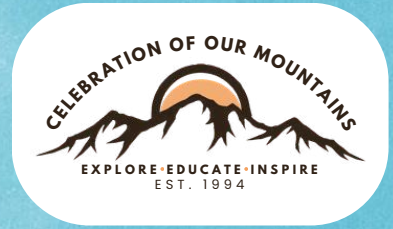
