



New Australian Karate Champion

Neiko Love, who is a member of the Raroa-based Marist Kyokushin Karate Club, is the new Australian Kyokushin Karate Champion.

Neiko won the heavyweight full-contact open grade, the premier division at the Australian MKA Kyokushin Karate Championships this month.

He was one of two club members to feature among the medals.

Miu Lin, who at 14 was the youngest member of the New Zealand team, won a bronze medal in the non-contact section of her age grade division.

Winning the gold medal "was really surreal," Neiko says.

"I'm beyond happy.

"All of the hard work and dedication paid off.

"Standing on that podium was definitely something else."

Neiko is coached by Shihan (Master) Peter Jennings, who has – along with his wife Sensi Bev-Ann Jennings (4th Dan) and a number of internationally certified black belts – been running the Marist Kyokushin Karate Club at Raroa Intermediate School since 2000.

"When the decision came my way I just gave Shihan a big hug," Neiko says.

"It was pretty amazing."

Neiko began his Karate journey in 2009 when he was five or six years old.

"I have been training ever since," he says. His ambitions for the future are to "keep

on training.

"Also there's a big international tournament next year, a World Tournament in Jakarta, Indonesia, so I will be training up hard for that.

"In about three years' time there is the big World Tournament in Japan and I'm hoping to get there as well."

Neiko and Mui were members of the five strong New Zealand team to compete in the annual Australian MKA National Kyokushin Karate Championships.

Shihan Peter also attended the event.

"Given New Zealand had a relatively small team competing against Australia's best from every state, the challenge was such that even one podium finish would constitute a success for the team," Peter says.

"However the results for the team far exceeded all expectations and hopes, with two achieving third place in their division, one second place and two returning home with impressive first place trophies."

The other Kiwi winner was Creed Norman from Gisborne, also a heavyweight, competing in the low grade full-contact division.

This year's results, Peter says, were "by far the most successful of all Kiwi teams who have attended the Australian competition over the past five decades.

“It has prompted a large number of Australian fighters and officials committing to exact revenge at the 2027 MKNZ Open National Championships, which will be held at Porirua’s Te Rauparaha Arena in late February.”
Peter’s comments about the quality of the New Zealand performances is echoed by Neiko.
“New Zealand did very well considering the small team we brought over,” Neiko says.
“Everyone overachieved what was

expected.
“Everyone was very happy with these results. We are over the moon,” Neiko says.

Stop Tiaki Wai founder Guy Nunns plans to stand for a seat on the Wellington City Council.
He plans to stand in the upcoming by election for a Takapu/Northern Ward.
The by election is taking place following the recent passing of Takapu/Northern Ward Councillor Tony Randle.
Mr Nunns announced his intention to stand in the by election just after Tiaki Wai held a protest at Parliament on 20 August.
“I will be standing on a platform of saving money, not spending money we don’t have,”

he says.
That will include “keeping debt to a minimum and questioning the whole water situation.”
Wellington City Council “still apparently have control over Tiaki Wai.
“This would be a good little effort from us to have someone in there with an official status questioning what is going on,” he says.
Mr Nunns stood for the Wharangi/Onslow-Western Ward in both the 2025 and the 2028 Wellington City Council elections, but was not voted in.

Greg O'Connor considers standing for WCC

Ohariu MP Greg O'Connor is "seriously considering" standing for a seat on the Wellington City Council.

Although a by election had not been announced when the 'Independent Herald' went to print, a by election for a new Takapu/Northern Ward Councillor is almost certain.

This follows the death of the very highly performing former Takapu/ Northern Ward Councillor Tony Randle earlier this month.

"I haven't made a final decision yet, but I'm seriously considering it," Mr O'Connor says.

"I have had conversations with a lot of people ... a very wide ranging group of people from local businesses to local residents to local politicians.

"Given that a big proportion of the old Ohariu electorate makes up the Northern Ward, it's an area I obviously know very well and the people I know well," he says.

"It was always my intention to contest Ohariu again.

"With Ohariu gone, I don't want to ever leave Wellington, so my options were diminished," Greg says.

Mr O'Connor was elected to Parliament in 2017, and will have served as an MP for nine years at the end of this Parliamentary term.

After being selected as Labour's Ohariu candidate that year, he aimed to challenge long serving MP Peter Dunne.

However Mr Dunne withdrew and Mr O'Connor won the seat ahead of National list MP Brett Hudson with a margin of 1,051 votes.

He then retained the seat in the 2020 election with a big margin of 11,961 votes.

Mr O'Connor was in the Police for 41

years before being elected to Parliament, including being elected by Police officers to be the President of the Police Association."

"At this stage five of the six candidates have confirmed they will attend," the KRA Chair Andrea Skews told the 'Independent Herald' on 25 August.

The five candidates who have confirmed are Dr Ayesha Verrall (Labour), Tamatha Paul (Greens), Jonathan Pitts (National), Jessica Hammond (Opportunity), and Josh Harford (Alliance).

The KRA was still waiting to hear back from Matthew Hague (ACT).

"We want to know the questions you want to ask," the KRA says.

"Please send us your questions for the candidates well ahead of the evening.

"We won't be taking questions from the floor on the night.

"This helps us keep things running to time, avoid repetition, and make sure the questions of greatest interest and importance to our community get priority."

Top two apprentices both locals

Two locals scooped the pool in the Lower North Island Apprentice of the Year competition.

Ngaio resident Dylan Johnston was named the Lower North Island's 2026 Master Builders Carters Apprentice of the Year on 24 August.

Richard Carroll, who lives in Karori, gained second placing.

Dylan is an apprentice with Tonks Residential Construction.

"Dylan delivered an exceptional entry, with an articulate and engaging written submission that combined clear, thorough explanations with a strong understanding of the materials, methods and building requirements behind his work," the judges said.

"He demonstrated an impressive ability to explain not only what he had done, but why and how, alongside a sound understanding of the Building Code and industry standards.

"His compelling personal story further showcased his commitment to the trade, willingness to learn and pride in his development as an apprentice.

"Dylan reinforced this strong impression throughout the practical challenge, interview and site visit."

The judges praised his careful planning, excellent health and safety practices, organisation and

high standard of workmanship, as well as the depth of knowledge he demonstrated across his project.

"He confidently discussed everything from demolition through to finishing details, clearly explaining construction methods, challenges

and the solutions used along the way," the judges said.

"His passion for building and genuine pride in his work shone through, leaving the judges in no doubt that his technical ability, professionalism and commitment to

quality mark him as an exciting emerging talent with a very bright future in the industry."

Dylan will now progress to the national Apprentice of the Year competition in Auckland from 7 to 9 October.

Richard is an apprentice with Western Builders.

"Richard's submission demonstrated an excellent understanding of his project, with detailed plans and examples helping to clearly communicate the work involved," the judges said.

"During the judging process, he presented with confidence while remaining humble about his achievements, and his ability to reflect on his own development made a strong impression.

"The project itself represented a significant achievement for Richard.

"He had taken on a leadership role from start to finish, managing the site team alongside subcontractors and suppliers while maintaining oversight of the build.

"During the site visit, he spoke confidently about the different stages of the project, the challenges encountered and how they were overcome.

"He carried that same composed approach into the practical challenge, where his calm manner and well-presented tool kit reflected a professional approach to his work.

"Richard's maturity and growing leadership ability mark him as a highly capable apprentice," the judges said.

Both Dylan and Richard trained through BCITO.

Now in its twenty-third year, the Apprentice of the Year competition, delivered in partnership with Carters, is New Zealand's leading competition for construction apprentices.

It recognises and celebrates apprentices who are building strong skills and showing promise as the next generation of industry leaders.

Across New Zealand, 95 apprentices from nine regions took part in the 2026 regional competition.

Each apprentice submitted a detailed overview of a building project they were working on before completing a two-hour practical challenge, which required them to build a project box revealed on the morning of the competition.

The top 10 regional competitors were then interviewed by a judging panel and assessed during an on-site visit to their project, where they were tested on their technical understanding, communication, project involvement and wider industry knowledge.

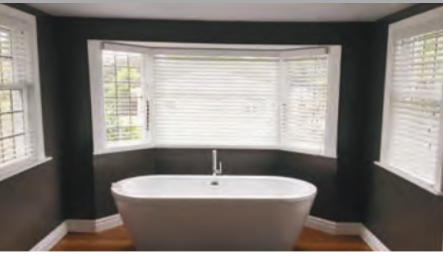

Making literacy fun and joyful

At Capital City Preschool literacy starts long before a child learns to read or write. It begins with conversations, songs, stories, rhymes, noticing sounds and discovering that words, letters and books can be exciting.

The preschool has been strengthening its language and literacy curriculum through professional learning with Liz Kane Literacy. The teaching team is deepening its understanding of how young children develop the foundations needed for later reading, spelling and writing, and how these skills can be intentionally nurtured through play and everyday experiences.

“We want our children to leave us excited about books, words, sounds and stories,” says Capital City Preschool Professional Leader Lisa Marshall.

“Literacy at this age should be fun and joyful.

“Our children are learning through play, conversations, music, stories and relationships, and we can intentionally weave early literacy skills into those experiences.”

Throughout the day, children enjoy stories, poems, songs, rhyming and listening games, and playful opportunities to notice sounds and letters.

Oral language and vocabulary are equally

important, with children encouraged to ask questions, share ideas and discover new words through their play.

While children take part in a short, intentional learning session each week introducing a new character, letter and its sound, this learning is then brought to life through stories, songs, games, conversations and play.

It combines evidence-based teaching knowledge with the joy, curiosity and play that should sit at the heart of the preschool years.

“We don’t want literacy to become something children think of as work,” Lisa says.

“We want them to be curious about language, to love being read to, to delight in rhyme and to feel proud when they discover something new.

“We also celebrate the different home languages our children bring to preschool.

“Literacy is about so much more than letters and sounds – it’s about language, communication, connection and giving children the confidence to share their ideas.”

By strengthening teacher knowledge while keeping learning playful and engaging, Capital City Preschool hopes to give every child a strong foundation and, most importantly, spark a lifelong love of literacy.

This projected video artwork explores the body as a woven universe, and movement as wananga - learning through movement and introspection.

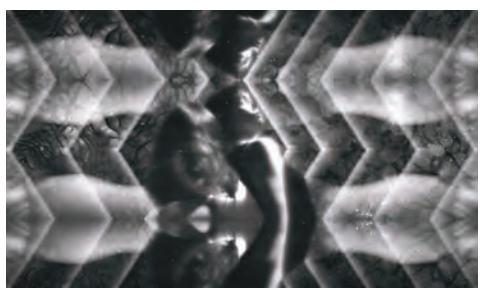
This event is weather dependent and cancellations will be announced via their website www.teaoraranga.co.nz and instagram, @teaoraranga.

"We wondered if we could get him a replacement seat."

Sure enough, Greg turned up in "Litte Red" as his car is known and, during the speeches towards the end of the event, he was summoned to the stage – the tray of an old Ford pick-up truck – to be presented with his new seat by the club chairman, Phil Kidd.

Mr O'Connor's new seat is a large Lay-Z-Boy recliner, donated by the new City Mission shop in Johnsonville.

Having been invited to try it for comfort, Greg compared it favourably to the Speaker's chair at Parliament House, claiming his new seat to be immeasurably more comfortable.

"I am absolutely stoked with this gesture from heartland people", said the surprised retiring MP.

He told the audience from his new seat that he had spent all morning "touching base at the show with real people.

"It has been a wonderful day. The Cancer Society "is a great cause and I am touched by this gesture," Greg said to the crowd from his new seat.

The annual Daffodils Motor Show is a fundraiser for the Wellington regional branch of the New Zealand Cancer Society.

Almost \$6,000 was raised at the event.

SEPTEMBER

September is a busy month in the garden calendar. The days are getting longer and the weather warmer. The promise of a long hot summer and a bumper harvest is in the air!

PLANTING

- ✓ Vege seedlings & plants
- ✓ Potatoes
- ✓ Peas & beans
- ✓ Strawberries
- ✓ Passionfruit
- ✓ Sweet peas
- ✓ Sunflowers
- ✓ Lavender

MAINTENANCE

- ✓ Protect frost sensitive plants
- ✓ Guard against slugs & snails
- ✓ Replenish container mix
- ✓ Check compost bins
- ✓ Spray for broadleaf weeds
- ✓ Re-sow lawn
- ✓ Spray for Onehunga weed
- ✓ Spray stone fruit trees

GARDEN TIPS & TRICKS

FRUIT

- ▶ Plant passionfruit in warmer regions. Choose well-drained soil, provide strong support and protect tender foliage from frost.
- ▶ Plant new citrus trees, removing flowers from young trees so they can concentrate on establishing strong growth.
- ▶ Feed strawberry plants every two weeks and water fertiliser in well.

VEGETABLES

- ▶ Sow carrots, parsnip, beetroot, silverbeet, peas, lettuce, leeks, cabbage, tomato, capsicum, courgette and cucumber. Transplant tender seedlings as the weather warms.
- ▶ Sow peas, snow peas and beans directly into the ground, protecting new growth from frost.
- ▶ Plant seedlings of lettuce, cabbage, corn, pumpkin, celery, onions, silverbeet and courgettes.
- ▶ Plant sprouted seed potatoes now for a later harvest.

FLOWERS

- ▶ Replace winter flowers with fresh spring annuals. Add a pinch of blood & bone when planting.
- ▶ Sow cosmos, impatiens, lobelia, salvia, viola and poppies, transplanting as the weather warms.
- ▶ Plant spring annuals including alyssum, begonia, dahlia, marigold and petunia.
- ▶ Sow sweet peas in a sunny, well-drained position with trellis support.
- ▶ Plant summer bulbs including gladioli, dahlias and begonias.
- ▶ Plant lavender in a well-drained position with at least half a day of sun.

JOB

- ▶ Prepare garden beds with compost before spring planting.
- ▶ Empty mature compost from your compost bin and spread it around the garden.
- ▶ Protect vulnerable plants from frost with frost cloth, keeping the cloth off the foliage.

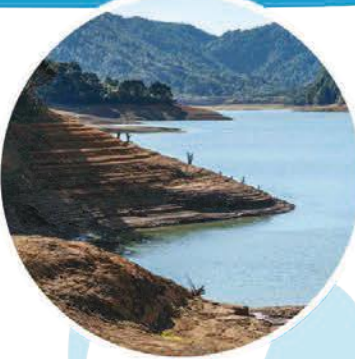

Successful Stop Tiaki Wai protest

Around 1,000 people joined the Stop Tiaki Wai protest that marched to Parliament on 20 August.

“We consider it to be a great success,” one of Stop Tiaki Wai’s founders, Guy Nunns says.

The protest, he says, “is against the action of Tiaki Wai”.

“How is it that we cannot pay for the basic things we need?” Mr Nunns asked in his speech on Parliament’s grounds.

“How is it that any number of people here now are struggling to actually pay their mortgage at the end of the week?”

“This has to stop,” he said.

“We’ve got Christopher Luxon saying something’s wrong.

“We’ve got Chris Bishop saying something’s wrong.

“We’ve Michael Laws saying it’s a disaster – Tiaki Wai.

“We’ve got Dave Seymour saying something’s wrong.

“We don’t know about the left. I’m sure they are thinking something’s wrong, but they are possibly milking this opportunity,” Mr Nunns said.

“We all want the same thing and it’s pretty simple ... clear, non-toxic, affordable water.

“I think if we can impress on the people that make decisions that this is what we want from this agency we are all going to be much better off.

“When it is done well, everybody is better off ... because we will get a resource delivered at a very good price efficiently and well,” he said.

Commenting on water meters, Mr Nunns said: “We don’t want to pay ... three times what they are paying up in Auckland for the same thing.”

He and his group were not enamoured with water meters.

Around 70% of the Tiaki Wai bill was for provision of stormwater and wastewater.

“What is left is the 30%.

“A water meter is a punitive charge,” he said.

“We are going to keep progressing.

“Going forward we have got some really good things in the pipeline, so stay tuned,” Mr Nunns said.

The 20 August protest march was calling for:

- democratic accountability to be restored;
- competitively managed affordable water services, producing a significant

- reduction in the water bills;
- any future water bill increases limited to the rate of increases to superannuation;
 - an independently audited, fully costed 10-year financial plan;
- meaningful consultation with households before major projects proceed; and
 - existing infrastructure problems to be fixed before billions more are borrowed.

Understanding Cholesterol

Cholesterol (mat ngako) is a fat-like substance found in your blood. Your body needs some cholesterol to work properly. It helps build cells and hormones and plays a role in digesting fats. Cholesterol comes from two sources: your liver makes most of it, while some comes from the food you eat. However, having too much cholesterol in your blood can be harmful. High cholesterol can increase your risk of a heart attack or stroke because it can cause fatty deposits to build up inside your arteries.

Types of cholesterol

There are two main types of cholesterol: LDL (low-density lipoprotein) and HDL (high-density lipoprotein).

LDL is often called “bad” cholesterol.

When LDL levels are too high, cholesterol can build up in the walls of your arteries. Over time, this can form hard fatty deposits called plaque. Plaque can narrow the arteries and, if it breaks away and blocks blood flow, can cause a heart attack or stroke. HDL is known as “good” cholesterol. It helps carry excess LDL cholesterol away from the arteries and

back to the liver, where it can be processed and removed from the body.

What are triglycerides?

Triglycerides are another type of fat in your blood. Your body turns unused calories into triglycerides and stores them in fat cells. Levels can remain high when you regularly consume more energy than your body needs, particularly from refined sugars, sweets, baked foods, white bread, sugary drinks and alcohol. High triglycerides can also contribute to fatty plaque in the arteries.

Getting your cholesterol checked

The only way to know your cholesterol levels is through a blood test, sometimes called a lipid profile or lipid test. It measures cholesterol and triglycerides. If you have never had a cholesterol test, talk to your doctor or nurse about when you should have one. You may need testing earlier or more often if you have a family history or other risk factors for heart attack or stroke.

How can you lower cholesterol?

You can help lower cholesterol by eating more vegetables, fruit, wholegrains and high-fibre foods, while limiting saturated fats and added sugar. Regular physical activity, maintaining a healthy weight, avoiding smoking and limiting alcohol can also support heart health. Some people may also need cholesterol-lowering medicine prescribed by their doctor.

That was duly slotted by Miles Woodhall and Norths defended for their lives throughout the final half an hour plus added time.

As the full time whistle came an explosion of joy erupted from North Wellington who came out on the right end of a tough encounter, moving up to second on the table after Tawa faltered away in Palmerston North.

North Wellington's final game beckons this Saturday at Alex Moore Park when they host ninth placed Wainuiomata at 2:30pm.

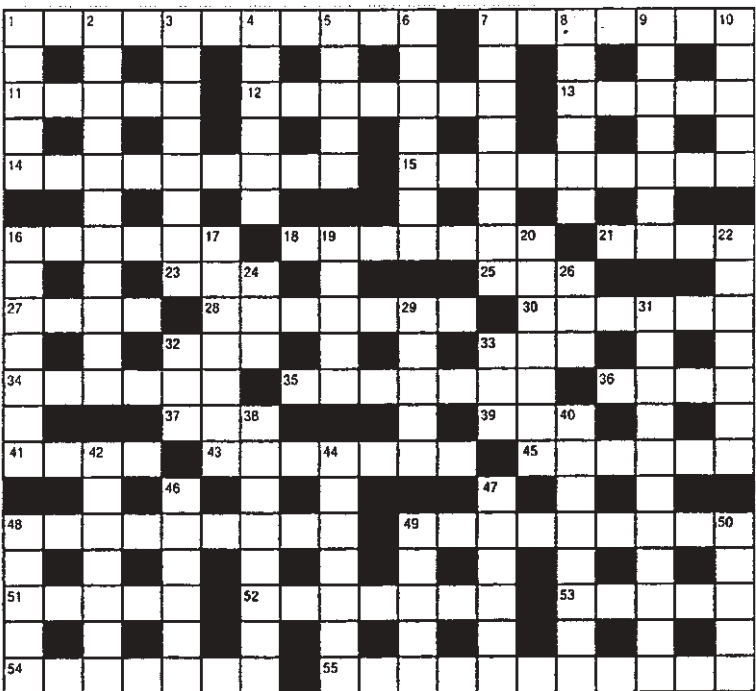
