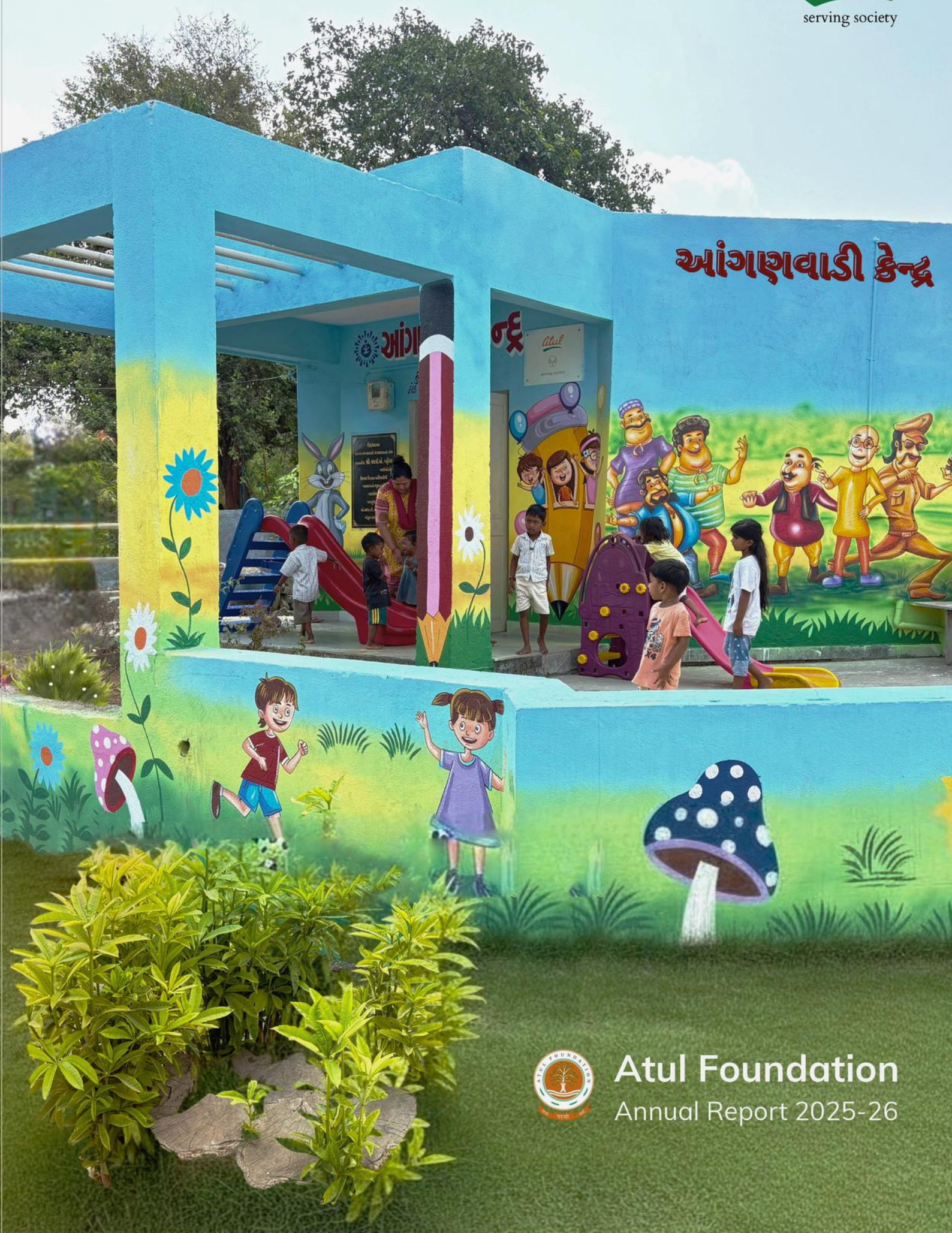

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Legacy

Much before the concept of corporate social responsibility had evolved into its present form, Atul Ltd (Atul) has been engaged in serving the society with diverse initiatives related to education, empowerment, health, relief, infrastructure and conservation. Kasturbhai Lalbhai, the Founder of Atul and an Indian legend, ensured complete commitment to community development and welfare in every company he established. The primary reason for the establishment of Atul was to generate large-scale employment and consequently improve the standard of living in rural India. His passion to give back to society was reflected in his daily schedule; he spent half a day on growing businesses while the other half was dedicated solely to social service. He appointed Balwantrai Mazumdar, an economist and Siddharth Lalbhai, his elder son and a chemical engineer, to develop Atul, both of whom continued with the fine legacy.

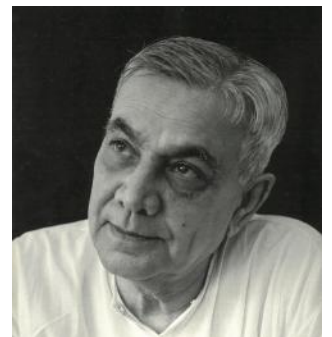


Kasturbhai Lalbhai (1894 - 1980)

Kasturbhai Lalbhai was an institution builder par excellence. He made seminal contributions, particularly in the fields of industry, education, culture and religion. His pioneering efforts helped transform a colonised and impoverished India to a land of emerging hopes and opportunities. He led a purposeful life guided by integrity, discipline, excellence, perseverance and simplicity.

Balwantrai Mazumdar (1902 - 1981)

An economist, Balwantrai Mazumdar was a voracious reader, sound thinker, patient listener and a farsighted professional. He created an atmosphere of camaraderie that brought out the collective best in the people of Atul. He was the moving force behind making the first site of Atul one of the largest eco-friendly manufacturing facilities of its kind in the world. He remained with the Group till the end of his life as did most of the people who worked with Kasturbhai Lalbhai.



Siddharth Lalbhai (1923 - 1998)

A chemical engineer and the elder son of the Founder, Siddharth Lalbhai dedicated his life to the development of Atul. He accorded equal value to creation of wealth and service to society. He upheld the principles of trusteeship, lived by the personal qualities of integrity, perseverance and simplicity and gave single-minded devotion to the tasks on hand.

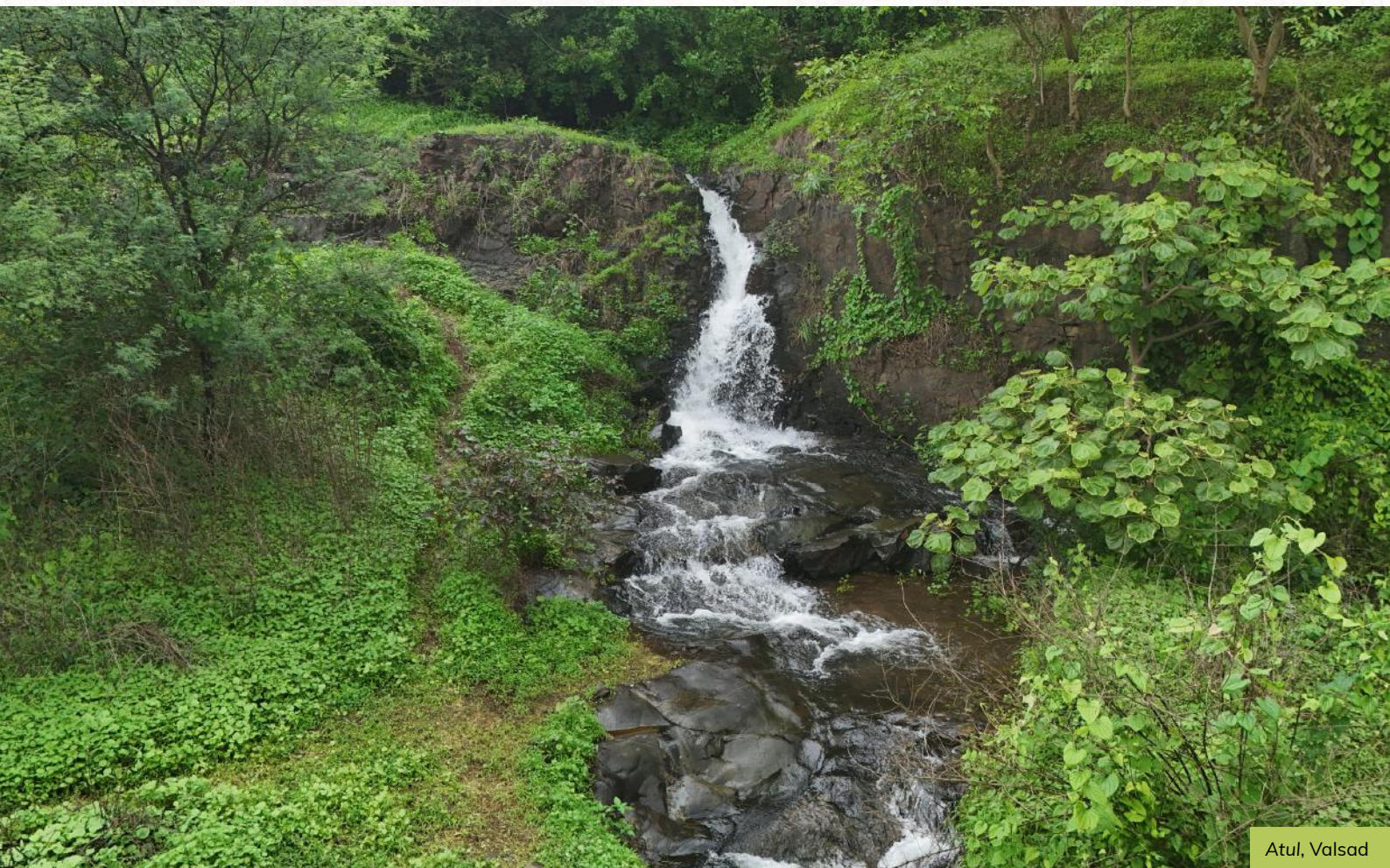

Dear Readers,

The defining characteristic of sustainable development lies not in just the scale of individual interventions, but in the depth of structural transformation they enable. We have long believed that lasting change is rooted in understanding its human impact. During 2025–26, our work across six programs — education, empowerment, health, relief, infrastructure and conservation, addressed foundational inequities limiting opportunity.

In education, our projects were designed not only to impart knowledge but also to nurture confidence and creativity among young minds. Through science and art-based educational projects, we sought to foster rational thinking and unlock human potential.

Our projects under the empowerment program reached underprivileged communities through vocational training programs and women self-help groups. The Adhikar project addressed a critical systemic gap — the disconnect between rural communities and government welfare schemes.

Our health program was implemented through Atul Foundation Health Center, Sampoorana project, health camps and preventive awareness projects. Our relief program extended to migrant workers and families affected by cyclonic conditions.

The infrastructure program focused on strengthening the spaces that shape everyday community life. We renovated anganwadis and classrooms, developed children's parks and created sanitation facilities, drinking water systems, community spaces and other need-based infrastructure.

Environmental stewardship has become a structural imperative. Our conservation program included projects focused on waste management, water conservation, renewable energy deployment, large-scale plantation drives under the Sanjeevani project, alongside the development of Miyawaki forests.

The effectiveness of Atul Foundation depends on meaningful partnerships with government agencies, development organisations and communities themselves. Through these collaborations, we continue to learn, adapt and deepen our understanding of what enduring change requires.

We also remain committed to responding thoughtfully to evolving challenges — from economic uncertainty to technological shifts and climate change. Our future initiatives and partnerships will continue to focus on strengthening community resilience, advancing sustainable livelihoods, improving adaptive capacity and fostering inclusive development. We extend our gratitude to every partner, community member and stakeholder who continues to walk this path with us.

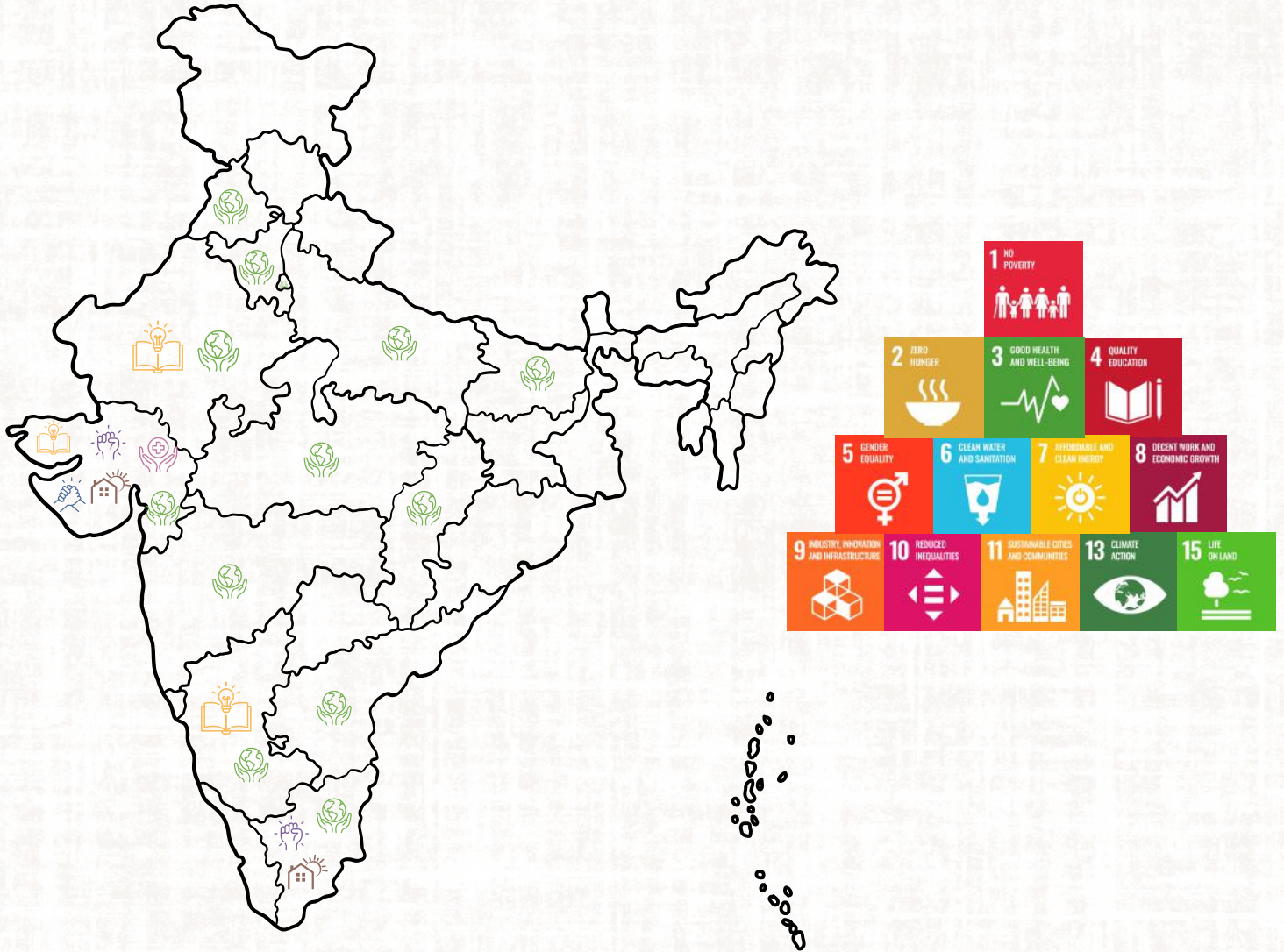

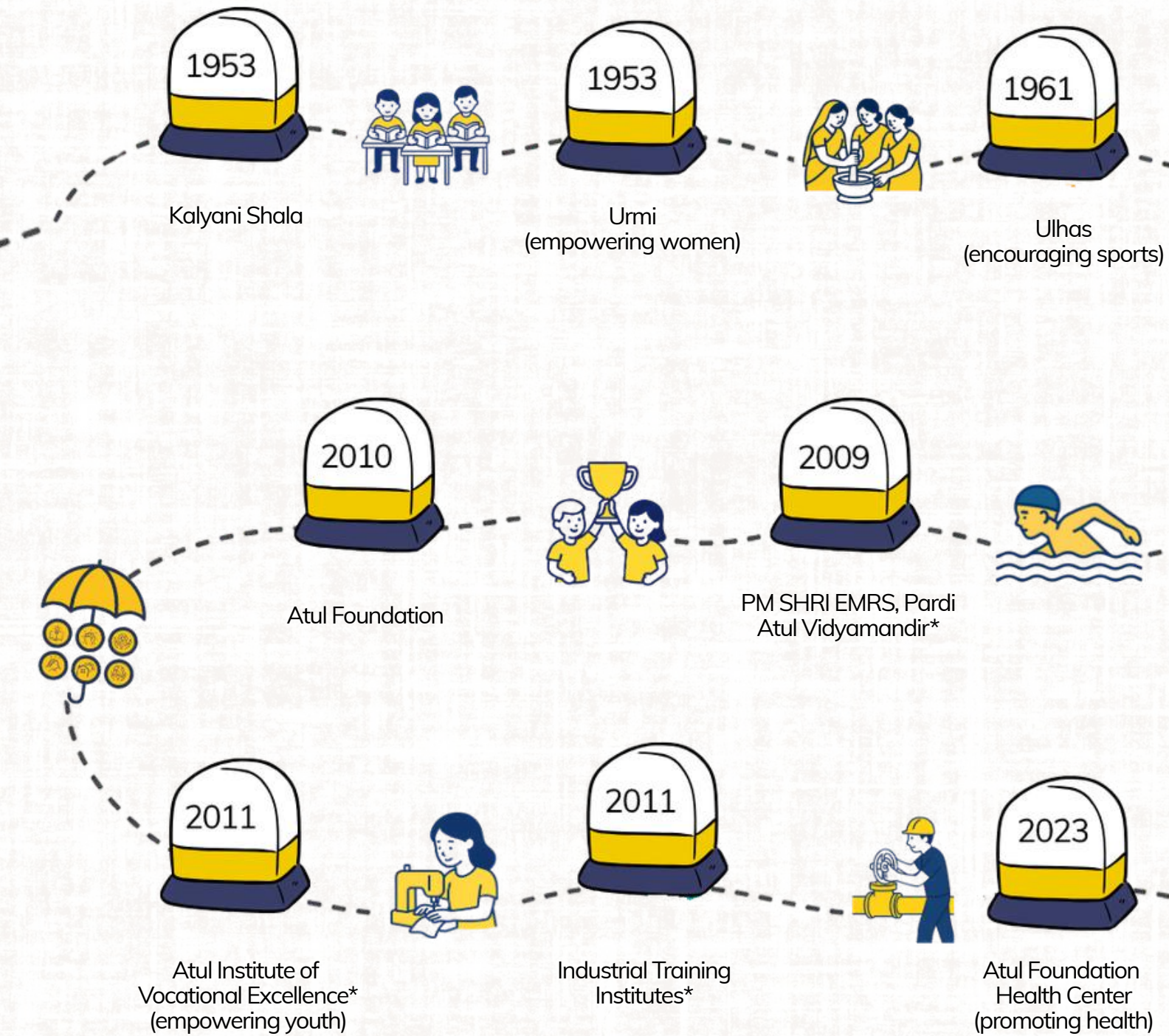


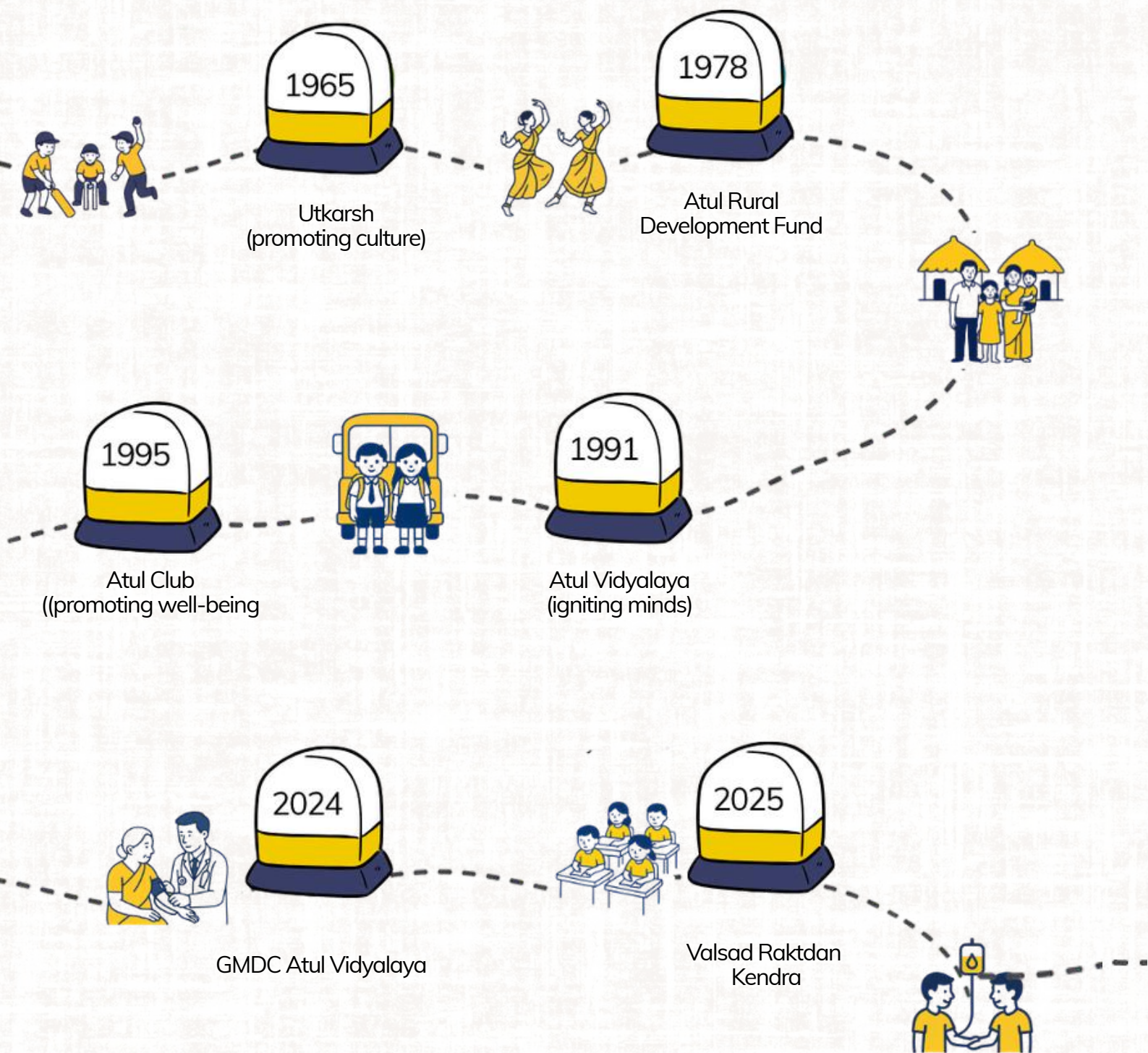

With state-of-the-art workshops, laboratories, residential and other infrastructure facilities, AIVE aims to bring about a qualitative change in the lives of tribal youth.

Recognised as a Scientific and Industrial Research organisation by the Department of Science and Technology, it serves as the Regional Blood Transfusion Center for Valsad and Dang districts of Gujarat. In collaboration with the Indian Council of Medical Research, it has pioneered sickle cell anaemia awareness and research in rural South Gujarat.

Ulhas promotes the health and well-being of residents of Atul and the surrounding villages. It organises cricket tournaments, inter-village volleyball competitions and marathons.



Utkarsh

Established: 1965

Utkarsh provides a platform to promote social and cultural programs for residents of Atul and surrounding villages. It organises music and dance competitions, annual funfairs and cultural events.

Established: 1995

Atul Club provides sports and recreational facilities to residents of Atul and surrounding villages. It offers facilities for badminton, billiards, swimming, table tennis and also has a well-equipped gymnasium.

Bhavnad, Dharampur

In remote tribal regions, access to quality primary education continues to be shaped by gaps in infrastructure, teacher availability and language barriers. Addressing these challenges, the Adhyapika project works to strengthen the learning environment by enabling local women to take on the role of educators within their own communities. Carefully selected and trained over six months, these women take on the roles of *adhyapikas*. Driven by a strong sense of commitment, they transform classrooms into spaces that are interactive and joyful.

Their shared cultural and linguistic background with students allows them to respond to individual learning needs with sensitivity, while fostering a nurturing space built on care and understanding. In areas where student-teacher ratios remain inconsistent due to a shortage of trained staff, and where multiple dialects often

complicate communication, *adhyapikas* act as a vital bridge. Their familiarity with local contexts helps them interpret student behaviour, engage with parents more effectively and support the development of each child in a personalised and meaningful way.

Being based within the village, they remain closely connected to families and the wider community, allowing for continued support beyond the classroom.

Four students of grade 3 at Fali Primary School, Valsad, struggled with basic reading and writing and showed little interest in language activities. Jaya Bhoya, the school adhyapika, introduced visual aids, peer learning and remedial sessions. Over time, the students began recognising letters, reading simple words and participating more actively, showing clear improvement in confidence and language skills.

Education



The Adhigam project focuses on making learning engaging and experiential, especially for students in underserved rural communities, by moving beyond textbooks to hands-on exploration of scientific concepts. In partnership with Agastya International Foundation, a mobile science laboratory featuring over 235 interactive models reaches schools across 14 villages, bringing science to life for students in grades 6 to 10.

Alongside model-based demonstrations, the project uses digital tools like tablets, structured lesson plans and creativity-driven teaching methods to strengthen understanding and sustain student interest. A conscious effort is also made to promote sustainability through the use of eco-friendly teaching materials and practices throughout the learning process.

An impact assessment was conducted using a pre-test and post-test quasi-experimental design to evaluate the effectiveness of the program in strengthening STEM learning through hands-on methods. The findings indicated significant improvement across key indicators, particularly in subject knowledge and conceptual understanding, while also demonstrating enhanced student engagement.

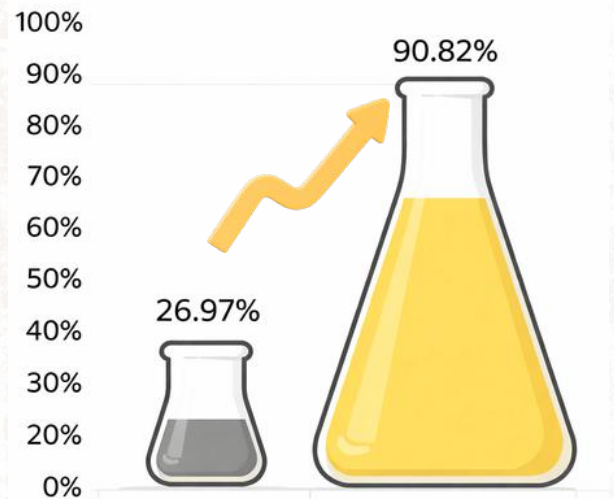

A teacher-led science model from Segvi High School focused on fostering innovation and scientific learning. Developed as part of the project, the model was submitted to the Jigyasa Competition and secured first rank at both the Gujarat State and National levels, reflecting its success in nurturing creativity, critical thinking and applied scientific skills.

Empowerment

The Uttara project adopts a holistic approach to empowering rural women by combining financial inclusion with livelihood development. At its core, the project uses the self-help group (SHG) model to create strong, community-led institutions that support women in building both economic stability and social confidence.

The project strengthens financial literacy and practices at the grassroots level. Women come together in SHGs to contribute small, regular savings, creating a shared fund managed through a group bank account. This pooled resource serves as an accessible credit system, allowing members to take loans at mutually agreed, low interest rates. The process encourages financial discipline, builds trust within the group and reduces dependence on informal and often exploitative sources of credit.

The need for this project is rooted in the realities faced by rural women like irregular, informal employment, limited involvement in household financial decisions, low literacy levels and minimal exposure to formal financial tools, which further restrict their participation. Over time, this integrated approach not only improves access to savings and credit but also enhances the decision-making power and economic independence of women.

Tejalben Patel, a member of Maa Krupa SHG, received nursery training with the support of Atul Foundation in September 2025. Following the training, she established her own nursery as a source of livelihood. She began participating in swadeshi melas and local fairs to showcase and sell her plants. Through these efforts, she now earns a steady monthly income of ₹ 15,000 to ₹ 16,000.

Empowerment



The Adhikar project supports communities by enabling access to both online and offline government schemes. Located in hilly and forested regions with limited network availability and digital connectivity, these villages often face challenges in accessing information and completing applications for government welfare programs.

Community service centres, which provide access to such services, are often situated at a considerable distance from these villages. Most residents depend on farming or daily-wage labour, and travelling to a centre often results in loss of income for one day in addition to travel and application expenses. Limited knowledge about these schemes further complicates the process of application.

The project goes beyond supporting registrations by facilitating laminated cards directly to beneficiaries. Beneficiaries are also guided on their usage, ensuring easy and reliable access to their entitlements. This approach reduces dependence on intermediaries, minimises repeated travel and empowers individuals to independently access and seek benefit from government services.

Mittal Bhoya of Chavara village was born with a congenital lip condition, but financial constraints prevented her family from affording the required surgery. Through the Adhikar project, an Ayushman card was created for her, enabling access to treatment. She was referred to the New Civil Hospital in Surat, where she underwent successful surgery, with the majority of the expenses covered under the scheme.

The Jeevan Jyoti project organises health camps in tribal villages to improve access to essential healthcare. These include eye camps, blood donation camps and general health check-up camps, bringing critical services closer to underserved communities.

In rural areas, limited awareness, financial constraints and inadequate healthcare infrastructure, often result in health issues remaining untreated. Conditions such as vision impairment, undiagnosed illnesses and other preventable concerns affect daily life, reducing the ability to work, learn and function independently.

Vulnerable groups are most affected. Elderly individuals face risks such as untreated cataracts leading to vision loss, while children

struggle with learning due to poor eyesight or unaddressed health issues. Also, accessible blood donation remains vital for emergency care.

These camps enable early detection, treatment and awareness. Eye camps address vision issues, general check-ups identify common ailments, and blood donation camps support healthcare systems.

Ratan Patel of Navera village had been struggling with cataract-related vision problems that affected her daily activities and independence. During a free medical camp, she was identified and underwent cataract surgery free of cost. Post intervention, her vision improved significantly, enabling her to carry out routine activities with confidence and ease.

The Sampoorna project is a comprehensive health and nutrition project to address anaemia, undernutrition and preventive health challenges among tribal communities in the Valsad, Gujarat. Adopting a life-cycle approach, the project supports adolescents, women of reproductive age, pregnant and lactating mothers, eligible couples and children during the critical first 1,000 days of life. Implemented across villages, schools, colleges, and vocational institutions, the project promotes healthier practices through anaemia screening, nutrition education, counselling, IFA supplementation and referral support.

Recognising adolescence as a critical stage for shaping lifelong habits, the project engages girls and boys through school and community-based interventions focused on nutrition, menstrual hygiene, mental well-being and healthy lifestyles. Schools were strengthened through wellbeing corners, health audits and initiatives promoting

The project also focuses on maternal and child health through counselling, growth monitoring, nutrition support, and referral services for pregnant women, lactating mothers, and young children. Through the participation of community volunteers, teachers, women's groups, and frontline workers, the Sampoorna project has contributed towards improving nutrition awareness and strengthening maternal and child health outcomes in tribal communities.

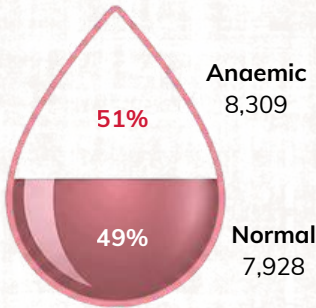

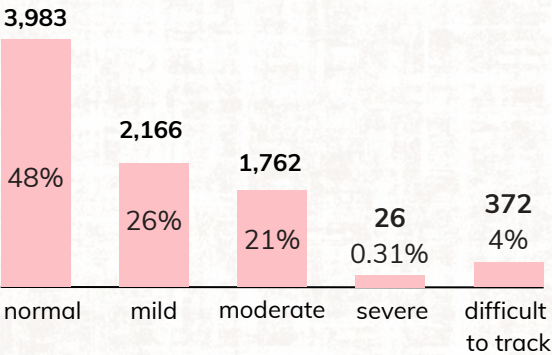

Aarohi Patel of Binvada village was identified with moderate anaemia during the first screening, with a haemoglobin level of 10.7 g/dL, along with fatigue and low appetite. Post intervention, and receiving Iron Folic Acid tablet supplementation and nutrition support, her haemoglobin level improved to 12.8 g/dL. She is now non-anaemic, with better health, improved habits and enhanced learning outcomes.

The Ojas project supports children living in difficult circumstances by providing care, guidance and opportunities for a better future. Many come from vulnerable family environments affected by socio-economic hardship, limited support systems and disrupted education.

Children are supported through customised individual care plans, regular engagement with parents or guardians and need-based interventions. The project encourages continued education and vocational training while fostering trust, resilience and growth within the community.

Through group activities, story camps, exposure visits, summer camps and ideathon workshops, children are encouraged to build life skills, creativity, confidence and problem-solving abilities.

The project also facilitates vocational training, scholarship linkages and economic rehabilitation support for families to strengthen long-term development outcomes.

These efforts have improved school attendance, participation in activities and communication skills among children. Many have also developed greater confidence, responsibility and leadership, with older children increasingly mentoring younger peers.

Twelve students who had discontinued their education were counselled and enrolled in vocational training courses at ARDF. They registered for short-term courses such as garment stitching and beauty parlour training. These skill-based courses are helping them build confidence and improve their livelihood opportunities. These trainings are conducted with the aim of enabling students to lead financially independent lives.

The Umeed project creates a safe and encouraging learning environment for children from migrant families. These children often face significant barriers to education due to frequent relocation and language differences. As families move from one place to another in search of livelihood opportunities, enrolling children in local schools becomes difficult. In the absence of access to schools, these children spend long hours without meaningful engagement and are often drawn into labour alongside their parents at a very young age.

Through basic reading and writing classes, the project introduces children to foundational literacy and numeracy skills, including alphabet recognition, simple sentence formation, counting and basic arithmetic.

Beyond academics, the project strives to instil the value of education and nurture habits that support overall development. Children are encouraged to participate in activities that promote discipline, hygiene, teamwork and respect for others. By engaging children constructively during the day, the project not only prevents early involvement in labour but also offers them a pathway towards a more secure and hopeful future.

The Anand project aims to improve the learning ecosystem in rural and under-resourced anganwadis and schools by creating safe, hygienic and engaging spaces that support health, learning and the overall development of children.

The project involves identifying severely underperforming anganwadis and carrying out structural repairs, renovation of toilets and kitchen spaces, and restoration of basic facilities. Colourful educational wall designs and child-friendly infrastructure are incorporated to create cheerful and engaging environments that support curiosity, cognitive growth and early childhood development. The refurbished anganwadis have led to improved attendance, participation and learning outcomes, while anganwadi workers have reported greater ease in conducting activities and stronger engagement with children.

The project also supports the renovation and development of schools through improvements such as classroom repairs, construction of toilets and drinking water stations, development of internal roads and parking areas and creation of recreational spaces. These interventions help provide students with clean, secure and motivating learning environments that foster confidence, enhance the schooling experience and encourage regular attendance.

The Ujjwal Atul project promotes sustainable waste disposal practices across villages in Valsad, Gujarat. The project encourages household-level waste segregation, conducts awareness programs in schools and communities and manages dry waste through a waste management centre, where it is segregated into categories and sent to authorised recyclers. Through this integrated approach, the project promotes behavioural change, youth participation and long-term environmental sustainability.

In many rural areas, waste is often burnt or dumped in open spaces, leading to pollution and the spread of diseases through insects and mosquitoes. To address this, the project team conducts door-to-door awareness campaigns on proper waste disposal and segregation practices, along with community

The project also promotes home composting or use of kitchen waste for animal feed. These practices help reduce waste generation, improve soil health and contribute towards cleaner, greener and healthier communities.

Under the Waste No More – Valsad initiative, 94 villages were covered through a collaboration supported by a grant of ₹ 380 lakh from the SBI Foundation. The project strengthened rural waste management practices through waste segregation, awareness activities and sustainable disposal systems across participating communities.

The Urja project addresses challenges related to access to water and energy supply in remote villages, where communities frequently experience limited access to water, agricultural uncertainty and seasonal migration. As livelihoods are largely dependent on agriculture and daily-wage labour, conventional irrigation methods using diesel-powered pumps place a financial burden on farmers and are environmentally unsustainable.

To encourage a cleaner and more resilient future, the project supported the installation of solar-powered water pumps and grid-connected solar systems for community farming groups and institutions.

The project has strengthened irrigation reliability, reduced dependence on rainfall, removed diesel-related expenses and improved food security. It has also introduced sustainable energy infrastructure within public institutions, contributing to long-term climate resilience and increasing awareness of green energy solutions.

Mahendra Patara from Kunda village earlier spent nearly ₹ 25,000 on fuel for irrigation, which placed a significant financial burden on farming activities. After the installation of the solar irrigation system, fuel expenses were completely eliminated, enabling him to cultivate multiple crops across all seasons. As a result, farmers are now earning between ₹ 40,000 and ₹ 50,000 through improved productivity and year-round cultivation.

The Paani project focuses on implementing soil and water conservation measures in ecologically sensitive and agriculture-dependent regions. These interventions play an important role in improving access to water, strengthening soil health and reducing the impact of erratic monsoons and climate change on rural livelihoods. By slowing surface runoff and promoting groundwater recharge, the project helps minimise soil erosion, restore vegetation cover and enhance agricultural productivity across farming communities.

The project also supports sustainable water management practices through the installation of drip irrigation systems, rainwater harvesting structures, check dams, ponds, gully plugs, trenches and bunds. These measures improve water retention, increase groundwater availability and enable efficient

The project conserved 8,410 lakh litres of water during the 2025 monsoon season through various soil and water conservation measures. Since 2022, a total of 28,557 lakh litres of water has been conserved, improving groundwater recharge and soil retention.

The Harit Van project restores natural ecosystems, enhances biodiversity and improves environmental sustainability across rural and coastal regions. Through large-scale plantation and ecological restoration efforts, the project aims to strengthen climate resilience, improve air quality and create sustainable spaces for future generations.

The project focuses on restoring green cover and developing dense native forests through Miyawaki plantations, a fast-growing and sustainable afforestation technique. By planting a diverse mix of indigenous species close together, the Miyawaki method enables rapid forest growth and quicker ecosystem restoration compared to conventional plantation approaches. These forests gradually become self-sustaining, support local biodiversity and require relatively low maintenance after the initial establishment and survival phase.

The project also included mangrove plantation efforts to strengthen coastal ecosystems and protect shoreline regions from environmental degradation. Mangroves act as natural barriers against coastal erosion, tidal surges and cyclones, while also supporting marine biodiversity and local livelihoods through rich breeding habitats for fish and aquatic species.

The Miyawaki forests, upon maturity, will enable carbon sequestration of approximately 1,716 tonnes annually while also conserving nearly 11,700 lakh litres of water. Similarly, the mangrove plantations are expected to enable annual carbon sequestration of around 1,672 tonnes, contributing significantly to long-term ecological restoration and climate resilience.

Sanjeevani is a large-scale community-led tree plantation project undertaken to promote environmental restoration and heal the planet through collective action. Plantation drives are conducted annually under this project to reflect a strong commitment towards sustainability, afforestation and ecological conservation by encouraging widespread participation from communities, institutions and volunteers.

The plantation drive focuses on increasing green cover, supporting biodiversity and combating the long-term impacts of climate change. All trees planted under the project are carefully selected native forest and fruit-bearing species, ensuring better ecological adaptability, higher survival rates and long-term environmental benefits for ecosystems.

The project brings together team members, vendors, distributors, customers, partners of Atul, and schools, colleges and village communities, creating a collective movement for environmental conservation. Each mature tree absorbs 22 kilograms of CO₂ every year. Therefore, 1,76,340 fully grown trees can collectively absorb approximately 38,79,480 kilograms of CO₂ annually, which would result in about 3,879.5 tonnes of CO₂ being removed from the atmosphere each year.

The Center for Environment Conservation (CEC) was established to promote sustainable environmental practices and strengthen conservation efforts through community participation, awareness and collaborative action. The centre serves as a platform to encourage government bodies, institutions and organisations to collaborate, exchange knowledge and learn from existing conservation initiatives and successful environmental models implemented across different regions.

The CEC also conducts trainings, workshops and awareness sessions in schools and colleges to sensitise children and youth towards environmental responsibility and sustainable living practices. Through drives, conservation campaigns, clean-up activities and community-led initiatives, the centre actively engages people in protecting

- Promoted hygiene and student well-being through safe sanitation facilities.
- Upgraded infrastructure and drainage systems to reduce waterlogging, improve mobility and ensure safety.

Recommendations

- Address safety risks by replacing moisture-affected electrical switchboards.
- Improve maintenance standards through better lighting, ventilation, termite control and classroom fittings.
- Strengthen safety through construction-zone barricading and ensuring contractor compliance through verification and insurance norms.
- Implement efficient administrative systems through inventory labelling and formal asset management processes.
- Promote well-being and preparedness by establishing a common room for girls.

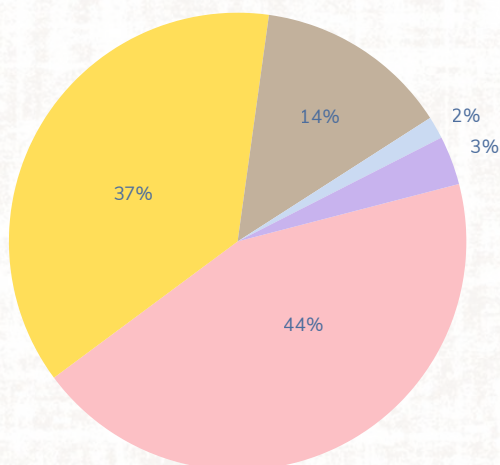

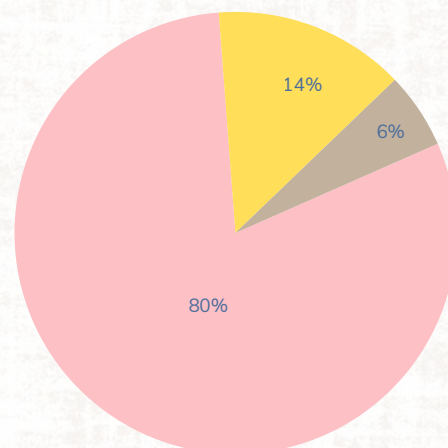

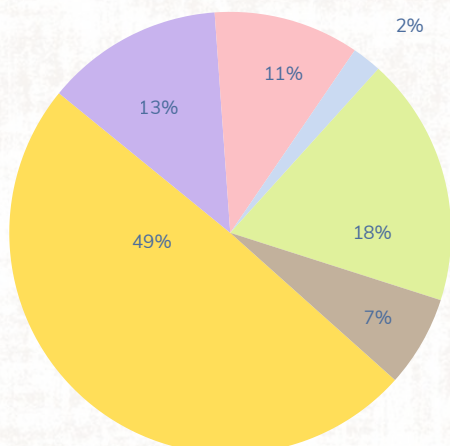
