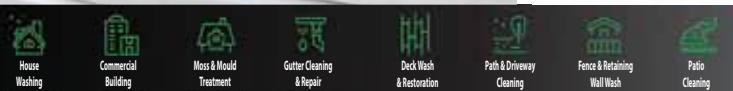

Both he and the wider Council "are just completely devastated" by the news of Cr Randle's passing.

"Tony had a particular skill set that he brought to the Council table that no-one else did.

"His analytic nature, his desire to dive that level deeper to make sure decisions were being based on the right and the correct was unmatched," Cr McNulty says.

"He had respect across the Council about just how diligently he performed his role.

"For me he was not just a colleague, but he was a friend.

"Even though we often were on the opposite sides of some political decisions, it didn't matter at the end of the day. We could put that aside and still go into the Johnsonville Club and grab a beer.

"It was that kind of relationship. It was a mutual respect.

"Respect is something everyone had for Tony – the way he conducted himself, how diligently he performed his role, the way he threw himself into his community.

"We are going to miss him dearly," Cr McNulty says.

Like her fellow Takapū/Northern Ward Councillor, Councillor Andrea Compton is "absolutely devastated" by Cr Randle's death. "He took me under his wing right from when I indicated I wanted to stand for Council," she says.

He was supportive and encouraging and "he really wanted me on Council with him and he knew that we basically were a team.

"He helped me enormously. I can't put into words how much he helped me.

"He was a total gentleman and his attention to detail was just second to none. I've never met anything quite like it.

"His analytic skills were pretty special too and that's a skill that a council needs.

"We are really going to miss him" Cr Compton says.

Cr Randle was first elected to Wellington City Council in 2022 and was re-elected in 2025. Before that he served as President of the Johnsonville Community Association from 2020 to 2022.

Wellington Mayor Andrew Little says Cr Randle's contribution to the Council was marked by diligence, care and a commitment to understanding the detail.

"Tony was deeply committed to public service and wanted the best for Wellington and its communities," the Mayor says.

"He was always cordial and constructive, but he also brought a healthy scepticism to every issue.

"He believed an important part of his role was to challenge, question and test assumptions to ensure decisions were based on solid evidence.

"What really set him apart was his focus on substance over rhetoric.

"He wanted to understand the facts, examine

the evidence, and make the best possible decision based on all available information.

"He was never willing to be rushed and valued thorough analysis and quality decision-making above all else.

"He applied his analytical skills to public transport in particular and was always willing to engage with the public on detailed and principled grounds," the Mayor says.

"I am deeply saddened by the sudden loss of my friend and councillor colleague, Tony Randle," Wharangi/Onslow-Western Ward Councillor Diane Calvert says.

"I first met Tony early on when I became a Councillor back in 2016.

"He was always generous with his time and a fountain of knowledge about all things public transport – from buses to trains.

"Living in neighbouring suburbs, we shared a practical understanding of how public transport operated across the Onslow and Northern suburbs, which became a frequent topic of conversation.

Street party to welcome new crossing

The Karori Community Action Group (KCAG) hosted a street party to celebrate the new pedestrian ramps and crossing improvements outside St John of God (SJOG) on Messines Road and on Braithwaite Street on 11 August.

The co-chair of the KCAG, Annelize Steyn, cut a ribbon to mark the opening of the new pedestrian ramps and improvements.

The ceremony was attended by Wellington City Council's Traffic Engineer Karl Rudge, Council staff, residents of SJOG and Huntleigh Home, and local residents.

The new improvements had their genesis around 18 months ago when Bronwyn Hayward, who was also a co-chair of the KCAG, decided to travel to a meeting of the group, being held at SJOG from Huntleigh Home where she lived.

She complained that it was hard to cross Braithwaite Street and even harder to cross Messines Road.

The KCAG decided to do something about it, to make it easier access for everyone and Huntleigh Home resident Valerie Smith then took up the case.

"I had earlier liaised with Wellington City Council Traffic Engineers over the Campbell Street crossing," Valerie says.

This crossing was completed on 17 April 2024, and its completion was also celebrated with a street party.

"I once again chased up WCC and eventually was put onto Traffic Engineer Karl Rudge, who when we made a case to him, came out with a colleague to look at the problem and took measurements," Valerie says.

"We again made the case in writing for him, and he took up our issue within WCC.

"Finally earlier this year Karl informed us he would be away for three months, but over June, July and August the 'pedestrian improvements' as he called them would be completed," Valerie says. "We wouldn't get the zebra crossing we would have liked but we would get a safe crossing on Messines Road and Braithwaite Street, with median safe strips on both, and better footpaths between the two."

This is, Valerie says "a huge improvement on what we had."

Region-wide amalgamation plan

A region-wide amalgamation proposal, supported by Wellington City Council, Porirua City Council, Hutt City Council and the South Wairarapa District Council, will be presented to the government under its Head Start programme by the Wellington Mayoral Forum.

This was announced by the Mayoral Forum following its meeting on 7 August. It is one of two proposals that will come from councils in the region.

The second is for a Wairarapa proposal, supported by the Carterton District Council and the Masterton District Council.

"The proposals will convey the positions of individual councils and we will request of Government that the door remains open for alternative arrangements for KCDC [Kapiti Coast District Council] and UHCC

[Upper Hutt City Council]," the Mayoral Forum says.

"The Wellington region was already working together and remains committed to doing so regardless of the Head Start process.

"The discussions are constructive.

"Mana whenua partnership at all layers and Māori representation is fundamental and we remain committed to their continued involvement now and into the future.

"Not every Council agrees and their views are respected and will be conveyed faithfully," the Mayoral Forum says.

"Cover letters will include the region's principles as bottom lines, individual position statements and any joint requests of Government."

Ngaio Agile celebrates eight years

Ngaio Agile celebrated its eighth birthday on 10 August.

On 6 August 2018 something new commenced in Ngaio – exercise classes for older people.

That day 35 people from the neighbouring communities turned up with the hope of becoming stronger and more balanced.

On Monday 10 August a crowd of around 60 gathered to mark that achievement.

Ngaio Agile is a community-based, and led, chapter of the nation-wide Live Stronger for Longer programme.

This programme aims at helping older people keep good muscle strength and be better balanced, all to help prevent falls that often result in broken hips and the like.

It is an ACC and Ministry of Health initiative.

Eight years down the track sees around 50 regulars gather at the Ngaio Union Church each Monday morning to do the exercising, enjoy some good company and tuck into coffee and treats.

More want to attend but the demand for places cannot be met because of limited space available.

To cope with that a wait list is in place, acting like a 'waiting room' for those keen to join the group, as space allows.

Feedback from participants testifies to the good effect of both the physical exercising and

the social interacting. This makes the activity all the more worth doing.

Many live on their own and so Ngaio Agile becomes a regular place for meeting with others outside the home.

Ngaio Agile is organised and run by a team of 11 volunteers from both the Ngaio Union Church and the local community.

This team approach has proved a key feature of the success of Ngaio Agile, sharing the many responsibilities and combining for robust management.

Nuku Ora (formerly Sport Wellington) acts as a resource and support agency for the Live Stronger for Longer programme for the greater Wellington and Wairarapa areas. Their representatives provide training, guidance and networking for suppliers of the programme.

Being a community-based provider means the whole programme runs through volunteer commitment.

The instructors are not professionals but rather are local people who have caught the vision and made themselves available for training and to be rostered on. It's all very low key, but seems to work for the faithful who beat a path to the door of the church each Monday. So, from small beginnings come big things – big in value and significance, to the many in their later years who look for opportunities to belong and benefit from that which 'keeps them young.'

"You're right in the beating heart of the creative, political, legal, corporate and scientific ecosystem of the country.

"The best thing about Open Day is watching the spark ignite someone's sense that they might just have found their place in the world."

The event is part of the university's ongoing efforts to attract and engage prospective students while supporting the Wellington scene.

Open Day 2026 is expected to be one of the largest gatherings of future students in recent years.

Portrait of NZ hero presented

A portrait of Sir Keith Park, who should be much more widely known as a famous New Zealander, was presented to the British High Commission in Wellington on 6 August.

Sir Keith, who regularly visited his sister Lilly in Kelburn, played the key role in the Battle of Britain victory during the Second World War.

His superb strategic and tactical abilities and his outstanding leadership ensured what was a victory, and secured it against the odds.

It saved Britain from being invaded by Hitler and that outcome may well have saved the world from being subjected to Nazi tyranny.

"If any one man won the Battle of Britain, he did," Lord Tedder, who later became Chief of the Royal Air Force, said in 1947.

"I do not believe it is realised how much that one man, with his leadership, his calm judgement and his skill, did to save not only our country but the world."

Sir Keith's portrait was presented to the acting British High Commissioner John Pearson by the President of Sir Keith Park Memorial Airfield Inc, Geoff Burkett.

The Sir Keith Park Memorial Airfield is in Thames.

Sir Keith "leaves an amazing legacy," Mr Pearson said in accepting the portrait.

He commanded RAF No 11 Group during Battle of Britain in 1940.

"Tasked with defending London and south-east England. Group No 11 was pivotal in defeating the German Luftwaffe and preventing a Nazi invasion of Britain.

"He became known as the 'Defender of London' in German intelligence appraisals."

The principal meeting room at the British High Commission's offices in Wellington is named after Sir Keith.

It was "lovely that today we can add this portrait to the room," Mr Pearson said.

He also noted that after his return to New Zealand Sir Keith became chairman of the Auckland International Airport Committee in 1951 and helped persuade the government to purchase land for the Airport.

He served three terms as Auckland City Councillor and was an active supporter of various charities, Mr Pearson said.

"We believe that none of our countrymen from this era had a more direct impact on our history and been denied more recognition," the Chief of Air Staff, Sir Stephen Dalton, said in 2010.

"Everywhere, and all the time, Park knew he was a New Zealander.

"He never failed at any task he was given."

As well as playing the key role in winning the Battle of Britain, Sir Keith was the architect of the British victory in the Battle of Malta.

"He is certainly an unsung hero," Mr Burkett said when presenting the portrait.

"He was driven by his desire to make the best possible decisions for the city, always seeking accurate information to inform his work.

"Tony was a special person whom we have lost far too soon.

"He was always willing to offer a helping hand and share his wisdom.

"I doubt we will see anyone like Tony on council again, with such passion and skill for spreadsheets and data.

"Wellingtonians, especially those living in

the Takapū/Northern ward, were very well served by Tony's dedication and expertise."

Cr Calvert says.

"We are all here for one another during this challenging time. My thoughts are with Tony's family as they now navigate life without him. They should be very proud of everything Tony accomplished, as are we all.

"Tony's legacy will live on through the many lives he touched and the work he championed," she adds.

Wellington City Council will need to conduct a by-election to fill the vacant Council seat. Details were not finalised when the 'Independent Herald' went to print, but it is likely to be around the time of the national election in November this year.

Works for a peaceful world

The event has since grown and has been held across Aotearoa, including Auckland, Tauranga, Christchurch, Wairarapa, Hutt City, Timaru, Dunedin and Queenstown.

New Blood Bank to serve region

The New Zealand Blood Service officially opened its new Wellington Blood Bank on 30 July.

This marks a significant investment in the future of New Zealand's blood supply and ensuring the Greater Wellington region is well placed to meet growing demand for specialist blood banking and transfusion laboratory services.

Opened by the Minister of Health Simeon Brown, the facility at Wellington Regional Hospital is more than three times larger than the previous site and has been designed to support growing demand, improve resilience and provide capacity for future expansion.

Operating 24 hours a day, seven days a week, the Wellington Blood Bank plays a vital role in patient care by providing specialist testing and managing the supply of blood and blood products for the region.

The Service's Chief Executive Sam Cliffe says that demand for specialist testing and transfusion support has grown significantly since the blood bank was first set up at Wellington Regional Hospital more than 45 years ago.

"Most people never see the work that happens inside a blood bank, but it is a critical part of modern healthcare," Sam says.

"Behind every transfusion is a team of highly skilled professionals working around the clock to make sure patients receive the right blood products when they need them most.

"This new facility is about preparing for the future.

"It gives us the capacity, resilience and modern infrastructure we need to meet growing demand, support increasingly complex healthcare services, and continue providing world-class transfusion support for patients across the Wellington region.

"Just as importantly, it's an investment in our people.

"Our Wellington team delivers an extraordinary service every day, and they now have a laboratory designed to support the vital work they do for years to come."

The new laboratory has space for additional testing capability, including a second blood analyser and increased refrigerated storage to help ensure continuity of service.

The Wellington Blood Bank team of 15 staff, including 13 scientists, carries out around 40,000 tests each year.

Their work helps ensure patients receive the right blood and blood products when they need them by storing and managing donated blood, undertaking specialist compatibility testing before transfusions, and performing highly specialised testing to support services such as kidney transplantation.

Michelle Sutherland, Interim Group Director of Operations for Capital, Coast and Hutt Valley, said the new blood bank is an important investment in the region's health services.

"The Wellington Blood Bank is an essential part of the care we provide every day at Wellington Regional Hospital," Michelle says.

"Having this purpose-built facility on site strengthens our ability to deliver timely, safe and high-quality care for patients who need blood transfusions and other specialist services. "We're proud to continue our close partnership with New Zealand Blood Service to support the health needs of our communities now and into the future." Minister of Health Hon Simeon Brown joined New Zealand Blood Service Chief Executive Sam Cliffe, representatives from Health New Zealand, members of the Service's Board and invited guests to mark the opening of the Wellington Blood Bank.

Talk on history of the incorrigibles

Dr Delwyn Blondell, an independent scholar and consultant historian, is the guest speaker at the next meeting of the Wellington Branch of the NZ Society of Genealogists.

The talk will begin at 7:30pm on Wednesday 19 August at the Johnsonville Bowling Club, 34 Frankmoore Avenue.

Dr Blondell's 2024 PhD thesis covered subjects ranging from prostitution to eugenic family studies.

Her talk will focus on 'NZ's 'Incorrigibles': tackling the vices of the socially problematic, 1870-1930'.

As the population of New Zealand grew and new settlers arrived, the expectations of what counted as 'respectable' society became increasingly rigid.

Those who repeatedly broke social laws or moral codes — the disorderly, the undeserving — found themselves pushed to the margins and considered incorrigible.

They were largely written out of the story, remembered only for how their vices allegedly undermined the virtue of the socially acceptable majority.

Some were notorious, such as the reviled baby farmers like Minnie Dean, the first

woman hanged in New Zealand.

Others were men and women in informal and bigamous marriages, ageing prostitutes and difficult reformatory girls.

Some left substantial records, as the State developed legal and administrative tools to manage their behaviour.

Others were all but invisible — ignored, overlooked and difficult to trace.

Dr Blondell will talk about what can be uncovered about their lives, and what their stories tell us about the society that sought to control them.

This talk is aimed at a general audience and is free. Visitors are very welcome at all the branch's meetings.

Coffee, tea, and biscuits are available from 7 pm, and the branch's friendly members will be happy to chat with people.

People who would like some help with their own family history research can ask branch members at the pre-meeting informal discussion group and help session which starts from 6 pm. The meeting should finish between 8.30 and 9 pm.

Public art at Wellington Railway Station

Local people will have an opportunity to participate in a major series of public art projects taking place over the remainder of 2026 at Wellington Railway Station.

Wellington arts organisation Urban Dream Brokerage announced the new project last week.

Supported by Wellington Metro partners KiwiRail, Metlink and Transdev, the Urban Dream Station Series sees a range of leading artists and organisations across the arts presenting free experimental projects.

They invite public participation and highlight the preciousness of the ornate 1937 Baroque and Jacobean styled interior architecture of our railway station.

The interactive projects will be based in the vacant site inside the station, running between July and December.

Featured creating daring new work are leading New Zealand artists like Seraphine Pick, Isabella Loudon, Gabby O'Connor, Jo Randerson and Steven Junil Park, leading producers Squiggla and Barbarian Productions and Melbourne public artmakers Strange Engine.

Squiggla invites people of all ages to discover the power of experimental drawing.

Using dots, lines, squiggles, in weekend workshops the public can respond to the station's grand architecture through art-making.

During their weekday evening commute they can collect a free Squiggla travel journal to make art on their train home – and then contribute to a digital gallery.

Squiggla by Train will take place in October.

Urban Dream Brokerage, supported by Wellington City Council, broker the use of vacant space by artists in the city to provide more public use.

The project highlights the vital role public art, transport and architecture can play together in giving everybody free space to be inspired and come together.

Barbarian Productions present Clown Walk, an alternative participatory take on fashion shows with Steven Junil Park, Jo Randerson and other costume and fashion makers.

Then in November, Strange Engine present Diagrammatica, an independent large-scale participatory and immersive installation combining sculpture, live film, sound and improvised music that was first presented in Melbourne's Rising Festival beneath Federation Square in 2025 – a sellout success experienced by 2500 visitors.

Local History – GHQ building

There is a proposal to remove the heritage status of a very important historical building, the General Headquarters (GHQ), a landmark building on the corner of Taranaki and Buckle Streets.

It's the oldest building on Mount Cook, dating from 1912 on a site occupied by the military since the early days of Wellington's establishment.

The link for giving online feedback about continuing to recognise the building's heritage is below (due by 19 August).

Before the arrival of European settlers, Mount Cook was the Rangitane pa "Pukeahu".

In 1839 the area near Mount Cook was reserved for Te Aro iwi as part of the Wellington Tenth (every tenth section was to be allocated to Māori).

In 1850 a Crown grant was made of 5.26 hectares of the strategic top of Mount Cook overlooking Wellington.

Barracks for the Royal Engineers and the 65th (Wellington) Regiment were built.

That land held by the Ordinance Department did not include the area where the GHQ building stands today (section 90).

On 4 March 1874 the Crown purchased from Māori sections 89 and 90 for 500 pounds.

New wooden barracks were built in 1882 at the bottom of the hill on the corner of Taranaki and Buckle Streets.

The Permanent Artillery was housed there until the soldiers and army command were moved back up the hill to new brick barracks.

The Defence Stores Office (later called GHQ) was built on the bottom site in 1911/12.

It was designed by Government Architect John Campbell's office in the Edwardian Baroque style favoured for English Imperial military buildings, and built from bricks made by Mount Cook prisoners.

The bricks, marked with prison arrows, were also used (more visibly) for the (former) Mount Cook Police Station, at the other end of Pukeahu War Memorial Park, and for the wall along Tasman Street.

Over the main door on Buckle Street is an arch with the legend "GR V 1911" and above the arch is a coat of arms.

The building is one of the few physical reminders of the 1913 Waterfront Strike, a painful dispute between employers and the waterside workers, and formed the backdrop for the conflict.

The "specials", temporarily appointed constables (mostly farmers' sons), reinforced the police force.

The Garrison Hall on Buckle Street, where

the striking workers met, was long ago demolished.

In 1929 the military stores moved to Fort Dorset (Seatoun) and Defence Headquarters moved back down the hill and into the building so that the Dominion Museum and War Memorial could be built on top.

The General Officer Commanding the Army (GHQ) operated from the building until moving to Featherston Street and then to its new building on Stout Street during WWII (now MBIE).

The GHQ building was occupied by the Health Department and used by Internal Affairs for museum storage.

Pukeahu National War Memorial Park commemorates all New Zealanders who died or served in international conflicts, including the 18,000 who died as a result of WWI.

The park is a major part of New Zealand's national identity.

Its two brick buildings on each corner are significant bookends that anchor the park's military history.

The GHQ building is the oldest existing military installation building in New Zealand, built in preparation for the Great War.

It's now the last heritage defence building left on the Mount Cook site; a keystone of military history; and part of the city's WWI Heritage Trail.

Its current low NBS rating of 9% explains the huge containers that surround it but the building was strong enough to withstand multiple earthquakes, including the serious 1942 earthquake.

Under the Government's new legislation, the Building (Earthquake Prone Building System Reform) Amendment Act, it will no longer need expensive design and intervention when only its facade is actually the problem.

Modern and cheaper fixes that tie the facade to the floor of the building mean it can be relatively easily strengthened without a costly budget, meaning saving the building is possible.

New housing is also important but there are many empty sites nearby, including 196 Taranaki Street, 60m away, and the CityHop Carpark opposite.

Demolition of history, and of this unique and interesting building, is not needed to create an attractive and affordable city.

GHQ represents 176 years of military history on Mount Cook, and 152 years at the site at the bottom of the hill.

Illegal drugs found in Karori

A man has been arrested following a Police search of a property in Karori.

The 39-year-old was charged in relation to the alleged importation of controlled drugs.

"The man faces charges including attempts to import and possession for supply.

"He's due to reappear in the Wellington District Court on 27 August," Detective Sergeant Tankin says.

Mansfield House a runner up

Katherine Mansfield House & Garden was runner up in the Heritage and Environment section of this year's Wellington Airport Regional Community Awards.

The Wellington City community awards were presented at a ceremony at the Michael Fowler Centre on 29 July.

Katherine Mansfield House & Garden is a significant literary heritage attraction.

In Thorndon, it is where internationally acclaimed New Zealand writer Katherine Mansfield was born and lived the first five years of her life.

She wrote short stories, poetry, letters, journals and reviews. Many of her works have been translated into more than 25 languages.

Katherine Mansfield began writing as a teenager and soon vowed to make it her career.

After completing a couple of years of high school in London, she decided to make the Northern Hemisphere her home. She spent much of her time living and writing in England, Switzerland, and France.

Katherine died in 1923 at the age of 34 from tuberculosis.

Her legacy of letters and modernist short stories lives on. It inspires writers, musicians and artists, and draws visitors from around the

world to her birthplace in Wellington.

In the early 1980s the Tinakori Road house's connection to the internationally famous author was all but forgotten.

That changed when the Katherine Mansfield Birthplace Society was established in 1986 and began to restore the house.

They have worked to recreate how the home would have looked when the Mansfield family lived there.

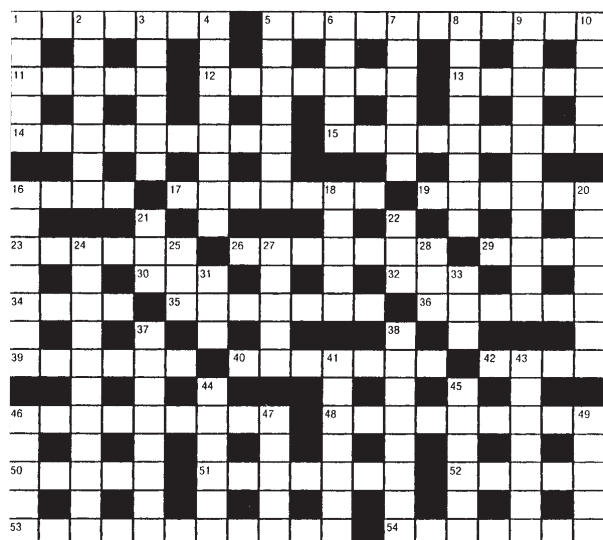

No third time lucky for Norths

For the third time this season fierce local rivals TFS North Wellington and Tawa did battle having met once in round robin competition and once in the Chatham Cup.

Tawa won both games by a single goal – 3-2 and 4-3 respectively.

Saturday started in similar fashion to many Tawa games so far this season with golden boot leader Sam Staunton opening the scoring in just the fourth minute.

Lachie Macgregor equalized with an absolute wonder goal in the 23rd minute, however Staunton had Tawa back in front just four minutes later.

A 15 minute brace from North Wellington captain Miles Woodhall took his goal tally to seven for the season.

Much like Tawa's earlier equaliser, North Wellington weren't in the lead for long with Ethan Phelan equalising for Tawa in the 65th minute.

Last goal wins rang true for Tawa

in the 81st minute, when Staunton scored his seventh goal against North Wellington out of the twenty he's scored this year in all competitions, notching up his fifth hattrick of the year so far with three league games remaining.

After denying Miramar Rangers a Central League title last week, barring an absolute miracle, Waterside Karori set their eyes on league leaders Napier City Rovers in their round 16 Central League encounter.

Despite frustrating Rovers for the

best part of half an hour, a 29th minute goal from the in-form Benjamin Stanley dampened Karori's spirits. Things were looking up for the blink of an eye when Albie Francis-Alles equalized in the 43rd minute.

However, in their next attack Napier retook the lead back through a former Wharfies player Luca Barclay.

Leo Brown killed the game off for Napier despite nearly reducing the deficit to one with a strike from distance in the dying stages.

Karori's three game unbeaten run came to a halt at the hands of Napier in a 3-1 defeat.

Three second half goals kept Waterside Karori women a point behind Petone in second spot on the women's Central League ladder.

A brace from Sophie Burchfield and a Natalie Orellana goal saw Wharfies avenge a 2-0 earlier season defeat to Palmerston North United with a 3-0 victory at Te Whaea.

The Karori Residents' Association will hold its annual general meeting at 7pm on Monday 7 September via Zoom.

The guest speaker this year is William Woods from Centrepoint.

William will speak on the upcoming construction work at the Interislander ferry terminal area at Kaiwharawhara.

This work is scheduled to start soon and will continue through to 2029.

The annual meeting will also be informed about what the association has achieved over the past year and will look at what it is working on for 2026-27.

Stop Tiaki Wai protest

Stop Tiaki Wai is holding a protest on 20 August in a bid to seek significant change to the Tiaki Wai set up.

After meeting at 11:30am at Frank Kitts Park, opposite the Wellington City Council Chambers in 2 Harris Street, the protest will march to Parliament.

The protest "is against the action of Tiaki Wai," says Guy Nunns, one of the founders of Stop Tiaki Wai.

"We want to completely change this organisation to suit us and us alone, the greater Wellington city ratepayer and resident."

The march is calling for:

- democratic accountability to be restored;
- competitively managed affordable water services, producing a significant reduction in the water bills;
- any future water bill increases limited to the rate of increases to superannuation;
- an independently audited, fully costed 10-year financial plan;
- meaningful consultation with households before major projects proceed; and
- existing infrastructure problems to be fixed before billions more are borrowed.

"Households demand the restoration of their right to have a meaningful say before they are locked into decades of higher charges and debt," Guy says.

"Our country has become unaffordable," Tiaki Wai says on its Facebook page.

"This needs to change.

"Say no to the exorbitant, unaccountable water costs.

"Be the change you want to see.

"Join the protest. Together we are strong."

Stop Tiaki Wai's mission is "to restrict Tiaki Wai's ability to incur significant new debt or begin projects until democratic accountability is restored, affordability is addressed and meaningful consultation has taken place."

Tiaki Wai's forecasted billing is set to triple in 10 years. The forecast water bill for 2027 is \$2,100, and for 2036 it is \$6,200.

"Forecasted water charges will bankrupt many home owners," Stop Tiaki Wai says.

It also noted the charge for water metres for each household is \$4,000, and asks if the metres are "gold plated".

Loss of democratic accountability and flawed governance is also among the series of issues Stop Tiaki Wai raises.

It also says "public consultation on Tiaki Wai was a sham" and there is an "alarming conflict of interest within the Tiaki Wai governance structure".

It further notes that the "Commerce Commission and others have raised major concern".

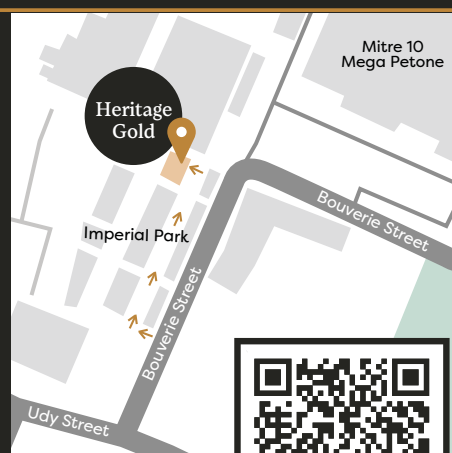
